BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE TERRITORY OF GUAM:

Section 1. Legislative Intent. With the closing of military bases on Guam and the reduction in forces, particularly the civilian component, it is necessary to ensure that all of this activity goes smoothly and without detriment to the employees affected. The skills of these highly trained individuals are generally needed by the Civil Service of government of Guam. This includes not just office workers but the blue collar trades as well. Since most of these workers have been with the military for a number of years, and if hired by government of Guam, it will be the government who benefits from their skills, it is only fitting and proper that these workers be given some minor advantages. Primarily, they should be allowed some credit for their prior experience and knowledge.

Section 2. Coordinating Committee. A committee to be known as the 12 Federal/Local Civil Service Coordinating Committee shall be composed as 13 follows: Director of Department of Administration who shall serve as 14 Chairman, the General Manager of Guam Power Authority, the Fire Chief of 15 the Guam Fire Department, the Director of Public Utility Agency of Guam, 16 the Director of Department of Public Works, the Administrative Director of 17 Guam Civil Service Commission. The Commander Naval Forces Marianas 18 and/or members of his staff are invited to attend and participate in these 19 meetings. Other department heads of the government of Guam may be 20 added to the Committee as the need arises. This Committee shall review all 21 base closings, reduction in forces, downsizing, and determine which 22 employees have skills for which the government of Guam is in need. They 23 shall establish procedures whereby the recruitment and hiring can be 24 expedited to the advantage of the employees and the government. The hiring 25 of the former federal employees shall be completed no later than ninety (90) 26 27 days after the military completes its downsizing on Guam.

Dear Speaker Nelson:

Enclosed please find Substitute Bill No. 454 (LS), "AN ACT TO CREATE A COORDINATING COMMITTEE TO OVERSEE THE HIRING OF FEDERAL CIVIL SERVANTS WHO HAVE BEEN RELEASED BECAUSE OF MILITARY DOWNSIZING AND BASE CLOSURE", which I have vetoed.

This legislation is duplicative of current laws and processes already in place. Through the BRAC process, there is already a mechanism presently in effect for working with employees who will be affected by military downsizing. At the present time, representatives of the Agency for Human Resource Development (AHRD) are stationed at the Port Authority of Guam, providing information and interviewing employees who may be affected through the military downsizing. This process is being coordinated through the Guam Economic Development Authority (GEDA) and the BRAC process established by the Twenty-Third Guam Legislature in Public Law 23-51.

Additionally, there are already in place laws, rules, and regulations to hire persons with special skills into the government through the regular Civil Service Commission procedures. Also, the mechanism of intergovernmental transfer can be used instead of the recruitment process to smooth the hiring of affected federal employees into the government of Guam system.

A copy of the legislation and the message have also been delivered to the Office of the Legislative Secretary.

PUBLIC HEARING ON BILL NO. 454

I. OVERVIEW

The Committee on General Governmental Operations and Micronesian Affairs conducted a public hearing on Bill No. 454 (An Act to create a Coordinating Committee to oversee the hiring of Federal civil servants who have been released because of military downsizing and base closure) on Friday, December 22, 1995 at the Public Hearing Room of the Guam Legislature Temporary Building in Agana.

II. TESTIMONY

MR. CARL TAITANO testified in support of Bill No. 454.

MR. BILL CUNDIFF, AHRD Director overseeing the implementation of Title III Job Training Partnership Act Dislocated Worker Program for civil service employees affected by BRACC '95 recommendations and Chairman of Guam's BRACC '95 Working Sub-committee on Human Resources, testified and wholeheartedly concurs with the intent of Bill No. 454. He stated that the closure of SRF and disestablishment of FISC will have a devastating effect on Guam's economy and on the employees and their families. "We must seize every opportunity and we must be proactive and visionary in our approach to ease the transition of these employees and their families into a new career environment. This is definitely an urgent matter", Mr. Cundiff said.

Mr. Cundiff also informed the Committee that his Agency has submitted a grant application to Washington, D.C. for \$25.5 million to assist the affected employees. The grant money will be used for readjustment, retraining and supportive services.

In closing, Mr. Cundiff stated that "assisting the civil servants and their families must be a Team Guam effort" and recommended that the "committee work cohesively with the Guam BRACC '95 Steering Committee so that the best possible services can be provided to the employees and their families and that duplication of efforts be eliminated."

MR. ELOY HARA thanked the Committee for giving the Commission the opportunity to comment on Bill 454. He stated that the CSC has reservations on the bill since "current laws and departmental personnel rules and regulations are already in place to address these issues" and that "Federal employees are no different from outside applicants" applying for jobs in the Government of Guam. "If GovGuam wishes to hire specialized or skilled workers, a selective factor rule in the Personnel Rules and Regulations can do the job", Mr. Hara said.

Mr. Hara said that the 90-days hiring provisions in the bill is unnecessary. Federal employees, like all other applicants, are not guaranteed jobs with the Government of Guam; they must qualify and

be ranked within the top 5 or 10 candidates to be eligible for selection.

"Although 4 GCA §8107 allows prior service credit, CSC reserves to comment on these issues which should be addressed by the Retirement Fund", Mr. Hara said in closing.

SENATOR MARK CHARFAUROS commented that he hopes this doesn't degrade the merit system. If passed, will there be exemption from the merit system? Need open competition.

MR. MANUEL Q. CRUZ, AFGE President, appeared before the Committee in support of Bill No. 454.

Mr. Cruz stated that, "even though there is an immediate need for the establishment of a Federal/Local Civil Service Coordinating Committee at this time, it is more critical that the issue of the Federal retirement credits be first addressed and resolved through local legislation."

MR. JOHN S. SALAS, Director of Department of Administration also submitted testimony. He said that the Bill "presents a commendable proposal for a joint effort to focus attention on the maximum utilization of experienced and trained local human resources. However, this effort may have been already addressed or being addressed by the Base Realignment and Closure Committee (BRAC) Task Force established by the Governor."

He recommended that Bill 454 be revised to establish a sub-committee within the BRAC Task Force to include those members recommended for the Coordinating Committee.

REAR ADMIRAL D. L. BREWER, III, in his letter to Speaker Parkinson, advises that "appointment of any military member to a Government of Guam Committee without military approval is inappropriate and in some cases prohibited." He wants to ensure that all such requests, in the future, are staffed via this command, before any legislation is proposed.

"Regarding Bill 454, it would be inappropriate for myself or any member of the military to be a sitting member of this committee. However, we will gladly provide any appropriate information that would assist the

committee in their assistance to federal civil servants," the Admiral stated.

III. RECOMMENDATIONS

The Committee on General Governmental Operations and Micronesian Affairs, after having a public hearing on Bill No. 454 (An Act to create a Coordinating Committee to oversee the hiring of Federal civil servants who have been released because of military downsizing and base closure), recommends passage of Bill No. 454 as amended.

TESTIMONY IN FAVOR OF BILL NO. 454

As Director of the Agency for Human Resources Development overseeing the implementation of Title III, Job Training Partnership Act Dislocated Worker Program for civil service employees affected by BRACC'95 recommendations and as Chairman of Guam's BRACC'95 Working Sub-Committee on Human Resources, I wholeheartedly concur with the intent of Bill No. 454. The closure of the Ship Repair Facility (SRF) and the disestablishment of Fleet and Industrial Supply Center (FISC) will have a devastating effect on our economy and on the employees and their families. We must seize every opportunity and we must be proactive and visionary in our approach to ease the transition of these employees and their families into a new career environment. This is definitely an urgent matter. And your committee is to be commended for initiating Bill No. 454.

In concert with Bill No. 454, the hardworking professionals at the Agency for Human Resources Development, have put together and submitted a grant application to Washington D.C. for 25.5 million dollars to assist these employees. The grant money will be used for the following services:

Hafa adai! The Civil Service Commission (CSC) would like to thank you for giving us the opportunity to comment on Bill No. 454.

CSC has reservations, however, for the coordinating committee to create and establish procedures for the recruitment and transferring of these employees. Current laws and departmental personnel rules and regulations are already in place to address these issues. Federal employees are no different from outside applicants who are applying for jobs in the Government of Guam. All should be treated equally as mandated by the merit system. If GovGuam wishes to hire specialized or skilled workers, a selective factor rule in the Personnel Rules and Regulations can do the job. As for an example, the way that CSC handled the Guam Airport Authority Air Crash/Rescue Crew in which 20 of 21 were hired. These rules screen applicants who possess the necessary qualifications for the selected jobs. The appointing authority will have the luxury to hire these potential applicants immediately after fulfilling the merit system requirements. The 90 days hiring provisions in this bill is unnecessary. Like all other applicants, federal employees are not guaranteed for the GovGuam jobs. They must qualify and be ranked within the top five (5) or ten (10) candidates to be eligible for selection.

Although 4 GCA §8107 allows prior service credit, CSC reserves to comment on these issues which should be addressed by the Retirement Fund.

On behalf of the hundreds of Federal civilian employees who will be affected by military downsizing and base closures on Guam starting next year, we support the intent and purpose of Bill No. 454, "an Act to create a Coordinating Committee to oversee the hiring of Federal civil servants who have been released because of military downsizing and base closure".

When the U.S. Fleet and Industrial Supply Center (FISC), Guam and the U. S. Naval Ship Repair Facility (SRF), Guam close their doors on or about 30 September 1997, over a thousand (1,000) employees will lose their jobs. Most of these employees (especially at SRF-Guam) are highly skilled, trained, and certified in the work they do. Some of these skills are needed by the Government of Guam right now. In fact, the Guam Power Authority (GPA) and the Port Authority of Guam (PAG) have been utilizing some of the specialized workers from SRF-Guam to perform repair work in various mechanized equipment and facilities.

As these Federal employees anticipate their working for the Government of Guam (GovGuam), one of the main issues of concern is time in service credits and retirement credits.

Regarding the time in service issue, the Guam Civil Service Commission has already addressed this matter when they granted GPA the authority to hire most of the employees at the Piti Power Plant above Step 1 in their prospective grade series. Even though this will not be effective until the final transfer of the assets of the Piti Power Plant to GPA in February or March of next year, it is still a breakthrough and a step in the right direction.

Also, for your information, it is our understanding that the twentythree (23) or so Federal firefighters from the former U. S. Naval Air Station (NAS) who transferred to and were hired by the Guam Airport Authority (GAA) were the recipients of time in service credits.

On the issue of retirement credits, this is where the real problem lies. Apparently, the Guam Retirement Commission is not buying in to the outright transfer of retirement credits from the Federal Government to the Government of Guam without proper monetary contributions. Such monetary contributions include the employee's contribution and the employer's contributions. In addition, some interests must be considered and factored in for he or she those years the contributions would have been gaining by the employee it had been a member of the GovGuam Retirement Fund.

As the Chairman of the Committee on General Governmental Operations and Micronesian Affairs, it is a known fact that you have been instrumental in pursuing through various legislation, ways for the Federal Government to outrightly pay over to the GovGuam Retirement Fund the employee's contribution, but so far to no success. It is a fact that the Federal Government has never really deducted any money from its annual operating budgets to pay its share in retirement contributions. As such, it would be hard to recover these contributions short of an enabling legislation by the U. S. Congress for this purpose.

For the record, it is a known fact that there have already been precedents in the Government of Guam in which retirement credits have been given for prior military service, for advanced educational achievements, as well as for prior Federal service (up to 5 years).

Even though there is an immediate need for the establishment of a Federal/Local Civil Service Coordinating Committee at this time, it is more critical that the issue of the Federal retirement credits be first addressed and resolved through local legislation. The 53 or so Federal employees from the U. S. Navy Public Works Center, who will be transferring to GPA in February or March next year, need to know now.

Thank you for the opportunity to provide our comments in support of Bill No. 454.

Bill would revive buyout program

Five House members representing federal employee-heavy districts have introduced legislation (HR-2751) that would revive the buyout program in non-defense agencies and would create several other incentives and assistance placement efforts for employees affected by job cuts.

The measure would provide for separation incentive payments for those not eligible for an immediate annuity and only if the payments are needed to avoid or minimize layoffs due to reductions in force, reorganization, transfer of function or similar actions.

A proposed new type of incentive payment would go to those not eligible for immediate retirement as an inducement to leave voluntarily and find a job in the private sector. Those individuals would receive the full amount of the severance payments to which they would have been entitled had they stayed and been laid off, if they find a private sector job within two months of separation. The amount would fall to 80 percent if the new employment begins within three months, 60 percent in four months and so on.


Also proposed are:

• Locking into law a presidential order establishing a government-wide priority placement program modeled after the Defense Department's internal program. Agencies would be required to fill positions with qualified displaced

employees referred through the program, names they would obtain from a central inventory of employees who have been RIF'd or given notice that they will be.

- Permission for agencies to pay a retraining incentive to non-federal employers of up to \$12,000 after a former federal employee has worked there for at least a year. This is intended to encourage hiring displaced federal workers by paying for a portion of any needed retraining. Agencies similarly could pay relocation incentives of up to \$20,000 if it is necessary for the individual to relocate for a non-federal job.
- Providing job placement and counseling services to current and former employees and their families.
- Allowing employees separated involuntarily or who take early retirement to continue federal life insurance by paying both the employee and agency share.
- Waiving the general requirement that retiring employees must have participated in the Federal Employees Health Benefits program for the five years preceding their retirement in order to keep their FEHB coverage.

Thank you for the opportunity to comment on Bill Nos. 454, relative to creating a coordinating committee to oversee the hiring of federal civil servants affected by the military downsizing and base closure on Guam, and Bill No. 235, to redefine the hiring restrictions on P.L. 22-140 pertaining to law enforcement officers.

Bill 454 presents a commendable proposal for a joint effort to focus attention on the maximum utilization of experienced and trained local human resources. However, this effort may have been already addressed or being addressed by the Base Realignment and Closure Committee (BRAC) Task Force established by the Governor. All of the concerns addressed by Bill 454 can be referred to that body for action. 


