COMMITTEE ON WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE REPORT ON

BILL NO. 1097

AN ACT TO PROVIDE APPROPRIATIONS FOR THE OPERATIONS OF THE EXECUTIVE BRANCH OF THE GOVERNMENT OF GUAM AND FOR OTHER PURPOSES FOR FISCAL YEAR 1995.

PURPOSE AND ESSENTIAL ELEMENTS

Bill No. 1097 provides appropriations for the Executive and Judicial Branches of the government of Guam for Fiscal Year 1995. As introduced, Bill 1097 contains two sections.

Section 1. contains estimated revenues from the General Fund of the government of Guam for Fiscal Year 1995 of \$540,164,800, and estimated revenues from Special Funds, including the Tourist Attraction Fund, of \$87,126,041, for a total of \$627,290,841. This does not include federal funds not appropriated by the Legislature, or federal funds requiring local match.

Section 2. contains various appropriations for the Executive and Judicial Branches of the government of Guam. Section 2 incorporates a "rollover" provision patterned on the rollover provision previously adopted in law for Fiscal Years 1993 and 1994, in which a declining appropriation is repeated for each territorial agency of the government. The Bureau of Budget and Management Research listing gives the amount available for FY 1995 as follows:

PUBLIC HEARING

The Committee on Ways and Means conducted a joint public hearing with the Committee on Tourism and Transportation on July 13, 1994 at 9:00 a. m. in the Legislative Public Hearing Room to gather testimony on Bill No. 1097. Present at the hearing were the Chairman, Senator Carl T. C. Gutierrez, who conducted the hearing, being joined by the Vice-Chairperson, Senator Herminia D. Dierking and Ways and Means Committee members Senators T. C. Ada, J. P. Aguon, E. P. Arriola, J. G. Bamba, A. C. Blaz, V. C. Pangelinan, D. L. G. Shimizu, and Speaker J. T. San Agustin, and Tourism and Transportation Committee members Senators T. V. C. Tanaka, D. F. Brooks, and F. E. Santos.

TESTIMONY

Testimony was taken simultaneously for Bill No. 1098 and for Bill No. 1097, because both bills required a detailed examination of the financial condition of the government of Guam.

The following Administration officials appeared in person and offered testimony on the financial condition of the government:

- Mr. Carl Taitano, Special Assistant for Financial Affairs, Office of the Governor
- Ms. Bernadette DeNorcey, Acting Director of Bureau of Budget and Management Research
- Mr. Paul Leon Guerrero, Analyst, Bureau of Budget and Management Research,
- Mr. Joseph Rivera, Analyst, Bureau of Budget and Management Research
- Mr. John DeNorcey, Controller, Department of Administration
- Mr. Tom Blaz, Deputy Director, Department of Agriculture.

Chairman Gutierrez began the hearing by noting that the hearing was being jointly conducted by the Committee on Ways and Means and the Committee on Tourism and Transportation. He then read a letter from the Governor transmitting Bill No. 1097. This letter addressed issues concerning Bill No. 1098 as well as Bill No. 1097. A copy of this letter is attached to this committee report.

The Chairman first called for testimony from the general public, or from groups that are not part of the government. No one testified in person. The **Chamber of Commerce** did submit written testimony on Bill No. 1098, which included a statement that they did not at this time have testimony on Bill No. 1097, but would submit some at a later date.

Much of the discussion during the July 13, 1994 public hearing concerned the provisions of Bill No. 1098. During the discussion, the interaction between the provisions of Bill No. 1098 and Bill No. 1097 was discussed, supposing that the two measures were both enacted into law.

Senator Pangelinan indicated that the Governor estimated revenues at \$540M for FY 1995, and that the estimated expenses for the Executive Branch is \$510M. However, the Executive Branch expenditures will, in fact, not be within the ceiling of \$510M. Senator Pangelinan pointed out that if Bill No. 1098 were enacted, that there would be a deficit budget, because there is no provision within the \$510M ceiling to pay the extra obligations authorized. The point was made that the real expenses would not be within the \$540M ceiling of total estimated revenues.

Chairman Gutierrez then inquired into the number of new employees hired within the government of Guam over the last three months, in order to estimate the aggravation on the cash flow of the government that is occuring due to new hires. Ms. DeNorcey did not have the number of new employees hired or the exact amount of the funds necessary to pay them, but promised the Committee that this information would be forthcoming.

Chairman Gutierrez then explained the cash situation with the government. The Governor asks for a certain funding level for the next fiscal year, however, it is not known with absolute certainty that that funding level will be achieved. If the cash flow is slow, and the funding level granted in the budget act is not being achieved, the Bureau of Budget and Management Research must slow down on allotment releases, so that the obligations of the government stay within the cash flow.

Senator Brooks said that there was no item in Bill No. 1097 to repay the loan, should Bill No. 1098 be passed into law.

Ms. Bernie DeNorcey said that it was estimated that \$39M would be coming in for Section 30 money, and that \$3M of that would be earmarked for debt service on the bonds authorized by Bill No. 1098. The specific language is not contained within Bill No. 1097.

Mr. John DeNorcey said that, looking briefly at Bill No. 1097, that he was unable to determine what amount is appropriated within that bill.

Senator Brooks asked for a breakdown of what would be appropriated, per agency, in Bill No. 1097.

Ms. Bernie DeNorcey indicated that there was a worksheet indicating what would "rollover" in the budget, per agency, including autonomous agencies. The worksheet handed out during the public hearing is attached to this committee report.

Chairman Gutierrez indicated that there will be a \$28M needed in debt service reflected in the budget bill, when it is reported out of the Committee.

Chairman Gutierrez asked why Section 30 funds were not set aside in Bill No. 1097, as it should be. The Chairman then explained to those present how the numbers were changed to reflect the same total, even though Section 30 funds were not reported separately as estimated revenue in Bill No. 1097.

Chairman Gutierrez pointed out that during an Oversight Hearing of the Committee on Ways and Means, held June 22, 1994, the Department of Administration and the Bureau of Budget and Management Research submitted an estimated revenue breakdown for the government of Guam for Fiscal Year 1995. That breakdown is attached. The breakdown indicates that the estimated revenues from the General Fund for Fiscal Year 1995 is \$540,164,800. The breakdown, however, from the Projected Revenues of June 22, 1994 is different from the breakdown contained in Bill No. 1097. A comparison of the two is as follows:

Chairman Gutierrez asked those testifying what the process is to prepare a budget. He pointed out the difference between the amounts expected to be received in the various Revenue Sources as presented on June 22, 1994 and as stated within Bill No. 1097, the Governor's budget request for Fiscal Year 1995.

Chairman Gutierrez pointed out specifically that, although the amounts stated in Bill No. 1097 are changed in the Millions place in the numeral, that the last six digits of the numerals are identical, thereby both adding up to \$540,164,800. He asked how that could be, that it is not coincidental. He pointed out that it was impossible that the amounts were recalculated, but that simply the same total was used, and the numerals stated to add up to the total were manipulated to add up to the same total.

Chairman Gutierrez indicated that this is not the proper way to calculate Estimated Revenues for a budget. He pointed out that one starts with the amounts estimated to be received, per category, and then adds these amounts up to get a total. One does not start with a total, and then work backwards by filling in the numbers above in order to get the total.

Senator Bamba then inquired whether it was possible that the Other category of licenses and fees, which are departmental charges, would increase by \$8M for this next fiscal year. Mr. Paul Leon Guerrero of the Bureau of Budget and Management Research indicated that many agencies are holding public hearings, pursuant to the recent authority by law to increase their fees, and that the fees will bring in increased revenues.

Senator Shimizu then inquired into the Licenses, Fees and Permits category of estimated revenues. He asked when the draft of the estimated revenues were made, and Mr. Leon Guerrero responded that it was done approximately 30 days ago.

Senator Shimizu then inquired how it was possible to increase the receipts by \$8M. He asked whether there were instructions to increase this category by nine times, within the 30 days, and whether information, per agency, in the increase in specific fees was taken into account, based on the agencies' recent actions to increase fees.

Ms. DeNorcey indicated that the increase in fees was due only to the Guam Police Department and the Department of Agriculture, which were contained in Bill No. 1098 for approval by the Legislature. The other departments were not estimated.

Senator Shimizu asked whether there was any information showing that there will actually be an increase in fees of \$8M. Senator Shimizu asked if there was a worksheet showing the actual increase, and whether he could have a copy of them. He pointed out that the public hearings may be held on the increase of fees, but the actual increase in receipts would not be known, as the fees would not be in place.

Chairman Gutierrez indicated then that he would like to nail down the projected revenues, and that any further information on that subject should be forwarded to the Committee on Ways and Means. He also indicated that he wanted assurance that all of the requirements for expenditures were contained in the budget, as the amount needed for retiring the debt, or the debt service, was not contained in the bill.

Mr. Leon Guerrero said that the specific amounts do not need to be recognized in the budget bill, as long as there is sufficient revenue to pay the debt service.

Senator Shimizu indicated that he did not want to see "soft" figures in the budget, such as the inclusion of the round figure of \$1M for Children's Inpatient Unit of the Department of Mental Health, and another appropriation for Off-Island Residential Treatment.

Chairman Gutierrez indicated that he wanted especially to focus on estimated revenues. Senator Shimizu indicated that he also wanted to look into the expenditures.

Senator Shimizu asked who is authorized to make allotments to spend money in the government of Guam. Mr. John DeNorcey indicated that it is the Bureau of Budget and Management Research. Mr. Leon Guerrero added that it is the Director of that agency, specifically, with the responsibility. Senator Shimizu asked if it was the "front office" that decides. Senator Shimizu then inquired into the release of funds to for medical insurance for those retirees who are on Medicare.

Senator Dierking then inquired into what the budget for the Judicial Branch is right now. Ms. Bernie DeNorcey indicated that it was \$18M for FY 1994. Senator Dierking asked for the complete number and was furnished the number \$18,183,119. Senator Dierking pointed out that according to the message of the Governor accompanying Bill No. 1097, that to recompute the numbers, the real number contained in the worksheet for the ceiling for the Executive Branch is \$510,590,412, not \$510M as is stated in the letter. In rounding numbers, you would round the number up, not down. Since there is approximately \$600,000 additionally needed, taking into

account the Judicial Branch and the Executive Branch, and if Bill No. 1097 represents a balanced budget, where is the extra needed \$600,000 to come from? Ms. Bernie DeNorcey indicated that the budget for Public Defender was listed in the Executive Branch, and should not have been included, so the number would be under \$510M.

Since there were not more questions or comments at this time, Chairman Gutierrez indicated that the hearing was concluded.

COMMITTEE ACTION

The Committee on Ways and Means, after consideration of the testimony offered at the public hearing, decided to report Bill No. 1097 out, as introduced, which is identical to bill transmitted as the request of the Governor.

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION

The Committee on Ways and Means wishes to report out Bill 1097 to the full legislature to do pass, as introduced by the request of the Governor.

Section 1. The sum of Six Million Dollars (\$6,000,000) is appropriated from the General Fund to the University of Guam for the following programs in Fiscal Year 1995:

Merit Awards, Student Loans, Nurses Training, Professional and Technical Awards, Doctoral Fellowships, ROTC, Regents Scholarship, Marine Lab Graduates Assistance, Advanced High School Placement, Senior Citizens, Administration of all Student Financial Assistance Programs, Doc Sanchez Scholarship Program, and Political Status Education Coordinating Commission.

Section 2. Section 3. The sum of One Hundred Eleven Thousand Eighty Five Dollars (\$111,085) is appropriated from the General Fund to the Guam State Council on Vocational Education to supplement federal funds and other operational requirements for Fiscal Year 1995.

Section 4. The sum of Thirty Three Million One Hundred Fifty Nine Thousand One Hundred Eighty Dollars (\$33,159,180) is appropriated from the General Fund to the Government of Guam Retirement Fund for the benefits of approximately Four Thousand Three Hundred Thirty Five (4,335) retirees:

Section 5. Dear Mr. Speaker:

Transmitted herewith are our budget recommendations for fiscal year 1995, as well as a measure to authorize the acquisition of \$45 million for the purposes of immediately paying off all income tax refunds due the residents of Guam this year.

Revenues for FY'95 are projected at \$540 million. The Executive Branch budget herein recommended is one of approximately \$510 million. We are holding a reserve of some \$30 million for the operations of the Guam Legislature and the Superior Court.

This budget is balanced, but leaves no room for further appropriations on the part of the Legislature. I urge the Legislature, should it entertain this budget, not to consider any further appropriations whatsoever, unless a new funding source is created or a de-appropriation of some budget item occurs simultaneously.

You will note that this budget includes two notable increases from last year. The first is a \$12 million increase for our schools. Schools are our number one priority and we are determined to provide them with the financial support they require. It is also important that we meet the three year average mandated by law for our school system. The other is an increase of some \$11 million to Public Health and Social Services and a \$1 million increase for Corrections. The increase to PH & SS is needed to offset increased levels in Public Assistance and the Medically Indigent Program, as well as service to senior Citizens. It is interesting to note that the increases in these categories are in part driven by Compact Impact The

The Honorable Joe T. San Agustin Page 2

issues and are in fact reimbursable by the federal government. We are pushing for just such reimbursement and need your support on this matter.

Included herewith is also a measure authorizing the borrowing of \$45 million to immediately pay off any outstanding income tax refunds due. We believe this to be necessary immediately for a variety of reasons. First, this money belongs to the people and should be given to them. Secondly, the infusion of \$45 million in cash to people will have a positive economic effect as this money will undoubtedly circulate in the economy, stimulating spending and economic activity. Third, the loan will actually save the government money. We must pay late interest of between 6% and 7% on these funds, while debt service may be in the range of 4% or 5%. Finally, the Department of Revenue and Taxation estimates that there are some \$47 million in accounts receivables that have not been collected, that Certain commerical and business and individual are in fact collectable. taxpayers have been paying slowly due to their own cashflow difficulties, and arrangements are being made for payment schedules that will ease the impact of paying these taxes.

This is not objectionable. We can't squeeze blood, and so long as good faith efforts are made to pay these debts owed the government, we can be as understanding of the cashflow problems of others as we desire them to be of our own. The point is that as these delinquent funds come in, they will ease our cash problems considerably and help off-set any debt service required for this loan. All in all, this is a practical and realistic approach that meets the needs of our people to get their refunds this year -- which I believe to be critical -- in a manner that not only does not hurt our cashflow position. Rather, it helps our cash position.

This measure will also allow for the use of currently restricted funds, the TAF and the Territorial Highway Fund, to allow us to get through the current cash crunch. I need not point out that previous administrations have always had this ability.

The combined effect of these measures will be to ease considerably the strain on current cash, and to make it far easier to get through the balance of the fiscal year with reduced difficulties.

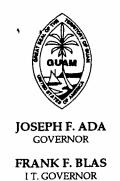
In many ways, things are looking up. As you know, the last two months have seen revenues staging a comeback. This is only logical, as tourism has been rebounding since the beginning of the year. As this rebound in our economy continues, pressure will continue to be eased. Even recent developments with respect to the strength in the value of the Yen versus the Dollar, are, from a tourism perspective, beneficial, as they reduce the cost of travel to Guam from Japan and hence increase our desirability as a destination.

As a final note, we have included in this budget a full subsidy for PUAG. We will be transmitting to the Legislature shortly a measure to grant PUAG full autonomy. To the extent that the Legislature acts favorably on this measure, and to the extent the Legislature desires, this can result in a reduction of subsidy to PUAG and a reduction in the General Fund budget.

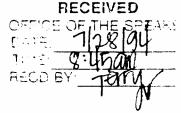

Dear Chairman Gutierrez, Chairman Aguon and Members of the Committees:

This morning, the Board of Directors of the Guam Chamber of Commerce reviewed Bill Nos. 1097 and 1098 and arrived at the following conclusions for purposes of today's public hearing:

- 1. With respect to Bill No. 1097, we do not have enough information regarding the proposed Fiscal Year 1995 Budget to provide the committees with our recommendations. We will submit our testimony on this bill at a later date.
- 2. In regards to Bill No. 1098, the Guam Chamber of Commerce takes the following positions:
 - a. We oppose the issuance of general obligation notes for the purpose of repaying tax refunds as the cost of issuance and the interest payable on the notes outweigh the 6-7% interest due on the tax refunds. While it is true that these refunds belong to the people, it is also true that these notes will be paid by the very same people.

- b. We are opposed to using moneys from the Tourist Attraction Fund (TAF) and the Territorial Highway Fund (THF) to cover current expenses of the Government. Our opposition is based on the fact that there is not a suggested mechanism to trim down government expenditures neither one to fully repay these unencumbered balanced of the TAF and the THF. We must learn to live within available financial resources and trim down expenditures. Let's not mortgage the future of our children who will ultimately pay for these loans and rampant expenditures.
 - c. We will forward our views regarding the proposed fees of the Guam Police Department and the Department of Agriculture at a later date.

Til just have to get it done a different way now, said Lohr, who had enjoyed three-shot leads after 18 and 36 holes.

"If he had shot 5-under today, he would have put himself out of reach," McCumber said of Lohr. But it's hard to do that. Hey, I can't believe he backed up a 61 with a 68. That's remarkable."

Four tied in LPGA

SYLVANIA, Ohio — Tammie Green, Lauri Merten, Sherri Turner and Meg Mallon shared the lead at 5-under-par 137 Saturday after two rounds of the \$500,000 LPGA Jamie Farr Toledo Classic.

Kim Williams, who was shot last Saturday night while entering a drug store in Niles, Ohio, shot a 72 and is one of six golfers at 140. Williams was among the leaders in the Youngstown-Warren Classic last week, but was unable to play the final two rounds after being injured.

She is playing with a bullet lodged in her rib cage. The bul-

let remained deeply imbedded in her body after hitting Williams in the neck and traveling through her shoulder.

Colbert breaks away

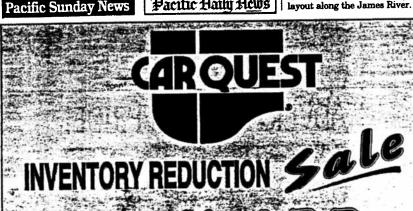
