AN ACT TO CREATE THE BUSINESS LICENSE APPLICATION TASK FORCE TO FORMULATE A PLAN FOR A ONE-STOP BUSINESS LICENSE CENTER.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE TERRITORY OF GUAM:

- 2 Section 1. Legislative findings. The Legislature recognizes that since
- 3 the inception of the process whereby prospective businesses are required to

obtain a business license to do business on Guam, they have been unnecessarily inconvenienced because a business license cannot be obtained at a single governmental office. The applicants have had to obtain approvals at many places, which are miles apart, and the procedures at times take several weeks to complete. Unless the process is made more efficient, there will continue to be unnecessary delays and an increased frustration with the system. In furtherance of reducing the time, travel, and delay caused by having to visit several agencies in order to complete the application procedure, the Legislature finds that a task force should be created to study the feasibility of implementing a One-Stop Business Application Center at the Department of Revenue and Taxation and to compile the steps necessary for such implementation.

Section 2. Business License Application Task Force. There is hereby created within the government of Guam a Business License Application Task Force (the "Task Force"), consisting of one (1) representative from each of the agencies or departments from which a license applicant could need approval or clearance in order to obtain a business license. The representative for each such agency shall be designated by the director, general manager, or chief executive officer of the agency or department. The representative from the Department of Revenue and Taxation shall be the Chairperson of the Task Force and shall preside over its meetings and direct its activities.

Section 3. Responsibilities and authority of Task Force. The responsibilities and authority of the Task Force shall be to:

(a) Prepare Plan. Cause to be prepared, through the expertise and analysis of the Task Force's members, a comprehensive plan which shall put into effect the goal of providing the public a "One-Stop"

Business License Application Center". In order to prepare this plan, the Task Force shall:

- (i) Obtain from each agency involved in giving approvals or clearances for the issuance of business licenses a copy of the law, rule, regulation, Executive Order, or other authority, if any, requiring such approval or clearance;
- (ii) Undertake analysis of the procedures carried out by each agency separately, and by the agencies as a whole, in the obtaining of approval or clearance for the issuance of a business license, with the aim of simplifying the procedure and making the approval or clearance issued by agencies relevant and necessary for the particular license being issued, as well as speeding up the process for obtaining either approval or rejection of applications for business licenses; and
- (iii) Hold one (1) or more public hearings on the subject of obtaining business licenses to gather input from the community for improving the process.
- (b) Recommendations. Develop and make detailed recommendations to the Governor and to the Legislature, including minority dissenting opinions, if any, regarding any changes, deletions, or additions to the current application process which would further improve and streamline the process;
- (c) Report. Deliver to the Governor and Legislature within sixty (60) days of the enactment of this Act, a written report detailing the plan and recommendations provided for in this Section. The report shall include the steps necessary to facilitate the expedited application process, which shall be implemented within sixty (60) days of approval

by the Legislature by statute of the recommendations in the Task Force's report.

Section 4. Cooperation of government agencies. All agencies, departments, boards, commissions and other instrumentalities of the government of Guam which are involved in the process of providing approvals or clearances for business licenses shall render such assistance to the Task Force as the Task Force may require.

COMMITTEE ON WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE REPORT ON

BILL NO. 361

AN ACT TO CREATE THE BUSINESS LICENSE APPLICATION TASK FORCE TO FORMULATE A PLAN FOR A ONE STOP BUSINESS LICENSE CENTER.

PURPOSE AND ESSENTIAL ELEMENTS

Bill No. 361 contains five sections. Section 1 contains findings and intent, and states that businesses are unnecessarily inconvenienced in the process of obtaining a business license because a license cannot be obtained from a single office.

Section 2 of the bill creates a Business License Application Task Force represented by one individual from each of the agencies involved in approval or clearance of applicants for business licenses. The individual is to be a designee of the Director or General Manager of the agency.

Section 3 of the bill indicates that the Department of Revenue and Taxation shall be the lead agency and shall preside over the Task Force.

Section 4 sets out the authority and responsibility of the Task Force, which consists of preparing a plan, making recommendations to the Governor and the Legislature, and preparing a report to the Governor and the Legislature within Sixty (60) days.

Section 5 of the bill specifies that all involved agencies shall cooperate with the Task Force.

PUBLIC HEARING

The Committee on Ways and Means conducted a public hearing on September 29, 1993 at 9:00 a.m. in the Legislative Public Hearing Room to gather testimony on Bill No.361. Present at the hearing were the Chairman, Senator Carl T. C. Gutierrez, who conducted the hearing, being joined by Senators T. C. Ada, E.P. Arriola, J. G. Bamba, A.C. Blaz, B. C. Pangelinan, and T. S. Nelson.

TESTIMONY

Four persons or agencies testified in regard to Bill No. 361:

1. Mr. Antonio C. Aguon, representing the Department of Revenue and Taxation, submitted written testimony of Director Joaquin G. Blaz regarding the bill, which is attached. Mr. Aguon then spoke orally, indicating that the Department of Revenue and Taxation is in favor of the bill, and recommended some suggestions. Some of the suggestions include stationing a representative from each of the clearing agencies at the Department of Revenue and Taxation, or have an

individual always on call. Additionally, telecom links could be installed. The Director's testimony also indicated that some agencies are still operating with manual systems, which could be computerized.

Chairman Gutierrez asked if the idea of a one-stop business license center would require a good deal of computer technology to implement. Mr. Aguon replied that that could be the case. Mr. Aguon indicated that the Department of Revenue and Taxation would prefer stationing an individual from each clearing agency at the location of the Department of Revenue and Taxation. Mr. Aguon also indicated that the Department of Revenue and Taxation could get the clearances for the applicant by using fax. He indicated that separate endorsements may be needed, precluding fax endorsements.

Chairman Gutierrez indicated that the Department of Revenue and Taxation should be the lead agency in this matter because of confidentiality, and Mr. Aguon agreed. Mr. Aguon also indicated that Revenue and Taxation is the department that issues the license.

2. Attorney Charles Troutman of the Office of the Compilor of Laws, Department of Law, then testified orally. He did not submit any written testimony. Mr. Troutman indicated that the Legislature should go far beyond the provisions of Bill 361. He felt that the applicants would still have to go around and check on the individual agencies to follow up on the processing of the clearances. Mr. Troutman envisions that there would be a lot of passing the buck as to where the particular application is at a particular time.

Mr. Troutman indicated that an analysis needs to be done of the layers of bureaucracy and an analysis of the various laws to determine exactly what is required. Mr. Troutman indicated that there is a "common law" aspect to some of the procedures of the government, and that in some cases practices are engaged in which are not provided for in the law or any rule or regulation. He gave an example of one type of practice which was taken over from the old Naval Government days, and which has since been declared unconstitutional, yet is still practiced. This is the case of employee clearances upon separation from government employment. The law needs to be modified to provide for pre-judgement attachment hearings.

Chairman Gutierrez asked Mr. Troutman if there was a need for any law to implement a one-stop business license center, and Mr. Troutman replied that no law was necessary. Chairman Gutierrez indicated that perhaps this could be done right now by the Governor's Executive Order, and Mr. Troutman replied that that would be correct, and does not need a law.

Mr. Troutman indicated that no matter how many one-stop places there are, there would still be a lot of red tape involved.

Senator Pangelinan indicated that he knew that there is no doubt that no law is needed, however, that the senators as policy directors are sending out a message by the passage of this bill. The bill is to make a change since the Executive Branch is not

responding to complaints from the public. The bill is to given some relief to the public. The bill is to get something done.

Mr. Troutman said that he is not taking exception with the Senator's need to pass such a bill, however, technically and theoretically it is not necessary. This bill will not achieve the goals that the sponsor of the bill wants for it.

Senator Pangelinan disagreed with Mr. Troutman on the effects of the bill. Senator Pangelinan said that the one-stop concept has been done in the past.

Senator Bamba asked if the requirements for clearance were by regulation. Mr. Aguon from the Department of Revenue and Taxation indicated that he was not aware of it. He indicated that he knew of some of the requirements, but that more than ten (10) agencies give clearances.

Senator Bamba indicated that he felt that some of the requirements for clearance are not necessary, for example, certain types of licenses should not require going to every agency, especially if certain agencies do not have purview over the type of activity that a license is being requested for.

Mr. Aguon indicated that a study would need to be done on the requirements of the various agencies and the reasons for them, and a lot of the information would come out at public hearings, which would be conducted by the Department of Revenue and Taxation, should such a bill as this become law.

With no further testimony or questions from members of the Committee on Ways and Means, the Chairman concluded the hearing.

- 3. Director F. L. G. Castro, Department of Land Management, submitted written testimony on Bill 361, which is attached. He did not appear at the public hearing. The written testimony is in favor of the bill, however, offers the suggestion that Bill No. 361 be combined with Bill No. 444, to create a one-stop license/permit application clearance center.
- 4. Acting General Manager Alejandro R. Hong-Yee, Guam Telephone Authority, submitted written testimony that the Guam Telephone Authority does not participate as a clearing agency in the business license process, and does not offer any testimony on the bill.

COMMITTEE ACTION

The Committee on Ways and Means, after consideration of the testimony offered at the public hearing, decided to make the responsibilities of the Business License Application Task Force more specific. To this end, the language in Items (i), (ii) and (iii) of Subsection (a) of Section 4 of the bill were inserted, to require that each agency involved in the business application process provide the authority by which they are issuing approvals or clearances, that an analysis be undertaken by the Task Force to simplify the procedure and make the procedure relevant to the type of license

being sought, and for the Task Force to hold at least one (1) public hearing on the business license application procedure to gather input from the public on possibilities of improving the procedure.

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION

The Committee on Ways and Means wishes to report out Bill 361 to the full legislature to do pass, as substituted.

Dear Senator Gutierrez:

Thank you for this opportunity to testify on Bill 361 an act to create a business license application task force. Let me begin by saying that I heed the complaints from license applicants as they come across my desk. If there is anything I can do to assist the applicant in the business license process, I insist that such assistance be rendered by my personnel. However, the clearance process isn't entirely under my control. I believe that the entire licensing process would be made much easier for the public to deal with if the entire process were under the control of one agency. I believe that agency must be Revenue and Taxation.

The Department of Revenue and Taxation serves several roles in our community, not the least of which are tax enforcer and licensor. In its unique role of tax enforcer, the department may actually delay the processing of licenses as mandated by Public Law 19-10. This is a justifiable delay and in the public interest. Unreasonable delays must be eliminated and will be eliminated should total control be assumed by Revenue and Taxation.

As the lead agency in the licensing process, the Department of Revenue and Taxation has it fingers on the pulse beat of Guam's licensees. There are other boards that grant licenses in our community, but the majority of licenses are processed and issued by Revenue and Taxation.

While no one licensee need acquire clearances from every Government of Guam agency, we have identified ten Gov-Guam agencies and one federal agency at which clearances may need to be acquired within Revenue and Taxation's licensing procedure. This has proven to be a major obstacle to overcome for some applicants.

I believe that a one stop license processing system can and should be developed with the cooperation of all the agencies involved. In fact, agency representatives were at one time stationed at Revenue and Taxation to provide on the spot clearances. This proved to be a highly successful program worth reviving. While Revenue and Taxation may serve as the clearing house for business license applicants, today, expeditious clearances by individual agencies remain outside the purview and control of Revenue and Taxation.

Certainly in this age of instantaneous facsimile transmissions and telecommunications, no one need spend hours or even days travelling from one agency to another securing clearances. Revenue and Taxation should do the walking.

Will any designated government agency be as aggressive in its pursuit of clearances as the applicant himself when it is in his own best interest to pursue it himself? I believe not. We can put the public interest ahead of our own by hastening the processing as best we can.

However, the perception will likely be that the government does not move fast enough. Some will see the product of this proposed task force as just another layer of bureaucracy. However, we should not use this as an excuse not to improve our services.

Should this bill become law, I shall call upon all the agencies involved in the clearance process to either station a responsible employee at Revenue and Taxation on a permanent basis or have that responsible person always on call for expeditious clearance. This responsible person must be granted the authority to make decisions quickly but responsibly and act on those decisions as quickly as if his own house were on fire. I shall insist that telecom links be established among the various information systems in place at our Its a disgrace that in our world of Gov-Guam agencies. computerized data bases, some departments must still extract information manually. On-line information systems can make the licensing process nearly instantaneous. Then and only then shall those obstacles I spoke of be removed. I assure you that the employees at Revenue and Taxation presently do all they can and shall continue to assist the license applicants within the best of their abilities under any rules our government lays down.

I am in support of Bill 361.

AN ACT TO CREATE THE BUSINESS LICENSE APPLICATION TASK FORCE TO FORMULATE A PLAN FOR A ONE STOP BUSINESS LICENSE CENTER.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE TERRITORY OF GUAM:

1 Section 1. (a) Legislative Findings and Intent. The 2 Legislature recognizes that since the inception of the process 3 whereby prospective businesses were required to obtain a business 4 license in order to do business on Guam, they have been unnecessarily inconvenienced because a business license cannot be 5 6 obtained at a single governmental office. The applicants have had to obtain approvals at multiple places, which are miles apart, and 7 8 the process took at times several weeks to complete. Unless the 9 process is made more efficient, there will continue to be 10 unnecessary delays and an increased frustration with the system. In 11 furtherance of reducing the time, travel and delay caused by having 12 to visit several agencies in order to complete the application procedure, a Task Force shall be created to study the feasibility of 13 14 and present the steps necessary to implement a One Stop Business 15 Application Center at the department of Revenue and Taxation. 16 Section 2. There is hereby created within the Government of 17 Guam the Business License Application Task Force consisting of one representative from each of the Agencies or Departments from 18 19 which an applicant could possibly need clearance or approval in

- 1 order to obtain a business license. The representative for each
- 2 agency shall be designated by the Director or General Manager of
- 3 said agency or department.
- 4 Section 3. The representative from the Department of
- 5 Revenue and Taxation shall be the Chairperson and as such shall
