AN ACT ESTABLISHING THE RIGHT TO FARM, BY ADDING A NEW §60354 TO CHAPTER 60, TITLE 5, GUAM CODE ANNOTATED.

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE TERRITORY OF GUAM:

Section 1. Legislative findings and intent. The Legislature finds that it is necessary to encourage and protect farming in the Territory. One of the concerns expressed by farmers is that they are afraid that they will be slowly squeezed out by the encroachment of development around and in the neighborhood of their farms. Therefore, the Legislature feels that it is important to create an exemption to protect various agricultural activities in order that farmers will not be dislocated because of the subsequent development of surrounding lands.

Section 2. A new §60354 is added to Title 5, Guam Code Annotated, to read:

"§60354. A farm for purposes of this section shall be farmland used for bonafide agriculture, as defined in §60102 of this Title, and which encompasses over one half acre in size. No person who is engaged in agricultural use of farmland may be forced or required to stop such farming activities because of changes in the usages of surrounding lands, nor because of zoning changes.

- (a) Any farm, as defined above, shall be deemed a preferred use of the land and, for so long as the land continues in production and continues to be used for agricultural purposes, said land shall be considered authorized as a farming area not withstanding changes in zoning or changes in the usage and characteristics of the neighborhood in which it is located.
- (b) Any farm which is authorized herein for agricultural usage may continue to be used in a manner consistent with the traditional agricultural uses of the land in the past.
- (c) If a farm as defined herein has been used for agricultural purposes within the previous two (2) years, there shall be a

rebuttable presumption that the usage of the land is continuous and that there has been no abandonment of the farming operations on the land. Anytime the land is not being used for agricultural purposes for two (2) consecutive years, there shall be a rebuttable presumption that there has been an abandonment of the usage of the land for agricultural purposes.

- (d) When land which was previously used for farming is no longer used for farming, and the agricultural operations have been abandoned as defined herein, the land shall be subject to the zoning laws and restrictions on use to the same extent as if it had never been used for agricultural purposes. The courts shall not order the cessation of agricultural usage for a farm, as defined herein, on the basis of inconvenience or discomfort which such usage may cause the neighbors of adjoining property, if such usage was originally commenced in a lawful manner.
- (e) The provisions of this section do not override or supersede any existing laws which govern the use of pesticide or herbicide near populated areas.
- (f) The definition of a farmer for the purpose of this section shall be as defined by provision II.1 of the Rules for Compensation to Farmers for Crop Damages in Section 2 of P. L. 22-64."

- (c) If a farm as defined herein has been used for agricultural purposes within the previous two (2) years, there shall be rebuttable presumption that the usage of the land is continuous and that there has been no abandonment of the farming operations on the land. Anytime the land is not being used for agricultural purposes for two (2) years consecutive, there shall be a rebuttable presumption that there has been an abandonment of the usage of the land for agricultural purposes.
- (d) When land which was previously used for farming is no longer used for farming and the agricultural operations has been abandoned is defined herein, the land shall be subject to the zoning laws and restrictions on use to the same extent as if it had ever be used for agricultural purposes. I. BACKGROUND

Senator Joe T. San Agustin, Chairman for the Committee on Economic-Agricultural Development and Insurance conducted a hearing on Bill #22, at 7:00 P.M., February 28, 1995, at the Mangilao Community Center.

II. SUMMARY OF TESTIMONY

MR. MICHAEL W. KUHLMANN, Acting Director of the Department of Agriculture submitted a written testimony and testified that the Department of Agriculture fully supports the efforts to protect and facilitates local farmers and other agricultural industry, however, there are questions which must be addressed to clear potential up ambiguities and conflicts which may arise. Some of the questions are listed as follows:

- 1. Who is a farmer?
- 2. Does Bill #78 intent to include any parcel of land where plants are grown such as coconuts, betelnuts and bananas as a farm or only the one half acre parcels where plant are grown?

Mr. Kuhlmann pointed out that many people would plant only for their own consumption or to give their produce away, but not to sale. To him, these people are not farmers, they are gardeners. However, Bill #78 alluded to "traditional agriculture use", would these category of people be also classified as "farmers" under Bill #78?

Mr. Kuhlmann suggested that to determine to whom this right (The right to farm) applied to, by defining farmers in some context with the filing of Income Tax Schedule "F".

He further question the intent of the Bill, whether it would override other applicable existing laws such as the Public Health Laws and laws which governs the use of pesticide and herbicides near populated areas? Also, would the "right to farm" block or prevent the development of high-rise buildings which would block the sun from the farm areas?

MR. BENNY SAN NICOLAS, Inarajan School Teacher, Farmer, Chairman, Southern District Soil and Water Conservation Board, provided the Committee with an oral testimony in which he testified that he is representing the Southern District Soil and Water Conservation Board in support of the Bill. He also testified that a lot of time in the past, farmers and/or families will be forced to move from their farm land so

houses can be built. Also there are times when new resident would move in and complain about the noise from the farm animals. He believe that when a farmer is farming the land, and someone new moved in next to the farm, they should be prepare to put up with all the noises and other activities being created by the farmers. He further testified that he does not believe that a farmers should be required to close up and stop farming just because a developer wishes to build on the land.

MR. GREGORIO CRUZ, Mangilao resident, presented an oral testimony, only to say that he support Bill #78. He thinks that the Bill will give the farmers a better protection against being forced out by development.

Due to the limited time, there were no questions or comments raised by any of the senators present on this Bill.

III. FINDINGS

After hearing all the testimonies presented, the Committee finds that everyone who testified support the passage of Bill #78. The Committee also finds that there were questions raised that needs to be addressed in order to clear up some ambiguities and conflict which may arise.

The Committee also finds that the Bill did not clearly define "who is a farmer." Also there seems to be some misunderstanding as to what constitute a "farm".

The Committee further finds that the Bill did not address the issue whether the Bill would override other existing laws which governs the use of pesticide and herbicide near populated areas. In addition, whether the "right of farm" would prevent or block the development of high-raise buildings.

IV. RECOMMENDATIONS

After reviewing all written and considering all oral testimonies, the Committee recommend that Bill # 78, be passed to include the following recommendations presented during the public hearing, changes, deletions and addition as:

 That the definition of "who is a farmer" should be clearly addressed and defined. Section 2, II. 1., Public Law #22-64, defined a farmer as follows:

"Bonafide farmer shall mean a person registered with the Department who commercially grows for profit fruits, crops, ornamentals, livestock,

including aquaculture and/or similar products, who furnishes financial records that substantiate a claim to the Department's satisfaction and who is (a) a U.S. Citizen, a permanent resident alien or who has been a resident of Guam for the immediately preceding five (5) years or (b) a corporation or partnership licensed to do business in Guam."

- 2. That the word "farm" be given a clearer definition than just: "Any bonafide agricultural use of land encompassing over one half acre size of land."
- 3. That the Bill does not override any existing laws which governs the use of pesticide or herbicide near populated areas or any other laws which deals with the issue of land.
- 4. To clear up the issue of whether a farmer is required to use over one half acre of land when farming to satisfy the intent of the Bill as mandated by Section #60353, and whether the one half acre be one parcel or an inclusion of many smaller parcels spread out over a larger parcel of land to equal one half acre.

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- 1. What constitute a bonafide agricultural use of land?
- 2. Does the Bill also apply to farming less that one half acre of land?
- 3. If the land is used for farming only during the last year of the two years, does this constitute abandonment as defined in the Bill?
- 4. Does the Bill overrides the proposed "I Tanta Plan"?
- 5. Does farmers who farm very little on the land such as a few coconut trees, small partial of papayas or bananas, are they also covered under this Bill?
- 6. What type of farming or the amount of produce needed to satisfy the intent of the Bill?
- 7. Does the Bill refer to any land in the Territory of Guam or does it refer only to government owned land being used for farming by local farmers?
- 8. How does this Bill affect those private land owners?
 Does the Bill has enforcement power them?

ON BILL 78

MR. CHAIRMAN: As the Government of Guam agency with a primary mission of encouraging and assisting Guam farmer and promoting development of island agriculture, the Department of Agriculture concurs with the spirit of H.R. 78, The Right To Farm Act: to protect farmers from being "squeezed out" of business by encroachment of development by or near their farms.

This is an appropriate time, however, to raise some questions about specifics of the Bill 78 which could cause problems in interpretation and implementation.

Foremost of these is establishing who is a "farmer." Bill 78 alludes to "bonafide agriculture use of land encompassing over one-half acre."

Mr. Chairman, we have a substantial number of people on parcels of this size or larger with a residence in the center ad plantings of various types, often just betelnut or coconut trees in one or two areas or around the periphery. Does Bill 78 include these areas as "farms" or only properties where the area planted is at least one-half acre?

Further, many of these people do not sell what they produce, but consume it themselves or give it away. In a strict sense, they are not farmers, but are gardeners. Bill 78, however, alludes to "traditional agricultural uses" and there is a longestablished Guam tradition of considering non-commercial gardeners as "farmers."

Depending upon the intent of this bill, It could be useful in determining to whom this right is applicable by defining farmer in some context with the filing of income tax Schedule F

A second point is defining the extent of this "right." Does it override other generally applicable laws. For instance, if a densely-populated development is near an animal farm, would public health laws apply? How about restrictions on uses of pesticides and herbicides near populated areas?

Relatedly, Bill 78 clearly intends to protect farmers from encroachment by new development. Would the right to farm extend to blocking a conflicting use, such preventing construction on adjacent property a high-rise building which would block the sun from the area being farmed?

As noted earlier, Mr. Chairman, the Department of Agriculture fully supports efforts to protect and facilitate our farmers and agriculture industry. These questions are raised so any resulting law can be clearer and potential ambiguities and conflicts avoided.

At 0800 hours, February 9, 1995, you requested that I review the following Bills and make an analysis of each:

Bill #22 - An act to add a new Section #62107 to Title 5, GCA, to require the Departments of Education, Correction, Youth Affairs and the Guam Memorial Hospital to make maximum use of fresh local produce and other foodstuffs.

Bill #78 - An Act establishing the right to farm, by adding a new Section #60353 to Chapter 60, Title 5 GCA.

After reviewing the above mentioned Bills, the following analysis are submitted:

Bill #22, the intent of the bill is two fold, one is that the following departments, Department of Education, Department of Corrections, Department of Youth Affairs and the Guam Memorial Hospital are required to procure large quantity of foodstuffs from any available sources to meet their daily operations in feeding people under their care.

Two, Since the Department of Agriculture is primarily the leading agency in promoting the effort to local farmers and to ensure the expansion of the local agricultural and aquacultural industries, market must be established and maintain to ensure that the local farmers have a viable continuing market for their produce.

The proposed Bill mandates the agencies listed above and all other Government of Guam Agencies to procure their needed foodstuff supplies through the Department of Agriculture. At the same time the Bill also mandates the Department of Agriculture to continue to make every effort to ensure that the produce from local farmers are first procured by these Government agencies. The Bill further mandates the Department of Agriculture assist local farmers in negotiating sale prices for their produce in accord with the competition with the commercial importers. The Department of Agriculture must also provide the necessary advice and assistance to ensure that produce are delivered to these agencies fresh and in good condition,

Bill #78, the intent of the Bill primarily is to encourage and protect farming in Guam and to provide safeguard to farmers from being force to relocate or encroachment because of development in the surrounding lands. However, there are some concern over the propose "I Tanota Plan" designating certain portion of land as commercial or residential where there are farmers presently farming the land. The question is, "does this Bill override the propose I Tanota Plan?" I think it does. As cited in the Bill which read:

"No person who is engaged in farming on such land may be forced or be required to stop such farming activities because of changes in the usages of the surrounding lands, nor because of zone changes."

What about the so call farmers who only grew a very small amount of plants such as coconut, bananas, peppers, are they covered under this Bill? It is believe that the Bill should identify the types of farming and the amount of produce harvested during a given period to satisfy the intent of the Bill.

Does the Bill refer to any land in the Territory of Guam? Or does it refer to only government owned land being use for farming by local farmers? How does this Bill apply to privately owned land? The Bill did not specify.

Please note that Section #60353, Chapter 60, Title 5 GCA, as cited in Bill #78 as a new section is erroneous. There is an existing Section #60353, subject title "Assets & Liabilities Transferred".

AN ACT ESTABLISHING THE RIGHT TO FARM, BY ADDING A NEW SECTION 60353 TO CHAPTER 60, TITLE 5 GUAM CODE ANNOTATED.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE TERRITORY OF GUAM:

1	Section 1. The Legislature findings and intent. The Legislature finds that
2	it is necessary to encourage and protect farming in the Territory. One of the concerns
3	expressed by farmers is that they are afraid that they will be slowly squeezed out by the
4	encroachment of development around and in the neighborhood of their farms.
5	Therefore, the Legislature feels that it is important to grandfather in various
6	agricultural activities in order that farmers will not be dislocated because of the
7	development of surrounding lands.
8	Section 2. A new Section 60353 is added to Title 5 of the Guam Code
9	Annotated to read as follows:
10	"Section 60353. Any bonafide agricultural use of land encompassing over one
11	half acre in size shall be deemed a farm for purposes of this section. No person
12	who is engaged in farming on such land may be forced or required to stop such
13	farming activities because of changes in the usages of the surrounding lands, nor
14	because of zoning changes. Therefore:
15	(a) Any farm as defined above shall be deemed a preferred use of the
16	land and, for so long as the land continues in production and continues to be
17	used for agricultural purposes, the said land shall be considered grandfathered as

a farming area not withstanding changes in zoning or changes in the usage and characteristics of the neighborhood in which it is located.

- (b) Any such farm which is grandfathered for agricultural usage may continue to be used in a manner consistent with the traditional agricultural uses of the land in the past.
- (c) If a farm as defined herein has been used for agricultural purposes within the previous two (2) years, there shall be a rebuttable presumption that the usage of the land is continuous and that there has been no abandonment of the farming operations on the land. Anytime the land is not being used for agricultural purposes for two (2) years consecutive, there shall be a rebuttable presumption that there has been an abandonment of the usage of the land for agricultural purposes.
- (d) When land which was previously used for farming is no longer used for farming and the agricultural operations has been abandoned is defined herein, then the land shall be subject to the zoning laws and restrictions on use to the same extent as if it had ever been used for agricultural purposes. It shall not be a basis for the courts to order the cessation of agricultural usage for a farm is defined herein because of inconvenience or discomfort which such usage may cause the neighbors of a joining property, if such usage was originally commenced in a lawful manner.
