"Section 1121.1. Budgetary Ceiling Guam Legislature. Effective with the beginning of the next fiscal year, the total budget of the Guam Legislature shall at no time exceed two and one-half percent (2.5%) of the total Government of Guam revenue projections set for the same fiscal year, as enacted into law in the government of Guam Budget Act for that fiscal year. The

Legislature, or any other body designated by law, must set a revenue projection for the government of Guam in the annual Government of Guam Budget Act."

Substitute Bill No. 221. AN ACT TO PUT A PROPOSAL BEFORE THE PEOPLE OF GUAM AS AN INITIATIVE MEASURE RELATIVE TO ESTABLISHING A BUDGETARY CEILING FOR THE GUAM LEGISLATURE'S ANNUAL BUDGET.

PREFACE

The Committee on Rules convened at 10:00 a.m. Thursday, March 9, 1995 in the Legislature's Public Hearing Room in Agana, Guam.

Alongside Chairman Sonny Lujan Orsini was Senator Anthony C. Blaz, F.P. Camacho, and A.R. Unpingco

<u>OVERVIEW</u>

The Government of Guam is made up of three separate but equal branches. These branches of Government are namely, the Executive Branch, Legislative Branch and the Judicial Branch. The Legislative Branch is made up of twenty-one members, elected by the people every other year.

The Legislature in accordance with the Organic Act of Guam is the policy-making body of the Government of Guam.

Bill 221 proposes to place an initiative before the people of Guam in the next election, be it Special, Primary or General Election.

The initiative proposes to establish a cap of 2.5% of the projected revenues for the Legislative Budget for the same fiscal year. The 2.5% cap would include the cost of the operations of each Senatorial Office, each Standing Committee and the Central Operations within the Legislature.

COMMITTEE FINDINGS

The subject matter contained in Substitute Bill 221 was previously included in Bill 31. However, due to a ruling by the Speaker that Bill 31 contained five separate issue in-

germane to each other, Senator Mark Forbes made a motion to remove the section relative to the establishment of a Legislative Budget cap. (Attachment I)

Senator Mark Forbes testified before the Committee in support of returning the power to govern back to the people.

Senator Anthony Blaz expressed his support of the contents of Bill 221 and emphasized that passage of Bill 221 would empower the people to decide on important policies of the Territory.

Senator Orsini expressed his support of Bill 221 and then concluded the meeting.

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION

In light of the strong voice expressed during the initiative drive and by the number of signatures received during the circulation of the initiatives, the Committee on Rules wishes to report out Substitute Bill 221 with the recommendation to **do PASS**.

FOOTNOTES: 1/ Bill No. 221 does not provide a General Fund appropriation measure for the Election Commission. However, to include any number of initiative measures under one (1) ballot at the next special or general election, whichever is sooner, is estimated to cost \$50,000. Additionally, the Bill poses a positive fiscal impact on the General Fund through limitation of the Legislature's total budget not to exceed 2.5% of the total Government of Guam revenue projections per the Guam Budget Act for that year or a budget reduction of \$5.8 from FY95 to FY96 inclusive of lump sum and based on the FY96 revenue estimate of \$540 Million.

It is noted that presently, the General Fund appropriation level totals \$545 million and the FY 1995 revenue forecast is \$527 million resulting in an \$18 million deficiency for Fiscal Year 1995.

AN ACT TO PUT A LEGISLATIVE REFORM PROPOSAL CONCERNING A LEGISLATIVE BUDGETARY CEILING BEFORE THE PEOPLE OF GUAM AS AN INITIATIVE MEASURE.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE TERRITORY OF GUAM:

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6 7 Section 1. Legislative Intent. The Legislature intends that the electorate be given the opportunity to vote on the issue set forth herein. The Legislature further finds that action either by the Legislature or the Governor would be required to hold a special election on this matter and, therefore, calls for such a special election to be held so that the electorate may act on this matter expeditiously.

8 9 Section 2. The initiative measure indicated below shall be put before the voters at the next special or general election, whichever is sooner.

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13 14 Section 3. For purposes of this election, a majority of the valid votes cast thereon shall be necessary for the approval and enactment into law of the initiative measure placed before electorate pursuant to this act. The term valid votes cast thereon shall include all votes cast in favor or against the proposal but shall not include blank, spoiled, or invalid ballots cast.

Section 4. The initiative measure placed on the ballot pursuant to this act shall 1 2 be treated as an initiative measure which has been duly presented to the Election 3 Commission with the necessary signatures on petitions for placement on the ballot, 4 pursuant to 3 Guam Code Annotated 17201. Article 2 of chapter 17 of Title 3 shall 5 apply to such initiative measure to the extent not inconsistent with this act. 6 Section 5. Initiative measure to restrict legislative budget to 2.5% of total 7 revenue projections. Effective October 1. 1995, the Total budget of the budget of the Guam Legislature shall at no time exceed two 16 17 and one-half percent (2.5%) of the total Government of Guam revenue projections set for 18 the same fiscal year, as enacted into law in the Government of Guam Budget Act for that 19 fiscal year. The Legislature, or any other body designated by law, must set a revenue 20 projection for the Government of Guam in the annual Government of Guam Budget Act."
