Dear Speaker Unpingco:

Enclosed please find a copy of Bill No. 372 (COR), "AN ACT TO AMEND §3201(a) OF ARTICLE 2, CHAPTER 3 OF TITLE 16 OF THE GUAM CODE ANNOTATED, RELATIVE TO VEHICLE LIGHTS", which I have signed into law today as Public Law No. 24-120.

This legislation promotes safe driving conditions by encouraging drivers to turn on their headlights sooner at dusk, and to leave them on longer at dawn. The current law requiring headlights of vehicles to be turned on between One (1) hour after sunset to One (1) hour before sunrise is more appropriate to temperate zones, where there is a considerable time between when the sun rises or sets and the disappearance of light from the skies.

On Guam, where light fades fast from the skies upon sunset and where there is very little light in the moments before sunrise, it is appropriate to conform the requirement to turn on the headlights of vehicles at the times when the daylight is more adequate to support safe driving.



Bill No. 372: AN ACT TO AMEND 16 GCA §3201(a), RELATIVE TO VEHICLE LIGHTS.

I. SUMMARY

The Committee on Judiciary, Public Safety and Consumer Protection held a public hearing Tuesday, October 21, 1997, at 2:00 PM on Bill 372 at the Legislative Public Hearing Room. Public Notice was published in the October 14 and October 21, 1997 editions of the Pacific Daily News.

Committee Members Present:

Providing Public Testimony on the Bill

Captain James M. Marques, Acting Chief, Guam Police Department, oral and written (see Attachment "A")

Acting Attorney General Charles H. Troutman, oral and written (see Attachment "B")

Purpose:

The purpose of the bill is to amend existing law covering the period of the day when vehicle lights must be turned on to eliminate the one-hour "grace period" after sunset and before sunrise. The existing statute, patterned after laws of states in North America where there ordinarily is a "twilight" period before sunrise and after sunset, is inappropriate for Guam where, because of its nearness to the equator, there is insufficient natural light during those times of day for safely operating a vehicle on a public highway without its lights turned on. The amendment will simplify the law's requirements, thereby making it easier for drivers to understand and for traffic officers to enforce.

Relationship to Existing Law:

The bill amends 16 GCA §3201(a). Subsections (b) through (e) of the statute set forth the requirements for headlamps and other lights for various kinds of vehicles operated on the highways of Guam.

By operation of 16 GCA §9108, failure to comply with the provisions of this section is a petty misdemeanor.

II. SUMMARY OF TESTIMONY;

James M. Marques, Acting Chief of Police

The Chief stated that he and the management team members of the Guam Police Department are in favor of the bill and support its passage. Requiring headlights to be turned on immediately after sunset and to be required until the sun comes up will improve traffic safety and remove the uncertainty in the present law for the police and drivers alike.

Charles H. Troutman, Acting Attorney General

Mr. Troutman said he strongly supported the passage of the bill. The Uniform Vehicle Code adopted this change twenty years ago, and in Guam it's even more important to make this change because here in the tropics we don't have the long twilight of the northern latitudes, and if existing law were followed literally by Guam drivers there would be chaos on the highways because by one hour after sunset it is completely dark. The change to be made in the statute will then make it enforceable against those drivers who now are lax about turning on their lights.

III. FINDINGS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

The Committee on Judiciary, Public Safety and Consumer Protection finds enthusiastic support from law enforcement for the passage of Bill No. 372 as introduced by Senator Barrett-Anderson, with no opposition to the bill, and submits its Report to the Twenty-Fourth Guam Legislature with the recommendation **TO DO PASS**.

On behalf of the men and women of the Guam Police Department, I would like to take this opportunity to express my sincerest Si Yuus Maase to you and your committee for your untiring and continuous efforts aimed at improving the quality of life for the people of Guam through meaningful, just and comprehensive legislation.

Copies of Bill Nos. 370, 371, 372, 373, and 374 have been staffed by management team members of the Guam Police Department and with the exception of just some very minor adjustments, it is the consensus of management that we are in concurrence with the overall context of the bills and endorse it fully, as to form.

The recommended changes are as follows:

AN ACT TO AMEND 16 GCA §§18121 and 18122, RELATING TO POSSESSION OR STORAGE OF MARIJUANA IN A MOTOR VEHICLE

COMMENTS:

Section 1. §§18121

Possession of marijuana is already a misdemeanor. Including it is not necessary.

Section 2. §§18122

Drug Free Guam Para Todos

Need to provide definition of usable quantity - amounts over one ounce are still usable.

AN ACT TO ADD NEW SECTIONS TO 16 GCA, RELATIVE TO ELUDING A POLICE OFFICER

COMMENTS:

Section 1. "§3301.2. Definitions

Visual command could mean hand signals when approaching a vehicle on foot such as when conducting stationary radar enforcement, etc.

Section 3. "§3301.3.

If included, sub-section (m) may allow those persons who are drugged or intoxicated a means of avoiding an otherwise valid charge.

AN ACT TO AMEND 16 GCA §181201(d), RELATIVE TO PROVIDING THE RESULTS OF BLOOD ALCOHOL OR TESTS TO POLICE OR PROSECUTORS

COMMENTS:

- 1. As a consideration, it may be helpful if the proposed legislation include urine samples.
- 2. There is no guidance as to when the blood test shall be conducted, at whose request or under what conditions, and whether doctors may refuse. Mandatory blood or urine testing for all victims of accidents would certainly bolster efforts at prosecuting repeat offenders who realize the implications of the tests.
