Enclosed please find a copy of Substitute Bill No. 549 (COR), "AN ACT TO APPROPRIATE FUNDS TO THE GUAM POLICE DEPARTMENT'S CRIME VICTIMS' ASSISTANCE UNIT AND TO RENAME THE UNIT TO THE 'ERICA AND CHRISTINA VICTIMS' ASSISTANCE UNIT", which I have signed into law today as Public Law No. 24-177.

This legislation appropriates \$250,000 from the General Fund for Fiscal Years 1998 and 1999 to the Crime Victim's Assistance Unit of the Guam Police Department. It also authorizes 3 new full time equivalents (FTEs) for that unit, and renames the unit to be the "Erica and Christina Crime Victims' Assistance Unit", to memorialize the short lives of Erica Misericordia Crisostomo Aquino and Christina San Nicolas, both children who were recent tragic victims of crimes committed by family members.

AN ACT TO APPROPRIATE FUNDS TO THE GUAM POLICE DEPARTMENT'S CRIME VICTIMS' ASSISTANCE UNIT AND TO RENAME THE UNIT TO THE "ERICA AND CHRISTINA VICTIMS' ASSISTANCE UNIT."

BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF GUAM:

In 1997 as a result of family violence, 6 year Section 1. Short Title. 2 old Erica Misericordia Crisostomo Aquino and 12 year old Christina San 3 Nicolas, became tragic victims of violent crimes. These two little girls were 4 robbed of their young, hopeful and productive lives. They are victims of a crime 5 that saddens and pains the family they left behind and a community trying to 6 cope with such a horrible violence. Erica's mother, Therese Cruz Crisostomo, 7 also fell victim to violence, which took both her and her daughter's lives in a 8 9 senseless act of violence. Therese was an experienced social worker who was 10 actively involved in the Family Violence Task Force, and spent countless hours assisting, counseling and caring for victims of family violence. Erica and 11 12 Christina found shelter in the places and people whom they trusted the most -13 their home, their family. Unknown to them, this refuge and place they called 14 home is the very place that violent and senseless crimes occur. While the loss of 15 these two young lives strike at the very heart and passion of our community, the 16 loss was even more painful and tragic to the families they left behind. We must 17 now look forward and learn from such tragedies and how we can eliminate such 18 senseless crimes from happening again. The Guam Legislature, in memory of 19 Erica and Christina, two (2) very young and beautiful children of Guam, whose 20 lives inspired all who came in contact with them, their families, friends, 21 classmates and all of us, and to insure that the tragedies that were inflicted upon 22 them will, hopefully, never happen again and hereby cites this Act as the "Erica 23 and Christina Victims' Assistance Act of 1998."

Section 2. Legislative Findings and Intent. The Guam Legislature finds

that the Guam Police Department is in a unique position to provide assistance to victims of crime and other traumatic incidences that may have a substantial impact on the emotional recovery of the victim and their families.

The Guam Legislature finds and declares that crime of violence is a serious crime against society; that there are hundreds of persons in Guam who are regularly beaten, tortured and, in some cases even killed, by criminals; that a significant number of women who are assaulted are pregnant; that victims of crime of violence come from all social and economic background and ethnic groups; and that children, even when they are not themselves physically assaulted, suffer deep and lasting emotional effects from exposure to crime of violence. It is therefore the intent of the Guam Legislature to assure the victims of crimes of violence the maximum protection from abuse the law can provide.

Violent crime on Guam is on the increase. During calendar year 1996, Guam experienced 15 cases of murder, 168 rapes, 107 robberies and 231 aggravated assaults. Of the overall 15,760 cases reported in 1996, 523 were reports of violent crime. Specifically in 1996, 7 murders were related to domestic or family disputes.

While the Federal Government allocates roughly Three Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$300,000.00) a year to Guam under the national Crime Victims Program (Victims of Crime Act), the local government has not dedicated sufficient matching resources to law enforcement agencies to develop a truly serious response to the needs of victims of crime. This appropriation is Guam's first step at local funding.

Section 3. There is hereby authorized and appropriated the sum of Two Hundred Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$250,000.00) for Fiscal Years 1998 and 1999 for

- 1 the Guam Police Department's "Crime Victims' Assistance Unit," which shall
- 2 also be authorized three (3) additional FTEs for FY98 to assist in the operation of
- 3 the Unit. The funds shall be used for personnel, training, contractual services,
- 4 counseling services, equipment and other required needs of the Unit to assist the
- 5 Unit in meeting its mission, goals and objectives by providing vital assistance to
- 6 victims of crimes of violence and their families.
- 7 Section 4. Name Change. The Guam Police Department shall
- 8 rename its existing crime victims assistance unit to the, "Erica and Christina Crime
- 9 Victims Assistance Unit." There is hereby additionally authorized and
- 10 appropriated the sum of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00) from the General
- 11 Fund in order to effectuate the name change mandated herein, and pay for the
- 12 additional costs and expenses to further the purposes of this Act.

PUBLIC NOTICE:

Pursuant to the requirements of the Standing Rules, notice of the Public Hearing on Bill No. 549 was published in the Pacific Daily News on Friday March 20 and Tuesday, March 24, 1998.

PUBLIC HEARING:

The Committee on Finance and Taxation conducted a public hearing on Wednesday, March 25, 1998 at 9:00 AM in the Legislature's Public Hearing Room to hear testimonies on Bill No. 549.

The hearing was called to order by the Chairperson of the Committee on Finance and Taxation, Vice Speaker Anthony C. Blaz. Committee members present were:

PROVIDING PUBLIC TESTIMONY ON THE BILL:

BACKGROUND:

Bill 549 was first conceived when Vice Speaker Blaz was informed of the plans of the Guam Police Department to set up a unit to be called "Crime Victims Assistance Unit" by reallocating certain funding within the budget of GPD to inaugurate this plan. Senator Blaz immediately pursued the plan through the drafting of Bill 549 to appropriate \$250,000 to fund the inauguration and continuing of this plan within the GPD.

At the Public Hearing, Lt. Josephine Fernandez from the GPD who was assigned to set up this unit testified in favor of Bill 549 appropriating \$250,000.

Also testifying at the Public Hearing was Alicia Limtiaco from the Attorney General Office in favor of the Bill 549 appropriating \$250,000.

FINDINGS:

Bill 549 (COR) is necessary for the continuing help and assistance to Crime Victims. It is the findings of the Committee on Finance and Taxation that creating the "Crime Victims Assistance Unit" is urgent and that adequate funding is vitally needed to be appropriated so that GPD will not have to reallocate any of their current budget for this vitally needed assistance service.

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION:

The Committee, having conducted a sufficient hearing, does hereby

recommend to the Legislature <u>to do pass</u> Bill 549- "AN ACT TO APPROPRIATE FUNDS TO THE GUAM POLICE DEPARTMENT FOR THE ESTABLISHMENT OF A CRIME VICTIMS' ASSISTANCE UNIT."
