AN ACT TO ADD §80115 TO TITLE 5, GUAM CODE ANNOTATED, TO REQUIRE THAT ALL GOVERNMENT BUILDINGS BE CONSTRUCTED TO INCLUDE HISTORICAL CHAMORRO ART OR REPRESENTATIONS OF GUAM HISTORY.

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE TERRITORY OF GUAM:

2 Section 1. Legislative intent. The Legislature is aware of the

1 increasing number of government buildings and structures being constructed

2 or renovated which contain little or no historical Chamorro structural

3 elements. In order to preserve and enhance the Chamorro culture, the

4 Legislature finds a need to insure that government buildings contain elements

5 of Chamorro artistry or of Guam history, and finds that making such

elements part of government buildings would enhance the unique beauty of

Guam, as well as improve the appearance and image of the island as a tourist

destination.

Section 2. §80115 is hereby added to Title 5, Guam Code Annotated, to read:

"§80115. Inclusion of Chamorro artistry or Guam history elements in government buildings. (a) All government of Guam buildings and structures constructed or renovated after the enactment of this section shall contain elements of either Guam history or of Chamorro artistry costing up to a maximum of three percent (3%) of the aggregate of the architectural and engineering, the construction or the renovation budgets therefor. Such elements may be made part of the internal or external physical structure of the building or structure and may be within the main part of the building or structure or separated from the main part. In complying with the provisions of this section, a contractor for the government agency constructing the building or structure may consult with the Guam Council on the Arts and Humanities as to the various types of Chamorro or historic Guam artistic elements. The Department of Public Works (the "Department") shall monitor noncompliance with this Section during its plans approval process, unless such plans are exempted in accordance with subsection (b) of this Section. If the

Department determines that a non-exempted project does not comply with this Section, it shall refuse to issue either a building permit or an occupancy permit (as the case requires) for such project until compliance.

(b) Exceptions to applicability. Buildings and structures constructed for use as shelters for utility facilities or utility operations are not subject to subsection (a) of this Section. Exceptions to the requirements of this Section may be granted by the Governor of Guam, based on reasonable justification. Any government of Guam construction projects which have commenced prior to the implementation of this Section may be exempted from its provisions as determined by the Department."

TESTIMONY ON BILL 95

"AN ACT RELATIVE TO MANDATING THAT ANY AND ALL GOVERNMENT BUILDINGS AND STRUCTURES CONSTRUCTED HEREON SHALL HAVE A RESEMBLANCE OF HISTORICAL CHAMORRO ART OR GUAM HISTORY."

Madame Chairman, Senator Elizabeth P. Arriola and members on the Committee on Youth, Senior Citizens and Cultural Affairs. My name is Alberto A. Lamorena V, Executive Director of the Guam Council on the Arts and Humanities Agency. I am appearing before you today to testify in favor of the intent of Bill 95 "An Act relative to mandating that any and all government buildings and structures constructed hereon shall have resemblance of historical Chamorro Art or Guam History."

We commend Senator Bordallo's initiative in trying to preserve the culture and arts on Guam. The Guam Council on the Arts and Humanities Agency endorses the intent of the bill but does not recommend passage of the bill as presented. The bill mandates but does not require government agencies to abide by the law.

Because the bill lacks teeth it is impossible and fruitless for GCAHA to implement the law. If the intent of the bill is to be carried out a penalty must be included in the bill, such as an occupancy permit will not be issued unless the agency has complied with the law. A section should also be included that states that prior to a building permit being issued plans must be approved by GCAHA to insure that the design is in compliance with the law.

We also feel that in section 2, the Office of Historic Preservation under the Department of Parks and Recreation be added as another agency to consult with since they are responsible for the restoration of historic sites and are well versed with the various architectural styles on Guam.

I hope the Committee reviews the recommendations given so that we can have a viable program that will benefit our Chamorro culture. Please feel free to solicit my advise concerning the amending of Bill 95.

Again, thank you for providing me this opportunity to voice my concerns.
