AN ACT TO ADOPT THE GUAM COMMUNITY COLLEGE REORGANIZATION PLAN APPROVED BY ITS BOARD OF TRUSTEES TO ENABLE THE COLLEGE TO MORE EFFECTIVELY MANAGE THE CONTINUAL GROWTH AND EXPANSION OF THE INSTITUTION, AND TO BETTER SERVE THE INCREASING VOCATIONAL EDUCATION AND TECHNICAL TRAINING NEEDS OF THE COMMUNITY.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE TERRITORY OF GUAM:

Section 1. Legislative intent. The Guam Community College (the 1 "College") has been experiencing significant changes and tremendous growth 2 over the past few years, both in the size of its facility and in its student 3 4 enrollment. In order to adequately meet the increasing vocational education needs of the community, as well as its personnel needs in the future, the 5 College has proposed a reorganization of its personnel structure which 6 7 would enable the College to more effectively carry out its responsibilities, as mandated by law. The proposed structure would organize the College in four 8 9 major units: (i) Office of the President, (ii) Academic Affairs, (iii) Business and Finance, and (iv) Administrative Services. If the proposed reorganization structure is adopted, top officials of the College have promised that no classified employee will be removed from such employee's position or downgraded, no new positions will be created, and no employee of the College will be involuntarily transferred to a position which is unrelated to such employee's current duties and responsibilities. Therefore, the reorganization structure contained in this Act rearranges the College's organization appropriately, allowing the institution to operate more effectively and efficiently in providing for the vocational education and technical training needs of the community.

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
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Section 2. Reorganization structure. The Guam Community College reorganization structure as set out in the Exhibit A attached hereto and incorporated herein, as adopted by the Board of Trustees of the Guam Community College, is hereby accepted and adopted as the organizational structure of the Guam Community College.

Section 3. Organizational structure expansion. No increase or deletion of positions in the organization structure of the Guam Community College as approved in Section 1 of this Act may be effectuated until

ACADEMIC AFFAIRS DIVISION

ACTIVITY DESCRIPTION:

The Academic Affairs Division activities encompass all instruction and student services of the College as well as the academic administrative support required for these programs. Activities are designed to accomplish the major mission of the College to educate and train the adults and youth of Guam. This Division has four major sub-divisions or sections. They are: Office of the Vice President for Academic Affairs; Business, Social Science, and Tourism; Technology and Human Services; and Student Development.

PROGRAM TITLE:

BUSINESS, SOCIAL SCIENCE, & TOURISM

ACTIVITY DESCRIPTION:

The Business, Computer Science, Criminal Justice, English, Junior ROTC, Marketing, Tourism, and Social Studies Departments and the Second Language Institute form the Business, Social Science, and Tourism Section of the Division Academic Affairs. The dean's office provides the leadership and management coordination necessary for program and department managers to effectively manage and direct the section's instructional programs and courses. In general, Program Specialists and Department Chairs have first line responsibility for the planning, operations, and evaluation of the section's instructional programs.

The Business Department's three associate degree and four certificate programs educate and train for employment in accounting, office administration and supervision, management, information systems, secretarial/clerical, and graphic arts positions. Additionally, department courses are key to many of the college's other programs.

The Computer Science Department's associate degree and certificate programs educate and train for employment in data entry, microcomputer operations and applications, and computer operations, programming, and systems analysis.

The Criminal Justice Department's five associate degree programs, four academies, and four mini training programs educate and train for employment in corrections, fire, police, criminal justice, industrial security, and other specialized law enforcement and security related positions.

The Junior Reserve Officer's Training Corps (JROTC) is a joint training program between GCC and the U.S. Army designed to educate and train cadets to be better Americans through learning activities in communications, citizenship, leadership, map reading and land navigation, technology awareness, weapons and safety, career opportunities, and drill.

The Language Institute offers courses in English and Japanese to non-native speakers to educate and train for personal enrichment, academic, and employment purposes.

The Marketing Department's programs educate and train students for employment in activities that direct the flow of goods and services from the producer to the consumer.

The Tourism Department four associate degree and four certificate programs educate and train students for entry level and supervisory positions in the island's tourism/hospitality industry, which includes positions in food and beverage, hotel operations, travel and ticketing, and tour operations.

The Social Studies Department offers courses that support vocational programs; promote well-rounded citizenship as well as broaden liberal arts offerings for associate degree programs; and fulfill the legal requirements of teaching Guam history and political development.



ACADEMIC AFFAIRS TECHNOLOGY AND HUMAN SERVICES SECTION

ACTIVITY DESCRIPTION:

The goal of technology and human services is to provide Engineering and Applied Science, and support the educational and training needs of Guam in areas of Human Resources; as well as Construction and Transportation. This section is organized to meet the demands of the community for entry level personnel, middle management and supervisory personnel, and qualified technicians in areas of environment and water, health systems, educational systems, personal services, communications, construction, infra-structure, transportation, and the leisure industry.

The Technology and Human Services Section is composed of thirteen (13) separate departments: Early Childhood Education, Educational Services, Cosmetology, Civil and Architectural Engineering, Electronic Engineering, Math, Science, Allied Health, Horticulture, Waterworks, Construction Trades, Heavy Equipment & Trucking, and Mechanics. These departments offer Diploma, Certificate and Associate Degree programs, with three of the departments cooperatively operating vocational programs in the Department of Education Secondary Schools.

PROGRAM TITLE:

STUDENT DEVELOPMENT SECTION

ACTIVITY DESCRIPTION:

The Student Development Section, has three units consisting of the: Academic Services, Student Support Services, and Work Experience Education. These units have been restructured further into smaller units for better control while providing instructional and educational related services to students in pursuit of their educational goals. The services available in these units are: Assessment and Counseling, Learning Resources, Developmental Education and Tutoring, Adult Education and GED, Adult Literacy, Special Projects, Student Personnel Support, Interscholastic Sports, Health Services, Campus Life, Drug and Alcohol Prevention, Women's Resources, Experimental Learning, Cooperative Education and Apprenticeship.

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ADMINISTRATIVE SERVICES DIVISION

ACTIVITY DESCRIPTION:

The Administrative Services Division consists of the Office of the Vice President, Institutional Development Section and the Operations Section. The Institutional Development Section consists of the Long Range Planning and MIS Department, the Federal Grants Department, and the Human Resources Development Department. Each of these departments work very closely with both the Academic Affairs and Finance Divisions in the formulation of priorities to guide the overall development of the College. The Operation Section consists of the following departments: Facility Planning and Maintenance, Safety, Security, Food Services and Administrative Support Services. The primary responsibility of this section is to provide support to the other divisions to enable them to better carry out the educational mission of the College.

PROGRAM TITLE:

Division of Finance and Business

ACTIVITY DESCRIPTION:

The Division of Finance and Business provides financial and business services for all Divisions and Departments within Guam Community College. It also provides the same basic services for the Guam Community College Foundation. The primary departmental operations within the organization are the Personnel Office; the Business Office including the General Accounting Office, Accounts Payable, Accounts Receivable, Cashiering, and Payroll; the Budget Office; the Purchasing Office; and the Bookstore.
