

CONSOLIDATE THE APPROPRIATIONS SET OUT IN SUBSECTION (d), (e), AND (f) FOR WATER, POWER, AND ROAD PAVING TO THE FIGUA SUBDIVISION IN MERIZO; TO REAPPROPRIATE SIX THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$600,000) TO THE GUAM POWER AUTHORITY FOR POWER EXTENSION; TO APPROPRIATE THREE HUNDRED SEVENTY SIX THOUSAND THREE HUNDRED FIFTEEN DOLLARS (\$376,315) TO THE SUPERIOR COURT OF GUAM FOR COMPUTER EQUIPMENT; TO APPROPRIATE SIXTY THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$60,000) TO UPGRADE THE WATER LINE ON SGT. PEDRO L. AGUON STREET, BARRIGADA; TO APPROPRIATE ONE HUNDRED THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$100,000) TO THE PACIFIC ISLANDS DEVELOPMENT BANK; TO APPROPRIATE SEVENTY-FIVE THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$75,000) TO THE DEPARTMENT OF PARKS AND RECREATION TO CATELOGUE AND ANALYZE ITS ARCHAEOLOGICAL COLLECTIONS AND SEVENTY-FIVE THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$75,000) TO THE GUAM MUSEUM TO CATALOGUE AND ANALYZE ITS ARCHAEOLOGICAL COLLECTIONS; TO ADD A NEW §6306 TO CHAPTER 6 OF TITLE 12, GUAM CODE ANNOTATED RELATIVE TO THE PLACEMENT OF SIGNS FOR GUAM MASS TRANSIT AUTHORITY; TO ADD A NEW §6307 TO CHAPTER 6 OF TITLE 12, GUAM CODE ANNOTATED, RELATIVE TO SIGNS FOR GUAM MASS TRANSIT AUTHORITY; AND TO ADD A NEW SUBSECTION (d) TO §26503 OF TITLE 11, GUAM CODE ANNOTATED, RELATIVE TO REPORTING BY THE DEPARTMENT OF ADMINISTRATION OF THE PUBLIC TRANSIT FUND.

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE TERRITORY OF GUAM:

2 **Section 1. (a) Student scholarships, financial assistance, and program**  
 3 **administration.** Five Million Eight Hundred Four Thousand Three Hundred  
 4 Ninety-eight Dollars (\$5,804,398) are reappropriated from the appropriation  
 5 previously made for the northern and southern high schools in Section 33 of Public  
 6 Law 20-220 to the University of Guam to be expended as follows:

11 (b) **Pedro "Doc" Sanchez Scholarship Program.** Four Hundred Twenty-seven  
12 Thousand Seven Hundred Fifty-one Dollars (\$427,751) are reappropriated from the  
13 appropriation previously made for the northern and southern high schools in  
14 Section 33 of Public Law 20-220 to the College of Business and Public  
15 Administration of the University of Guam for the Pedro "Doc" Sanchez  
16 Scholarship Program.

17 (c) **Teacher Training Council and Guam Teacher Corps.** Six Hundred Thousand  
18 Dollars (\$600,000) are reappropriated from the appropriation previously made for  
19 the northern and southern high schools in Section 33 of Public Law 20-220 to the  
20 University of Guam, which shall disburse the funds pursuant to the directives and  
21 policies of the Teacher Training Council, for stipends for the Guam Teacher Corps  
22 and for the administration of the Teacher Training Council, in accordance with the  
23 provisions of Public Law 21-88.

24 (d) **Political Status Education Coordinating Commission.** Two Hundred  
25 Eighty-four Thousand Dollars (\$284,000) are reappropriated from the appropriation  
26 previously made for the northern and southern high schools in Section 33 of Public  
27 Law 20-220 to the University of Guam for the Political Status Education

1 Coordinating Commission's operations. This appropriation shall continue until  
2 expended for the operations and purposes of the Commission.

3 **(e) Chamorro Language and Culture Institute.** One Hundred Sixty-five  
4 Thousand Three Hundred Dollars (\$165,300) are appropriated from the  
5 appropriation previously made for the northern and southern high schools in  
6 Section 33 of Public Law 20-220 to the Chamorro Language and Culture Institute of  
7 the University of Guam for operations of this Institute. This appropriation shall  
8 continue until expended for the operations and purposes of the Institute.

9 **(f) Not subject to transfer.** No appropriation made in this Subsections (a), (b),  
10 (c), (d), and (e) of this Section shall be subject to any transfer authority which may be  
11 effective during the life of the appropriation.

12 **(g) Availability of appropriations.** Unless otherwise provided, the  
13 appropriations made in this Section shall be available upon enactment and until  
14 September 30, 1994.

15 **(h) Repeal of scholarship appropriation in Public Law 21-136.** In order to avoid  
16 duplication of funding, effective October 1, 1993, the appropriation item  
17 "Miscellaneous", listed under Section "Regents Scholarship Fund", within Division  
18 of "Board of Regents" of the "University of Guam" Section of Chapter II of Public  
19 Law 21-136, which appropriates One Million Eight Hundred Sixty-three Thousand  
20 Two Hundred Twenty-seven Dollars (\$1,863,227) for stipends, is repealed.

21 **(i) Reinstatement of requirement for University of Guam to submit to the**  
22 **Legislature the anticipated costs of scholarships and financial aid with budget**  
23 **requests for operations on a fiscal year.** §16118 of Title 17, Guam Code  
24 Annotated, as amended by Section 6 of Public Law 22-19, is further amended to read:

25 "§16118. Legislative appropriation. (a) On February 15th, or  
26 earlier, of each year, a budget requirement for the following Fiscal Year for  
27 personnel and operating costs necessary for carrying out the mission,

1 purposes and general activities of the University, including funds necessary  
2 for student loans, scholarships, and financial aid, shall be certified by the  
3 Board and submitted to the Legislature. Following public budget hearings  
4 before the Legislature, an appropriation shall be made available to the  
5 University in an amount to be determined by the Legislature based upon the  
6 fiscal condition of the government of Guam, to be allotted in four (4)  
7 appropriately disproportional quarterly installments which shall be remitted  
8 on the first day of each quarter of the appropriate University Year, under the  
9 full fiscal control of the Board which shall be fully accountable for the  
10 appropriate expenditure of all University funds. Such appropriation for the  
11 annual personnel and operating costs of the University shall not include any  
12 sums collected by the University from student tuition and fees. University  
13 funds derived from fees shall be considered non-appropriated funds of the  
14 University under the fiscal control of the Board. One Hundred Percent  
15 (100%) of the funds derived from student tuition shall be deposited in  
16 the University of Guam Bond Fund for repayment of general obligation  
17 bonds in accordance with §22340(k) of Title 5, Guam Code Annotated. A Fiscal  
18 Year shall run concurrently with the Fiscal Year of the territorial agencies of  
19 the government of Guam. A University Year shall run from August 1 to July  
20 31.

21 (b) Anything herein to the contrary notwithstanding, the Legislature may  
22 appropriate any additional funds for carrying out the activities of the  
23 University.

24 (c) No agreements to borrow money shall be entered into by the  
25 University without prior Legislative approval.

26 (d) The Board shall disburse such funds as the Legislature may appropriate  
27 for the purpose of carrying out the activities of the University."

1           **Section 2. Revision of Short Title Section of Chapter I of General**  
2 **Appropriation Act of 1994.** Section 1 of Chapter I of Public Law 21-136 is repealed and  
3 reenacted to read:

4           **"Section 1. Short Title.** This Act may be known as the 'General  
5 Appropriation Act of 1994'. Except as otherwise provided by this Act, the  
6 appropriations made by this Act shall be available to pay for obligations incurred on  
7 or after October 1, 1993 but not later than September 30, 1994. In the event that any  
8 appropriation of this Act is found contrary to federal law, all portions not so found  
9 shall remain valid."

10           **Section 3. Revision to Definitions Section of Chapter I of General**  
11 **Appropriation Act of 1994.** Section 5 of Chapter I of Public Law 21-136 is repealed  
12 and reenacted to read:

13           **"Section 5. Definitions.**           The following definitions shall apply to this  
14 document.

15           (a) 'Budget Digest' consists of all numbers in this document which are  
16 contained in Chapter II, and their verbal purposes as stated to the left of them in the  
17 left hand column of this document, except for those numbers designated 'total' and  
18 their verbal purposes as stated to the left of them in the left hand column, and  
19 except for those numbers listed next to any verbal purpose under the designation  
20 'Miscellaneous', and which are defined as 'appropriations' in Subsection (a) of  
21 Section 6 of this Chapter.

22           (b) 'Capital Outlay' includes:

23           (1) equipment such as loader trucks, tractors, trailers, automobiles or  
24 other vehicles; machinery; reference books; filing cabinets, typewriters, adding  
25 and calculating machines, other business machines, office equipment; and  
26 tools, implements and instruments which may be used continuously without  
27 material change in physical condition and must have a useful life of one (1)

1 year or longer and cost not less than Two Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$250) but not  
2 more than Two Hundred Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$250,000);

3 (2) repair, remodeling or alteration of a building or replacement  
4 thereof and the replacement and renewal of plumbing, wiring and air  
5 conditioning systems costing more than Thirty Thousand Dollars (\$30,000).  
6 Capital Outlay does not include normal maintenance expenditures;

7 (3) construction of an entirely new building, including the materials  
8 and labor either supplied by an agency of the Government or supplied by  
9 contract; and

10 (4) non-structural improvements to buildings, the grading, leveling  
11 drainage and landscaping of land or the construction of roadways, fences,  
12 ditches, or sanitary or storm sewers.

13 (c) 'Committee Report' includes those pages appearing before each  
14 territorial agency's operational budget for which appropriations are made in Chapter  
15 II of this document entitled 'Committee Report', containing public hearing, mark-  
16 up, and summary information.

17 (d) 'Contingency' means expenditure for unbudgeted items.

18 (e) 'Contractual Services' include:

19 (1) services rendered or performed by business, other government  
20 agencies or individuals other than expenses for personnel services;

21 (2) current services or charges for rental of personal property,  
22 insurance premiums (not employee benefits), dues, paid subscriptions, and  
23 other fixed charges; and

24 (3) telex and other forms of communication except telephone and  
25 facsimile.

26 (f) 'Document' includes 'General Appropriation Act of 1994', 'Committee  
27 Report', and 'Digest'.

1 (g) 'Equipment' means items having a purchase price of Two Hundred  
2 Fifty Dollars (\$250) or less.

3 (h) 'Expenditures' means all amounts of money, other than refunds  
4 authorized by law, paid out or encumbered for payment by a territorial agency other  
5 than for investment securities or as agent or trustee for other governmental entities  
6 or private persons.

7 (i) 'FTE' means the equivalent of one (1) permanent position  
8 continuously filled for two thousand eighty (2,080) hours per year for the year  
9 commencing October 1, 1993.

10 (j) 'Federal Funds' means payments by the United States Government to  
11 the territorial government or territorial agencies for specific purposes or in lieu of  
12 taxes, including grants, reimbursements, and payments made in accordance with  
13 contracts but does not include payments pursuant to Section 30 of the Organic Act of  
14 Guam.

15 (k) 'General Appropriation Act of 1994' or 'this Act' consists of Chapter I,  
16 General Provisions; Chapter II, Appropriations as defined in Section 6 of this  
17 Chapter; and Chapters III, IV, and V of this document.

18 (l) 'General Fund' means that Fund as defined by Section 6309 of the  
19 Government Code.

20 (m) 'Office Space Rental' means payment to an entity for rental of office  
21 space and may include the cost of maintenance, power, and other utility expenses.

22 (n) 'Match' means direct cost sharing or in-kind General Fund support  
23 required as a condition for acceptance for federal funds.

24 (o) 'Other Fund' means:

25 (1) unencumbered balances in territorial agency accounts  
26 appropriated by this Act; and

1 (2) all revenue available to territorial agencies from sources other  
2 than the General Fund and federal funds.

3 (p) 'Personnel Services' include:

4 (1) salaries and wages payable to persons employed by the  
5 Government;

6 (2) the Government's contributions to the Government of Guam  
7 Retirement Fund and the employer's contribution under the Federal  
8 Insurance Contribution Act; and

9 (3) the Government's contribution for health, dental and life  
10 insurance plans.

11 (q) 'Power' includes all expenses incurred for the use of electricity or LPG,  
12 propane, or butane gas.

13 (r) 'Revenue' means all amounts received by a territorial agency from  
14 sources external to that agency, net of refunds and other correcting transactions,  
15 other than from issue of debt liquidation of investment or as agent or trustee for  
16 other governmental agents, entities, or private persons.

17 (s) 'Supplies and Materials' means materials which by their nature are  
18 consumable, which have a useful lifetime of less than one (1) year, and which, after  
19 use, undergo an impairment or a material change in physical condition.

20 (t) 'Telephone' includes all charges for telephone service.

21 (u) 'Toll Calls' includes all charges for long distance telephone calls and  
22 facsimile.

23 (v) 'Territorial Agency', for purposes of this Act, means any office,  
24 department, institution, board, bureau, commission, council, authority, or  
25 committee of the territorial government, the Guam Mass Transit Authority, the  
26 Guam Memorial Hospital Authority, the Guam Visitors Bureau, the Public



1 Defender Service Corporation, the Superior Court of Guam, and the University of  
2 Guam.

3 (w) 'Travel & Transportation' means off-island travel expenses and local  
4 mileage reimbursement in accordance with the laws of Guam.

5 (x) 'Water/Sewer' includes all expenses for the purchase of water and all  
6 expenses for waste-water treatment."

7 **Section 4. Revision to General Provisions Section of Chapter I of General**  
8 **Appropriation Act of 1994.** Section 6 of Chapter I of Public Law 21-136 is repealed  
9 and reenacted to read:

10 "Section 6. General Provisions. The following General Provisions shall  
11 apply to the appropriations made in Chapter II of this Act:

12 (a) Except as otherwise specifically provided, and except for all pages with  
13 the heading 'Summary', amounts which are designated as 'totals' in the left hand  
14 column of this document and are set out under the column heading 'FY 1993  
15 GENERAL FUND APPROVED', and amounts for whatever purpose which are  
16 listed under the designation 'Miscellaneous' and are set out under the column  
17 heading 'FY 1993 GENERAL FUND APPROVED', are appropriated from the General  
18 Fund. Except as otherwise specifically provided, amounts set out under the column  
19 heading 'FY 1993 FED/OTHER APPROVED' are appropriated matching funds.  
20 Amounts which are not designated as 'totals' and amounts which are not  
21 designated for whatever purpose under 'Miscellaneous', are provided for use as the  
22 Budget Digest only, and are not appropriations, however, the appropriations were  
23 derived from the representation that the items and prices in the digest were  
24 anticipated expenditures of the government.

25 (b) For Fiscal Year 1994, appropriations are those amounts as defined in  
26 Subsection (a) of this Section and set out in Chapter II of this Act and unless  
27 otherwise specified, amounts set out in Chapters III, IV and V of this Act, which are

1 effective October 1, 1993, from the General Fund or other funds, as indicated, to  
2 territorial agencies named, for the purposes expressed, or so much thereof as may be  
3 necessary, within available revenues and unencumbered balances, and unless  
4 otherwise specified, amounts which are stated to be appropriated in Chapters III, IV,  
5 and V of this Act.

6 (c) Except for the Guam Visitors Bureau, the Superior Court of Guam, the  
7 Public Defender Service Corporation, and the Legislature, the governor or his  
8 official designee shall monitor revenue received by territorial agencies from sources  
9 other than the General fund and shall order reductions in the operating budget of  
10 any territorial agency whose revenue from these sources is not meeting budgeted  
11 projection.

12 (d) The total number of FTE authorized for Fiscal Year 1994 is indicated by  
13 a number in the row labelled 'TOTAL NUMBER OF PERSONNEL (FTE)' AND THE  
14 COLUMN HEADED 'FY 1993 GENERAL FUND APPROVED' OR 'FY 1993  
15 FED/OTHER APPROVED', OR 'PUAG FUND APPROVED', as relevant. The total  
16 number of FTE shall not be exceeded. All regular and overtime hours of work  
17 performed and, except for hours of accrued leave paid upon separation from the  
18 Government, hours for which leave is granted and compensation given, shall be  
19 applied against the total FTE. No FTE shall be used to employ more than one (1)  
20 person at the same time, whether on a full-time, part-time, or limited term basis.

21 (e) It shall be a petty misdemeanor for any person to knowingly employ in  
22 the government of Guam more than one (1) person at a time on a part-time, limited  
23 term, or temporary basis so that more than one (1) person receives salary at the same  
24 time from funds appropriated for the utilization of one (1) FTE.

25 (f) The Governor or his official designee shall transmit to the Speaker of  
26 the Legislature, no later than the seventh day of each month, a schedule showing

1 actual cash receipts, actual cash disbursements, and encumbrances during the  
2 previous month.

3 (g) Prior to the payment of overtime, a territorial agency shall submit for  
4 payroll processing at the end of each pay period, a statement of the amount of  
5 overtime due an employee, the purpose for which the employee worked in excess of  
6 regular working hours, and an explanation and justification as to the need for the  
7 overtime.

8 (h) Payment for overtime claims shall be prepared only if the claims are  
9 properly documented. Overtime shall be paid not later than the second pay period  
10 after the period in which it was earned.

11 (i) The Governor or his official designee shall conduct periodic spot audits  
12 to determine if any employee of the Executive Branch claiming overtime  
13 compensation was on duty at the time the overtime was earned.

14 (j) The Director or chief officer of any territorial agency upon whose  
15 decision a payment for overtime is authorized shall be personally liable to the  
16 government for any payment of overtime made contrary to the provisions of  
17 Paragraph (h) of this Section, or for any payment of overtime found to have been  
18 made for unauthorized expenditure of government funds.

19 (k) In keeping with the doctrine of separation of powers, the Superior  
20 Court of Guam shall be as independent as possible from the control of the other co-  
21 equal branches of the government of Guam. Such independence shall include  
22 provision for a year-to-year budget appropriation measure for the operations of the  
23 Superior Court of Guam which is separate and apart from the appropriations for the  
24 operations of the Executive Branch.

25 (l) Notwithstanding any other provision of law, no  
26 reclassification/reassignment of pay ranges of any positions not funded by

1 appropriations of the Legislature may be implemented, unless non-appropriated  
2 funds from another source are available for this purpose.

3 (m) Notwithstanding any other provision of law, it is prohibited to expend  
4 General, Other, or Federal Funds for in-service training or other professional  
5 development training, excluding seminars, to persons occupying unclassified or  
6 temporary positions within the Executive Branch, except attorneys and physicians."

7 **Section 5. Three Year Economic Plan appropriations for Fiscal Year 1994 at**  
8 **Four Percent (4%) Reduction Level.** Due to the slowing of income to the  
9 government, the Three Year Economic Plan, which calls for a Two Percent (2%)  
10 reduction in the level of appropriations from those made for Fiscal Year 1993 to  
11 those made for Fiscal Year 1994, the reduction level is raised to Four Percent (4%).  
12 Appropriations for territorial agency operations for Fiscal Year 1994 are those  
13 appropriations specified in Subsection (b) of Section 7 of Chapter V (Three Year  
14 Economic Plan, Administrative Provisions) of Public Law 21-136, as amended by  
15 Sections 4 (University of Guam) and 5 (Department of Labor) of Public Law 21-137,  
16 reduced by Four Percent (4%). Subsection (b) of Section 7 of Chapter V of Public  
17 Law 21-136 is repealed and reenacted to read:

18 **"(b) Lapsing and appropriating of funds in declining amounts for Fiscal**  
19 **Years 1994 and 1995.**

20 (1) For Fiscal Year 1994, each and every  
21 item of appropriation made for Fiscal Year 1993 in Chapter II of this Act shall  
22 lapse and be of no further force or effect on midnight of September 30, 1993.  
23 Appropriation items in Chapter II of this Act, which are not Capital Outlay,  
24 Equipment, and Miscellaneous items for stipends, are reduced by four percent  
25 (4%) from that level appropriated for Fiscal Year 1993, and these reduced items  
26 are appropriated as the Fiscal Year 1994 budget, and will be available for  
expenditure from October 1, 1993 to September 30, 1994. Miscellaneous items

1 which are stipends are not reduced, and are appropriated for Fiscal Year 1994,  
2 and are available for expenditure from October 1, 1993 to September 30, 1994.

3 (2) For Fiscal Year 1995, each and every item of appropriation which is  
4 appropriated pursuant to item (1) of this Subsection for the Fiscal Year 1994  
5 budget and contained in Chapter II of this Act shall lapse and be of no further  
6 force or effect on midnight of September 30, 1994. Appropriation items in  
7 Chapter II of this Act, which are not Capital Outlay, Equipment, and  
8 Miscellaneous items for stipends, and which were appropriated pursuant to  
9 item (1) of this Subsection for Fiscal Year 1994, are reduced by four percent (4%)  
10 from that level appropriated as the Fiscal Year 1994 budget, and these reduced  
11 items are appropriated as the Fiscal Year 1995 budget, and will be available for  
12 expenditure from October 1, 1994 to September 30, 1995. Miscellaneous items  
13 which are stipends are not reduced, and are appropriated for Fiscal Year 1995,  
14 and are available for expenditure from October 1, 1994 to September 30, 1995."

15 **Section 6. Technical amendment to Three Year Economic Plan.** Subsection  
16 (c) of Section 7 of Chapter V (Administrative Provisions of Public Law 21-136) is  
17 amended to read:

18 **"(c) Provision for the effect of the enactment of subsequent legislation.**

19 Notwithstanding any provision of Subsection (b) of this Section  
20 indicating the lapsing and enactment of certain sums appropriated in Chapter  
21 II of this Act for Fiscal Years 1994 and 1995, if there is enacted, between October  
22 1, 1992 and September 30, 1994, any subsequent General Appropriation Act,  
23 Supplemental Budget Act, or amendment, repeal, or reenactment of all or a  
24 portion of this Act, the latest authorized total expenditures for any entire  
25 fiscal year shall be that version of the law which lapses, is reduced, and  
26 appropriated on the dates so specified for this to occur in this Section."

1           **Section 7. Retirement Contributions Fund and Personnel Benefits Fund.**  
2 Section 5 of Chapter V of Public Law 21-136, placing a new code Section into  
3 permanent law, was not implemented in Fiscal Year 1993, and therefore is repeated  
4 below for easy reference and to indicate that it is to be implemented in Fiscal Year  
5 1994:

6           "Section \_\_\_\_\_ (a)           Legislative Intent. The Legislature finds that  
7 amounts appropriated directly to territorial agencies for retirement benefits,  
8 and personnel benefits such as health insurance, life insurance, and dental  
9 insurance, are utilized for personnel expenses such as overtime pay,  
10 hazardous pay, holiday pay, limited term positions, and other categories if the  
11 funds are transferred, so that the actual expenses of the government of Guam  
12 for retirement, health insurance, life insurance, dental insurance, overtime,  
13 limited term positions, and other categories, is obscured in the budget process  
14 since the categories for which funds are appropriated are actually utilized for a  
15 different purpose than that which is stated. For this reason, two funds which  
16 are separate and distinct from any other funds of the government of Guam  
17 shall be utilized to better track the expenses of the government of Guam in  
18 these categories.

19           (b) Creation and operation of Retirement Contributions Fund. There is  
20 created, separate and apart from any other funds of the government of Guam,  
21 and under the administration and control of the Department of  
22 Administration, the Retirement Contributions Fund. Notwithstanding any  
23 other provision of law, each fiscal year, all appropriations from the General  
24 Fund to any territorial agency for the purpose of paying retirement  
25 contributions shall be deposited in the Retirement Contributions Fund, and  
26 shall be paid out incrementally only as required by the actual expenses of the  
27 aggregate of the individual employees of the government who are currently

1 employed at the time each payroll is prepared. A report of the status of the  
2 Retirement Contributions Fund shall be made to the Governor and to the  
3 Legislature at the end of each quarter. The funds in the Retirement  
4 Contributions Fund shall not be used for any other purpose than retirement  
5 contributions to be transmitted to the Government of Guam Retirement  
6 Fund. Within thirty (30) days after the end of each fiscal year, all funds in the  
7 Retirement Contributions Fund shall be paid over to the Government of  
8 Guam Retirement Fund to reduce the unfunded liability. A report of this  
9 transaction shall be made to the Legislature. The funds in the Retirement  
10 Contributions Fund are not subject to any transfer authority of the Governor.

11 (c) Creation and operation of Personnel Benefits Fund. There is created,  
12 separate and apart from any other funds of the government of Guam, and  
13 under the administration and control of the Department of Administration,  
14 the Personnel Benefits Fund. Notwithstanding any other provision of law,  
15 each fiscal year, all appropriations from the General Fund to any territorial  
16 agency for the purpose of paying medical insurance, life insurance, and dental  
17 insurance, shall be deposited in the Personnel Benefits Fund, and shall be paid  
18 out incrementally only as required by the actual expenses of the aggregate of  
19 the individual employees of the government who are currently employed at  
20 the time each payroll is prepared. A report of the status of the Personnel  
21 Benefits Fund shall be made to the Governor and to the Legislature at the end  
22 of each quarter. The funds in the Personnel Benefits Fund shall not be used for  
23 any other purpose than for medical insurance, life insurance, and dental  
24 insurance. Within thirty (30) days after the end of each fiscal year, all funds in  
25 the Personnel Benefits Fund shall be paid over to the Government of Guam  
26 Retirement Fund to reduce the unfunded liability. A report of this transaction

1 shall be made to the Legislature. The funds in the Personnel Benefits Fund are  
2 not subject to any transfer authority of the Governor."

3 Notwithstanding any other provision in Public Law 21-136, as amended in  
4 Public Law 21-137 and as reappropriated in this Act, particularly the fact that  
5 appropriations for retirement, medical insurance, life insurance, and dental  
6 insurance appear in the Three Year Economic Plan as amounts which when added  
7 together make up the sums appropriated for Personnel Services, those amounts set  
8 out for retirement, medical insurance, life insurance and dental insurance and  
9 which appear in the Digest in Public Law 21-136, as amended in Public Law 21-137  
10 and reappropriated in this Act, shall be placed on October 1, 1993 in the appropriate  
11 fund created in this Section .

12 **Section 8. Stipends for Civil Service Commission.** Notwithstanding the  
13 provisions of §43104 of Chapter 43 of Title 5, Guam Code Annotated, due to the  
14 excessive workload placed upon the Civil Service Commission because of the  
15 implementation and adjustments needed to the Hay Study and the backlog of  
16 personnel cases pending before the Commission, for a period of one (1) year from  
17 October 1, 1993, the members of the Civil Service Commission shall receive  
18 compensation for attendance at Civil Service Commission meetings of Fifty Dollars  
19 (\$50) per meeting with no limitation on the amount of meetings that can be  
20 compensated per month.

21 **Section 9. (a) University of Guam; FTE exemption.** Notwithstanding  
22 any other provision of law, for Fiscal Years 1994 and 1995, the Full-Time Equivalency  
23 (FTE) restrictions imposed by the Three Year Economic Plan shall not be applicable  
24 to the University of Guam instructional positions; provided, that the expenditures  
25 do not exceed the total appropriation for personnel services.

26 **(b) University of Guam transfer authority.** The University of Guam  
27 is authorized to transfer funds, not to exceed One Hundred Thousand Dollars



1 (\$100,000) from the personnel salary category to the contractual category to alleviate  
2 faculty recruitment difficulties for Fiscal Year 1994 and Fiscal Year 1995.

3 **Section 10. Guam Community College; FTE exemption.** Notwithstanding  
4 any other provision of law, for Fiscal Years 1994 and 1995, the Full-Time Equivalency  
5 (FTE) restrictions imposed by the Three Year Economic Plan shall not be applicable  
6 to the Guam Community College instructional positions; provided, that the  
7 expenditures do not exceed the total appropriation for personnel services.

8 **Section 11. (a) Guam Memorial Hospital Authority; FTE exemption for**  
9 **persons practicing the healing arts and certified and registered ancillary services**  
10 **personnel.** Notwithstanding any other provision of law, for Fiscal Years 1994 and  
11 1995, the FTE restrictions imposed by the Three Year Economic Plan shall not be  
12 applicable to persons practicing the healing arts as defined in Subsection (b) of 10  
13 GCA Section 12101 for the Guam Memorial Hospital Authority or to certified and  
14 registered ancillary services personnel in the following position areas within the  
15 Authority: Pharmacy, Physical Therapy, Medical Laboratory, Radiology,  
16 Cardiopulmonary, and Dietary, and the Authority is authorized to hire personnel to  
17 fill positions in such areas in Fiscal Years 1994 and 1995, provided that expenditures  
18 do not exceed the total appropriation authorized for personnel services.

19 **(b) Guam Memorial Hospital Authority; FTE exemption for employees in**  
20 **direct patient care.** Notwithstanding any other provision of law, for Fiscal Years  
21 1994 and 1995, part-time employment for non-licensed, non-certified, and non-  
22 registered personnel in direct patient care areas including Nursing Services,  
23 Ancillary Services, or the Administrative Services of Housekeeping, Laundry,  
24 Medical Records, and Security Services is allowed provided that no more than four  
25 (4) persons shall share a single FTE, and the total compensation will not exceed the  
26 total funds provided for the salary appropriated for the utilization of one (1) FTE.

1           (c)     **Guam Memorial Hospital transfer authority.** For Fiscal Years 1994 and  
2 1995, the Board of Trustees of the Guam Memorial Hospital Authority may approve  
3 transfers of appropriations from the Guam Memorial Hospital Operations Fund of  
4 up to Five Percent (5%) of any line item of the Guam Memorial Hospital budget to  
5 any other line item of said budget in the case of an emergency, to avoid injury or  
6 loss of life to any patient, employee or staff member. A declaration of the state of  
7 emergency shall be sent to the Governor of Guam within seventy-two (72) hours of  
8 any such transfer, duly certified by the chairperson and the hospital administrator,  
9 of which a copy shall be sent to the Speaker of the Legislature and the chairperson of  
10 the Legislative Committee on Health, Welfare and Ecology.

11           **Section 12. Appropriations from Guam Contractors License Board Fund and**  
12 **Professional Engineers, Architects and Land Surveyors Fund to revert to the**  
13 **General Fund for Fiscal Years 1994 and 1995.** (a) At the end of Fiscal Year 1994,  
14 any unappropriated balances from the Guam Contractors License Board Fund and  
15 the Professional Engineers, Architects and Land Surveyors Fund shall revert to the  
16 General Fund.

17 (b) At the end of Fiscal Year 1995, any unappropriated balances from the Guam  
18 Contractors License Board Fund and the Professional Engineers, Architects and Land  
19 Surveyors Fund shall revert to the General Fund.

20           **Section 13. All funds except those specified to revert to the General Fund at**  
21 **the end of the Fiscal Year.** Notwithstanding any other provision of law,  
22 unless otherwise specified in this Act or subsequent legislation:

23 (a) Except for appropriations from the Tourist Attraction Fund, all unexpended  
24 and/or unencumbered appropriations in Chapter II of Public Law 21-136 and made  
25 pursuant to the Three Year Economic Plan for Fiscal Year 1994 shall revert to the  
26 General Fund on the last day of that fiscal year; all unexpended and/or  
27 unencumbered appropriations in Chapter II of Public Law 21-136 and made

1 pursuant to the Three Year Economic Plan for Fiscal Year 1994 from the Tourist  
2 Attraction Fund shall revert to the Tourist Attraction Fund on the last day of that  
3 fiscal year; and

4 (b) Except for appropriations from the Tourist Attraction Fund; all unexpended  
5 and/or unencumbered appropriations in Chapter II of Public Law 21-136 and made  
6 pursuant to the Three Year Economic Plan for Fiscal year 1995 shall revert to the  
7 General Fund on the last day of that fiscal year; and all unexpended and/or  
8 unencumbered appropriations in Chapter II of Public Law 21-136 and made  
9 pursuant to the Three Year Economic Plan for Fiscal year 1995 from the Tourist  
10 Attraction Fund shall revert to the Tourist Attraction Fund on the last day of that  
11 fiscal year.

12 **Section 14. Carryover of Local and Federal Matching Funds for grants.** The  
13 Local and Federal Matching Funds for programs whose expiration dates extend  
14 beyond September 30, 1994, and the Local and Federal Matching Funds for programs  
15 whose expiration dates extend beyond September 30, 1995 for Fiscal Year 1995, are  
16 hereby authorized to be carried over and expended through the period of the grant  
17 award.

18 **Section 15. Territorial Agency planning for hiring vacancies where less than**  
19 **One Hundred percent (100%) funding has been provided.** In the case of a  
20 Territorial Agency which has been provided funding at less than One Hundred  
21 percent (100%) level for vacancies, the agency may first hire the most vital positions,  
22 as determined by the Director or head of the Territorial Agency, for the  
23 consideration of the health, safety, and welfare of the territory, up to the level of the  
24 funding provided for the entire Fiscal Year. The Territorial Agency may also hire  
25 in a staggered pattern throughout the Fiscal Year as funds remain, or may hire the  
26 full compliment of FTE at the beginning of the fiscal year for as many months as the  
27 funding may provide, should that decision be the best management for the

1 particular Territorial Agency. The decision of how to fill the vacancies shall be the  
2 prerogative of the Director, or other head of the Territorial Agency.

3 **Section 16. Brand names of products and prices of a particular brand name**  
4 **of a product.** Should any brand name of any product, or any price of a product  
5 which is particular to a certain brand name, appear in Public Law 21-136, the brand  
6 name shall mean and be read as the generic term for the product, and the price shall  
7 mean and be read to apply to any brand name of that generic term.

8 **Section 17. Money reimbursed by the federal government shall be placed in**  
9 **General Fund.** Except as provided by the provisions of Public Law 22-24, if the  
10 territory expends any funds which are reimbursed by the federal government, the  
11 reimbursed funds shall be placed in the General Fund upon receipt.

12 **Section 18. Unless specifically provided for in this Act, General Provisions,**  
13 **Miscellaneous Appropriations, Miscellaneous Provisions, and Administrative**  
14 **Provisions of Public Laws 21-136 and the provisions of 21-137 are not effective for**  
15 **Fiscal Year 1994.** The provisions of Chapters I, III, IV, and V of Public Law 21-136  
16 and the provisions of Public Law 21-137 which are not specifically repeated in this  
17 Act shall not carryover and be effective for Fiscal Year 1994.

18 **Section 19. Judiciary Branch Transfer Authority.** §22405 of Title 5, Guam  
19 Code Annotated, is amended to read:

20 "§22405. Transfer authority: Judiciary. Notwithstanding any other provision of law,  
21 the Presiding Judge is hereby authorized to transfer up to Five Percent (5%) of funds  
22 appropriated by the Legislature to various divisions or categories within the Judicial  
23 Branch; provided, that notice of each transfer and justification therefor are delivered  
24 by the end of the month in which the transfer takes place to the Speaker of the  
25 Legislature; and provided, further, that no transfer shall take place to fund new  
26 positions, whether classified, unclassified, contractual, part-time, or temporary.  
27 Unexpended funds of the Judicial Branch shall be maintained in a continuing

1 budget appropriation for use in succeeding budget cycles, except that the funds cut  
2 from the budget of the Judicial Branch as a result of the Eight Percent (8%) and Four  
3 Percent (4%) reductions in budget set out in Public Laws 22-08 and 21-136 and in  
4 Section 5 of this Act are not available for such use."

5 **Section 20.** Section 24 of Chapter IV of Public Law 21-136, as amended by  
6 Section 16 of Public Law 21-137, is repealed and reenacted to read:

7 "Section 16. The Director of Revenue and Taxation is authorized to extend  
8 the employment contracts of personnel hired as Collection Support Technicians  
9 prior to October 1, 1993. These extensions shall not extend beyond September 30, 1994.

10 **Section 21. Advance appropriation to Department of Education for School**  
11 **Year 1994-1995 textbooks.** Nine Million Two Hundred Forty-seven Thousand  
12 Dollars (\$9,247,000) are appropriated from the Fiscal Year 1995 revenues of the  
13 General Fund to the Department of Education (the Department) as an advance  
14 appropriation to procure textbooks, workbooks and library books from local and off-  
15 island vendors for the School Year 1994-1995. This appropriation is not subject to  
16 any transfer authority of the Governor. These funds shall be made available and be  
17 released to the Department no later than December 31, 1993.

18 **Section 22. Such sums as are necessary for 1994 Summer School Program.**  
19 There are hereby appropriated such sums as are necessary from the Summer School  
20 Fund established pursuant to Section 6118 of Title 17 of the Guam Code Annotated  
21 to the Department of Education to fund the operations of the 1994 Summer School  
22 Program.

23 **Section 23. One Hundred Fifteen Thousand Seven Hundred Fourteen**  
24 **Dollars (\$115,714) to Guam State Council on Vocational Education (SCOVE).** One  
25 Hundred Fifteen Thousand Seven Hundred Fourteen Dollars (\$115,714) are  
26 appropriated from the General Fund to the Guam State Council on Vocational

1 Educational to supplement federal funds and other operational requirements for  
2 Fiscal Year 1994.

3 **Section 24.** <sup>Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000) J. A. A.</sup> ~~Two Hundred Thirty Thousand Dollars (\$230,000)~~ for  
4 **maintenance of Agana Heights and Tamuning Gymnasiums.** (a) ~~One Hundred~~  
5 ~~Twenty-five Thousand Dollars (\$25,000) J. A. A.~~ ~~Twenty-six Thousand Dollars (\$126,000)~~ are appropriated from the General Fund to  
6 the Agana Heights Municipal Planning Council for maintenance and operations of  
7 the Agana Heights Gymnasium; and

8 (b) <sup>Twenty-five Thousand Dollars (\$25,000) J. A. A.</sup> ~~One Hundred Four Thousand Dollars (\$104,000)~~ are appropriated from  
9 the General Fund to the Tamuning Municipal Planning Council for maintenance  
10 and operations of the Tamuning Gymnasium.

11 **Section 25** **Twenty-nine Million Six Hundred Fifty-nine Thousand One**  
12 **Hundred Eighty Dollars (\$29,659,180) to Government of Guam Retirement Fund for**  
13 **supplemental annuity benefits.** Twenty-nine Million Six Hundred Fifty-nine  
14 Thousand One Hundred Eighty Dollars (\$29,659,180) are appropriated from the  
15 General Fund to the Government of Guam Retirement Fund for the benefits of  
16 Four Thousand Three Hundred (4,300) retirees, consisting of the continuing  
17 provisions of items (i) through (vii) below, for the Fiscal Year 1994 COLA as  
18 provided in item (viii) below, and for the cost of medicare premiums of those  
19 retirees and their survivors who are eligible to receive social security benefits as  
20 provided in item (ix) below:

- 21 (i) the One Thousand Two Hundred Dollar (\$1,200) annuity benefits (to  
22 continue existing programs);
- 23 (ii) the One Thousand Five Hundred Dollar (\$1,500) supplemental annuity  
24 benefits (to continue existing programs);
- 25 (iii) the Seven Hundred Dollar (\$700) supplemental annuity benefits (to

16 benefits and are required under the government of Guam group health  
17 insurance programs to pay such premiums to continue to participate in  
18 such health insurance programs, failing which they are excluded  
19 therefrom.

20 **Section 26. Nine Million Five Hundred Sixty Thousand Thirty-eight Dollars**  
21 **(\$9,560,038) to Department of Administration for the Government of Guam**  
22 **Retirement Fund. Nine Million Five Hundred Sixty Thousand Thirty-eight Dollars**  
23 **(\$9,560,038) are appropriated from the General Fund to the Department of**  
24 **Administration for the purpose of paying contributions to the Retirement Fund for**  
25 **the Judicial Branch and for Executive Branch departments, authorities, and agencies**  
26 **(line agencies, University of Guam, Guam Community College, Guam Memorial**  
27 **Hospital Authority, Public Utility Agency of Guam, and the Public Defender Service**

1 Corporation), for which General Fund appropriations for Fiscal Year 1994 operations  
2 are made pursuant to Section 7 of Chapter V of Public Law 21-136 and in this Act, in

4 Annotated, made in Section 8 of Public Law 22-06. This appropriation shall be  
5 utilized for no other purpose than that stated in this Section, and notwithstanding  
6 any other provision of law, funds authorized by this Section shall not be transferred,  
7 encumbered, or in any way earmarked for any other purpose than to implement  
8 Section 8137 of Title 4, Guam Code Annotated, as amended in Section 8 of Public  
9 Law 22-06.

10 **Section 27. One Million Seven Hundred Twenty-eight Thousand Dollars**  
11 **(\$1,728,000) to Department of Administration for Off-Island Residential Treatment**  
12 **Fund.** One Million Seven Hundred Twenty-eight Thousand Dollars  
13 (\$1,728,000) are appropriated from the General Fund to the Department of  
14 Administration Off-Island Residential Treatment Fund for Fiscal Year 1994 to pay  
15 authorized expenses to send persons under the jurisdiction of the Court for  
16 residential care arising from physical, mental or emotional handicaps or from  
17 severe emotional disturbance.

18 **Section 28. Four Hundred Six Thousand Eighty Dollars (\$406,080) to**  
19 **Department of Revenue and Taxation for Tax Collection Task Force.** Four Hundred  
20 Six Thousand Eighty Dollars (\$406,080) are appropriated from the General Fund to  
21 the Department of Revenue and Taxation to fund the Fiscal Year 1994 operations of

3 Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the Governor is authorized to

6 for Fiestan Tasi, with the net proceeds of such cockfights to be given to the  
7 Municipal Planning Council of the village in which the cockfight is held.

17 1994. All appropriations to the Legislature Operations Fund shall be carried over and  
18 continue in Fiscal Year 1994 for use by the Legislature. The appropriation in this  
19 Section is reenacted October 1, 1994 for the operations of the Legislature for Fiscal  
20 Year 1995, and all appropriations to the Legislature Operations Fund on September  
21 30, 1994 shall be carried over and continue in Fiscal Year 1995 for the use by the  
22 Legislature.

23 **Section 32. Two Hundred Sixty-eight Thousand Seven Hundred Fifty**  
24 **Dollars (\$268,750) for Gef Pa'go Inalahan.** Two Hundred Sixty-eight Thousand  
25 Seven Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$268,750) are appropriated from the General Fund to  
26 the Gef Pa'go Inalahan for the design, construction management, and construction  
27 of outdoor stage with roof, bathroom facilities, and continued operations of the Gef

1 Pa'go Inalahan Chamorro Cultural Village project. The recipient of this  
2 appropriation shall make a report of the expenditures of the funds in this  
3 appropriation to the Governor and the Legislature.

4 **Section 33. (a) One Hundred Forty-seven Thousand Two Hundred Dollars**  
5 **(\$147,200) appropriation for conducting the Special Election.** One Hundred Forty-  
6 seven Thousand Two Hundred Dollars (\$147,200) are reappropriated from the  
7 appropriation previously made for the northern and southern high schools in  
8 Section 33 of Public Law 20-220 to the Guam Election Commission (the  
9 "Commission") to conduct a Special Election on Saturday, October 9, 1993 to fill the  
10 vacancy in the Twenty-Second Guam Legislature.

11 (b) ~~Thirty Thousand Dollars (\$30,000)~~ <sup>ZERO 000 do</sup> appropriation for advertising for Special  
12 Election. ~~Thirty Thousand Dollars (\$30,000)~~ <sup>ZERO 000 do</sup> are reappropriated from the  
13 appropriation previously made for the northern and southern high schools in  
14 Section 33 of Public Law 20-220 to the Guam Election Commission (the  
15 "Commission") for advertising needed for the Special Election on Saturday, October

21 Guam Power Authority for power extension to lot nos. 3-1 3-2, and 3-3, As  
22 Lucas, Talofofo.

23 (b) **Requirement for Guam Power Authority to maintain list of power requests.** The  
24 Guam Power Authority (GPA) shall maintain a list in chronological order of all  
25 persons who request the extension of power to their own residential property, and  
26 shall not less than once every quarter submit such list to the Legislature, together

1 with an estimate of the costs of so extending power to the properties set out on the  
2 list.

3 **(c) Requirement for Public Utility Agency of Guam to maintain list of water and**  
4 **sewer requests.** The Public Utility Agency of Guam (PUAG) shall maintain a list in  
5 chronological order of all persons who request the extension of water or sewer to  
6 their own residential property, and shall not less than once every quarter submit  
7 such list to the Legislature, together with an estimate of the costs of so extending  
8 water or sewer to the properties set out on the list.

9 **Section 35. Two Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$200,000) for Guam**  
10 **Educational Radio Foundation funded through Public Law 21-128. (a) Background**  
11 **and Legislative Findings.** Public Law 21-128 was enacted into law on July 28, 1992  
12 appropriating Two Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$200,000) to the Guam Educational  
13 Radio Foundation to establish an educational radio station on Guam. That project  
14 is well under way and the goal will be realized with the inauguration of KPRG,  
15 Public Radio for Guam, in late 1993. Public Law 21-128 helps the government fulfill  
16 its obligation to provide residents of Guam with access to the arts and to preserve  
17 the local culture. This additional appropriation will provide KPRG, Public Radio for  
18 Guam, a chance to stabilize the radio operation and will provide time for the  
19 Foundation to seek other avenues of funding. Once on-the-air, KPRG will continue  
20 to provide benefits for all the people of Guam for many decades to come. KPRG,  
21 Public Radio for Guam, will be sending local programs of culture, performing arts  
22 and lifestyles to the National Public Radio distribution center in Washington, D.C.  
23 for broadcast to the entire United States. This aspect of the project has the ability to  
24 generate an accurate and positive profile for Guam, possibly creating widespread  
25 interest in, and understanding of, our island.

26 A public radio station located at the University of Guam also provides a  
27 unique learning experience for students interested in radio broadcasting. Formal

1 internships will be established to allow students to obtain practical experience while  
2 working side-by-side with broadcast professionals. KPRG will serve as an outreach  
3 vehicle for the University, giving publicity to the many significant projects being  
4 conducted there. KPRG also allows University of Guam faculty to share their  
5 expertise and research with a listening audience.

6 KPRG is unique in that it will be a high-quality news, information, and  
7 entertainment service in a non-commercial environment. Public Radio for Guam  
8 will be a "window to the world" and a vehicle for local programming. The  
9 programming of KPRG is designed to enrich the artistic and cultural life in Guam,  
10 pioneering new concepts and techniques that will serve minority as well as majority  
11 needs and interests.

12 **(b) Appropriation.** Two Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$200,000) are  
13 appropriated from the General Fund to the Guam Educational Radio Foundation, a  
14 not-for-profit corporation, to establish and support an educational radio station on  
15 Guam; provided, however, that none of the funds shall be released until the Guam  
16 Educational Radio Foundation (the Foundation) submits to the Director of  
17 Administration (the Director) via the Governor an audited report as to how the  
18 Foundation spent the funds appropriated for it in Public Law 21-128. The Director  
19 shall release the funds to the Foundation upon the Director's receipt of the report  
20 and a copy of the report shall be submitted to the Legislature.

21 **Section 36. Four Hundred Eighty Thousand Dollars (\$480,000) for Agency**  
22 **for Human Resources Development (AHRD).** Four Hundred Eighty Thousand  
23 Dollars (\$480,000) are appropriated from the General Fund to the Agency for Human  
24 Resources Development to supplement federal funds for its Fiscal Year 1994  
25 operations.

26 **Section 37. Three Hundred Seventy-five Thousand Dollars (\$375,000) for**  
27 **"Mary Clare Home".** Three Hundred Seventy-five Thousand Dollars (\$375,000)

1 are appropriated from the General Fund to the Department of Mental Health and  
2 Substance Abuse for contractual expenses to operate the "Mary Clare Home" in  
3 Fiscal Year 1994.

4 **Section 38. Two Hundred Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$250,000) to Department**  
5 **of Public Health and Social Services for Automated Data Processing System study.**  
6 Two Hundred Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$250,000) are appropriated from the General  
7 Fund to the Department of Public Health and Social Services to conduct a feasibility  
8 study in the development of the Automated Data Processing System and for  
9 associated costs in the continuation of this system in Fiscal Year 1994.

10 **Section 39. One Hundred Sixty-nine Thousand Three Hundred Seventy-**  
11 **seven Dollars (\$169,377) to Guam Public Library for books.** One Hundred  
12 Sixty-nine Thousand Three Hundred Seventy-seven Dollars (\$169,377) are  
13 appropriated from the General Fund to the Guam Public Library for purchase of  
14 books and subscriptions, and to match federal funds in Fiscal Year 1994.

15 **Section 40. Two Hundred Twenty-three Thousand Seven Hundred Ninety-**  
16 **three Dollars (\$223,793) to Guam Museum for ten (10) positions.** Two Hundred  
17 Twenty-three Thousand Seven Hundred Ninety-three Dollars (\$223,793) are  
18 appropriated from the General Fund to the Guam Museum for staffing ten (10) full-  
19 time equivalency (FTE) positions and operations for the preservation of historical  
20 records in Fiscal Year 1994.

21 **Section 41. Sixty-seven Thousand Six Hundred Dollars (\$67,600) to Guam**  
22 **Energy Office for office space lease.** Sixty-seven Thousand Six Hundred Dollars  
23 (\$67,600) are appropriated from the General Fund to the Guam Energy Office for  
24 office space lease in Fiscal Year 1994.

25 **Section 42. Three Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$300,000) to Department of**  
26 **Agriculture for Melon Fly Eradication Project.** Three Hundred Thousand Dollars

1 (\$300,000) are appropriated from the General Fund to the Department of Agriculture  
2 for the Melon Fly Eradication Project.

3 **Section 43. Twenty Thousand Dollars (\$20,000) to the Department of Public**  
4 **Works for Guam Insular Guards memorial.** Twenty Thousand Dollars (\$20,000) are  
5 appropriated from the General Fund to the Department of Public Works to complete  
6 the construction of the memorial monument in honor of the Guam Insular Guards  
7 located at the Plaza de Espana.

8 **Section 44. Technical amendment to Public Utility Agency of Guam budget,**  
9 **specifying the Estimated Revenues and that the appropriation is made from General**  
10 **Fund to Public Utility Agency of Guam Fund.** Chapter II of the General  
11 Appropriation Act, Public Law 21-136, relative to appropriations for the operations  
12 of the Public Utility Agency of Guam, is amended to include the following:

13 "Section 1. (a) Estimated Revenues of the Public Utility Agency of Guam

7 convicted of acts made unlawful in Article 1 of Chapter 18 of Title 16, Guam Code  
8 Annotated.

9 (d) The Administrative Director of the Superior Court shall notify the Director of  
10 the Department of Corrections when the Fund has a balance of Three Hundred  
11 Thousand Dollars (\$300,000). Thereafter, the Director of Corrections may encumber  
12 and draw down money from the Fund as needed to complete design and  
13 construction of the minimum security facilities.

14 (e) Annually, the Superior Court of Guam and the Director of Corrections shall

27 The Legislature has been made aware of a serious flooding problem affecting the

1 homes and residences situated within the R.R. Cruz Subdivision of Agat. The  
2 subdivision was created many years ago from an area where drainage and  
3 percolation was naturally slow. Likewise, the area is located at the base of the hills  
4 on which the village of Santa Rita is situated. Recently, the government of Guam  
5 improved and paved the main public easement through the subdivision,  
6 simultaneously installing adequate water and sewer lines to serve this growing  
7 residential subdivision. However, the improvements to the road have created  
8 problems. The finished level of the pavement above the ground level of the lots  
9 served has reduced or completely blocked the drainage of rain water runoff. Now,  
10 whenever there is a heavy rain, the level of the road acts as a dam, trapping the rain  
11 water and additional runoff from the hills of Santa Rita within the residential lots  
12 themselves. Situations have been experienced where the level of the water retained  
13 exceeds the floor level of the existing homes, thereby flooding out those living in  
14 the homes. This situation is intolerable and creates health problems because of the  
15 tendency of the dammed water to remain stagnant for long periods of time. Because  
16 the situation was caused by the government's work on the road serving the area, it  
17 is incumbent upon the government to resolve the problem before serious public  
18 health problems develop.

19 **(b) Appropriation.** One Million Three Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$1,300,000) are  
20 appropriated from the General Fund to the Department of Public Works to develop  
21 plans and specifications for an adequate drainage system for the lots and parcels of  
22 property served by and situated within the R.R. Cruz Subdivision of Agat, and to  
23 construct the necessary culvert and drainage system.

24 **Section 55. One Hundred Forty Thousand Six Hundred Sixty-two Dollars**  
25 **(\$140,662) to Public Health and Social Services for Chalan Pago/Ordot Senior**  
26 **Citizens Center. One Hundred Forty Thousand Six Hundred Sixty Two Dollars**  
27 **(\$140,662) are appropriated from the General Fund to the Department of Public**

1 Health and Social Services for starting up operations of the Chalan Pago/Ordot  
 2 Senior Citizens Center and transportation of senior citizens under the supervision  
 3 and coordination of GARP/SPIMA, which will operate the Center.

4 **Section 56. Reprogramming of Guam Visitors Bureau operating budget to**  
 5 **provide for the provisions of Civil Service Commission Memorandum No. 93-334.**

6 (a) **Legislative findings and Intent.** Based upon a request from the Guam Visitors  
 7 Bureau, the Civil Service Commission issued Memorandum No. 93-344 advising  
 8 GVB of the official code, position title, pay grade and class standard for  
 9 Administrator, Research & Evaluation, formerly a contractual services position  
 10 with the job title of Research Manager. The GVB has subsequently requested that the  
 11 Legislature make the necessary budgetary amendments. It is therefore the intent of  
 12 the Legislature to amend the FY 1994 budget of the GVB, approved under Public Law  
 13 21-136, to conform with this request and to fund the classified position of  
 14 Administrator, Research & Evaluation, beginning with Fiscal Year 1994 by  
 15 transferring funds from contractual services to personnel.

7 **Section 63.** Reappropriation of ~~Six Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$600,000)~~ <sup>ZERO J. F. Adon</sup> for  
8 the extension of power lines to private residences. ~~Six Hundred Thousand Dollars~~ <sup>ZERO J. F. Adon</sup>  
9 ~~(\$600,000)~~ are reappropriated from Section 33 of Public Law 20-220 (Northern and  
10 Southern High Schools Project) to the Guam Power Authority to extend power lines  
11 to all private residences on Guam which are not presently receiving such power.

12 **Section 64.** Three Hundred Seventy-six Thousand Three Hundred Fifteen  
13 Dollars (\$376,315) to the Superior Court of Guam to continue computerization  
14 program. Three Hundred Seventy-six Thousand Three Hundred Fifteen Dollars  
15 (\$376,315) are appropriated from the General Fund to the Superior Court of Guam to

21 **Section 66.** One Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$100,000) to the Pacific Islands  
22 Development Bank (PIDB). One Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$100,000) are  
23 appropriated from the General Fund to the Pacific Islands Development Bank to  
24 fund the initial contribution of Guam as a member of the bank.

25 **Section 67.** Seventy-five Thousand Dollars (\$75,000) to the Department of  
26 Parks and Recreation to catalogue and analyze its archaeological collections, and

15 **Section 68. Adding a new §6306 to Chapter 6 of Title 12, Guam Code**  
16 **Annotated, relative to signage of the Guam Mass Transit Authority.** A new §6306  
17 is added to Chapter 6 of Title 12, Guam Code Annotated to read:

18 "§6306. Signage on Authority Property. Notwithstanding any other  
19 provision of law relative to sign regulations, the Board of Directors may establish  
20 appropriate regulations and fees for the placement of a sign or signs on any of its bus  
21 stop shelters, benches and vehicles, provided the signs shall be stationary, non-  
22 flashing, and not larger than the dimensions of the property upon which they are  
23 located. The placement of the signs shall not interfere with or obstruct traffic  
24 visibility."

25 **Section 69. Adding a new §6307 to Chapter 6 of Title 12, Guam Code**  
26 **Annotated, relative to fees for signs on Guam Mass Transit Property, to read:**

1 "§6307. Fees for Signs on Authority Property. Fees collected by the  
2 Authority pursuant to §6306 of this Chapter 6 shall be deposited in the Public Transit

4 **Section 70. Adding a new Subsection (d) to §26503 of Title 11 of Guam Code**  
5 **Annotated to read:**

6 "(d) The Department of Administration shall report on a monthly basis to  
7 the Legislative Committee which has oversight over the Guam Mass Transit  
8 Authority on the balance and status of the Public Transit Fund."
