AN ACT TO REPEAL AND REENACT 16 GCA §3401(d); TO REPEAL 16 GCA §§3401(e), 3401(f), 3401(g), AND 7120(d); TO ADD NEW 16 GCA §§3401.1 AND 7120.1; TO AMEND 5 GCA §50111; AND TO REPEAL 17 GCA §41110; ALL RELATIVE TO PARKING FOR PERSONS WITH DISABILITIES.

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE TERRITORY OF GUAM:

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**Section 1. Purpose**. The purposes of this act are to establish a uniform system for accessible parking for persons with disabilities to enhance access and the safety of persons who have disabilities which limit or impair the ability to walk, and to conform with the requirements of the Americans with Disabilities Act Accessibility Guidelines as they apply to accessible parking.

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**Section 2.** 16 GCA §3401(d) is hereby repealed and reenacted to read:

"(d) No person shall park any vehicle in a designated accessible
 parking space for persons with disabilities which is on public
 property or private property available for public use unless the
 vehicle displays a special license plate, a removable windshield
 placard or a temporary removable windshield placard issued
 pursuant to 16 GCA §7120.1."

Section 3. 16 GCA §3401(e), §3401(f), and §3401(g) are hereby
 repealed.

Section 4. A new §3401.1 of Title 16, Guam Code Annotated, is
hereby enacted to read:

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"§3401.1. Accessible Parking For Persons With Disabilities.

(a) Any person who commits, or attempts to commit a deception or
 fraud by one or more of the following methods is guilty of a misdemeanor:

(1) intentionally making a false statement of material
fact to obtain or assist an individual in obtaining a special
license plate, removable windshield placard, or temporary
removable windshield placard, issued pursuant to 16 GCA
§7120.1, including any statement made on the physician's or

optometrist's certification submitted for purposes of obtaining
 the license plate or placard;

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(2) altering, modifying, or selling a removable special license plate, removable windshield placard, or temporary removable windshield placard issued pursuant to 16 GCA §7120.1; or

7 (3) copying or forging a special license plate, removable
8 windshield placard, or temporary removable windshield
9 placard issued pursuant to 16 GCA §7120.1, or using any such
10 copied or forged license plate or placard;

(b) Any person who parks in a designated accessible parking space,
or who blocks access to aisles adjacent to an accessible parking space, on
public property or private property available for public use, with a vehicle
that does not have a special license plate, a removable windshield placard,
or a temporary removable windshield placard is guilty of a violation.

(c) Any person who parks in a designated accessible parking space, 16 17 or who blocks access to aisles adjacent to an accessible parking space on public property or private property available for public use, using a vehicle 18 with a special license plate, removable windshield placard, or temporary 19 removable windshield placard obtained pursuant to 16 GCA §7120.1, and 20 who is not a qualified person with a disability as defined in 16 GCA 21 §7120.1(a)(2), is guilty of a violation, unless such person is using the vehicle 22 or placard in connection with the transportation of a qualified person with 23 a disability. 24

(d) Any qualified person with a disability who has applied for and
received a special license plate, a removable windshield placard, or a
temporary removable windshield placard, and who permits another

individual not a qualified person with a disability to use the vehicle with
the special license plate or placard in violation of this Act is guilty of a
violation.

(e) **Penalty.** A violation of subsections (b), (c), or (d) of this section 4 shall be punished by a fine of not less than Three Hundred Dollars 5 (\$300.00) and not more than Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00). All fines 6 imposed by the court shall be deposited into the Accessible Parking Fund 7 maintained by the Governor's Commission on Persons with Disabilities 8 pursuant to 5 GCA §50111(c). Additionally, a vehicle which is illegally 9 parked pursuant to this subsection may be towed, and the owner of the 10 vehicle shall be liable for reasonable towing expenses, which charges shall 11 constitute a lien against the offending vehicle. 12

(f) Citations. The Guam Police Department, all law enforcement
 personnel, and other persons or organizations who are authorized under
 this Act to issue citations may cite vehicles parked in violation of this Act.

(g) Forfeiture. Upon conviction of an offense committed in violation 16 of subsection (a) of this section or found guilty of a violation under 17 subsections (b), (c), or (d) of this section, the Court may confiscate the 18 special license plate, removable windshield placard, or temporary 19 removable windshield placard and return it to the Motor Vehicle Division 20 of the Department of Revenue & Taxation along with a certified copy of 21 the judgment, and upon receipt thereof the Motor Vehicle Division shall 22 cancel and destroy the license plate or placard. The person to whom the 23 license plate or placard was originally issued shall not receive another 24 special license plate or placard until he or she resubmits a completed 25 application and presents a current certification of a physician attesting to 26 his or her qualifying condition. 27

(h) Private Persons Authorized to Issue Citations. Private Security 1 Personnel, and persons who are designated by the Governor's 2 Commission on Persons with Disabilities and employed by Non-Profit 3 Organizations (NPOs) representing or serving people with disabilities, are 4 hereby authorized to issue citations to enforce the provisions of this Act 5 provided they obtain proper training in law enforcement as evidenced by a 6 certificate of completion from an accredited law enforcement academy or 7 institute. Citation forms may be distributed by the Guam Police 8 Department for use in the enforcement of this Act. 9

(i) Accessible Parking spaces serving a particular building shall be
located on the shortest accessible route of travel from adjacent parking to
an accessible entrance and comply with the Americans with Disabilities Act
Accessibility Guidelines for Building and Facilities (ADAAG) technical
specification §4.6.2.

(j) As to parking lots constructed or repayed after the effective date 15 of this Act, accessible parking spaces shall be at least 96 inches wide and 16 228 inches long with a minimum 60 inches-wide adjacent access aisle. 17 Access aisles shall be identified and painted with diagonal stripes and a 18 part of an accessible route to the building or facility entrance. Vehicle 19 20 standing spaces and adjacent access aisles shall be level with surface slopes not exceeding 1:50 (2%) in all directions. Access aisles and parking 21 spaces shall comply with ADAAG technical specifications §4.3 and §4.6.3. 22

(k) Accessible parking spaces shall be designated as reserved by a sign
showing (i) the International Symbol of Accessibility commonly known as
the wheelchair symbol and specified in §4.30.7 of the ADAAG; (ii) below the
symbol, a statement that violators will be fined not less than \$300 and not
more than \$500, and the vehicle may be towed; (iii) a reference to 16 GCA

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§3401.1; and (iv) a statement that access aisles must not be blocked. Spaces 1 complying with ADAAG technical specification §4.1.2(5)(b) shall also have 2 an additional sign "Van Accessible" mounted below the symbol of 3 accessibility. All signs referred to in this subsection (k) should be a 4 maximum of 12 inches wide with edges having rounded corners. All signs 5 shall be mounted on a post centered at the head of the parking space with 6 the center of the International Symbol of Accessibility seven (7) feet above 7 8 the parking surface.

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Section 5. 5 GCA §50111 is hereby amended to read as follows:

"§50111. Provisions for Persons with Disabilities. (a) All 10 buildings parking lots, walks and recreational facilities hereafter 11 constructed by or for the government of Guam intended for the 12 use of the general public shall be designed and constructed in such 13 manner as to permit persons with disabilities who use 14 wheelchairs or are otherwise of limited mobility ready access to 15 16 such buildings, parking lots, walks, recreational facilities and to all parts thereof open to the general public. All public buildings, 17 parking lots, walks, and recreational facilities now in use by the 18 19 general public shall be modified, insofar as is possible and practicable to permit ready access by persons with disabilities, and 20 in leasing buildings for public use, priority shall be given to those 21 structures where access to public areas by persons with disabilities 22 is provided. All modifications and construction shall follow 23 existing federal guidelines regarding access by persons with 24 disabilities. 25

(b) The Director of DPW shall designate, by use of the International
Symbol of Accessibility, parking areas which are to be used by

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persons with disabilities. Such spaces shall also carry a designation 1 that illegal parking carries a fine of not less than Three Hundred 2 Dollars (\$300) and not more than Five Hundred Dollars (\$500), and 3 that an illegally parked vehicle may be towed. In designating 4 parking areas for persons with disabilities, the Director of DPW and 5 the Department shall coordinate its activities with the various 6 departments, agencies, boards, and authorities of the government to 7 insure the reasonable allocation of accessible parking areas for 8 persons with disabilities. 9

10 (c) A fund to be known as the Accessible Parking Fund is hereby 11 created, separate and apart from any other fund of the government of 12 Guam. The Governor's Commission on Persons with Disabilities shall 13 maintain the fund, and shall utilize the fund for the purpose of ensuring an 14 aggressive media campaign to educate the public about the human aspects 15 of parking in an accessible parking space and its impact on persons with 16 disabilities."

17 **Section 6.** 16 GCA §7120(d) is hereby repealed.

18 **Section 7.** A new 16 GCA §7120.1 is hereby added to read:

"§7120.1. Special License Plates and Removable WindshieldPlacards.

21 (a) Definitions.

. . .

22 Terms used in this section are defined as follows:

(1) "International Symbol of Accessibility" means the
symbol adopted by Rehabilitation International in 1969 at its
Eleventh World Congress on Rehabilitation of the Disabled.

26 (2) "Qualified person with a disability" means a person
27 who, as determined by a licensed physician:

(i) cannot walk two hundred feet (200') without 1 stopping to rest, due to a diagnosed arthritic, 2 neurological or orthopedic condition; 3 (ii) cannot walk without the use of, or assistance 4 from, a brace, cane, crutch, another person, prosthetic 5 device, wheelchair, or other assistive device; 6 (iii) is restricted by lung disease to such an extent 7 that the person's forced (respiratory) explatory volume 8 for one second, when measured by spirometry, is less 9 than one liter, or the arterial oxygen tension is less than 10 sixty mm/hg on room air at rest; 11 (iv) uses portable oxygen; 12 (v) has a cardiac condition to the extent that the 13 person's functional limitations are classified in severity 14 as Class III or Class IV according to standards set by the 15 American Heart Association: or 16 (vi) has a central visual acuity that does not exceed 17 20/200 in the better eye, with corrective lenses, as 18 measured by the Snellen test, or visual acuity greater 19 than 20/200, but with a limitation in the field of vision 20 such that the widest diameter of the visual field subtends 21 an angle not greater than 20 degrees. An optometrist, in 22 lieu of a licensed physician, may determine the existence 23 of a visual impairment as defined under this subsection. 24 "Special license plate" means a license plate that (3)25 displays the International Symbol of Accessibility: 26

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1	(i) In a color that contrasts to the background;
2	and
3	(ii) In the same size as the letters and numbers on
4	the plate.
5	(4) "Removable windshield placard" means a two-
6	sided, hanger style placard which includes on each side:
7	(i) The International Symbol of Accessibility, which
8	is at least three inches $(3'')$ in height, centered on the
9	placard, and is white on a blue shield;
10	(ii) An identification number;
11	(iii) A date of expiration; and
12	(iv) The seal or other identification of the issuing
13	authority.
14	(5) "Temporary removable windshield placard" means
15	a two-sided, hanger style placard which includes on each side:
16	(i) The International Symbol of Accessibility,
17	which is at least three inches $(3'')$ in height, centered on
18	the placard, and is white on a red shield;
19	(ii) An identification number;
20	(iii) A date of expiration; and
21	(iv) The seal or other identification of the issuing
22	authority.
23	(b) Special License Plates.
24	(1) Upon application of a qualified person with a
25	disability, the Motor Vehicles Division of the Department of
26	Revenue and Taxation shall issue a special license plate for the
27	vehicle which is registered in the applicant's name. The initial

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application shall be accompanied by the certification of a licensed physician that the applicant meets the 16 GCA §7120.1(a)(2) definition of a qualified person with a disability, except that a licensed optometrist may certify a visual impairment as defined in 16 GCA §7120.1(a)(2)(f).

(2) The fee for the issuance of a special license plate shall not exceed the fee charged for a similar license plate for the same class of vehicle.

9 (c) Removable Windshield Placards.

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The Department of Revenue and Taxation (Motor 10 (1) Vehicle Division) shall provide for the issuance and periodic 11 renewal of removable windshield placards, upon the 12 applications of qualified persons with disabilities, when such 13 14 disabilities are certified as permanent by a licensed physician or 15 by a licensed optometrist if the disability is a visual impairment. 16 The department shall, upon request, issue no more than one removable windshield placard in addition to the issuance of a 17 special license plate and shall, upon request, issue no more than 18 19 two placards to each applicant who does not have a special The department shall not charge a fee for 20 license plate. issuance of the placards. 21

(2) The initial application shall be accompanied by the
certification of a licensed physician that the applicant meets the
§7120.1(a)(2) definition of a person with disabilities.
Resubmission of a physician's or optometrist's certification is
not required when applying for renewal of a special license
plate or removable windshield placard.

(3) Upon application of an organization, the Motor Vehicles Division of the Department of Revenue and Taxation shall issue no more than one removable windshield placard for each vehicle registered in the applicant's name if the vehicle is used primarily to transport qualified persons with disabilities. The application shall include a certification by the applicant, under criteria to be determined by the Department of Revenue and Taxation through rules and regulations, that the vehicle is used primarily to transport qualified persons with disabilities. If the organization ceases to transport qualified persons with disabilities, the organization shall return the removable windshield placard to the Department of Revenue and Taxation (Motor Vehicle Department) for cancellation.

The removable windshield placard shall be 14 (4) displayed in such a manner that it may be viewed from the 15 front and the rear of the vehicle by hanging it from the front 16 windshield rearview mirror of a vehicle utilizing a parking 17 space reserved for persons with disabilities. When there is no 18 rearview mirror, or if tinting of the windshield substantially 19 20 obscures the view of the placard when it is hanging from the rearview mirror, the placard shall be displayed on the 21 dashboard. 22

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(d) Temporary Removable Windshield Placards.

(1) The Department of Revenue and Taxation (Motor
Vehicle Department) shall issue temporary removable
windshield placards, upon the application of qualified persons
with disabilities, when the disabilities are certified as

temporary by a licensed physician or by a licensed optometrist
if the disability is a visual impairment. The department shall
issue, upon request, no more than one additional temporary
removable windshield placard to each applicant. The
department shall not charge a fee for issuance of the placards.

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(2) The Department of Revenue and Taxation (Motor Vehicle Department) shall require that the application be accompanied by the certification of a licensed physician that the applicant meets the 16 GCA §7120.1(a)(2) definition of a qualified person with a disability, except that a licensed optometrist may certify a visual impairment as defined in §7120.1(a)(2)(f). The certification shall also include the period of time that the physician or optometrist determines the applicant will have the disability, not to exceed six (6) months.

The temporary removable windshield placard shall 15 (3) be displayed in such a manner that it may be viewed from the 16 front and rear of the vehicle by hanging it from the front 17 windshield rearview mirror of a vehicle utilizing a parking 18 space reserved for persons with disabilities. When there is no 19 20 rearview mirror, or if tinting of the windshield substantially obscures the view of the placard when it is hanging from the 21 rearview mirror, the placard shall be displayed on the 22 dashboard. 23

(4) Each temporary removable windshield placard
shall be valid for a period of time for which the physician or
optometrist has determined that the applicant will have the
disability, not to exceed six (6) months from the date of

If the temporary disability extends beyond the 1 issuance. expiration date of the placard, the applicant may reapply for a 2 temporary removable windshield placard. The applicant, upon 3 reapplication, shall submit another physician's or optometrist's 4 certification, and the placard shall be valid for a period of time 5 for which the physician or optometrist has determined that the 6 applicant will continue to have the disability, not to exceed six 7 (6) months from the date of issuance. 8

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(e) Parking.

10 Special license plates, removable windshield placards or temporary 11 removable windshield placards displaying the International Symbol of 12 Accessibility shall be the only recognized means of identifying vehicles 13 permitted to utilize parking spaces reserved for qualified persons with 14 disabilities.

15 (f) Reciprocity.

The territory of Guam shall recognize for six (6) months removable windshield placards, temporary removable windshield placards, and special license plates which have been issued by issuing authorities of other U.S. territories, states, and countries, for the purpose of identifying vehicles permitted to utilize parking spaces reserved for qualified persons with disabilities.

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(g) Previously Issued Placards.

All removable windshield placards that have been issued prior to the effective date of this Act by the Department of Revenue and Taxation (Motor Vehicle Division) for use by persons with disabilities shall automatically expire 180 days after the effective date of this Act. All placards which have expiration dates prior to 180 days after the effective date of this Act shall expire on their expiration dates. As soon as
practicable after the effective date of this Act, the Department of Revenue
and Taxation shall notify by mail all holders of removable windshield
placards issued prior to the effective date of this Act of the requirements of
this Act.

6 (h) Revocation of Special License Plate or Removable Windshield7 Placard.

8 (1) The Department of Revenue and Taxation may cancel, 9 revoke or suspend a special license plate, removable windshield 10 placard or temporary removable windshield placard if the 11 department has determined that any of the following circumstances 12 exist:

(i) a special license plate or placard was fraudulently
 or erroneously issued;

(ii) a person is or was using his or her special license
 plate or placard unlawfully;

(iii) the person is no longer eligible to receive or use a
special license plate or placard; or

(iv) the owner has committed an offense under this Act
involving a special license plate or placard.

21 (2) Before the Department of Revenue and Taxation cancels, 22 revokes or suspends a special license plate, removable windshield 23 placard or temporary removable windshield placard pursuant to this 24 subsection (h), the person affected by it shall be given notice and an 25 opportunity to be heard.

26 (i) Rules.

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1 The Department of Revenue and Taxation shall, within 180 days 2 from the effective date of this Act, adopt rules and regulations, in 3 compliance with the Administrative Adjudication Law, to carry out the 4 purposes of this Act, including rules for the issuance and renewal of 5 removable and temporary removable windshield placards, reciprocity, and 6 special license plates.

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Section 8. 17 GCA §41110 is hereby repealed.

As the new Executive Director of the Governor's Commission on Persons with Disabilities ( the "Commission") I would like to thank you for the timely manner in which you have addressed this most needed Bill 123, " An Act to Amend 16 GCA Subsection 3401, 16 GCA Section 7120 and 5 GCA Section 50111, to add 16 GCA Section 7120.1, and to repeal 17 GCA Section 41110, Relative to Parking for Persons with Disabilities". Dear Senator Blas:

May I add my voice to the even

May I add my voice to the support of Bill 123.

As a holder of a legitimate handicapped plate on my car I can say that there are many many cases of people parking in slots that should be reserved for handicapped people.

One of the worst places to park is the Agana Post office that has but one slot. It should be painted and additional slots added. Perhaps a Meter Maid from the Police Department could take care of this area.

The card board placards that are given out freely and are passed from one person to another should be eliminated.

Another point to consider is to provide legal handicapped persons with something more then the card board placard. I have personally seen many of the original cards copied through a copying machine, or cards being used by other persons after the original owner has passed away. This abuse is more prevalent then those individuals that park in these slots.

Hawaii issues the permit with a photo or license plate only to the individual who provides a doctor's certification and this must be visible at all times.

Your suggestion to raise the fine to \$300. is also a good one. It should be placed on the sign as noted in places like the Hilton Hotel and Hyatt Hotel.



Dear Mr. Chairman:

This is to memorialize in writing GPD's responses and position regarding Bill numbers 23, 44, 98, 117, 123 and 157 that were discussed at a public hearing held by your committee on March 22, 1995.

Bill No. 23 ("Rhino-Ammo" or "Black Rhino")

GPD supports the intent of Bill No. 23; however, we would submit that <u>Sections</u> <u>60100(g)</u> and <u>60121.1</u> (restricted bullets) of Chapter 60 (Firearm) of Title 10 G.C.A. adequately prohibits armor penetrating ammo or bullets.

GPD nonetheless applauds the safety concerns shown by the sponsor of the bill for men and women peace officers who may face such dangers. Indeed, GPD recommends that <u>Section 60121.1</u> of Title 10 G.C.A. be amended to include the increased penalty language of Section 2 of Bill 23 for the importation or possession of restricted bullets.

<u>Bill No. 44</u> (Assignment of Police Officers to Police Type Duties and Only the Classified Civilian Employees Perform Routine Duties)

GPD not only supports the intent of this bill, but its management practice is to assign police officers as much as possible to perform police-type duties rather than routine administrative and clerical duties which are typically handled by civilian classified or non-uniformed personnel.

GPD respectfully urges the committee not to support a bill which would mandate by law such a policy without taking into account practical situations that require exceptions and flexibility. First, GPD like many agencies lost over twenty civilian classified positions that were vacant for more than 120 days prior to September 30, 1994 and stands to lose more for civilian classified positions that remain vacant for more than 120 days after October 1, 1994 under the Budget Act passed in the late fall of 1994. Secondly, GPD requires flexibility for those uniformed police officers who require light duty or cause of injuries, administrative investigations and or for stress. GPD therefore respectfully requests that the committee not mandate by law an existing management practice.

# <u>Bill No. 98</u> (Amendments to the Criminal Mischief Statute Relative to Young Offenders Committing Vandalism and Graffiti)

GPD supports the intent of the bill which addresses the inconsistencies between Subsection 34.60(b) and 34.60(c) that were created by the Anti-Graffiti amendment enacted by the 22nd Guam Legislature. In addition, GPD supports stiffer fines and serving longer community service hours for vandalism and graffiti committed by youthful offenders. However, GPD does not necessarily support automatic certifying of youthful offenders between the ages of sixteen and eighteen to be treated as adults for what may only be a felony in the third degree (Title 19 G.C.A. Section 5106 only automatically certifies minors 16 years and older as adults for only first and second degree felonies). Furthermore, it may not be wise nor prudent to make any youthful offender (first timer) of the Criminal Mischief Law subject to a felony offense as compared to other crimes of a more serious and violent nature.

#### Bill No. 117 (Seat Belt Amendments)

GPD fully supports this bill which makes all passengers as well as the driver in "any" motor vehicle subject to being restrained by properly adjusted and fastened seat safety belts. However, please note that enforcement of the seat belt requirement in conventional motor vehicles will probably not raise any serious objections from the public but the same may not be true for passengers in the truck beds of pickups. Many people of Guam travel on our roads in the back of pickup trucks and under this law "any motor vehicles" includes them, too.

In any case, the bottom line for GPD is that safety is foremost insofar as traffic and vehicular enforcement are concerned.

#### **<u>Bill No. 123</u>** (Person's With Disabilities and Accessible Parking Amendments)

GPD wholly supports the comprehensive nature of Bill 123 in addressing the enforcement and regulating problems of accessible parking and permits for persons with disabilities.

GPD would urge that the committee consider increasing the penalties for those who commit a fraud or deception in acquiring, possessing and or displaying special license plates, placards or permits reserved for persons with disabilities from a misdemeanor and fine of \$300.00 to a felony in third degree and a fine up to One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) or more.

Additionally, GPD request that the committee add to line 49 of page 2 of this bill the following phrase "as near as practical" between the words "shall" and "regularly" so that it reads:

"The Guam Police Department shall [as near as practical] regularly patrol all onstreet and..."

Another important problem that this bill addresses is the restriction imposed by the current law for enforcing accessible parking for persons with disabilities on private property (i.e., GPD must presently secure the permission of the owner of the property for citing and towing vehicles illegally parked in an accessible parking stall). GPD submits that many complaints arise as a result of this restriction. Relatedly, GPD would ask that the committee consider including a provision permitting employees from relevant agencies the authority to issue citations for enforcing some of these provisions contained in the bill (e.g. DPHSS employees permitted to enforce the Clean Indoor Air Act/Anti-Smoking Law).

From my personal vantage, some sections of the bill requires additions, deletions and/or changes as indicated below:

Section 4 (4) ..(Pg 2, Line 32).."If a qualified person with a disability, (Add) "or his legal representative (hereafter will be synanymous with person with disability)" has applied...etc..etc.

Note: A legal representative could be the spouse, parent, legal guardian/others who are designated by the court to help the person with disability who cannot function normally, for example a person with damaged brain (traumatic brain injury), some wheel chair cases, minors, etc., needs another persons to transport him/her to the clinic, hospital, school, shopping center, church, etc., typical examples who needs to be transported by another person.

- Section 4 (6) ..(Pg 2, Line 45).."Officers of the Guam Police Department and other individuals"...Question: who are "other individuals ?" .. I think "other individuals" should be spelled out.
- - (b) ..(Pg 3, Line 38).."with current federal guidelines, etc.,"...the "federal guidelines," should be spelled out.

..(Pg 4, Line 1), "Signs shall be located so they cannot be obscured, etc." ... to comply with this requirement, the use of standard sign in GOVGUAM controlled areas and private sectors should include a suggested height, for uniformity.

Section 7 (a) Definitions.

(Add) ..(Pg 5, Line 11)..(g) Has brain damage (Traumatic Brain Injury case).

#### TESTIMONY - BILL NUMBER 123

On behalf of the Guam Developmental Disabilities Council I would like to express our support for Bill No. 123, " AN ACT TO AMEND 16 GCA \*\*3401, 16 GCA \*7120 AND 5 GCA \*50111, TO ADD 16 GCA \*7120.1 AND TO REPEAL 17 GCA \*41110, RELATIVE TO PARKING FOR PEOPLE WITH DISABILITIES".


There are many issues on island that of concern to people with disabilities. From our experiences at the Developmental Disabilities Council the issue of parking has always been an issue of major concern.

From the perspective of an individual who does not have a disability that limits his/her mobility, parking may not seem like a priority issue. The reality is that for a person with a disability, appropriate parking is a very serious issue.

Although legislation concerning parking for people with disabilities does exist, there is a definitive need for modification of the existing legislature. Bill Number 123 clearly addresses issues that were not addressed or appropriately addressed in the existing legislation including the following specific issues:

> 1. The Bill would permit Officers of the Guam Police Department and others who are authorized to issue traffic citations to cite vehicles illegally parked in violation of this law in both **publicly** or **privately** owned accessible parking space which have been designated for use by persons with disabilities. In the past GPD Officers were not empowered to issue traffic citation to vehicles illegally parked on privately owned parking facilities unless first summoned by the owner of the the property - this significantly limiting enforcement efforts.

> 2. A fine of \$300 would be assessed for violations of this law. A \$300 fine certainly will send a strong message to people who violate the law. Although most people without disabilities do not utilize parking designated for people with disabilities, or improperly utilize or secure parking placecards, some individuals in our community do, with impunity, violate the current statue. This law will undoubtedly enhance compliance with the law.



This simplifies the current cumbersome system that requires the Department of Vocational Rehabilitation to certify individuals before parking placards can be issued.

In brief summary, the Developmental Disabilities Council supports without reservation Bill Number 123, and feels that the adaptation of this legislation will have a significant impact in the more appropriate utilization of parking designated for people with disabilities.

TESTIMONY ON BILL 123

My name is Albert T. San Agustin, Rehabilitation Services Administrator, Department of Vocational Rehabilitation. The Department of Vocational Rehabilitation supports the expectations of Bill 123. Ms. Lydia P. Calvo, VR Counselor III is also with me to support and respond to your questions.

The most significant contribution of Bill 123 is the creation of a one stop process for persons with an eligible disability. The current procedure requires the person or families of persons with an eligible disability to be initially certified by DVR before proceeding on to the Motor Vehicle Section.

Based on our experience under P.L. 18-28, we found that many applicants for handicap parking were not aware of services and programs available not only at DVR but with other GovGuam agencies. In fact, we have handicap parking applicants who later became consumers of DVR services. The point we wish to register is a continual need to access persons with disabilities even under the proposed one-stop process with the Division of Motor Vehicle. We hope that the regulations to be adjudicated under Bill 123 will provide a consent option for referral purposes.

Bill 123 does not sufficiently address private commercial buildings owned and operated privately for public access. They are not mandated by local laws to provide accessible parking for persons with a disabilities. Yet under the federal (ADA) Americans with Disabilities Act all privately owned and operated commercial buildings must provide for reasonable accommodations to persons with various disabilities.

Physicians and persons with disabilities need to understand that the presence of an impairment is not sufficient grounds for an Access Parking Permit.

We are also attaching a list of the parking permits certified by DVR from 1986 to 1995.

We thank you for your paramount consideration on behalf of all persons with various disabilities.

The Guam System for Assistive Technology (GSAT) wishes to extend it's appreciation for the invitation to provide public comment regarding Bill No. 123 - An Act To Amend 16GCA 3401,...Relative To Parking For Persons With Disabilities.

On behalf of the GSAT Advisory Board and the University of Guam/University Affiliated Program on Developmental Disabilities Staff, we commend the sponsors and supporters of this long awaited bill. As an advocate for systems change towards the increased access and utilization of assistive technology and services which benefit individuals with disabilities, we offer these following recommendations:

1) A new Section be included which describes the design, designation and construction elements of accessible parking spaces in all existing, altered or newly constructed commercial facilities and places of public accommodation. Standards from the ADA Accessibility Guidelines and the Uniform Building Code can be extracted and used as a model for this bill.

Section\_\_\_\_. Parking

**Minimum number**. A ratio of 1 to 25 of the first 100 available parking spaces in a lot will be used to calculate the required minimum number of accessible spaces. Available parking spaces beyond 100 shall comply with the minimum number of accessible spaces cited in the ADAAG technical specifications 4.1.2 (5)

**Location**. Accessible Parking spaces serving a particular building shall be located on the shortest accessible route of travel from adjacent parking to an accessible entrance and comply with ADAAG technical specifications cited on 4.6.2

**Parking spaces**. Accessible parking spaces shall be at least 96 in wide and 228 in. long with a minimum 60 in. adjacent access aisle. Access aisle shall be a part of an accessible route to the building or facility entrance. Vehicle standing spaces and adjacent access aisles shall be level with surface slopes not exceeding 1:50 (2%) in all directions. Access aisles and parking spaces shall comply with ADAAG technical specifications 4.3 and 4.6.3.

**Signage.** Accessible parking spaces shall be designated as reserved by a sign showing (1) the International Symbol of Accessibility commonly known as the wheelchair symbol and specified on





4.30.7 of the ADAAG, (2) below the symbol, a statement that violators will be fined \$300 and the vehicle may be towed, (3) the GCA Subsection 3401, (4) a statement that access aisles must not be blocked, (5) Spaces complying with ADAAG technical specifications 4.1.2(5)(b) shall have an additional sign "Van Accessible" mounted also below the symbol of accessibility. Signs should be a maximum of 12 in. wide with edges having rounded corners. Signs shall be mounted on a post centered at the head of the parking space with the center of the International Symbol of Accessibility 7 feet above the parking surface.

**Vertical Clearance and Passenger Loading Zones.** Shall comply with ADADG technical specifications 4.6.5 and 4.6.6

2) The Guam Police Department must be authorized to cite and tow vehicles that are illegally parked in both private and publicly owned accessible spaces <u>including</u> vehicles which block or park in the access aisles adjacent to the accessible parking spaces.

3) The Department of Revenue and Taxation must be given the authority to ensure that if a Private Business does not comply with the accessible parking requirements for the building in which they will conduct their business, then the renewal or issuance of a business license will be denied.

4) Organizations representing or serving people with disabilities, especially Non-Profit Organizations (NPO), must be included in the list of authorized individuals who will be deputized to issue citations. Adequate training must also be provided to these qualified individuals. A portion of the fines collected from the NPO issued citations can be paid to the NPOs by the Governor's Commission on Persons with Disabilities for services to monitor and provide enforcement efforts.

5) The Accessible Parking Fund should be administered by the Governor's Commission on Persons with Disabilities to ensure that an aggressive media campaign can be implemented to educate the public about the human aspects of parking in an accessible parking space and it's impact on persons with disabilities. Each GovGuam agency like any private entity, must procure and maintain their own accessible parking areas and also budget for it. Any cost associated with services related to the issuance of parking permits and identification cards that will be provided by the Department of Tax and Revenue should be absorbed by their operational budget.

We hope these recommendation can provide a greater perspective to enhance Bill No. 123 to especially meet the needs of those individuals who utilize a variety of assistive devices and services including canes, service animals, wheelchairs, walkers, crutches or prosthesis and who are concerned with not only the physical structural issues such as unleveled parking areas, slippery, and obstructed access aisles or route of travel areas, but more importantly, attitudinal, enforcement, and educational issues.

Once again thank you for allowing us this opportunity to provide input on Bill No. 123.

 The territory of Guam shall recognize removable windshield placards, temporary removable windshield placards and special license plates for six months which have been issued by issuing authorities of other U.S. territories, states and countries, for the purpose of identifying vehicles permitted to utilize parking spaces reserved for qualified persons with disabilities.

(g) Previously Issued Placards.

All removable windshield placards that have been issued prior to the effective date of this Act by the Department of Revenue and Taxation (Motor Vehicle Department) for use by persons with disabilities shall automatically expire 180 days after the effective date of this Act. All placards which have expiration dates prior to 180 days after the effective date of this Act shall expire on their expiration dates. As soon as practicable after the effective date of this Act, the Department of Revenue and Taxation shall notify by mail all holders of removable windshield placards issued prior to the effective date of this Act of the requirements of this Act.

(h) Revocation of Special License Plate or Removable Windshield Placard

(1) The Department of Revenue and Taxation may cancel, revoke or suspend a special license plate, removable windshield placard or temporary removable windshield placard if the department has determined that any of the following circumstances exist:

issued;

(a) a special license plate or placard was fraudulently or erroneously ed;

(b) a person is or was using his or her special license plate or placard unlawfully;

(c) the person is no longer eligible to receive or use a special license plate or placard; or

The Department of Revenue and Taxation shall, within 180 days from the effective date of this Act, adopt rules and regulations, in compliance with the Administrative Adjudication Law, to carry out the purposes of this Act, including rules for the issuance and renewal of removable and temporary removable windshield placards, reciprocity and special license plates."

# MARCH 22, 1995

### I. OVERVIEW



The Committee on Judiciary, Criminal Justice and Environmental Affairs scheduled a public hearing on March 22, 1995 at 2:00 p.m. at the Legislative Public Hearing Room. Public notice was announced on the March 21, 1995 issue of the PDN. Members present were:



### II. SUMMARY F TESTIMONY



Ms. Patricia R. Botten, a private citizen, testified in support of Bill 123. She stated that disabled people have been terrorized and insulted when confronting people who illegally park in spaces designated for persons with disabilities. She stated that any law which would deter the illegal parking would be greatly appreciated.

Mr. Antkowiak, Executive Director of the Developmental Disabilities Planning Council, testified in support of Bill 123. His testimony was provided in written form; **attached**.

Mr. Eric Heisel, Department of Law, testified in favor of Bill 123. However, he stated that further research and carefulness should be taken in regards to allowing police officers to ticket violators on private property without the invitation or permission of the owner. He stated his concern of private property rights. He also cited Section 5, stating his concern about the Government of Guam's authority to require private buildings to construct parking lots for persons with disabilities. He cited the Federal Governments right under the ADA, but questioned the Government of Guam's authority.

Mr. Albert San Agustin, Rehabilitation Services Administrator, and Ms. Lydia P. Calvo, VR Counselor III, Department of Vocational Rehabilitation, testified in favor of Bill 123. Their testimony was provided in written form; attached.

Mr. Frank Ichihara, of the Guam Police Department, testified in favor of Bill 123. He stated that G.P.D. prefers that the fines and penalties be even higher than what is suggested in this Bill. He stated his concern that the language of this Bill might mandate G.P.D. to patrol both private and public buildings around the island. He suggested that the author take into consideration the resources of G.P.D., and adjust the language to reflect such consideration.

Mr. Jesus C. Torres, Executive Director of the Governor's Commission on Persons with Disabilities, testified in support of Bill 123. He stated that because the Commission is still in the process of appointing all of its Board members, the Commission would like to provide written testimony at a later date. Mr. Torres, as a private citizen, stated that he favored the Bill's section giving police the authority to ticket on vate property without the permution of private property owners. He also stated that he was happy that the fines were being raised, but suggested that the second and third offenses have more stricter penalties.

Mr. Rodney Priest, a social worker with the Advocacy Office, stated his support for Bill 123, but had disagreements with some of the sections of the Bill. He stated that subsection (e), paragraph 4 of page 2 might deny or limit a person's options as to whom they want to allow the use of their privately owned vehicle. He stated that the intent of the paragraph may be to disallow individuals without disabilities from parking in accessible spaces, but the language does not clearly express this intent. He stated that section 5, subsection (a), contains inappropriate language. He suggested that "confined in a wheelchair" be changed to "users of wheelchairs." He also suggested that individuals or groups be deputized to help enforce or monitor this law.

Ms. Teresita Borja, the Vice-Mayor of Tamuning, testified in support of Bill 123. She stated that she wanted the handicap signs to be more visible to the public, and agreed with the intent of this Bill.

Mr. Edward Artero, the Mayor of Yigo, testified in support of Bill 123. He stated that the Legislature should seriously look into this Bill. He suggested that security guards on private property be given the authority to issue citations. Otherwise, he fully supports the passage of this Bill.

Mr. Ben Servino, a private citizen, testified in support of Bill 123. He suggested that the language of Section 5, subsection (a) be changed to include privately owned and constructed buildings. He also suggested and agreed with Mr. Priest that the word "confined to a wheelchair" be changed to "user" or "used." He also suggested that in section 7, in regards to "special license plates," the letter "H" be eliminated, to remove any association with the word "handicapped." He also suggested that ID cards be issued to persons with disabilities to help G.P.D. with their enforcement efforts, as well as allowing people with disabilities to use the ID's in states with the same policy agreements. He also suggested that a uniform height for the signs be created. He further stated he agreed with the Bill's section allowing the police to ticket on private property. Mr. Servino also submitted written testimony on behalf of GSAT; attached.

Mrs. Dorothy Horn, submitted written testimony to the Committee in support of Bill 123; attached.

Mr. Joe Cepeda, a member of Disabled American Veterans, testified in

support of Bill 123. Stated that he has also seen may violations on military installations throughout the island. He suggested that the military police and Guam police get together to discuss strategies on enforcing the law, and stressed that he would appreciate such action.

### III. FINDING AND RECOMMENDATION



The Committee finds that the there is a need to establish a uniform system for accessible parking for persons with disabilities, which will conform with the requirements of the Americans with Disabilities Act Accessibility Guidelines. The Committee also finds that this uniform system will enhance access and the safety of persons with disabilities. The Committee further finds that upon the obtainment of testimony, amendments to this Bill are required. See Amended Bill attached.

Accordingly, the Committee on Judiciary, Criminal Justice and Environmental Affairs, to which was referred **Bill No. 123**, does hereby submit its findings and recommendation to the Twenty-Third Guam Legislature **TO DO PASS Bill No. 123** "AN ACT TO AMEND 16 GCA SECTION 3401, 16 GCA SECTION 7120 AND 5 GCA SECTION 50111, TO ADD 16 GCA SECTION 7120.1, AND TO REPEAL 17 GCA 41110, RELATIVE TO PARKING FOR PERSONS WITH DISABILITIES."

(3) Any person who parks in a designated accessible parking space, using a vehicle with a special license plate or removable windshield placard obtained pursuant to 16 GCA 210.1(b), (c) or (d), and who is not a qualified person with a disability as defined in 16 GCA 210.1(a)(2), is guilty of a violation, unless such person is using the vehicle or placard in connection with the transportation of a qualified person with a disability.

(4) If a qualified person with a disability has applied for and received a special license plate, a removable windshield placard or a temporary removable windshield placard, that person shall not permit another individual who is not a qualified person with a disability to use the vehicle with the special license plate or the placard in violation of this act.

(5) A violation of subparagraphs 2, 3 or 4 of this subsection (e) shall be punished by a fine of three hundred dollars (\$300.00), which shall be deposited into the Accessible Parking Fund maintained by the Department of Public Works pursuant to 5 GCA §50111(c). Additionally, a vehicle which is illegally parked pursuant to this subsection may be towed, and the owner of the vehicle shall be liable for the towing expense.

(6) Officers of the Guam Police Department and other individuals who are authorized by law to issue traffic citations may cite vehicles illegally parked in violation of this subsection (e) and have them towed from publicly owned or privately owned accessible parking spaces which are designated for use by persons with disabilities. The Guam Police department shall regularly patrol all onstreet and



offstreet parking areas and facilities, whether publicly or privately owned, in which parking stalls or spaces for persons with disabilities are designated or required to be designated pursuant to the provisions of this Article, for purposes of enforcing of the provisions of this Subsection

(7) Upon conviction of an offense committed in violation of subsections (e)(1), (e)(3) or (e)(4) of this section, the judge trying the case, as a part of any penalty imposed, may confiscate the special license plate, removable windshield placard or temporary removable windshield placard and return it to the Motor Vehicles Division of the Department of Revenue and Taxation along with a certified copy of the sentence imposed. Upon receipt of a special license plate, removable windshield placard or temporary removable windshield placard from a judge, the division shall cancel and destroy the placard, and the qualified person with a disability to whom it was issued shall not receive another special license plate or placard until he or she submits a completed application and presents a current certification of a physician attesting to his or her condition. A law enforcement officer who observes a misuse of a placard may immediately confiscate the placard and forward it with a copy of his or her report to the Motor Vehicles Division of the Department of Revenue and Taxation."

Section 5. 5 GCA §50111 is hereby amended to read as follows:

24 "(a) All buildings private and public, parking lots, walks and recreational facilities 25 hereafter constructed by or for the government of Guam intended for the use of the general 26 public shall be designed and constructed in such manner as to permit persons with disabilities who are confined to wheelchairs or otherwise of limited mobility ready access to 27 such buildings, parking lots, walks, recreational facilities and to all parts thereof open to the 28 29 general public. All public buildings, parking lots, walks, and recreational facilities owned or leased by the government of Guam now in use by the general public shall be modified, 30 insofar as is possible and practicable to permit ready access by persons with disabilities, and 31 32 in leasing buildings for public use, priority shall be given to those structures where access to 33 public areas by persons with disabilities is provided. All modifications and construction shall follow current applicable federal guidelines regarding access by persons with disabilities. All 34 35 government of Guam buildings, whether leased or owned by the government, which are now used by the general public and those leased or constructed in the future shall provide 36 37 accessible parking spaces with access aisles for use by persons with disabilities. These spaces and aisles shall comply, both in number and in dimension, with current applicable 38 39 federal guidelines.

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42 (b) The Director of the Department of Public Works, pursuant to subsection (a) and in conformance with current federal guidelines, shall designate accessible parking spaces for 43 all buildings owned or leased by the government of Guam. The signs designating these 44 spaces shall contain the following information: (1) the International Symbol of Accessibility; 45 commonly known as wheelchair symbol (2) a statement that illegal parking is a violation and 46 47 carries a three hundred dollar (\$300.00) fine; and (3) a statement that an illegally parked vehicle may be towed. (4) GCA Subsection 3401. Van accessible spaces shall also have an 48 additional sign stating "van accessible," which shall be mounted below the symbol of 49





accessibility. Signs shall be located so they cannot be obscured by a vehicle parked in the space. The Director and the department shall coordinate its activities with the various departments, agencies, boards and authorities of the government to insure the appropriate location of accessible parking spaces.

(c) The fund previously created as the Disabled Parking Fund is hereby renamed the "Accessible Parking Fund," and shall continue to be separate and apart from any other fund of the government of Guam. The Director of the department shall maintain the fund and shall utilize the fund to pay for installing and maintaining accessible parking spaces for government of Guam buildings, including the painting of lines and curbing, for constructing and installing signs necessary to mark the spaces, and for fabricating special license plates and removable windshield placards issued pursuant to 16 GCA §§7210.1(b), (c) and (d). Funding for the Accessible Parking Fund shall be derived solely from fines collected pursuant to 16 GCA §3401(e)(5)."

Section 6.	16 GCA	§7120(d) is	hereby	repealed.
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Section 7. A new 16 GCA §7120.1 is hereby added to read:

"§7120.1. Special License Plates and Removable Windshield Placards.

(a) Definitions.

Terms used in this section are defined as follows:

(1) "International Symbol of Accessibility" means the symbol adopted by Rehabilitation International in 1969 at its Eleventh World Congress on Rehabilitation of the Disabled.

(2) "Qualified person with a disability" means a person who, as determined by a licensed physician:

(a) Cannot walk two hundred feet without stopping to rest, due to a diagnosed arthritic, neurological or orthopedic condition; or

(b) Cannot walk without the use of, or assistance from, a brace, cane, crutch, another person, prosthetic device, wheelchair, or other assistive device; or

(c) Is restricted by lung disease to such an extent that the person's forced (respiratory) expiratory volume for one second, when measured by spirometry, is less than one liter, or the arterial oxygen tension is less than sixty mm/hg on room air at rest; or

(d) Uses portable oxygen; or

Has a cardiac condition to the extent that the person's functional 1 (e) 2 limitations are classified in severity as Class III or Class IV according to 3 standards set by the American Heart Association; or 4 5 6 Has a central visual acuity that does not exceed 20/200 in the (f) better eye, with corrective lenses, as measured by the Snellen test, or visual 7 acuity greater than 20/200, but with a limitation in the field of vision such that the widest diameter of the visual field subtends an angle not greater than 20 8 9 degrees. An optometrist, in lieu of a licensed physician, may determine the existence of a visual impairment as defined under this subsection. 10 11 12 "Special license plate" means a license plate that displays the 13 (3) International Symbol of Accessibility: 14 15 In a color that contrasts to the background, and 16 (a) 17 18 In the same size as the letters and numbers on the plate. **(b)** 19 20 (4) "Removable windshield placard" means a two-sided, hanger-style placard which includes on each side: 21 22 The International Symbol of Accessibility, which is at least three 23 (a) inches in height, centered on the placard, and is white on a blue shield; 24 25 26 (b) An identification number; 27 A date of expiration; and 28 (c) 29 The seal or other identification of the issuing authority. 30 (d)31 32 "Temporary removable windshield placard" means a two-sided, hanger-(5)style placard which includes on each side: 33 34 The International Symbol of Accessibility, which is at least three 35 (a) 36 inches in height, centered on the placard, and is white on a red shield; 37 38 An identification number; **(b)** 39 40 A date of expiration; and (c) 41 42 The seal or other identification of the issuing authority. (d) 43 (b) Special License Plates. 44 45 46 Upon application of a qualified person with a disability, the Motor 47 (1)Vehicles Division of the Department of Revenue and Taxation shall issue a special 48 license plate for the vehicle which is registered in the applicant's name. The initial 49





application shall be accompanied by the certification of a licensed physician that the applicant meets the \$7120.1(a)(2) definition of a qualified person with a disability, except that a licensed optometrist may certify a visual impairment as defined in \$7120.1(a)(2)(f).

(2) The fee for the issuance of a special license plate shall not exceed the fee charged for a similar license plate for the same class of vehicle.

#### (c) Removable Windshield Placards.

(1) The Department of Revenue and Taxation (Motor Vehicle Division) shall provide for the issuance and periodic renewal of removable windshield placards, upon the applications of qualified persons with disabilities, when such disabilities are certified as permanent by a licensed physician or by a licensed optometrist if the disability is a visual impairment. The department shall, upon request, issue no more than one removable windshield placard in addition to the issuance of a special license plate and shall, upon request, issue no more than two placards to each applicant who does not have a special license plate. The department shall not charge a fee for issuance of the placards.

(2) The initial application shall be accompanied by the certification of a licensed physician that the applicant meets the \$7120.1(a)(2) definition of a qualified person with a disability, except that a licensed optometrist may certify a visual impairment as defined in \$7120.1(a)(2)(f). Resubmission of a physician's or optometrist's certification is not required when applying for renewal of a special license plate or removable windshield placard.

(3) Upon application of an organization, the Motor Vehicles Division of the Department of Revenue and Taxation shall issue no more than one removable windshield placard for each vehicle registered in the applicant's name if the vehicle is used primarily to transport qualified persons with disabilities. The application shall include a certification by the applicant, under criteria to be determined by the Department of Revenue and Taxation through rules and regulations, that the vehicle is used primarily to transport qualified persons with disabilities. If the organization ceases to transport qualified persons with disabilities, the organization shall return the removable windshield placard to the Department of Revenue and Taxation (Motor Vehicle Department) for cancellation and destruction.

(4) The removable windshield placard shall be displayed in such a manner that it may be viewed from the front and the rear of the vehicle by hanging it from the front windshield rearview mirror of a vehicle utilizing a parking space reserved for persons with disabilities. When there is no rearview mirror, or if tinting of the windshield substantially obscures the view of the placard when it is hanging from the rearview mirror, the placard shall be displayed on the dashboard.





(d) Temporary Removable Windshield Placards.

(1) The Department of Revenue and Taxation (Motor Vehicle Department) shall issue temporary removable windshield placards, upon the application of qualified persons with disabilities, when the disabilities are certified as temporary by a licensed physician or by a licensed optometrist if the disability is a visual impairment. The department shall issue, upon request, no more than one additional temporary removable windshield placard to each applicant. The department shall not charge a fee or issuance of the placards.

(2) The Department of Revenue and Taxation (Motor Vehicle Department) shall require that the application be accompanied by the certification of a licensed physician that the applicant meets the \$7120.1(a)(2) definition of a qualified person with a disability, except that a licensed optometrist may certify a visual impairment as defined in \$7120.1(a)(2)(f). The certification shall also include the period of time that the physician or optometrist determines the applicant will have the disability, not to exceed six months.

(3) The temporary removable windshield placard shall be displayed in such a manner that it may be viewed from the front and rear of the vehicle by hanging it from the front windshield rearview mirror of a vehicle utilizing a parking space reserved for persons with disabilities. When there is no rearview mirror, or if tinting of the windshield substantially obscures the view of the placard when it is hanging from the rearview mirror, the placard shall be displayed on the dashboard.

(4) Each temporary removable windshield placard shall be valid for a period of time for which the physician or optometrist has determined that the applicant will have the disability, not to exceed six months from the date of issuance. If the temporary disability extends beyond the expiration date of the placard, the applicant may reapply for a temporary removable windshield placard. The applicant, upon reapplication, shall submit another physician's or optometrist's certification, and the placard shall be valid for a period of time for which the physician or optometrist has determined that the applicant will continue to have the disability, not to exceed six months from the date of issuance.

### (e) Parking.

Special license plates, removable windshield placards or temporary removable windshield placards displaying the International Symbol of Accessibility shall be the only recognized means of identifying vehicles permitted to utilize parking spaces reserved for qualified persons with disabilities.

(f) Reciprocity.

The territory of Guam shall recognize removable windshield placards, temporary removable windshield placards and special license plates for six months which have been issued by issuing authorities of other U.S. territories, states and countries, for the purpose of identifying vehicles permitted to utilize parking spaces reserved for qualified persons with disabilities.

#### (g) Previously Issued Placards.

All removable windshield placards that have been issued prior to the effective date of this Act by the Department of Revenue and Taxation (Motor Vehicle Department) for use by persons with disabilities shall automatically expire 180 days after the effective date of this Act. All placards which have expiration dates prior to 180 days after the effective date of this Act shall expire on their expiration dates. As soon as practicable after the effective date of this Act, the Department of Revenue and Taxation shall notify by mail all holders of removable windshield placards issued prior to the effective date of this Act of the requirements of this Act.

(h) Revocation of Special License Plate or Removable Windshield Placard

(1) The Department of Revenue and Taxation may cancel, revoke or suspend a special license plate, removable windshield placard or temporary removable windshield placard if the department has determined that any of the following circumstances exist:

(a) a special license plate or placard was fraudulently or erroneously issued;

(b) a person is or was using his or her special license plate or placard unlawfully;

(c) the person is no longer eligible to receive or use a special license plate or placard; or

(d) the owner has committed an offense under this act involving a special license plate or placard.

(2) Before the Department of Revenue and Taxation cancels, revokes or suspends a special license plate, removable windshield placard or temporary removable windshield placard pursuant to this subsection (h), the person affected by it shall be given notice and an opportunity to be heard.



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 The Department of Revenue and Taxation shall, within 180 days from the effective date of this Act, adopt rules and regulations, in compliance with the Administrative Adjudication Law, to carry out the purposes of this Act, including rules for the issuance and renewal of removable and temporary removable windshield placards, reciprocity and special license plates."

Section 8. 17 GCA §41110 is hereby repealed.
