AN ACT TO AMEND §410(a), CHAPTER 4, TITLE 1 OF THE GUAM CODE ANNOTATED, TO HONOR THE CHAMORRO PEOPLE.

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE TERRITORY OF GUAM:

- Section 1. Legislative Intent. The Great Seal of the Territory of Guam represents the island of Guam in official matters. Guam is the homeland of the Chamorro, the indigenous people of Guam, who have resided in Guam since before
- 5 the Roman Empire, indeed since at least one thousand years before the birth of
- 6 Christ. The Chamorro language, in one form or another, has been spoken here for
- 7 thousands of years. It is noted that other American jurisdictions, including States of

- the Union, honor native languages in their Great Seals. The State of Hawaii, in its
- 2 Great Seal, contains a State Motto in the Hawaiian tongue, while the very names of
- 3 a large number of States are of indigenous, Native American, derivation. Thus, it is
- 4 only fitting that the Chamorro people and language be duly honored in our Great
- 5 Seal.
- 6 Section 2. Section 410(a) of Chapter 4 of Title 1 of the Guam Code
- 7 Annotated is amended to read:
- 8 "§410. Great Seal: Description. (a) The Great Seal of Guam shall consist
- 9 of the Coat of Arms of Guam surrounded by the following words, letters and
- 10 punctuation, encircling the outer border of the Coat of Arms in such a manner as to
- 11 be read when the Coat of Arms is in a proper position: "Great Seal of Guam, Tano'
- 12 I Man Chamorro." The Great Seal shall be approximately two and five-sixteenths
- 13 inches (2 5/16") long."
- 14 Section 3. Effective ninety (90) days from enactment of this Act, seals
- procured by and for government agencies shall conform to Section 2 herein.



Dear Speaker Unpingco:

Enclosed please find a copy of Bill No. 66 (COR), "AN ACT TO AMEND §410 (a), CHAPTER 4, TITLE 1 OF THE GUAM CODE ANNOTATED, TO HONOR THE CHAMORRO PEOPLE", which I have vetoed.

While I applaud the sponsors of this legislation for the noble concept, I feel that such an important and symbolic gesture must have the input and support of the members of this community.

As a Chamorro, and as a son of Guam, I too strongly feel that the great seal of our island should reflect the identity and strength of our people, and the specialness of our home.

For 432 years, the people of Guam have struggled with our identity, first as a possession of Spain, then of the United States, then of Japan, and finally back with the United States as a colony -- a status that we continue to hold today. Our long and difficult quest for Chamorro self-determination and for internal self-government continues, to this day.

The symbolism involved in altering the great seal is not to be taken lightly, and should involve great deliberation and an opportunity for our people to participate in such a decision.

This bill was passed with the testimony of just five individuals, and without the input of any of the agencies or organizations that are currently set up by law to provide guidance on matters of culture, heritage and language. I have attached a letter from the Chamorro Language Commission indicating that perhaps the choice of words, and certainly the orthography bear closer scrutiny before we hastily change our seal.

I would also like to point out that much of the economic stability we enjoy today is directly attributable to our present relationship with the United States, our U.S. citizenship, and our adherence to the laws of the United States. Indeed, our primary industry, tourism, is so successful partly because we are a special part of America that Asian tourists desire to visit. In addition, much of our future economic stability and growth in other industries depend upon Guam being able to market our potential as "America in Asia". As the global economy continues to shift to the Asia Pacific Rim, and as Hong Kong reverts to China this summer, this status is even more important. The financial services and telecommunications industries, as laid out in VISION 2001, could potentially bring millions of dollars through Guam, as long as we maintain the stability we have built under the American flag.

Finally, there is no appropriation accompanying this measure to accommodate the very high cost involved in changing the seal, which is affixed to many items of government property including stationary, buildings, and so forth. And, a more realistic transition time of two years, during which time the seals could be interchangeably used, would be more appropriate.

#### I. OVERVIEW

On February 4, 1997 the Committee on Rules, Government Reform and Federal Affairs conducted a public hearing on Bill No. 66 "An act to amend §410.(a), Chapter Four, 1GCA, to honor the Chamorro people." The hearing took place at 9:00 a.m. in the Public Hearing Room of the Guam Legislative Building. Public notice was given through an announcement in the January 30, 1997 issue of the Pacific Daily News.

#### II. SUMMARY OF TESTIMONY

Ms. Patricia U. Garrido, private citizen, provided oral testimony in favor of Bill No. 66. Ms. Garrido stated that it is important to support any effort that honors the Chamorro people, particularly the Great Seal of Guam which lends credit to all official documents.

Ms. Rita Cruz, private citizen, provided oral testimony in favor of Bill No. 66. She went on to offer the translation of "The Great Seal of Guam" in the Chamorro language and suggested that this phrase be presented in Chamorro when appearing on the seal.

The Honorable Elizabeth Arriola, former senator, provided oral testimony in favor of Bill No. 66. Senator Arriola stated that it is about time that we changed the seal and that it is positive to distinguish the indigenous people of Guam from any other people.

Mr. Francisco Aguero, private citizen, provided oral testimony **in favor** of Bill No. 66. Mr. Aguero, a president of a Chamorro club in California, indicated that he is in favor of honoring the Chamorro people and that they are very happy to display the Guam flag in California.

Mr. Vicente Garrido, private citizen, provided oral testimony in favor of Bill No. 66.

#### III. FINDINGS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

The Committee finds that Bill No. 66, if passed into law, would pay homage to the Chamorro people. As in other jurisdictions, it is only fitting that our Great Seal not only recognize Guam, but should also honor the native language of the Chamorro people which has been spoken here for thousands of years. The phrase "Tano' I Man Chamorro" means "the land of the Chamorro people." By making it part of the official seal, it would simply make the statement every single time that the seal is used, that Guam is the homeland of the Chamorro people. Thus, to include that phrase to the outer border of the Coat of Arms of the Great Seal of Guam would be a fitting tribute to the indigenous people of our island.

Accordingly, the Committee on Rules, Government Reform and Federal Affairs, to which Bill No. 66 was referred, does hereby submit its findings and recommendations to the Twenty-fourth Guam Legislature **TO DO PASS BILL NO.** 66 "An act to amend §410.(a), Chapter Four, 1GCA, to honor the Chamorro people."
