Section 1. Legislative Findings. The Legislature finds that previous studies have indicated that the Territory of Guam has great potential in the field of Aquaculture. In addition to providing for local farmers and the local markets, there is the market of islands within the Western Pacific Region that we may be able to expand to.

In 1985, the government of Guam took over the Guam Aqua Research Incorporated and changed the name to the Guam Aquaculture Development and Training Center (GADTC). Since then, the Department of Commerce has supervised the operations of the GADTC, which today provides seedlings of shrimp and a variety of fish to local farmers. Furthermore, the GADTC consists of an indoor hatchery, a broodstock maturation room, a phytoplankton laboratory, a feed preparation room, living quarters, and an office. The outdoor facilities include seven (7) concrete raceways, six (6) cement ponds, and thirty (30) 1-metric ton tanks.

Section 2. A new Section 47065 is added to the Government Code of Guam to read as follows:

"Section 47065. Creation of the Guam Aquaculture Development and Training Center Revolving Fund. There is hereby created the Guam Aquaculture Development and Training Center Revolving Fund. This Fund shall be used exclusively for the administration, operation, maintenance and improvement of the Guam Aquaculture Development and Training Center. The Guam Aquaculture Development and Training Center Revolving Fund shall be maintained separate and apart from any other funds of the government of Guam. Independent records and accounts shall be maintained in connection therewith. All revenues received from the gross sales by the

I. BACKGROUND

Senator Joe T. San Agustin, Chairman for the Committee on Economic-Agricultural Development and Insurance conducted a public hearing on Bill #102, at 7:00 P.M., February 29, 1995, at the Mangilao Community Center.

II. SUMMARY OF TESTIMONY

TESTIMONY was offered and submitted by the following:

Frank Aguon Department of Commerce Vic Taisapic Aquaculture farmer Department of Commerce Gilbert E. Roblez GEDA

MR. VIC TAISAPIC, provided an oral testimony which was directed primarily on Bill #1, and did not testify on Bill #102, however, indicated he supports the Bill.

SENATOR SUNNY L. ORSINI, responded that in respect to Bill #102, it is imperative that the legislature establish a capital outlay revolving fund within Guam Aquacultural Development Training Center (GADTC). It would give the Department of Commerce a greater flexibility, right now as it stands if GADTC were to purchase essential equipment and resources to run the operation, it would have to go through a very bureaucratic, very cumbersome process. With respect to aquaculture, it is essential that there is money on hand and he believe that it is stepping on the right direction to push Bill #102 and ask the Committee for their support on the Bill.

MR. FRANK B. AGUON, provided a written testimony and made an oral presentation that the Department of Commerce supports Bill #102. He stated that the Department has been tasked with the responsibility of developing a viable aquaculture industry on Guam through Executive Order #88-23. In order to carry out these responsibilities, it is necessary that the legislature assist in creating a Guam Aguaculture Development Training Center (GADTC) Revolving Fund. The purpose of the revolving fund is to facilitate the deposit of funds from proceeds of service fees such as sale of seedstock, sale of stock for test marketing and facility fees collected through These proceeds are to be maintained in a separate account to be utilized in payment of debts, liabilities and obligations in connection with the operation, maintenance and GADTC's facility renovation. This would allow the use of funds generated through GADTC without having to be deposited in the government general funds and it will be in compliance with existing Rules and Regulations governing revolving funds. Mr. Aguon further stated that the revolving fund would allow for improve operational efficiency of GADTC through the purchase of goods and services in a timely manner. He continued that it is essential for the

maintenance and culture of live aquatic species, that goods and services such as feeds, repair of life support system are provided without delays. The normal GSA requisition and purchase order process does not meet these requirements. With the maintenance of live aquatic species, it is critical to have the flexibility to respond quickly to emergencies which require the purchase of parts, materials or supplies that are immediately needed to resolve the emergency situation. In addition, some transactions in carrying out GADTC's projects and programs requires the use of cash or check as payments. For example, the shipping of marine shrimp seedstock to Hawaii or the U.S. Mainland, the air cargo costs must be paid at the time of shipment in cash or check. Therefore, the establishment of the GADTC Revolving Fund with the flexibility to write checks or use cash will greatly facilitate GADTC's operation.

SENATOR MARK CHARFAUROS, comments were directed to Bill #1 and sympathize with Mr. Taisapic in his effort to trying to obtain a permit to establish an aquaculture farm. He supports Bill #102.

SENATOR LOU LEON GUERRERO, applaud Mr. Taisapic's effort and commented on his sacrifices and determination in his attempts to obtain a permit to establish an aquaculture farm. She also indicated that she supports Bill #102.

SENATOR SAN AGUSTIN, stated that there was a discussion about GEDA sponsoring a \$54,000.00 - \$55,000.00 of experimental project and was given to the University of Guam. He would like to know what is the rational for spending over #270,000.00 for the Department of Commerce for this particular aquaculture training center at Fadian. Why was the experiment directed towards that group and was it a species or is it cultivation experimentation?

MR. GILBLERT ROBLES, responded that the rational was the system itself, the type of system that UOG is trying to develop at this time. It is a system that the average homeowner can put together in his backyard and use to grow any kind of species of aquaculture.

SENATOR SAN AGUSTIN, asked if that particular environment is not available at the Fadian facility. Mr. Roblez, responded that he does not believe that the kind of system that UOG is experimenting with is available at Fadian.

SENATOR SAN AGUSTIN further question whether GEDA conducted an investigation to find out if the ponding type and a tank farm approach is available at the Fadian Facility. Mr. Bill Fitzgerald answered that these system are available, but the system that GEDA was supporting was basically a close system and the system at Fadian is an open system but can be

modified to serve as a close system to facilitate the backyard aquaculture farmers.

Mr. Frank Aguon through his letter to Senator Orsini requested that the following languages as originally cited in the title and Section 2 of the Bill be changed:

- 1. To eliminate the words "capital outlay" from the proposed legislation.
- 2. To change the wording regarding the use of the fund to read, "shall be used exclusively for the administration, operation, maintenance and improvement of the Guam Aquaculture Development and Training Center."
- 3. The following language be include in Section 2 of the Bill: "Guam Aquaculture Development and Training Center Revolving Fund shall be maintained separate and apart from any other funds of the Government of Guam. Independent records and accounts shall be maintained in connection therewith."

III. FINDINGS:

After hearing all the testimonies presented, questions and comments by the Committee Members, the Committee finds that the following issues are important and should be considered.

- 1. The Department of Commerce has been tasked with the responsibility of developing a viable aquaculture industry on Guam through Executive Order #88-23.
- 2. The purpose for the revolving fund is to facilitate the deposit of funds from proceeds of service fees and to maintain a separate account to be utilized in payment of debts, liabilities and obligations in connection with the operation, maintenance and GADTC'S facility renovation.
- 3. It is necessary that changes be made on the title of the Bill and make an addition in Section 2 of the Bill to satisfy the intended action of the Bill.
- 4. The revolving fund would give the Department of Commerce a greater flexibility to purchase essential equipment and resources for an efficient aquaculture training center operation.
- 5. Presently all purchases made or anuy use of funds must first go through the government bureaucratic

channels which would be detrimental for the survival of marine life in the event of an emergency.

6. Payments for shipment of marine seedstocks to Hawaii, U.S. Mainland or other destination outside of the Guam must be made in cash or check at the time of shipment.

IV. RECOMMENDATIONS

After reviewing all the facts and testimonies presented during the public hearing, the Committee finds it necessary to make some changes in the title and the languages of the Bill and to incorporate important issues brought about by the general public. Therefore, the Committee recommends the following:

That the title of the Bill be change to read as follows:

AN ACT TO CREATE A GUAM AQUACULTURE DEVELOPMENT AND TRAINING CENTER REVOLVING FUND WITHIN THE GUAM DEPARTMENT OF COMMERCE FOR THE PURPOSE OF PURCHASING ESSENTIAL EQUIPMENT, MATERIALS AND SUPPLIES FOR THE GUAM AQUACULTURE DEVELOPMENT AND TRAINING CENTER."

2. That Section 2, of the Bill be changed as follows:

After the word created, add the following:

"the Guam Aquaculture Development and Training Center Revolving Fund. This fund shall be used exclusively for the administration, operation, maintenance and improvement of the Guam Aquaculture Development and Training Center. The Guam Aquaculture Development and Training Center Revolving Fund shall be maintained separate and apart from any other funds of the Government of Guam. Dear Senator Orsini:

I want to thank you again for your initiative in drafting Bill No. 102 to establish the Guam Aquaculture Development and Training Center Revolving Fund. Further to my testimony in support of the legislation, there are some changes to the bill that I would suggest to strengthen the bill and usefulness of the Fund. These are as follows:

- The elimination of "capitol outlay" from the proposed legislation, since capital outlay is narrowly interpreted in the Government of Guam budgetary terms as applying to "equipment costing \$250 or more..." This would legally be interpreted in narrow terms and unduly restrict the use of the Fund.
- A change in wording regarding the use of the Fund. The new wording would state that it "shall be used exclusively for the administration, operation, maintenance and improvement of the Guam Aquaculture Development and Training Center." This is preferential to the current wording of "to purchase essential equipments, materials and supplies for the Guam Aquaculture Development and Training Center." The reason for this is that the preferred wording allows broader flexibility in the use of the funds to carry out the GADTC program. Furthermore, the ultimate goal of GADTC is to become self-sufficient in generating its funding through sales for the operational costs. Therefore, the fund has to have the flexibility to cover all aspects of GADTC's operations. This broader terminology was used in Bill No. 513 from the 22nd Legislature.
- Wording should be included as follows: "Guam Aquaculture Development and Training Center Revolving Fund shall be maintained separate and apart from any other funds of the Government of Guam. Independent records and accounts shall be maintained in connection therewith." This assures that the Fund is maintained separately and a bank account can be established to facilitate the writing of checks. Our Chamorro Village Revolving Fund

currently operates under this preferential structure. This is critical to the usage of the Revolving Fund, since the purchase of supplies and equipment without the delays (often months) associated with the processing of purchase orders through GSA sharply which would limit the usefulness of the Revolving Fund.

Your support of the aquaculture industry and the Department's efforts to develop the industry is greatly appreciated. If you have questions regarding the above recommendations on Bill No. 102, please do not hesitate to contact me or Bill FitzGerald of my staff. TESTIMONY REGARDING BILL 102

AN ACT TO ESTABLISH A CAPITAL OUTLAY REVOLVING FUND WITHIN THE GUAM DEPARTMENT OF COMMERCE FOR THE PURPOSE OF PURCHASING ESSENTIAL EQUIPMENTS, MATERIALS AND SUPPLIES FOR THE GUAM AQUACULTURE DEVELOPMENT AND TRAINING CENTER

Good evening, Mr. Chairman and distinguished members of the Committee.

My name is Frank B. Aguon, Jr. I am the Acting Director of Commerce and I am
here to testify in favor of Bill 102.

The Department of Commerce fully supports Bill No. 102 which creates the Guam Aquaculture Development and Training Center Revolving Fund. This is a responsibility that the Department has been tasked with through Executive Order 88-23. The legislation will assist the Department in carrying out the responsibilities of developing a viable aquaculture industry for Guam.

The purpose of the Revolving Fund is to facilitate the deposit of funds from proceeds of service fees (e.g., sale of seedstock, sale of stock for test marketing, facility fee, etc.) collected through GADTC. These proceeds are maintained in a separate account to be utilized in payment of debts, liabilities and obligations in connection with the operation, maintenance and renovation of the GADTC facility.



This allows the use of funds generated through the operation of GADTC to be directly utilized by GADTC without being deposited in the government general fund. Standard operating procedures would be followed in compliance with government rules and regulations concerning revolving funds.

The Revolving Fund would allow for improved operational efficiency of GADTC through the purchase of goods and services in a timely manner. It is essential, with the maintenance and culture of live aquatic animals, that goods and services (e.g., feed, repair of life support systems) are provided without delays. Unfortunately, the normal GSA requisition/purchase order process does not meet this need. In addition, one of the long-term goals is to strive toward self sufficiency in operating costs. This is tied to the expansion of the commercial aquaculture sector. As the commercial sector grows, GADTC will be able to generate increased revenue which would be utilized to defray operational costs.

With the maintaining of live aquatic animals, it is critical to have the flexibility to respond quickly to emergencies which require the purchase of parts, materials or supplies that are immediately needed to resolve the emergency situation. In addition, some transactions in carrying out projects and programs of GADTC requires the use of cash or checks as payment. For example, in the shipping of marine shrimp seedstock to Hawaii or the U.S. mainland, the air cargo costs must be paid at the time of shipment and in cash or by check. Therefore, the establishment of the GADTC Revolving Fund with the flexibility of establishing a bank account with the ability to write checks against it will greatly facilitate the operations at GADTC.

In summary, Bill No. 102 reaffirms through legislation the role and functions that the Department of Commerce has been fulfilling. Specifically, the GADTC Revolving Fund will add the necessary flexibility to carry out the daily functions and emergency needs of GADTC in fulfilling its goals. The Department, with the assistance of this legislation, will continue to aggressively support the development of the commercial aquaculture industry on Guam.

I would like to thank the Committee for the opportunity to testify before you today. If you have questions regarding this testimony, I would be pleased to answer them.

AN ACT TO ESTABLISH A CAPITOL OUTLAY REVOLVING FUND WITHIN THE GUAM DEPARTMENT OF COMMERCE FOR THE PURPOSE OF PURCHASING ESSENTIAL EQUIPMENTS, MATERIALS AND SUPPLIES FOR THE GUAM AQUACULTURE DEVELOPMENT AND TRAINING CENTER.

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Section 1. Legislative Findings. The Legislature finds that previous studies have indicated that the Territory of Guam has great potential in the field of aquaculture. In addition to providing for local farmers and the local markets, there is the market of islands within the Western Pacific Region that we may be able to expand to.

In 1985, the Government of Guam took over the Guam Aqua Research Incorporated and changed the name to the Guam Aquaculture Development and Training Center (GADTC). Since then, the Department of Commerce has supervised the operations of the Center, which today provides seedlings of shrimp and a variety of fish to local farmers. Furthermore, the GADTC consist of an indoor hatchery, a broodstock, maturation room, a phytoplankton laboratory, a feed preparation room, living quarters and an office. The outdoor facilities include 7 concrete raceways, 6 cement ponds and thirty 1-metric ton tanks.

Section 2.Creation of a Capitol Outlay Revolving Fund. There is hereby created the Department of Commerce Capitol Outlay Revolving Fund to purchase essential equipments, materials and supplies for the Guam Aquaculture Development and Training Center. All revenues received from the gross sales of the Center shall be deposited into this Fund. Such Fund shall be under the control of the Guam Department of Commerce for the GADTC.
