AN ACT TO ADD A NEW CHAPTER 47 TO TITLE 17, GUAM CODE ANNOTATED, TO ESTABLISH A PUBLIC HIGH SCHOOL PRE-MEDICAL PROGRAM AND A PRE-MEDICAL PROGRAM AND A DOCTOR OF MEDICINE FELLOWSHIP AT THE UNIVERSITY OF GUAM; TO MAKE AN APPROPRIATION FOR THE EMERGENCY MEDICAL SERVICES DEPARTMENT OF THE GUAM MEMORIAL HOSPITAL; AND TO AMEND SUBPARAGRAPH (b) OF §12311, TITLE 10,

GUAM CODE ANNOTATED, ON LICENSING NURSES BY ENDORSEMENT.

1	BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE TERRITORY OF GUAM:
2	Section 1. A new Chapter 47 is hereby added to Title 17, Guam Code
3	Annotated, to read:
4	"CHAPTER 47
5	PRE-MEDICAL PROGRAMS AND FELLOWSHIPS
.6	§47101. Name of chapter. This chapter shall be referred to as the
7	"Access to Medical Training and Education Act" or AMTE.
8	§47102. Legislative findings. The Legislature finds that there continues
9	to be an urgent need for physicians to serve Guam and the region. The Guam
10	Memorial Hospital and other health organizations on the island continue to
11	find it very difficult to hire physicians to serve the health needs of the people
12	of Guam. In order to meet the demands of health care for the island, the
13	Legislature believes that it is most effective to identify potential physician
14	candidates during their high school years so that the necessary support for
15	the candidate's success in a pre-medical program and in the application to a
16	school of medicine can be enhanced. Therefore, the Legislature herein
17	establishes the following AMTE programs: a High School Pre-Medical
18	Program at the Department of Education, a Pre-Medical Program at the
19	University of Guam, and a Doctor of Medicine Fellowship at the University
20	of Guam.
21	§47103. High School Pre-Medical Program. (a) The Department of
22	Education shall develop and implement a Pre-Medical Program curriculum
23	for the island's public high schools. Such program shall include the following:

1. Identifying and recruiting students who show interest in 1 science and health-related fields; 2 3

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- 2. Granting educational credits for course work during the junior and senior years of high school;
- 3. Providing practicum experience for each student participating in such program not only during the school year but also in the summer months as a summer intern at Guam Memorial Hospital or at Public Health facilities;
- 4. Providing awareness of the health care needs of Guam and its neighbors; and
- 11 5. Providing guidance and counseling so that the student is prepared to enroll in the Pre-Medical Program at the University of 12 13 Guam.
 - (b) The Director of Education shall no later than three (3) months from the effective date of this chapter, provide a written report to the Chairperson of the Board of Education, the Governor of Guam, and the Speaker of the Legislature on such Program's curriculum which shall include a description of the curriculum, financial requirements, and the date of implementation of the Program within the public high schools of Guam. In no event, however, shall the implementation of the High School Pre-Medical Program in the high schools of Guam be later than academic year 1994-1995.
- 22 §47104.1. Pre-Medical Program at the University of Guam. The University of Guam (the "University") shall develop and implement a Pre-23 Medical Program curriculum. The curriculum's objective shall be to prepare a 24 student at the University to meet all the requirements necessary to apply to 25 professional schools of medicine, to prepare for the standardized medical 26 school aptitude test, and to provide opportunities for awareness of the health

- care needs of Guam and the region. The University shall work in 1
- coordination with the AMTE Council in developing and implementing such a 2
- Pre-Medical Program curriculum at the University, which curriculum shall be 3
- adopted by the University no later than academic year 1994-1995. 4
- §47104.2 AMTE Fellowship Council. There is hereby created the 5
- AMTE Fellowship Council (the "AMTE Council"), the general purpose of 6
- which shall be to plan, develop, implement and manage the Pre-Medical 7
- Programs and the Doctor of Medicine Fellowship program as provided in 8
- this chapter in order to attract, select, orient, and assist qualified high school 9
- and college students to become physicians in Guam. The AMTE Council shall 10
- convene within thirty (30) days of the enactment of this chapter to implement 11
- 12 its provisions.
- §47104.3. Members of AMTE Council. The AMTE Council shall be 13
- composed of the following: 14
- 15 (1) The Administrator of the Guam Memorial Hospital;
- (2) The Director of Public Health and Social Services; 16
- 17 (3) The Chairman of the Board of Medical Examiners;
- (4) The President of the Guam Medical Society; 18
- 19 (5) The President of the University;
- (6) The Director of Mental Health and Substance Abuse; and 20
- 21 (7) The Director of the Guam Health Planning and Development
- 22 Agency.
- 23 §47104.4. Personnel. The Office of the President of the University shall
- provide logistics and personnel necessary for the operation of the AMTE 24
- 25 Council.
- §47104.5. Administrator of the AMTE Council. There is hereby 26 27
- established within the office of the President of the University the AMTE

- Fellowship Administrator, full- or part-time, if needed, who shall work in 1
- conjunction with the President of the University in the administration of the 2
- Pre-Medical Program at the University. The AMTE Administrator shall work 3
- under the President of the University and the AMTE Council to develop, 4
- organize, and administer the Pre-Medical Program and the Doctor of 5
- Medicine Fellowship Program at the University. The AMTE Fellowship 6
- Administrator shall work closely with the President, the administrators, and 7
- the deans of the University in the preparation of the curriculum, planning of 8
- schedules, and assuring adequate instruction in the Program. The AMTE 9
- Fellowship Administrator shall be entitled to government of Guam benefits 10
- and shall serve at the pleasure of the AMTE Council. The AMTE Council 11
- shall set the rate and term of pay of such administrator and may provide the 12
- 13 same by contract.
- §47104.6. Financial assistance eligibility. Financial assistance may be 14
- awarded by the AMTE Council to eligible students enrolled in the Pre-15
- Medical Program at the University who are: 16
- 17 (a) Bona fide residents of Guam for at least ten (10) years;
- 18 (b) Citizens or permanent residents of the United States;
- 19 (c) Seniors or graduates of an accredited high school with an overall
- grade point average of not less than 3.0 on a 4.0 scale; 20
- 21 (d) Admitted to the University of Guam in accordance with its
- admission policies, including advance placement for high school students; 22
- 23 (e) Agreed and bound to return to Guam to practice medicine or work
- in a health service field after successfully completing his or her medical 24
- 25 training.
- §47104.6.1. Continued eligibility. To be eligible to continue to receive 26
- financial assistance under such program, the student must remain in good 27

academic standing for each academic year given assistance under such 1 2 program.

§47104.7. Obligations. (a) A student who for any reason is terminated 3 from the Pre-Medical Program shall repay to the AMTE Medical Fund as 4 established in this chapter an amount equal to the total financial assistance 5 received by the student within five (5) years of such termination from the 6 Program with interest at the rate of twelve (12%) percent per annum. 7

(b) A student who does complete the Pre-Medical Program but is not 8 selected for the Doctor of Medicine Fellowship Program as established 9 therein or does not pursue for any reason application into the Doctor of 10 Medicine Fellowship Program shall repay to the AMTE Medical Fund an 11 amount equal to the total financial assistance received by the student. In the 12 13 alternative, in lieu of monetary repayment, a student may satisfy his financial obligations herein by employment with the government of Guam at the rate 14 of one (1) year of employment for each academic year or fraction thereof that 15 16 the student received financial assistance.

17 §47104.8. Financial assistance. (a) Students in the Pre-Medical School Program at the University must complete an application form provided by the 18 AMTE Council and satisfy all the requirements set out in §47103.6 of this 19 20 chapter. 21

- (b) Students enrolled in the Pre-Medical School Program and selected for financial assistance by the AMTE Council shall be entitled to the following 22 benefits:
- 24 (1) All costs of tuition, fees and books for a period of not more 25 than four (4) academic years; 26

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(2) A monthly stipend according to the following schedule: Freshmen, two hundred dollars (\$200) per month; sophomores, three

hundred dollars (\$300) per month; juniors, four hundred dollars (\$400)

2 per month; and seniors, five hundred dollars (\$500) per month.

(c) As a condition for continuing full entitlement to the benefits provided in this section, the recipient must maintain full-time enrollment with a minimum of twelve (12) semester credits per semester, not including the summer session, and good academic standing with an overall grade point average of 3.0 or better for each academic year. No student may receive benefits beyond four (4) academic years.

§47105. Doctor of Medicine Fellowship Program. There is hereby established a Doctor of Medicine Fellowship Program under the AMTE Council for the following purposes:

12 (1) To provide physicians for Guam Memorial Hospital, the 13 Department of Public Health and Social Services, the Department of Mental 14 Health and Substance Abuse, and other health organizations in Guam and in 15 the region;

16 (2) To develop local medical personnel who are sensitive to Guam's cultural diversity.

§47105.1. Administration. The Fellowship Program shall be administered by the AMTE Council, and all such fellowships shall be granted by the AMTE Council.

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by the AMTE Council.

§47105.2. Fund. There is hereby established a Physicians Fellowship
Fund, hereinafter referred to as the "AMTE Fellowship Fund" from which
fellowships and financial assistance granted pursuant to this chapter as well
as the cost for administering the Programs shall be funded. The AMTE
Fellowship Fund shall be kept separate and apart from any other fund and
shall be administered by the AMTE Council, which is authorized to accept
gifts, devises, bequests, donations, and all other kinds of contributions for the

use of the AMTE Fellowship Fund. The AMTE Fellowship Fund shall be 1 funded by annual appropriations by the Legislature to the extent made 2 necessary by the financial assistance and fellowships granted pursuant to this 3 chapter. The funds shall be administered by the AMTE Council and all 4 monies appropriated for financial assistance and fellowships pursuant to this 5 chapter and all repayment of such financial assistance and fellowships given 6 under this chapter shall be paid directly to the AMTE Fellowship Fund. 7 Within one hundred twenty (120) days after the close of its fiscal year, the 8 AMTE Council shall transmit to the Governor, the Speaker of the 9 Legislature, and the President of the University an annual report of the 10 expenditures of the AMTE Fellowship Fund, including, but not limited to, a 11 balance sheet, a statement of receipts and expenses, a general description of 12 the income sources and the expenses of the AMTE Fellowship Fund. 13

§47105.2.1. Investment. Reserves of the AMTE Fellowship Fund in 14 excess of requirements for current operations may be invested and reinvested 15 by the AMTE Council. At its discretion, the AMTE Council may designate its 16 Chairman or an investment committee consisting of two (2) or more AMTE 17 Council members to supervise this function. The AMTE Council shall have 18 full power to manage the investments as in its considered judgment seems 19 most appropriate to the requirements and objectives of the Fund. All 20 proceeds and income from investments, of whatever nature, shall be credited 21 to the account of the AMTE Fellowship Fund. 22 23

§47105.3. Regulations. The AMTE Council, subject to the provisions of the Administrative Adjudication Law, shall promulgate regulations pursuant to and not inconsistent with the provisions of this chapter.

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§47105.4. Submission of names. The names of all students granted fellowships under this chapter shall be submitted to the Governor, the

- Speaker of the Legislature, and the President of the University no later than 1
- January 15th of each calendar year. 2
- §47105.5. Application forms and notices. The AMTE Council shall 3
- prescribe by regulation necessary application forms and procedures for all 4
- financial assistance fellowships authorized by this chapter. 5
- §47105.6. Prohibition. No money may be expended for awards under 6
- this chapter unless such awards are authorized by the AMTE Council by 7
- resolution. Any person who disburses or certifies any expenditure from the 8
- AMTE Fellowship Fund without such authorization shall be personally liable
- for the restitution of such expenditure to the AMTE Fellowship Fund. 10
- §47105.7. Discharge of fellowship obligations upon death or disability. 11
- The AMTE Council may, upon the death or disability of a student who has 12
- received any financial assistance under the provisions of this chapter, 13
- discharge in full or in part all such student's obligations for the repayment of 14
- 15 such assistance.
- §47105.8. Award of physician fellowship: selection. The AMTE 16
- Council may select up to five (5) applicants per academic year for fellowship 17
- awards. The names shall be submitted to the Governor, the Speaker of the 18
- Legislature, and President of the University no later than January 15th of 19
- each year. With the submission of the names to the Legislature, the AMTE 20
- 21 Council shall also request the necessary appropriation to fully fund the
- fellowships granted for the academic year. 22
- 23 §47105.8.1. Physician fellowship eligibility. An applicant for a
- fellowship must: 24
- 25 (a) Be a bona fide resident of Guam for at least ten (10) years;
- (b) Be a citizen of the United States or a permanent resident; 26

(c) Provide proof of acceptance into a school of medicine at an
accredited institution of higher education in the United States;

An applicant need not have gone through the High School Pre-Medical Program or the Pre-Medical Program as provided in this chapter to be eligible for a physician fellowship; provided, however, that a student who has enrolled in and successfully completed the High School Pre-Medical Program or Pre-Medical Program or both shall be given preference over other applicants.

- 9 §47105.8.2. Physician fellowship benefits. Students awarded a 10 physician fellowship pursuant to this chapter shall receive the following 11 benefits:
- 12 (a) All costs of tuition, fees, and books for a period of not more than 13 four (4) academic years;
- (b) A monthly stipend of up to Two Thousand Dollars (\$2,000) as determined by the Council for a period of not more than four (4) academic years;
- 17 (c) Transportation from Guam to the student's school of medicine, 18 Return transportation to Guam will be paid for the student after the 19 successful completion of the student's medical training.

20 §47105.9. Physician fellowship obligations: (a) A fellow who attends medical school under the physician fellowship program shall agree to return 21 to work for the government of Guam within three (3) months after the 22 completion of the course of studies for which the fellowship was granted; 23 provided, however, that if the fellow continues in a residency or internship 24 program or in an area of specialty, then the AMTE Council may defer the 25 fellow's obligations until three (3) months after said residency, internship, or 26 specialty training is completed. 27

- (b) A fellow will lose entitlement to the fellowship if he or she fails to 1 maintain good standing as a full time student in the approved medical school. 2
- (c) A fellow who does not successfully complete his or her medical 3 education within four (4) academic years shall pay back all monies expended 4 on his or her behalf to the Physicians Medical Fund with interest at twelve 5 percent (12%) per annum within five (5) years of his or her termination from 6 the medical program. 7
- (d) Upon the successful completion of medical school and any area of 8 specialty training as approved by the AMTE Council, fellows are required to 9 return to Guam within three (3) months of completion of said medical 10 training and are required to provide two (2) years of service to the government of Guam for each year of fellowship. This obligation shall be in addition to any other obligations under the Pre-Medical Program.

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- §47105.10. Obligations of the government of Guam. The government 14 of Guam shall make available a position at the Guam Memorial Hospital, the 15 Department of Public Health and Social Service, or any other government 16 17 health-related facility to a returning fellow within three (3) months of the completion of his or her medical training as determined by the AMTE 18 Council. The Administrator of the AMTE Council shall be responsible for 19 coordinating the availability of returning fellows and openings within the 20 government of Guam in the area of the returning fellow's medical training 21 for placement in the government of Guam. The failure of the government of 22 Guam to make available a medical position within the government of Guam 23 to a returning fellow shall relieve the fellow of any and all financial 24 25 obligations and service commitment to the government of Guam.
 - §47105.11. Budget and compensation. The budget for financial assistance, salaries, stipend, travel and operational requirements of the

1 AMTE Council as provided in this chapter shall be submitted for the Fiscal

2 Year 1994 and annually thereafter by the AMTE Council for approval by the

3 Legislature. The Legislature shall appropriate funds to the AMTE Council

4 which shall disburse them pursuant to its directives and policies. Unexpended

5 funds shall be maintained in a continuing budget appropriation for use by the

6 AMTE Council in succeeding budget cycles.

7 §47106. Service on Guam after employment with the government of

8 Guam. In meeting the obligation to repay the financial assistance given in the 9 Pre-Medical and Fellowship Programs and III to the second s

Pre-Medical and Fellowship Programs established in this chapter, the

10 following rules shall apply: For each year of the Pre-Medical Program, one

11 (1) year's service on Guam; for each year of the Fellowship Program, two (2)

"AN ACT TO ADD A NEW CHAPTER 47 TO TITLE 17, GUAM CODE ANNOTATED, TO ESTABLISH A HIGH SCHOOL PRE MEDICAL PROGRAM AT THE DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION, A PRE-MEDICAL PROGRAM AT THE UNIVERSITY OF GUAM, AND A DOCTOR OF MEDICINE FELLOWSHIP AT THE UNIVERSITY OF GUAM."

The Committee on Education, Twenty Second Guam Legislature, conducted a Public Hearing on Bill No. 344, relative to the establishment of a pre-medical program at the Department of Education and the University of Guam and a doctor of medicine fellowship at the University of Guam, on Wednesday, March 24, 1993, and subsequently followed by a second hearing on Wednesday, May, 26, 1993, in the Public Hearing Room, Temporary Legislative Building, Agana, Guam.

SUMMARY OF TESTIMONY

Dr. Ricardo B. Eusebio Concerned Citizen

Dr. Ricardo B. Eusebio, a general surgeon at Naval Hospital, Guam, presented oral and written testimony as a concerned citizen to the Committee in support of Bill No. 344. Dr. Eusebio commenced his testimony by stating that Bill No. 344 addresses the critical health care manpower needs of our island. Dr. Eusebio also stated that increasing the supply of doctors on island would enable these doctors to spend more time with their patients and to encourage self improvement by allowing for more time for further education and training,

eventually benefitting the patients. Dr. Eusebio also stated that the proposed provision would provide educational support to prospective medical doctors. Dr. Eusebio concluded his comments by presenting several recommendations for improving the bill, these included: changing the term "pre-pre medical program" to reduce possible confusion; the 3.0 grade standard should be made more stringent because of the rigorous demands of medical school; the criteria for residency of applicants should be reduced; and a provision should be provided for local residents who are presently enrolled in a medical program at a credited university to receive assistance from this program.

Dr. Franklin J. A. Quitugua Director, Department of Education

Dr. Franklin J. A. Quitugua, Director of the Department of Education, presented oral and written testimony to the Committee respectfully opposing the passage of Bill No. 344. Dr. Quitugua stated that the Department believes that their current work in developing the secondary school curriculum would provide courses suitable for students inclined to pursue careers in the healing arts. Dr. Quitugua further stated that a more functional career guidance program in the middle and high school levels would properly help guide our students in the selection of relevant courses. Dr. Quitugua concluded by stating that the legislation is not necessary for the secondary school segment because the secondary school curriculum will satisfy the intent of the bill, thus the Department opposes the passage of the provision.

Dr. Lawrence Kasperbauer Chairman, Guam Territorial Board of Education

Dr. Lawrence Kasperbauer, Chairman of the Guam Territorial Board of Education, appeared before the Committee and presented oral testimony in support of the Department of Education's position on Bill No. 344. Dr. Kasperbauer emphasized that there does not need to be a law for such a program, and recommended that the local medical society continue to work closely with the public schools and the counselors.

Mr. Jesus U. Torres
Chairman, Board of Regents

University of Guam

Mr. Jesus U. Torres, Chairman of the Board of Regents at the University of Guam, presented written testimony to the Committee in support of Bill No. 344, which was read by Dr. Remington Rose-Crossley, Dean of the College of Arts and Liberal Sciences at the University of Guam. In the testimony, Mr. Torres stated that the University supports Bill No. 344 because of the shortage of physicians practicing on Guam. Mr. Torres also mentioned that the University has been offering healing arts advisement programs since the early 1980's, and there are 7 UOG students in medical schools. Mr. Torres further stated that the provision would give the University support in strengthening its existing programs. Mr. Torres concluded his comments by stating that the AMTE Council should reconsider the need for a full-time AMTE Fellowship Administrator because the University has already developed and organized a program, rather a liaison faculty from the University may be utilized.

Dr. Wilfred P. Leon Guerrero President, University of Guam

Dr. Wilfred P. Leon Guerrero, President of the University of Guam, appeared before the Committee to respond to any questions or concerns the Committee may have in relation to the impact of the proposed measure with the University of Guam.

Mr. PeterJohn Camacho Hospital Administrator, Guam Memorial Hospital Authority

Mr. PeterJohn Camacho, Hospital Administrator of Guam Memorial Hospital Authority, presented written testimony to the Committee in support of the proposed measure, Bill No. 344, which was read by Mr. E. J. Cruz, also of Guam Memorial Hospital. In the testimony, Mr. Camacho commenced by acknowledging that the island has been experiencing difficulties in attracting and retaining medical practitioners and healthcare professionals. Mr. Camacho continued by recommending the following: that the island's medical practitioners and Guam Memorial Hospital be granted the opportunity to be involved as mentors for the students enrolled in the program; the AMTE program should explore all possible avenues to insure that recipients of the

program return to Guam to provide service to our community; need to ensure that Guam retains the professionals once they have completed their commitment to the island under the program; and the issue of malpractice insurance availability on the island needs to be addressed.

COMMITTEE QUESTIONS/COMMENTS

Senator Madeleine Z. Bordallo, Chairperson, commenced the questioning and the discussion with the witnesses. Senator Bordallo initially asked Dr. Quitugua if the ALPS(Alternative Learning Paths) Program would provide premedical programs for the high school students. Dr. Quitugua responded that the ALPS Program would provide career guidance courses for the island's high school students in different areas. Senator David L. G. Shimizu, the author of Bill No. 344, then presented comments on the provision, emphasizing the shortage of doctors on the island and the need to provide educational support and encouragement to the local people to pursue a career in the medical field. Senator Shimizu also expressed his disappointment in the Department of Education's position in opposing the measure. Dr. Franklin Quitugua stated that the provision in the bill referring to the Department of Education would legislate what DOE officials are presently working on, then recommended that, if the bill were to be passed, the provision in the bill referring to the Curriculum and Instruction Division of the Department be deleted because it is mandating an administrative responsibility.

Several other senators also posed questions and comments to the witnesses present during the hearing. Vice-Speaker John P. Aguon further emphasized the need for more doctors on the island and was pleased that the bill proposes to establish a policy on addressing the shortage on island. Vice Speaker Aguon continued by stating that members of the Legislature and the Department of Education should get together to generate ideas on how to encourage local students to enter into the medical profession. Senator Thomas C. Ada mentioned that he was surprised with the Department of Education's position in opposing the proposal, and stressed that Guam could start with Bill No. 344 and move ahead. Dr. Quitugua responded that increased school guidance counseling should aid in encouraging our students to pursue the field of medicine as well as other areas of studies. Senator Anthony C. Blaz commented that healthcare appears to be a worldwide concern; and further stated that a pre-medical

curriculum in the schools may not be necessary because DOE officials have stated that they are already working on addressing this concern within the public schools, and further stated that it may work at the University of Guam; but stressed that finding the money may be a problem. Senator Blaz concluded by stating that the Pro-Tech Scholarships may be geared toward the medical field.

COMMITTEE FINDINGS/RECOMMENDATIONS

The Committee on Education finds that the island community continues to experience a shortage in medical doctors, impacting the quality of health care available to the People of Guam. The Committee also finds that in order to address this concern appropriately, island leaders must implement programs which would encourage local people to pursue a degree in the medical field. The Committee further finds that Bill No. 344 would provide local People with educational financial support with an opportunity to pursue a degree in the medical field, and subsequently to return to the island to serve the island THEREFORE, THE COMMITTEE ON EDUCATION community. RECOMMENDS THAT BILL NO. 344, AS SUBSTITUTED BY THE COMMITTEE ON EDUCATION, "AN ACT TO ADD A NEW CHAPTER 47 TO TITLE 17, GUAM CODE ANNOTATED, TO ESTABLISH A HIGH SCHOOL PRE MEDICAL PROGRAM AT THE DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION, A PRE-MEDICAL PROGRAM AT THE UNIVERSITY OF GUAM, AND A DOCTOR OF MEDICINE FELLOWSHIP AT THE UNIVERSITY OF GUAM", BE FAVORABLY CONSIDERED AND PASSED BY THE TWENTY SECOND GUAM LEGISLATURE.

"AN ACT TO ADD A NEW CHAPTER 47 TO TITLE 17, GUAM CODE ANNOTATED, TO ESTABLISH A HIGH SCHOOL PRE MEDICAL PROGRAM AT THE DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION, A PRE-MEDICAL PROGRAM AT THE UNIVERSITY OF GUAM, AND A DOCTOR OF MEDICINE FELLOWSHIP AT THE UNIVERSITY OF GUAM."

BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE TERRITORY OF GUAM:

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Section 1. §§47101. Name of Act.

This Act shall be referred to as the

"Access to Medical Training and Education " Act or " AMTE.

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Section 2. §§47102. Legislative Findings.

The Legislature finds that there continues to be an urgent need for medical doctors to serve Guam and the region. The Guam Memorial Hospital and other health organizations on the island continue to be impacted with the difficulty of hiring medical doctors to serve the health needs of our people. In order to meet the demands of health care for our

island, the Legislature believes that it is most effective to identify potential physician candidates during their high school years so that the necessary support for the candidate's success in a pre-medical program and in the application to a school of medicine can be enhanced. Therefore, the Legislature herein establishes the following AMTE programs: a High School Pre-Pre Medical Program at the Department of Education, a Pre-Medical Program at the University of Guam and a Doctor of Medicine Fellowship at the University of Guam.

Section 3. §§47103. High School Pre-Medical Program.

- (a) The Department of Education shall develop and implement a Pre-Pre Medical Program curriculum for the island's high-schools. The Program shall include the following:
- 1. identification and recruitment of students that show interest in science and health related fields;
- 2. granting of educational credits for coursework during the junior and senior years of high school;
- 3. providing practicum experience for each student participating in the program not only during the school year but including the summer months as a summer intern at the Guam Memorial Hospital or Public Health Facilities;
- 4. providing awareness of the health care needs of Guam and its neighboring countries; and
- 5. providing guidance and counseling so that the student is prepared to enroll in the Pre-Medical Program at the University of Guam.
- (b) The Director of Education shall thereafter, but in no event later than three months from the effective date of this Act, provide a

written report to the Chairperson of the Board of Education, the Governor of Guam, and the Speaker of the Guam Legislature on the curriculum program which shall include a description of the completed Curriculum Program, the financial requirements, and the effective date of implementation of the Program within the high schools of Guam. In no event however, shall the implementation of the High School Pre-Medical Program in the high schools of Guam be later than the academic school year for 1994-1995.

Section 4. §§47104. Pre-Medical Program at the University of Guam.

§§47104.1. Pre-Medical Program at the University of Guam. The University of Guam shall develop and implement a Pre-Medical Program curriculum. The curriculum's objective shall be to prepare the student to meet all the requirements necessary to apply to professional schools of medicine, prepare for the standardized medical school aptitude test and to provide opportunities for awareness of the health care needs of Guam and the region. The University of Guam shall work in coordination with the AMTE Council in developing and implementing a Pre-Medical Program Curriculum at the University of Guam, which Curriculum shall be adopted by the University no later than Academic Year 1994-95.

§§47104.2. AMTE Fellowship Council. There is hereby created the AMTE Fellowship Council (the "AMTE Council"), the general purpose of which shall be to plan, develop, implement and manage the Pre-Medical Program and the Doctor of Medicine Fellowship program as described herein in order to attract, select, orient, and assist qualified high school and college students to become physicians in the Territory of

Guam. The AMTE Council shall convene within thirty (30) days of the
enactment of this Act for the purposes of implementing the provisions of
this Act.
§§47104.3. Members of AMTE Fellowship Council. The Council
shall be composed of the following:
(1) Administrator of the Guam Memorial Hospital;
(2) Director of the Department of Public Health and Social
Services;
(3) Chairman of the Board of Medical Examiners;
(4) President of the Guam Medical Society;
(5) President of the University of Guam;
(6) Director of Mental Health and Substance Abuse; and
(7) Director of Guam Health Planning and Development
Agency.
§§47104.4. Personnel. The Office of the President of the
University of Guam shall provide logistics and personnel necessary for the
operation of the Council.
§§47104.5. Administrator of the Council. There is hereby
established within the office of the President of the University of Guam
the AMTE Fellowship' Administrator who shall be responsible for
working in conjunction with the President of the University in the
administration of the Pre-Medical Program at the University of Guam.
The AMTE Administrator shall work under the President of the University
of Guam and the AMTE Council to develop, organize, and administer the
Pre-Medical Program and the Doctor of Medicine Fellowship Program as
herein established at the University of Guam. The AMTE Administrator
shall work closely with the President, the administrators, and the Deans

- of the University of Guam in the preparation of the curriculum, planning of schedules, and assuring adequate instruction in the Program. The AMTE Fellowship Administrator shall be entitled to all Government of Guam benefits and shall serve at the pleasure of the AMTE Fellowship Council. The AMTE Council shall set the rate and term of pay of the Administrator and may provide the same by contract.
 - §§47104.6. Financial Assistance Eligibility. Financial assistance may be awarded by the Council to eligible students enrolled in the Pre-Medical Program who meet the following criteria:
 - (a) are bona fide residents of Guam for at least ten (ten) years;
 - (b) are citizens or permanent residents of the United States;
 - (c) are seniors or graduates of an accredited Guam high school with an overall grade point average of not less than 3.0 on a 4.0 scale;
 - (d) have been admitted to the University of Guam in accordance with its admission policies, including advance placement for high school students;
 - (e) if accepted in the Doctor of Medicine Fellowship Program and successfully completes his or her medical training agrees to return to practice medicine with the Government of Guam.
 - §§47104.6.1. Continued Eligibility. To be eligible to continue to receive financial assistance under this program, the student must maintain an overall grade point average of 3.0 or better for each academic year during the term of assistance under this Program.
 - **§§47104.7.** Obligations.

(a) A student who for any reason is terminated from the Pre-Medical Program shall repay to the AMTE Medical Fund as established herein an amount equal to the total financial assistance received by the student within five (5) years of his or her termination from the Program with interest at the rate twelve (12%) percent per annum.

- (b) A student who does complete the Pre-Medical Program but is not selected for the Doctor of Medicine Fellowship Program as established herein or does not pursue for any reason application into the Doctor of Medicine Fellowship Program shall repay to the AMTE Medical Fund an amount equal to the total financial assistance received by the student. In the alternative, in lieu of monetary repayment, a student may satisfy his financial obligations herein by employment service with the Government of Guam at the rate of two years of employment service for each year or a fraction thereof the student receives financial assistance.
 - §§47104.8. Financial Assistance Benefits.

- (a) Students in the Pre-Medical School Program at the University of Guam must complete an application form provided by the Council and satisfy all the requirements set out in Section §§47103.6 above.
- (b) Students enrolled in the Pre-Medical School program and selected for financial assistance by the Council shall be entitled to the following benefits:
- (1) All costs of tuition, fees and books for a period of not more than four (4) academic years;
- (2) A monthly stipend according to the following schedule: college freshman, two hundred dollars (\$200.00) per month; sophomore, three hundred dollars (\$300.00) per month: junior, four hundred dollars (\$400.00) per month; and senior, five hundred dollars (\$500.00)per month.
 - (c) As a condition for continuing full entitlement to the benefits

provided in this Section, the recipient must maintain a full-time enrollment with a minimum of twelve (12) semester credits per semester, not including the summer session, and good academic standing with an overall grade point average of 3.0 or better for each academic year. No student may receive benefits beyond four (4) academic years.

Section 5. §§47105. Doctor of Medicine Fellowship Program.

There is hereby established a Doctor of Medicine Fellowship Program under the AMTE Council for the following purposes:

- (1) To provide medical doctors for the Guam Memorial Hospital, the Department of Public Health and Social Services, the Department of Mental Health and Substance Abuse and other health organizations in Guam and in the region;
- (2) To develop local medical personnel that are sensitive to Guam's cultural diversity.
- §§47105.1. Administration. The provisions of this Section shall be administered by the AMTE Council as established in §§47103.01 above, and all fellowships provided by this Section shall be granted by the Council.
- §§47105.2. Fund. There is hereby established a Physicians Fellowship Fund hereinafter referred to as the "AMTE Fellowship Fund" from which fellowships and financial assistance granted pursuant to this Chapter as well as the cost for administering the Programs shall be financed. The AMTE Fellowship Fund shall be kept separate and apart from any other fund and shall be administered by the Physicians Fellowship Council. The Council is authorized to accept for the fellowship funds, gifts, devises, bequests, donations, and all other kinds

of contributions for the purposes of the AMTE Fellowship Fund. The AMTE Fellowship Fund shall be funded by annual appropriations by the Guam Legislature to the extent made necessary by financial assistance and fellowships granted pursuant to this Chapter. The funds shall be administered by the AMTE Council and all monies appropriated for financial assistance and fellowships pursuant to this Chapter and all repayment of such financial assistance and fellowships, made under this Chapter, shall be paid directly to the AMTE Fellowship Fund and dispensed by the AMTE Council. Within one hundred twenty (120) days after the closing of its fiscal year, the AMTE Council shall transmit to the Governor, the Speaker of the Guam Legislature, and the President the University of Guam an annual report of the expenditures of the AMTE Fellowship Fund, including, but not limited to, a balance sheet, statement

§§47105.2.1. Investment. The reserves of the AMTE Fellowship Fund in excess of requirements for current operations may be invested and reinvested by or under authority of the AMTE Council. At its discretion, the AMTE Council may designate its Chairman or an investment committee consisting of two or more Council members to supervise this function. The AMTE Council shall have full power to manage the investments as in its considered judgment seem most appropriate to the requirements and objectives of the Fund. All proceeds and income from investments, of whatever nature, shall be credited to the account of the AMTE Fellowship Fund.

of receipts and expenses, and a general description of the income sources

of the AMTE Fellowship Fund and the expenses thereof.

§§47105.3. Regulations. The Council, subject to the provisions of the Administrative Adjudication Act, shall make regulations pursuant to

and not inconsistent with the provisions of this Chapter.

§§47105.4. Submission of Names. The names of all students granted fellowships under this Chapter shall be submitted to the Governor, Speaker of the Guam Legislature, and the President of the University of Guam no later than January 15th of each calendar year.

§§47105.5. Application Forms and Notices. The Council shall prescribe by regulation necessary application forms and procedures for all financial assistance fellowships pursuant to this Chapter.

§§47105.6. Prohibition. No money may be expended for award under this Chapter unless such awards are authorized by the Council by resolution. Any member or officer who disburses or certifies any expenditure from the Fellowship Fund without such authorization shall be personally liable for the restitution of such expenditure to the Fellowship Fund.

§§47105.7. Discharge of Fellowship Obligations Upon Death or Disability. The Council may, upon the death or disability of a student who has received any financial assistance under the provisions of this Chapter, discharge in full or in part all obligations for the repayment of said fellowship.

§§47105.8. Award of Physician Fellowship. Selection. The AMTE Council may select up to five applicants per academic year for fellowship awards. The names shall be submitted to the Governor, the Speaker of the Legislature, and President of the University of Guam no later than January 15th of each academic year. With the submission of the names to the Guam Legislature, the AMTE Council shall also request the necessary appropriation to fully fund the fellowships granted for the academic year.

2	(a) An applicant must be a bona fide resident of Guam for at

26	§§47105.9. Physician Fellowship Obligations:
27	(a) A fellow who attends medical school under the Physicians

Fellowship Program shall agree to return to work for the Government of Guam within three (3) months after the completion of the course of studies for which the fellowship was granted, provided, however, that if the fellow continues in a residency or internship program or an area of specialty, then the Council may defer the fellow's obligations herein until three months after said residency, internship, or specially training are completed.

- (b) A fellow will lose his or her entitlement to the fellowship if he or she fails to maintain his or her standing as a full time student in the approved medical school.
- (c) A fellow who does not successfully complete his or her medical education within four (4) academic years, shall pay back all monies expended on his or her behalf to the Physicians Medical Fund with interest at twelve percent (12%) per annum within five (5) years of his or her termination from the medical program.
- (d) Upon the successful completion of medical school and any area of specialty training as approved by the council, fellows are required to return to Guam within three (3) months of completion of said medical training and are required to provide one year of service to the Government of Guam for each year of fellowship. This obligation shall be in addition to any other obligations under the Pre-Medical Program.
- §§47105.10. Obligations of the Government of Guam. The Guam Memorial Hospital and other health organizations on the island continue to be impacted with the difficulty of hiring medical doctors to serve the health needs of our people. In order to meet the demands of health care for our island, the Legislature believes that it is most effective to identify potential physician candidates during their high school years so that the necessary support for the candidate's success in a pre-medical program and in the application to a school of medicine can be enhanced. Therefore, the Legislature herein establishes the following AMTE programs: a High School Pre-Pre Medical Program at the Department of Education, a Pre-Medical Program at the University of Guam and a

Thank you for giving the Department of Education this opportunity to testify on Bill No. 344 "AN ACT TO ADD A NEW CHAPTER 47 TO TITLE 17. GUAM CODE ANNOTATED, TO ESTABLISH A HIGH SCHOOL PRE-PRE MEDICAL PROGRAM AT THE DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION, A PRE-MEDICAL PROGRAM AT THE UNIVERSITY OF GUAM, AND A DOCTOR OF MEDICINE FELLOWSHIP AT THE UNIVERSITY OF GUAM."

The intent of the proposed legislation as discussed in Section 3 is to mandate the Department of Education to prepare an early preservice recruitment program which would attract, encourage, and nurture gifted students who are interested in pursuing career fields in medicine to accelerate their studies in pursuit of professional preparation leading to degrees in medicine and related fields in the healing arts.

We believe that our current work in developing the secondary school curriculum to provide for a wide range of offerings in science and mathematics through an improved College Preparatory and Honors Programs will provide the course work that are suitable in providing the basic curriculum structure that students who are inclined to pursue careers in the healing arts would find helpful. Appropriate courses in Biology, Anatomy, Chemistry, Algebra and Advanced Mathematics are all very appropriate high school courses for early pre-med students.

Additionally, a more functional career guidance program in the Middle and High School levels would help guide our students to the more relevant curricular and co-curricular opportunities that complement their courses in science and mathematics.



We do not believe that this legislation is necessary for the secondary school segment of the proposal because our improved secondary school curriculum will satisfy the intent of the Bill.

The Department of Education respectfully opposes passage of Bill No. 344.

Dear Senator Bordallo:

The University wishes to voice its support for Bill No. 344, as the shortage of physicians practicing on Guam is well known and of import to all of us.

The University is happy to report that it has had Pre-medical, Pre-optometry, Pre-dental and Pre-veterinary Advisement Programs since the early 1980s. A description of the program from the University's catalog is attached.

At present there are seven UOG students either in medical schools or in residencies in New York State, Hawaii, Pennsylvania, and Maryland.

The University is always striving to strengthen its existing programs and Bill No. 344 will give the University support to accomplish that strengthening.

We would recommend, however, that the AMTE Council should, as part of its implementation, study whether there is a need for a full-time AMTE Fellowship Administrator, since a major function of that office will be to develop and organize a program that the University has already developed and organized.

It is possible that the Council could directly monitor and support the University's program, using as liaison biology and science faculty who advise pre-med students.

Students requiring developmental work in the areas of mathematics or English are welcomed to the program but completion of the program will probably take longer than two years for these students.

Advising of those participating in the Engineering Science Program will be handled by the pre-engineering advisors in the Division of Natural Sciences and the Water and Energy Research Institute.

PREMEDICAL, PREOPTOMETRY, PREDENTAL AND PREVETERINARY PROGRAMS

The University of Guam offers all courses which are required to attend post-graduate medical, optometry and dental schools, and these courses are as rigorous as courses in other accredited institutions. However, the University of Guam does not offer a "pre-med major," etc., sequence of courses, because most medical, optometry and dental schools prefer to consider candidates who have completed a subject area major. Therefore, those who plan to continue their studies in medical, optometry or dental school should choose a subject area major, and, in addition, should schedule mathematics through calculus, one year of college or university physics, one year of general biology, and two years of chemistry (through organic chemistry). Courses such as quantitative analysis, biochemistry, cell physiology, genetics and comparative anatomy are often recommended if scheduling permits. Often, premed, preoptometry and predental students will choose to major in math or the sciences, but this is not necessary so long as the required courses are taken. Prospective premeds, preoptometry and predents should realize that national examinations (the Medical College Aptitude Test, MCAT; the Optometry College Admission Test, OCAT; and the Dental Aptitude Test, DAT) are to be taken in the junior year of college; required courses should be completed or in progress before these exams are scheduled in order to assure adequate scores. Information on MCAT, OCAT and DAT can be obtained from the Office of Counseling and Career Planning; Guam is an officially designated test site for these exams.

Those who are interested in veterinary medicine can complete basic science requirements at the University of Guam However, there are very few schools of veterinary medicine and they are extremely selective. They usually require, in addition to basic science, agriculture courses in animal husbandry, animal nutrition, etc., and all have specific state residency

requirements which being a rement of Guam does not fulfill. Pre-ventudents are encouraged to attend the University of Guam for two years, during which time basic science courses can be taken and appropriate catalogs studied.

Advisement for these pre-professional courses is handled through the biology major advisor in the Division of Natural Sciences, and all students who plan to go to medical, optometry, dental, and veterinary schools are encouraged to seek this advisement, regardless of their subject area. The University of Guam presently participates in a special "Underserved in Sight" program with the Pacific University College of Optometry, and a special program for Pacific island students is available. Inquiries from high school students and other Guam residents are welcomed.

Testimony on Bill 344: An Act To Add A New Chapter 47 to Title 17, Guam Code Annotated To Establish A High School Pre-Pre Medical Program At The Department Of Education, A Pre-Medical Program At The University Of Guam, And A Doctor Of Medicine Fellowship At The University Of Guam

Good Morning Mister Chairman and Members of the Committee:

My name is PeterJohn Camacho and I am the Administrator of the Guam Memorial Hospital Authority. I am presenting this testimony on Bill 344, relative to the establishment of the AMTE Act on behalf of the Authority.

AMTE is the Chamorro word meaning to heal or cure. It is very fitting and appropriate that this word also stands for the acronym, "access to medical training and education". For many years, our island has been subject to the "illness" or difficulties of attracting and retaining medical practitioners as well as other healthcare professionals. The establishment of this program will go a long way towards addressing the need for physicians for the people of our island home.

There are several recommendations that I would like to offer for the Committee's consideration. The first is the need to involve our island's physicians in a more active and dynamic way. We all know the positive effect a greatly admired role model has on motivating individuals. Involving our medical community as mentors for students who are interested can only strengthen the program. I believe that the Guam Medical Society should be approached to participate. The Council should develop a program to involve that valuable resource. The Authority would also be a good forum to "expose" interested individuals to the healthcare profession. A coordinated program will need to be established to ensure that the Authority continues to meet regulatory agency requirements for training and confidentiality and that the students will benefit from this experience.

The University of Guam has administered the professional technical scholarship program for many years. Many of the professionals, both in healthcare and non-healthcare, now on island have benefitted from this program. However, there have been problems in securing a commitment from those recipients to return to island. Aggressive recruitment and attractive compensation packages are a few incentives to stay on the mainland. The AMTE program should explore all possible avenues, including penalties to ensure that those individuals who receive those benefits return to Guam to provide service to our community.

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We also need to look at what other things can be done to ensure that we can retain these professionals once they return. The Chairperson of the Committee is presently working on an amendment to the existing Peer Review law. This will certainly give a clear sign to the medical community of our commitment to ensuring that we all participate in activities to ensure that the quality of healthcare services on the island are continually improved.

The issue of malpractice insurance availability also needs to be addressed. One of the reasons that physicians are reluctant to come to Guam is because of the lack of malpractice insurance. They are concerned about the impact that a lawsuit can have on their and their family's livelihood and their financial security.

These are a few things for your consideration. However, I would like to extend a heartfelt thanks to Senator Shimizu for his commitment to providing a means to meeting our island's future medical needs. On behalf of the Authority, I respectfully request the Committee's endorsement of this bill and passage by the Legislature. Thank you.
