1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE TERRITORY OF GUAM: 2 Section 1. Subsection (c) of §34.50 of Title 9, Guam Code Annotated, is 3 hereby amended to read: 4 "(c) he intentionally damages, destroys, removes or defaces 5 the property of another." 6 **Section 2.** A new subsection (c) is hereby added to §34.60 of Title 9, 7 Guam Code Annotated, to read: 8 "(c) Any person, including any juvenile under the jurisdiction of 9 the Juvenile Court, convicted under subsection (c) of §34.50, Title 9, 10 Guam Code Annotated, is guilty of a misdemeanor and shall be 11 punishable by a fine of not more than One Thousand Dollars 12 (\$1,000), per violation plus the responsibility of repainting or 13 refurbishing the property so damaged, destroyed, removed, or 14 defaced at such persons expense, under the supervision of the 15 affected property owner, and the Mayor of the municipality in which 16 the offense was committed, or a court representative, and in addition, perform a minimum of one hundred eighty (180) but not to 17 18 exceed perform to three hundred sixty (360) hours of community 19 service. Furthermore, parents or guardians of any minor convicted 20 under this subsection shall also be responsible for providing 21 supervision." 22 Section 3. A new §34.70 is hereby added to Title 9, Guam Code 23 Annotated, to read: 24 "§34.70. Reporting purchases made by minors. Every person, 25 firm or corporation which sells, gives, or in any way furnishes, to

another person who is under the age of eighteen (18) years, any

spray paint can, or any other preparation to spray paint, must record

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such transaction in writing and furnish such records to the Guam Police Department at the end of each month."

Section 4. Title. The first four sections of this Act may be cited as the "Don't Mess With Guam, Anti-Graffiti Act of 1994".

Section 5. §46107 of Title 17, Guam Code Annotated, is amended to read:

"§46107. Standardization. The Commission shall develop a standard orthographic system to be used by all government agencies in documents, signs, and material printed in the Chamorro language. In order to facilitate implementation and minimize costs, only material, documents and signs done after availability of the standard orthography need conform to it. The standard orthography shall retain the spelling of the word "Chamorro" and shall also be used in all Chamorro names of streets, places, buildings, facilities, and geographical areas in Guam. The Commission shall distribute information on the standard orthography to all agencies and review all use of Chamorro in such documents, signs and materials for external publication. Materials which are for internal use need not be reviewed by the Commission."

Preface:

The Committee on Judiciary and Criminal Justice, to which was referred Bill No. 628, "AN ACT TO AMEND §34.50 (c), TO ADD A NEW SUBSECTION (c) TO §34.60 TO AMEND SUBSECTION (b) of §34.60, ALL IN TITLE 9, GUAM CODE ANNOTATED, RELATIVE TO PROVIDING FOR PENALTIES FOR PERSONS FOUND GUILTY OF DAMAGING, DESTROYING, REMOVING, OR DEFACING PUBLIC OR PRIVATE PROPERTY AND TO CITE THE ACT AS THE DON'T' MESS WITH GUAM, ANTI GRAFFITI ACT OF 1994," conducted a public hearing on Friday, January 14, 1994, at 1:30 p.m. in the Legislative Public Hearing Room. Committee members present were Senator Pilar C. Lujan, Chairperson and Senator Francis E. Santos. Also in attendance were Senators Elizabeth P. Arriola, Doris F. Brooks and Felix P. Camacho.

Notification:

Letters were sent to the Governor, the Chief of Police, the Attorney General, the Guam Visitors Bureau, the Youth Congress, the Committee members; the news media. The general public was notified via the Legislative Weekly Calendar and a paid notice.

Testimony and Discussion:

At this time, the Chairperson called on Mayors Antonio Babauta and Greg Borja, Mr. Rory Respicio and Ms. Polly Ulloa of the Youth Congress, and Ms. Frances Tydingco-Gatewood representing the Attorney general's Office to present testimony on Bill No. 628.

Stating that this legislation is long overdue, Agat Mayor Antonio Babauta testified in support of Bill No. 628. Next, Santa Rita Mayor Greg Borja, Chairman of the Mayors' Council Legislative and Financial Affairs Committee, also testified in support and recommended that the legislation be passed.

Representing the Youth Congress was Youth Speaker Rory Respicio and Ms. Polly Ulloa, Vice Chairperson of the Committee on Judiciary and Criminal Justice. The Youth Congress finds that the intent of the legislation to be beneficial to the people of Guam.

Youth Speaker Respicio went on to say that while the legislation seeks to address the graffiti problem by placing harsher penalties on individuals found guilty of damaging or defacing public or private property, the Youth Congress plans to host a graffiti painting party. This event said Speaker Respicio will send a clear message to the offenders that their peers do no think it's cool to trash others private property, and our public property.

At this time Attorney Frances Tydingco-Gatewood suggested to the Committee that technical corrections be made with regards to the defacement of public and private property and that the punishment provisions be consistent with those contained in §34.60.

Adjournment:

There being no further questions, the Chairperson taking into consideration the comments presented, adjourned the Committee hearing on Bill No. 628.

Committee Findings

1. With the rise in gang related activity, the community has had to endure increased appearance of unseemingly unsightly and at times offensive.

- 2. Although the vast majority of our people take pride in maintaining the beauty of our island, and the few that show utter disrespect for such values should be so punished.
- 3. The Youth Congress wholeheartedly supports the legislation they also suggested that programs be initiated to encourage the vandals to stop out of goodwill for the community. To best accomplish this, the Youth Congress will be sponsoring a graffiti paint over party to encourage the vandals to stop.
- 4. The Guam Visitors Bureau is highly supportive of legislation which furthers the government's commitment to providing continued maintenance and upkeep of our island. While beautification and maintenance of the island remain the Visitors Bureau's priority, the imposition of penalties and fines as well as the responsibility of repairing damaged property will send a message to the community Don't mess with Guam."

Committee Recommendation

Therefore, the Committee recommends that Bill No. 628 as reported by the Committee on Judiciary and Criminal Justice and further amended by the author, be acted on favorably by the members of the Legislature.

"(c) Any person convicted under Paragraph (c) §34.50 of Title 9, Guam Code Annotated is guilty of a misdemeanor and shall be punishable by a fine of not more than One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000), per violation plus the responsibility of repainting or refurbishing the property so damaged, destroyed, removed, or defaced at his expense, under the supervision of the affected property owner, and the Mayor of the respective municipality, or court representative. Furthermore, parents or guardians of any minor convicted under this section shall also be responsible for providing supervision.

Section 3. This Act may be referred to or cited as the "DON'T MESS WITH GUAM, ANTI-GRAFFITI ACT OF 1993."

Madam Chair:

Thank you for inviting the Nineteenth Guam Youth Congress to present testimony this afternoon. It is your continuing actions, and the actions of the Guam Legislature, which supports my belief that Guam's young people have risen to be major players in policy which impact our youth. Please allow me, on behalf of the members of the Nineteenth Guam Youth Congress, to present testimony on Bill 628.

Bill No. 628 seeks to address the graffiti problem by placing harsher penalties on individuals found guilty of damaging, destroying, removing or defacing public or private property. I commend the bill's author and, of course, Youth Congress' very own Advisor, Senator Elizabeth P. Arriola, for her vision in eradicating the rampant incidences of terrible acts of vandalism to our public and private properties.

The intent of Bill 628's seems promising, and the Youth Congress wholeheartedly supports the provisions thereof; however, we must also try to encourage vandals to stop out of goodwill and concern for the community, and not because of the consequences. To address the graffiti problem Youth Congress, in conjunction with Senator Arriola, plans to host a graffiti painting-over party. Again, I emphasize that the Youth Congress will provide contributive efforts to your Committee on Judiciary and Criminal Justice as we seek to answer some of our island's problems, particularly problems with vandalism. Together, we can and will make a difference!

Bill No. 628

GPD fully supports "The Don't Mess With Guam Anti-Graffiti Act of 1993." With the rise of gang-related activity, our island community has had to endure the increased appearance of unseemly unsightly and offensive graffiti. Although the vast majority of our people on Guam take pride in maintaining the beauty of our island, those few who show utter disrespect for such values by destroying or defacing property with graffiti must be held criminally responsible for such acts and be required to repair, refurbish and/or repaint the property so damaged. GPD believes that Bill 628 begins to address this problem.

There are, however, some technical corrections which should be made to the language of Bill 628. First, subsection (c) of §34.30 of Title 9 G.C.A. should read to cover private and public property:

"(c) he intentionally <u>damage</u>, <u>destroys</u>, <u>removes</u>, or <u>defrays</u> the property of <u>another or public property</u>."

Secondly, Section 2 of Bill 628 beginning on line seven which sets forth the punishment should be referenced to §34.60 which sets out the punishments for the various forms of criminal mischief in §34.50 of Title 9 G.C.A.

Bill No. 640 (LS)

GPD fully supports the newly proposed juvenile curfew law set forth in Bill 640(LS). Although it is troubling to think that Guam requires a law to force an awareness on parents or guardians of children to know the whereabouts of their children, there seems to be little choice given the rise of juvenile criminal activity.

Bill No. 669

GPD fully supports Bill 669 which regulates the speed of large transport vehicles (i.e., gross weight of vehicle and load of ten thousand pounds or more). It takes very little common sense to know that large transport vehicles pose significantly more harm to others than ordinary vehicles when traveling at the posted speed limits. This bill will not only have an effect on large transport vehicle-related accidents, but requiring large transport vehicles to travel at maximum speeds which are lower than the maximum posted speeds for ordinary vehicles should lessen the wear and tear of our roadways.

Bill No. 791

GPD supports the intent of Bill 791. Section 3 of Bill 791 (amending §3419 of 11 G.C.A. Division 1) which prohibits the sale of liquor to minors and makes clear that businesses should request identification from purchasers of liquor who appear to be minors is greatly needed.

However, Section 2 of Bill 791 (amending §3418 of 11 G.C.A. Division 1) raises some concern for GPD even though the intent is commendable. First, determining what constitutes a "habitual or common drunkard" is anticipated to cause much argument between proprietors or licensees and police officers who attempt to enforce this law as well as much dispute in court. Secondly, the scheme of this section appears to intend that only citations (tickets) be issued even though a violation of this offense constitutes a felony in the third degree which often result in an arrest. Thirdly, is it fair to limit this offense to licensees and not include the persons who actually serve liquor (i.e., employees, waiters, waitresses, bartenders, managers, etc.)? And finally, will the existence of such a law (even if it is a criminal law) which imposes a legal duty upon hosts (businesses/licensees) to be diligent about avoiding the sale of liquor to common or habitual drunkards or obviously intoxicated persons create future civil lawsuits (i.e., social host responsibility; or village fiesta or fundraising activities where licenses are required to sell liquor may be impacted by such a law)? Perhaps Section 2 of this Bill requires much more study and evaluation.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE TERRITORY OF GUAM:

- Section 1. Paragraph (c) §34.50 of Title 9, Guam Code Annotated is hereby amended to read as follows:
 - "(c) he intentionally damages, destroys, removes, or defaces the property of another."
- Section 2. A new Paragraph (c) is hereby added to Title 9, Guam Code Annotated to read as follows:
 - "(c) Any person convicted under Paragraph (c) §34.50 of Title 9, Guam Code Annotated is guilty of a misdemeanor and shall be punishable by a fine of not more than One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000), per violation plus the responsibility of repainting or refurbishing the property so damaged, destroyed, removed, or defaced at his expense, under the supervision of the affected property owner, and the Mayor of the respective municipality, or court representative. Furthermore, parents or guardians of any minor convicted under this section shall also be responsible for providing supervision.

Section 3. This Act may be referred to or cited as the "DON'T MESS WITH GUAM, ANTI-GRAFFITI ACT OF 1993."
