CERTIFICATION OF PASSAGE OF AN ACT TO THE GOVERNOR

This is to certify that Bill No. 64 (COR), "AN ACT TO DESIGNATE ALL FUNDS PROVIDED TO THE TERRITORY OF GUAM THROUGH THE UNITED STATES DEPARTMENT OF INTERIOR BUDGET FOR ANY PURPOSE ASSOCIATED WITH THE IMPACT OF THE COMPACTS OF FREE ASSOCIATION BETWEEN THE UNITED STATES AND STATES FORMERLY PART OF THE TRUST TERRITORY OF THE PACIFIC ISLANDS AND NOW IN FREE ASSOCIATION WITH THE UNITED STATES AS FUNDS TO BE USED EXCLUSIVELY FOR THE CONSTRUCTION OF NEW PUBLIC SCHOOLS IN THE TERRITORY OF GUAM", returned to the Legislature without approval of the Governor, was reconsidered by the Legislature and after such reconsideration, the Legislature did, on the 28th day of April, 1997, agree to pass said bill notwithstanding the objection of the Governor by a vote of seventeen (17) members.

AN ACT TO DESIGNATE ALL FUNDS PROVIDED TO THE TERRITORY OF GUAM THROUGH THE UNITED STATES DEPARTMENT OF THE INTERIOR BUDGET FOR ANY PURPOSE ASSOCIATED WITH THE IMPACT OF THE COMPACTS OF FREE ASSOCIATION BETWEEN THE UNITED STATES AND STATES FORMERLY PART OF THE TRUST TERRITORY OF THE PACIFIC ISLANDS AND NOW IN FREE ASSOCIATION WITH THE UNITED STATES AS

FUNDS TO BE USED EXCLUSIVELY FOR THE CONSTRUCTION OF NEW PUBLIC SCHOOLS IN THE TERRITORY OF GUAM.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE TERRITORY OF GUAM:

2 Section 1. All sums contained in the United States Department of the Interior 3 Budget, which are intended to reimburse the government of Guam for the impact of the Compacts of Free Association upon the Territory of Guam, or are otherwise 4 intended to assist Guam in coping with the impact of the Compacts of Free 5 6 Association upon Guam, or are intended to assist in the development of new infrastructure required in association with the impact of the Compacts of Free 7 8 Association upon Guam, or are otherwise referenced to be provided to Guam in 9 connection with the Compacts of Free Association between the United States and the 10 Federated States of Micronesia, the Republic of Palau (Belau) or the Republic of the 11 Marshall Islands, are hereby appropriated to the Department of Education solely for 12 the purpose of construction of new schools in the Territory of Guam. Funds 13 addressed in this Section can be used for off-site improvements, including access, lighting, drainage, sanitation and other infrastructure improvements, required for the 14 15 safe and convenient operation of any new school constructed with funds authorized by this Act. Funds addressed in this Section shall not be used to construct new 16 17 classrooms on existing school campuses, nor for renovation of existing schools, nor 18 for any other purpose but the construction of new schools.

Enclosed please find a copy of Bill No. 64 (COR), "AN ACT TO DESIGNATE ALL FUNDS PROVIDED TO GUAM THROUGH THE UNITED STATES DEPARTMENT OF THE INTERIOR BUDGET FOR ANY PURPOSE ASSOCIATED WITH THE IMPACT OF THE COMPACTS OF FREE ASSOCIATION BETWEEN THE UNITED STATES AND STATES FORMERLY PART OF THE TRUST TERRITORY OF THE PACIFIC ISLANDS AND NOW IN FREE ASSOCIATION WITH THE UNITED STATES AS FUNDS TO BE USED EXCLUSIVELY FOR THE CONSTRUCTION OF NEW PUBLIC SCHOOLS IN THE TERRITORY OF GUAM.", which I have vetoed.

This legislation would concentrate all of the compact impact funds for the sole purpose of the construction of new schools. The legislation would prohibit the expenditure of compact impact funds for construction of new classrooms on existing school campuses and also for the renovation of existing schools.

Even if all of the funds were to be used by the Department of Education, the Department of Education has specified that the Department needs construction on existing school campuses. The Department needs new classrooms on existing campuses, as well as to make critically needed renovations and renovations to comply with the Americans for disabilities Act (ADA).

See attached correspondence from Mr. Roland Taimanglo of the Department of Education.

Compact impact funds are a grant appropriated from the federal government. The purpose of the grant is to compensate Guam for all compact impact experienced by Guam as a result of in-migration of residents from Micronesia. The funds include compact impact on the criminal justice system, and other services Guam delivers to residents from Micronesia. Although the school system has been substantially impacted, this impact is not exclusive of a substantial increase in other services delivered by the government.

Additionally, the legislature has not been given the power to appropriate funds that are appropriated to the territory by the federal government. The Organic Act states the following:

"(a) Appropriations, except as otherwise provided in this chapter, and except such appropriations as shall be made from time to time by the Congress of the United States, shall be made by the legislature." (See Title 48 USC §1423j(a).)

Compact impact funds are 100% appropriated by the Congress of the United States. They are exempted from appropriation by the Guam Legislature.

Re: Bill Nos. 64 and 62

Pursuant to your request for input from this agency in relation to Bill 64, I am providing the following for the Legislative Review Committee.

I recommend that the sentence beginning on line 16 be amended as follows:

"Funds addressed in this section shall not be used to construct new classrooms on existing school campuses, nor for any other purpose but the construction of new schools. Since each school currently lacks sufficient space to house new classrooms or to support new classrooms without adversely impacting quality educational services. Funds addressed in this section may be used to renovate existing schools to comply with the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) or to make critically needed renovations and repairs to correct hazardous and unsafe school facilities."

With the amendments specified above, we feel that Bill 64 will address both short-term and long-term capital project needs for our department.

In relation to Bill 62, we have already provided our comments to the Committee on Education. Attached please find a copy of our testimony.

Thank you for giving us the opportunity to participate in the legislative review process.

"An act to designate all funds provided to Guam through the United States Department of the Interior budget for any purpose associated with the impact of the Compacts of Free Association between the United States and States formerly part of the Trust Territory of the Pacific Islands and now in Free Association with the United States as funds to be used exclusively for the construction if new public schools in the Territory of Guam."

I. OVERVIEW

On February 4, 1997 the Committee on Rules, Government Reform and Federal Affairs conducted a public hearing on Bill No. 64 "An act to designate all funds provided to Guam through the United States Department of the Interior budget for any purpose associated with the impact of the Compacts of Free Association between the United States and States formerly part of the Trust Territory of the Pacific Islands and now in Free Association with the United States as funds to be used exclusively for the construction of new public schools in the Territory of Guam." The hearing took place at 9:00 a.m. in the Public Hearing Room of the Guam Legislative Building. Public notice was given through an announcement in the January 30, 1997 issue of the Pacific Daily News.

II. SUMMARY OF TESTIMONY

Mr. Norbert Perez, President of the Republic of Guahan, testified **in favor** of Bill No. 64. Mr. Perez stated that one of the primary reasons for his support of this measure is that giving priority to education is important. He further stated that the moneys should be targeted towards education. To build new schools would illustrate an effort to upgrade the quality of education and prepare the youth of Guam for the future.

Ms. Patricia U. Garrido, private citizen, provided oral testimony **not in favor** of Bill No. 64.

The Honorable Vicente Taitague, Mayor of Talofofo, provided written testimony (attached) not in favor of Bill No. 64.

Mr. Charles Troutman, Compiler of Laws, provided written testimony (attached) **not in favor** of Bill No. 64.

III. FINDINGS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

The Committee finds that Bill No. 64, if passed into law, will alleviate the critical situation of overcrowding in our island's public schools. The designation of compact impact funds exclusively for the construction of *new* public schools would provide our island's students with an environment that is conducive to learning and help eliminate the problematic overcrowding that is pervasive throughout the Guam Public School System.

The impact of the Compacts of Free Association on our island and its infrastructure is certain. However, the limited funds available to address this impact compel us to identify those areas bearing the greatest impact and prioritize funding accordingly. While there are other areas that are undeniably impacted by these agreements of Free Association, the significant increase in enrollment in the Guam Public School System has placed our island students in facilities that are severely overcrowded. The greatest single financial impact of unrestricted immigration is upon the public Every single public school in Guam is overcrowded. school system. policymakers, it is incumbent upon us to resolve this crisis with long-term solutions that will benefit our island's youth. No longer can we afford to use "bandaid" solutions, such as the construction of temporary classrooms or the construction of additional classrooms to the existing facilities. When we commit to the education of our children, we do not only commit a classroom wherein they can learn - we must also commit the support resources that accompany those classrooms. To do anything less than designate these funds for the purpose of constructing new public schools throughout the Territory of Guam, is to compromise the quality of education for our students.

Accordingly, the Committee on Rules, Government Reform and Federal Affairs, to which Bill No. 64 was referred, does hereby submit its findings and recommendations to the Twenty-fourth Guam Legislature **TO DO PASS BILL NO.** 64 "An act to designate all funds provided to Guam through the United States Department of Interior budget for any purpose associated with the impact of the Compacts of Free Association with the United States and States formerly part of the Trust Territory of the Pacific Islands and now in Free Association with the United States as funds to be used exclusively for the construction of new public schools in the Territory of Guam."
