Enclosed please find a copy of Bill No. 7 (LS), "AN ACT TO REPEAL AND REENACT §3305 OF TITLE 16 OF THE GUAM CODE ANNOTATED, RELATIVE TO MOTORCYCLE SAFETY HELMETS AND TO ADD A NEW §3306 OF TITLE 16 GUAM CODE ANNOTATED, RELATIVE TO THE SALE OF SAFETY HELMETS", which I have **signed** into law today as **Public Law No. 24-02.** 

In 1995, the National Highway System Designation Act was signed into law; that federal law de-links the receipt of federal funds from the enactment by states and territories of mandatory helmet laws and mandatory minimum speed limits.

There have been many studies conducted over the years on motorcycle safety. Although motorcycles have a fairly high rate of accidents, the use of helmets is not a conclusive factor in significantly reducing accidents. Young, inexperienced riders are more at risk for accidents than older riders, and many accidents have been shown to involve the use of alcohol or drugs. The use of helmets is not as conclusive for predicting accidents as is participation in a motorcycle safety training program. A safety training program has been shown to have good results in reducing accidents.

At this time, 3 states do not have any helmet law; 25 states require a helmet to be worn; 21 states require riders under a certain age to wear helmets; one state requires underage passengers, learners, and novice riders to wear helmets. Many states require riders to wear eye protection, as wind in the eyes causes decreased vision. Many states also require

headlights to be used in the daytime, to assist other vehicles in seeing motorcyclists.

At this time, I urge the legislature and the community to look into designing and implementing safety training programs for motorcyclists, particularly to assist new riders. I also urge the use of eye protection and headlights during the daytime.

AN ACT TO REPEAL AND REENACT §3305 OF TITLE 16 OF THE GUAM CODE ANNOTATED, RELATIVE TO MOTORCYCLE SAFETY HELMETS, AND TO ADD A NEW §3306 TO TITLE 16 OF THE

# GUAM CODE ANNOTATED, RELATIVE TO THE SALE OF SAFETY HELMETS.

1	BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE TERRITORY OF GUAM:
2	Section 1. Legislative Intent. The Guam Legislature finds that the Federal
3	Government has relaxed national mandates across the nation, pursuant to the
4	National Highway System Designation Act of 1995, allowing states and territories to
5	determine highway requirements and safety standards without penalty or loss of
6	Federal highway funding.
7	Section 2. Title 16 Guam Code Annotated §3305 is repealed and reenacted to
8	read:
9	"§3305. Mandatory Safety Helmets. Any driver under eighteen (18)
10	years of age and any passenger under eighteen (18) years of age shall wear a
11	safety helmet, of a type approved by the Department of Revenue and Taxation,
12	when riding on a motorcycle, including a bicycle equipped with a motor.
13	Anyone who violates this section shall be subject to a fine of not less than Fifty
14	Dollars (\$50.00) and not more than Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00)."
15	Section 3. A new Title 16 Guam Code Annotated §3306 is added to read:
16	"§3306. Sale of Safety Helmets. No person shall sell or offer for sale for
17	use by an operator or passenger of a motorcycle, or bicycle equipped with a
18	motor, a helmet which is not of a type meeting the requirements established by
19	the Department of Revenue & Taxation. Anyone who violates this Section shall
20	be guilty of a petty misdemeanor."
