Dear Speaker Parkinson:

Enclosed please find Bill No. 31 (LS), "AN ACT TO PUT A PROPOSAL BEFORE THE PEOPLE OF GUAM AS AN INITIATIVE MEASURE TO LIMIT THE MEMBERSHIP OF THE GUAM LEGISLATURE TO FIFTEEN MEMBERS," which I have **signed** into law this date as Public Law No. 23-01.

I have signed this bill into law in order to give the people of Guam the opportunity to vote on this important issue, which is to determine the size of the Legislature. I believe that the gathering of over 7,000 signatures on a petition recently has indicated a great deal of interest by the people in making this choice.

There are two areas in the bill that need to be addressed in future legislation. The language in Section 2 of the bill states that the measure is to be voted upon at the next General Election if an appropriation for a special election is not made sooner. However, the language contained within the measure to be voted upon, in Section 5 of the bill, states that the reduction in the number of senators would take place with the Twenty-Fourth Guam Legislature. The timing of the election during which the measure may be voted upon may make the provisions of the measure impossible to effect in the Twenty-Fourth Guam Legislature.

The second area that needs to be addressed is Section 6 of the bill. This section prohibits corporations from donating any money whatsoever to campaign for or against the passage of the measure to be voted upon.

Corporations, however, as well as individuals, have First Amendment rights under the United States Constitution. Also, First Amendment rights include freedom of association as well as freedom of speech. Although one can limit campaign contributions, one cannot prohibit entirely the participation in free speech and association which is inherent in making some campaign contributions for or against a candidate or an issue. See Buckley v. Valeo, 424 U. S. 1; 96 S. Ct. 612 and Collingswood v. Ringgold, 66 N.J. 350, 331 A2nd 262, appeal dismissed 426 U.S. 901, 96 S. Ct. 2220 for background. I believe that Section 6 of the bill needs to be repealed or modified to allow for some corporate contributions.

AN ACT TO PUT A PROPOSAL BEFORE THE PEOPLE OF GUAM AS AN INITIATIVE MEASURE TO LIMIT THE MEMBERSHIP OF THE GUAM LEGISLATURE TO FIFTEEN MEMBERS.

### BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE TERRITORY OF GUAM:

**Section 1.** Legislative Intent. The Legislature intends that the electorate be given the opportunity to vote on the issue set forth herein.

**Section 2.** The initiative measure set forth in this Act shall be put before the voters at a special election if funds are appropriated authorizing the placement of the measure on the special election ballot and the special election is called prior to the General Election, or at the next General

1 Election, whichever comes first. If there is a special election called to place 2 the measure on the ballot, it shall be held not less than 120 days nor more than 3 150 days after the effective date of the appropriation for the special election. 4 The ballots at such election may be hand counted at such locations as the 5 Election Commission may specify. 6 **Section 3.** For purposes of the election provided for by this Act, 7 approval by a majority of the valid votes cast on the measure shall be 8 necessary for the enactment into law of the initiative measure. Valid votes 9 cast on a measure shall include all votes cast in favor or against the proposal 10 but shall not include blank, spoiled, or invalid ballots cast. 11 **Section 4.** The initiative measure placed on the ballot pursuant to this 12 Act shall be treated by the Election Commission as having been duly presented 13 by petition with the signatures required by 3 GCA §§ 17201 and 17207. Article 14 2 of chapter 17 of Title 3, GCA, relative to Initiatives, shall apply to the 15 initiative measure specified to the extent not inconsistent with this Act. 16 Section 5. Initiative measure to change number of Senators from 17 twenty-one (21) to fifteen (15). Annotated is hereby amended to read:

"§ 6101. Guam Legislature Description. The Guam

Legislature shall be a unicameral body consisting of fifteen

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(15) members who are elected at large and as provided by law, commencing with the election of the Twenty-Fourth Guam Legislature. "

Section 6. Corporate contributions prohibited. No corporation may directly or indirectly contribute labor, money or anything of value to influence or advocate the passage or defeat or placement on the ballot of the initiative measure set forth in this Act; nor may any corporation contribute, directly or indirectly, labor, money or anything of value to anyone else to be used for such purposes. Willful violation of this section shall be a misdemeanor. In addition to other penalties and punishments allowed by law, in the event of conviction for a violation of this section, the court shall impose an additional fine of three times the value of the illegal expenditures and contributions, and, in the case of a corporation, shall order the corporation charter authorizing the corporation to conduct business within the territory cancelled and forfeited.

### COMMITTEE REPORT ON BILL NO. 31

Bill No. 31 - AN ACT TO PUT FIVE LEGISLATIVE REFORM PROPOSALS BEFORE THE PEOPLE OF GUAM AS INITIATIVE MEASURES AT A SPECIAL ELECTION.

### **PREFACE:**

The Committee on Rules convened at 10:10 a.m. Thursday, March 9, 1995 in the Legislative Public Hearing Room in Agana, Guam.

Alongside Chairman Sonny Lujan Orsini was Senators Anthony C. Blaz.

### **OVERVIEW:**

In 1994, then Mr. Mark Forbes registered five Legislative Reform Initiatives with the Guam Election Commission.

The five initiatives are as follows:

- 1. Beginning with the Twenty-Fourth Guam Legislature, the number of senators of the Guam legislature shall be reduced to fifteen (15) members.
- 2. Placement of a ceiling cap on the expenditures of the Guam Legislature at 2.5% of the total GovGuam revenue projections for the same fiscal year.
- 3. Reduces senatorial salaries to forty thousand Dollars (\$40,000) per annum.
- 4. To place a limit of four successive terms for senators.
- 5. Allows for the passage of initiatives by a majority of those votes cast on the initiative

The passage of Bill 31 would mandate that initiatives which garner the required signatures to be placed in a ballot and for the people to vote in an election during the next General Election or ninety (90) days, whichever comes first.

Notwithstanding the 90 days provision incorporated in Bill 31, the Special Election for the initiatives included in Bill 31 shall be held within 150 days, on a Saturday and no earlier than 120 days from the enactment of this bill.

Only votes cast on individual initiatives shall be considered for the determination of passage or nonpassage of the individual initiatives.

### **COMMITTEE FINDINGS:**

Senator Forbes testified before the Committee in support of Bill No. 31. As the author and the individual who spearheaded the initiative movement, Senator Forbes informed the Committee of the level of interest expressed by the community in the initiatives.

Senator Forbes expressed to the committee the importance of returning the power to the people. As elected officials, Senator Forbes expressed the importance of allowing the people to express their wishes of the manner in which government should run. "There is no other right of the people more important than the right to fashion their own Government."

In light of the cost of \$100,000 to \$200,000.00 on a Special Election with the fiscal position of the government, the senator expressed that to empower the people at that cost is really a bargain.

Senator Orsini questioned Senator Forbes on how he arrived at the maximum number of consecutive years a senator may serve. In response, the number was arrived to place a limit on the number of years equal to that of the Governor and the Lieutenant Governor.

Senator orsini further inquired on the number of senators to serve in the legislature. Senator Forbes responded that in a previous conversation with an employee at the Guam Election Commission, he learned that on the average, people usually vote for fifteen candidates on a ballot. People may vote for 21 candidates, but on the average, fifteen votes per ballot is cast.

Senator Anthony Blaz expressed his support of Bill No. 31. The bill simply empowers the people to decide on important policies governing their elected officials. Majority of the candidates in the last election campaigned on Legislative Reform. The senator pointed that the bill would also place a deadline for having an election to place these initiatives to the electorate

At the conclusion of remarks, Senator Orsini expressed his support of Bill No. 31 to those present at the hearing.

### **COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION:**

In light of the strong voice of the people indicated through the interest and number of signatures received during the duration of the circulation of those same initiatives, the Committee on Rules recommends immediate passage of Bill No. 31.
