

AN ACT TO TASK THE GUAM VISITORS BUREAU TO WORK WITH THE DEPARTMENT OF PARKS AND RECREATION AND THE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS TO DETERMINE THE APPROPRIATE DESIGN AND COST FOR CONSTRUCTION OF VENDOR AND CONCESSIONAIRE HUTS FOR USE AT CERTAIN PARK AREAS, AND TO ADD A NEW §77115.5 TO TITLE 21, GUAM CODE ANNOTATED, RELATIVE TO CONCESSION FACILITY DESIGN.

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#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE TERRITORY OF GUAM:

Section 1. Legislative Findings and Intent. (a) Guam's Territorial Park 2 3 System holds a vital and valuable part of the patrimony and culturally rich and diversified heritage of the people of Guam. The natural and historic 4 5 endowment of Guam's main parks and historic sites serve as a major growing attraction for island residents and our growing number of visitors. 6 7 Each year, visitors numbering in the hundreds of thousands traverse our 8 parks to share our cultural history and enjoy our island's beauty. The expanding use of our parks and historic sites makes their permanent 9 preservation and protection, as well as the refined presentation and 10 11 projected image of their distinct natural, scenic, and historic qualities, of 12 utmost importance. The Legislature not only recognizes the need to keep the 13 parks and historic sites clean and well maintained, but also the need to keep 14 them beautiful and attractive.

(b) At present, the Director of the Department of Parks and Recreation (DPR) issues permits to vendors and concessionaires under the authority of Public Law 12-209, and enforces rules and regulations governing their activities including the size and set up of canopies. The Legislature finds that the prevailing use of portable canopies detract from the aesthetic and cultural characteristics of the parks and historic sites and should be replaced with well designed facilities with traditional and harmonious features.

(c) It is therefore the intent of this Act to task the Guam Visitors Bureau
(GVB) with determining the appropriate design of concession facilities; to
work with DPR to determine the number and sites of such facilities; and to
work with the Department of Public Works (DPW) to determine the

construction costs; and to report their collective findings to the Legislature for
 appropriate action.

3 Section 2. A new §77115.5 is added to Title 21, Guam Code Annotated,
4 to read:

"§77115.5. Concession Facility Design. The Guam Visitors Bureau 5 6 (GVB), and the Department of Public Works (DPW), are hereby tasked to work with the Department to determine the appropriate design, quantity, 7 locations and construction costs of permanent concession facilities for public 8 9 parks and historic sites in place of canopies presently being used by vendors. 10 The three entities shall work in close cooperation to insure that the final 11 product will be esthetically pleasing to both residents and visitors. The design 12 of the facilities should take into account the following:

13 (a) Reasonable cost for construction;

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- 14 (b) Thematic relationship, whenever feasible, to the park or15 historic site upon which the facility is to be located;
- 16 (c) Utilization of standardized basic designs; and
- (d) Basic structures must be resistant to Guam's tropical
  weather conditions, except that decorative or culturally
  appropriate finishing materials, which may or may not be
  resistant to Guam's tropical weather, may be used to achieve a
  desired thematic effect."

Section 3. Effective Date and Reporting Requirement. The provisions herein shall become operative upon the effective date of this Act. GVB, DPR, and DPW shall jointly report their findings to the Legislature's Committee on Tourism & Transportation within 180 days of the effective date of this Act.

Guam's Territorial Park System holds a vital and valuable part of 3 (a). the patrimony and culturally rich and diversified heritage of the people of 4 Guam. The natural and historic endowment of Guam's main parks and 5 6 historic sites serve as a major growing attraction for island residents and our 7 growing number of visitors. Each year, visitors numbering in the hundreds of thousands, traverse our parks to share our cultural history and enjoy our 8 9 island's beauty. The expanding use of our parks and historic sites makes their 10 permanent preservation and protection, as well as the refined presentation and projected image of their distinct natural, scenic and historic qualities, of 11 utmost importance. 1 (b). Synopsis of testimony:

DPR Director Shelton suggested some language changes for Bill 328 which would clear up possible inconsistencies and grey areas, including material to be used to construct the huts, and whether a standard design should be used. DPW Director Shinohara concurred with the need for amendments to the language of the bill. GVB General Manager Nelson said GVB was ready to assume responsibility to design the huts. DFS President Perez wrote in favor of the bill and recommended it be enacted into law as soon as possible.

Sen. Brown noted that her intent in the bill was to have the huts reflect the cultural and natural esthetics of the specific parks, but that did not preclude standardizing the general design.

Sen. Aguon asked Director Shelton if he supported the idea of the revised vendor fees being placed into a fund that would maintain the parks and vendor huts.

There being no other testimony, Bill 328 was declared publicly heard and the hearing was adjourned.

#### COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION

The Committee on Tourism & Transportation recommends that Bill 328 be amended to address the concerns expressed in the public hearing regarding hut construction and design.

The Committee further recommends that Bill 328, as amended, be reported out with the recommendation to do pass.

Dear Mr. Chairman and Committee Members:

Thank you for offering the Department of Parks and Recreation the opportunity to comment and provide input to your committee on Bill No. 328.

As written, Bill No. 328 seeks to address and improve the aesthetic appearance of Guam's Park Areas which is a concern the Department shares with this body. The legislative finding of the prevailing use of portable structures currently in use certainly detracts from the natural beauty of our parks and in fact creates the appearance of nomadic settlements in some of our most scenic sites. As such the Department certainly concurs with the intent of Bill No. 328.

For the record however, it should be noted that some contradictory language may exist in the original version and we would urge this committee to consider some amendments in a final version prior to passage.

- 1. The bill states that the present "portable canopies" should be replaced by "semi-permanent" huts which would be able to "endure weather conditions normally expected on Guam." Considering our island's normal "weather conditions", any structure of less than a permanent construction method of steel or concrete could not easily "endure". As this bill envisions some appropriation legislation at a future date, I'm sure we'd all agree that such investment of funds not be subject to destruction in the next typhoon. In this vein, the proposed design should be for "PERMANENT" structures.
- 2. The reference to "semi-artificial" huts we feel is included so that the design has the appearance of a structure of prehistoric or Spanish-era times but the term may prove confusing at the design stage. Perhaps more concise and specific language may be in order here.


- 3. The reference to "the final product" being "in line with the cultural and natural settings of EACH park and historic site" may preclude the designated entities from being able to achieve a standard or uniform design and could result in two or more designs causing additional design costs.
- 4. On the subject of cost, since the Department has no engineering staff on board, such cost may very well fall to DPW to bear and we would defer to them for comment in this regard.

As a recommendation, perhaps the measure could call for a design or drawing contest among the schools of Guam to compete for the most pleasing and functional designs. Such a contest would insure the public's input, particularly that of our younger generations, in the design process.

Additionally, the Department would assume that the legislation envisions an implied commitment of budgetary support to the Department for the upkeep and maintenance of the expanded facilities that will come as a result of this bill.

The department eagerly anticipates the enactment of this legislation and will provide its full cooperation in accordance with its responsibilities.

**Hafa Adai!** On behalf of the Guam Visitors Bureau, we are pleased to submit testimony on Bill No. 328, "An Act to Add a New Section 77115.5 of Title 21 Guam Code Annotated Relative to Task the Guam Visitors Bureau to Work with the Department of Parks and Recreation and the Department of Public Works to Determine the Appropriate Design and Cost for Construction of Concessionaire and Vendor Huts for Use at Certain Park Areas."

Notwithstanding objections from any relevant parties, the Guam Visitors Bureau stands ready today to take on the assignment for appropriate design of the concessionaire and vendor huts. Section 1. Legislative Findings and Intent. a. Guam's Territorial 4 5 Park System holds a vital and valuable part of the patrimony and culturally rich and diversified heritage of the people of Guam. The natural and historic 6 endowment of Guam's main parks serve as a major growing attraction for island 7 residents and our growing number of visitors. Each year, visitors numbering in 8 9 the hundreds of thousands, traverse our parks to share our cultural history and enjoy our island's beauty.
