Enclosed please find a copy of Bill No. 240 (LS), "AN ACT TO ADD A NEW SUBSECTION (n) TO §34.70 OF CHAPTER 34 OF TITLE 9 OF THE GUAM CODE ANNOTATED, RELATIVE TO THE MANDATORY REVOCATION OF A LICENSE OR INSTRUCTION PERMIT OF ANY DRIVER AS A PENALTY FOR THE DEFACEMENT OF PROPERTY.", which I have signed into law today as Public Law No. 24-113.

This legislation amends the current penalties for vandalism and defacement of property -- graffiti. Bill 240 sends a clear, unmistakable message to those who still do not appreciate our community's displeasure at the proliferation of graffiti on our island.

Our Administration will vigorously enforce this new provision. I commend the bill's sponsor, Senator Ben Pangelinan, for recognizing the deterrent that a driver's license revocation for defacement of property will have, especially on a young person. We will promote this new information in our island's schools and throughout our community. More importantly, through the Department of Public Works, the Department of Parks and Recreation, and the Department of Youth Affairs, we will expand the current efforts to eradicate graffiti by focusing new resources on this problem in our community.

Graffiti is a symptom of a breakdown in values, and a lack of respect for our island. A recent television report showed young people rationalizing

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their graffiti-defacing actions as some form of new artwork. This is not "art". Artists do not do their best work in the middle of the night on someone else's property.

We have found that graffiti is many times perpetrated by gang members, and it must be dealt with as a symptom of lawlessness. I am especially disturbed by the lack of respect that is reflected by those who would "tag" the Archbishop Flores Memorial in Tamuning or the statue of Pope John Paul II in the heart of Agana-- what does it mean for our community when a criminal element will deface some of our most revered public figures?

To Guam's young people, I say: Some of you may find graffiti amusing, but, believe me, our community stopped laughing a long, long time ago. We are all tired of it. I call on the many young people who are equally offended by the defacement of our home to help us combat this menace. You, the youth, can exert peer pressure to counter this scourge. Let's spread the message that graffiti is offensive to all of us. Let's work together to clean it up. And let's help each other enforce the laws to deal with those few who are responsible for tens of thousands of dollars of damage to our island.

## PENALTY FOR THE DEFACEMENT OF PROPERTY.

1	BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF GUAM:
2	Section 1. Legislative Findings and Intent. The members of the Guam
3	Legislature recognize the necessity and significance of preserving our culture
4	to benefit and enrich the future generations of our Island. Further, it is of
5	considerable importance that our environment and its physical attributes be
6	defended and supported against the presence of vandalism and the
7	defacement of property.
8	Alarming statistics from the Guam Police Department find that there
9	were 2,336 cases of vandalism reported in 1996. Of the reported 1996 cases of
10	vandalism and defacement of property, Guam's public and private schools
11	have also fallen victim to one hundred seventeen (117) of those cases.
12	Thousands of dollars are spent annually to recover from the damages
13	resulting from graffiti. It is therefore the intent of the Guam Legislature to
14	enact stricter penalties for individuals involved in vandalism and the
15	defacement of property.
16	Section 2. A new Subsection (n) is hereby added to §34.70 of Chapter 34
17	of Title 9 of the Guam Code Annotated to read as follows:
18	"(n) In addition to any punishment ordered under Subsection (f),
19	(g), (h), (i) and (j), the court shall immediately, upon conviction of an
20	offender charged with the defacement of property, revoke the license or
21	instruction permit of any driver in violation of this Section subject to a
22	period of time described hereafter:
23	(a) after one (1) conviction, three (3) months;
24	(b) after a second or subsequent conviction, six (6) months

for each conviction.

Any person who was convicted of any offense as described in this Act upon being eligible to receive a license or instruction permit, shall not be eligible to receive a license or instruction permit until the entire penalty period has elapsed.

Any prior convictions resulting in the revocation of a driver's license or instruction permit shall not run concurrently with any existing or subsequent suspension, revocation, cancellation or denial which is provided for by law."

Section 3. Effective Date. This Subsection shall take effect thirty (30) days after enactment into law. The Department of Revenue and Taxation, the Department of Education, the Department of Youth Affairs, the Department of Parks and Recreation, the Department of Public Works and other agencies that may be affected, shall develop and implement, a public education campaign to promote this new provision.

#### **Committee Report**

BIII No. 240: AN ACT TO ADD SUBSECTION (N) TO TITILE 9 GCA §34.70 RELATIVE TO THE MANDATORY REVOCATION OF A LICENSE OR INSTRUCTION PERMIT OF ANY DRIVER AS PENALTY FOR THE DEFACEMENT OF PROPERTY.

#### Overview

The Committee on Judiciary, Public Safety and Consumer Protection held a public hearing on Thursday, June 19, 1997 at 9:30 a.m. on Bill No. 275. at the Legislative public hearing room. Public Notice was announced in the June 13, 15 & 19, 1997 issues of the Pacific Daily News.

#### Committee Members Present:

#### Providing Public Testimony on the Bill:

Joseph T. Duenas, oral/written (Attachment "A") Margaret E. Bean, written (Attachment "B") Joseph P. Mafnas, written (Attachment "C")

#### Purpose.

The stated purpose of the bill is to address the alarming increase in cases of vandalism and defacement of property by mandating the revocation of the driver's license or instruction permit of any person convicted of certain offenses under the anti-graffiti laws in 9 GCA Chapter 34.

#### Relationship to Existing Law:

<u>Section 2</u> adds a Subsection (n) to 9 GCA 34.70 to provide that the court shall immediately, upon the conviction of an offender or receipt of record showing



that the offender has committed a defacement of property, revoke the license or permit for:

- (1) after one conviction, three months;
- (2) after a second or subsequent conviction, six months for each conviction.

Any previous revocations shall not run concurrently with any existing or subsequent suspension, revocation, cancellation or denial provided by law.

#### II. Summary of Testimony

## MR. JOSEPH T. DUENAS, DIRECTOR DEPARTMENT OF REVENUE AND TAXATION

Mr. Duenas, Director of the Department of Revenue and Taxation, testified that he supported the concept of Bill 240; however, he was concerned about enforcing the provisions contained in the Bill. Mr. Duenas questioned the notification process and appropriations to fund the program. Mr. Duenas stated that more work needs to go into how the program will be administered, he offered his Department's assistance in fine tuning the Bill.

## MS. MARGARET E. BEAN, DEPUTY, FAMILY DIVISION DEPARTMENT OF LAW

Ms. Bean submitted testimony that she did not believe that the Bill was effective in deterring or punishing people for defacement of property. Ms. Bean's testimony indicates that it has been her experience that restitution including the painting of walls is a more effective deterrent. Finally, Ms. Bean's testimony indicated that she believes that there is no correlation between licensing people to drive and defacing property.

## MR. JOSEPH P. MAFNAS, CHIEF OF POLICE (ACTING) GUAM POLICE DEPARTMENT

Mr. Mafnas submitted written testimony supporting the intent of the Bill. Mr. Mafnas' testimony indictaed that the Legislature should consider increasing the fines associated with the offense in question.

#### SENATOR EDWARDO CRUZ

Senator Cruz stated that the enforcement of the provisions of Bill 240 would entail the Guam Police Department's involvement with the program. Senator Cruz further expressed that he felt that more officers were needed on the streets.



#### **SENATOR VICENTE PANGELINAN**

Senator Pangelinan stated that this Bill would work the same way that a drunk driver's license is revoked, based on a conviction and court order.

#### III. Findings and recommendations

The Committee on Judiciary, Public Safety and Consumer Protection finds support for the passage of Bill No.240 as amended. The Committee on Judiciary, Public Safety and Consumer Protection presents its findings with the recommendation **TO DO PASS** Bill No. 240 as amended.

Dear Senator Barrett-Anderson:

My name is Joseph T. Duenas. I am the Director of the Department of Revenue and Taxation. I want to thank you for the opportunity to comment on Bill 240.

Surely no one questions that the island must find new and innovative ways to address the graffiti and vandalism problems and its effect on our island. There have been attempts by this august forum to address this issue in the immediate past. Various civic groups and non-profit organizations have attempted to rid our community of graffiti and limit vandalism. These actions, although laudable, have not seemed to limit or prevent this activity.

Statistics prepared by the Guam Police Department indicate that youth and our young citizens seem to be in the forefront of this problem. The community is frustrated and continually calls for stricter penalties. However, I am not sure punitive measures by themselves will adequately address this problem. There is no one solution to this problem but the proposed legislation may be a step in the right direction. It will provide officials with the appropriate tools to seriously address the problem. Driving is a privilege that has great meaning in our culture. It provides a means for our youth to show independence and importance in the eyes of their peers. As a result the privilege of obtaining a driver's license and operating a motor vehicle has significant meaning to our youth. Any limitation, suspension or revocation of that privilege could be an enormous tool in changing or correcting unacceptable behavior. For this reason I fully support the concept of this measure.

However, Bill 240 as drafted does not provide a means of enforcing the provisions provided. Is the accused entitled to an administrative hearing on the suspension or is this a part of the sentence to be enforced by the Court? Can it be reasonably

expected that our courts will be able to properly administer this provision? That the division of Motor Vehicle be notified concerning convictions? No money is appropriated to modify present software programs to assist in enforcement of this provision. Nor does the law adequately address how the provisions are to be administered. Should administrative measures be considered in suspending or revoking the driver's license or training permit?

Although I support the essence of what the legislature is attempting to accomplish, much more work needs to go into how this is going to be administered and how the additional responsibilities placed on the Division of Motor Vehicle and other departments throughout the government will be funded. To state as public policy that certain actions will be taken if one is found guilty of actions made unlawful by our laws but not to provide adequate means of carrying out the stated policy would be unacceptable. In the long run we, as a society, will create a negative attitude if we make declarations that we are not willing to carry out. We would be better off ignoring the problem altogether than recognizing it and naming consequences we are unwilling to pay to achieve. It sends a message to our youthful offenders that we do not have the wherewithal to enforce our community standards.

Let me assure the Legislature that our Department stands ready to work with the Legislature in fine tuning this legislation to make it an effective tool to address the community's goals of ridding the island of vandalism and graffiti.

Dear Senator Barrett-Anderson:

Buenas yan Saluda!

I have received a copy of Bill No. 240 which provides for the mandatory revocation of driver's licenses of any person who is convicted of defacement of property. If the person is under 16, it provides that they cannot get a license until the penalty period has elapsed.

I do not believe that this is an effective way to deter or punish people for defacement of property. In our experience in juvenile court, we have found it much more effective to require the offenders to pay for and paint the wall they have defaced. We have not seen repeat offenders.

I also believe there is no correlation between licensing people to drive and defacing property, unlike drunk driving laws. The logic is just not there.


