Dear Speaker Unpingco:

Enclosed please find Substitute Bill No. 584 (COR), "AN ACT TO APPROPRIATE NINE HUNDRED THREE THOUSAND, TWO HUNDRED DOLLARS (\$903,200.00) FROM THE GENERAL FUND TO THE UNIVERSITY OF GUAM FOR CERTAIN FUNDING PURPOSES.", which I have signed into law today as Public Law No. 24-203.

Although this legislation appropriates more than \$900,000 for certain programs at the University of Guam, at this point in time these appropriations can only be considered an authorization. An allotment cannot be made for all of these programs at this time. The available funding for Fiscal Year 1998 is already appropriated. When funding is available, and on an individual basis, these items will be addressed.

This legislation combines together in one bill the following separately introduced bills:

- Bill No. 582, which appropriates \$39,200 to the Richard Flores a) Taitano Micronesian Area Research Center for the public access work station for the genealogy data base.
- Bill No. 574, which appropriates \$179,000 to the University of b) Guam Nursing School.

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- c) Bill No. 560, which appropriates \$75,000 to the Richard Flores Taitano Micronesian Area Research Center for the Centennial Conference on the legacy of the Spanish American War in the Pacific to be held June 17-19, 1998.
- d) Bill No. 584, which appropriates \$610,000 to the University of Guam for the library enhancement program.

Every effort will be made to accommodate the needs of the University.

AN ACT TO APPROPRIATE NINE HUNDRED THREE THOUSAND, TWO HUNDRED DOLLARS (\$903,200.00) FROM THE GENERAL FUND TO THE UNIVERSITY OF GUAM FOR CERTAIN FUNDING PURPOSES.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF GUAM:

Section 1. Legislative Findings. (a) *I Liheslaturan Guahan* finds that development of our human resources, especially those who will be our future leaders in government, industry, medicine, law, and other commercial and business endeavors, must be the first and foremost priority of the government of Guam.

To insure that the continued growth and prosperity of our island, its people and this government's ability to provide those services and benefits our people expect is not jeopardized, *I Liheslaturan Guahan* finds that the need for development of our human resources must be held as the highest priority; and to achieve this goal, the government of Guam must invest in the future of our human resources, especially in the areas of higher learning endeavors.

The best type of investment in the development of our human resources is in the form of continued support for our educational resources for higher learning. It is in this respect that *I Liheslaturan Guahan* finds it imperative that funds must be identified to support this priority so as not to burden any further our people seeking to improve themselves through pursuing higher learning.

Finally, *I Liheslaturan Guahan* finds that, for many years, annual appropriations for the University of Guam's budgets were confined on the fiscal year operational aspect of the University, and the enhancement and improvement of the University of Guam's Library were generally neglected. Because of this neglect, there is an urgent need to fund the University of Guam's 1998 Library Enhancement and Improvement Program, because further neglect would seriously jeopardize this institution's accreditation.

(b) This year, 1998, the centennial of the Spanish American War provides an opportunity to reflect on the events that directly affected the people of Guam and the Pacific. It is important to consider those historical events that show the links of Guam with the Philippines and Spain in the past, and with the Unites States today, while paying significant attention to the expectations of its people.

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The Richard Flores Taitano Micronesian Area Research Center,
University of Guam ("MARC"), is planning a conference to be held on June
17, 18 and 19, 1998, with the title: "The Legacy of the Spanish American War in the
Pacific." This conference will provide an opportunity to reflect upon past
events, which shifted the administration in the Western Pacific from Spain to
America and indelibly affected the people of Guam.

This interdisciplinary conference offers the possibility for an exchange of ideas among local, national and international scholars. As an academic conference, it will increase discussion regarding the effects of 1898, not only on Guam, but on other areas of the Pacific.

It is therefore the intent of *I Liheslaturan Guahan* to acknowledge the centennial administration of Guam under the government of the United States of America and authorize this financial support for MARC to undertake this sponsorship of this centennial conference.

(c) I Liheslaturan Guahan finds an urgent need for MARC to create a publicly accessible work station for the Chamorro Genealogy data base, and to enable the processing and verification of data drawn from the 1920 United States Census and the 1920 Spanish Census.

Dear Mr. Chairman:

This testimony is submitted in support of the passage of Bill 584 relative to appropriating Six Hundred Ten Thousand Dollars (\$610,000.00) from the General Fund to the University of Guam.

As this Committee is well aware, the Accreditation Team during their visit to the University of Guam in 1995 cited the University for its lack in library collections which included books, periodicals and non-print materials. The University's failure to meet its obligation in maintaining an adequate stock and staffing of the Library was primarily due to severe cuts in the University's operating budget during the past five fiscal years. During these years the collection has remained essentially status quo because funding requests for the Library has been partially provided.

Based on the number of student enrollment, the number of faculty employed, and the curricula offered at the University, we will need approximately \$9 million to upgrade our book collection to be rated "A" and \$6.5 million to be rated "B" according to the standards set by the Association of College and Research Libraries (ACRL). These figures only take into consideration the quantitative count of volumes of books. It does not take into consideration the age of the books and the costs for additional journals required to support the curricula offered at the University. (See Attachment) It is noted that the

University of Guam Library has been and continues to be the major use of library for all public and private schools on Guam.

The Western Accrediting Association of Senior Colleges and Universities has recently confirmed the next visit of the Accrediting Team for March 2000. This is less than two years away. Since the lack of library holdings was one of the major concerns, it is imperative that this issue be resolved if the institution is to be assured of continuing accreditation.

As President of the University of Guam, I strongly support the passage of Bill 584. It is without doubt that the passage of this Bill would be in the best interest of the University of Guam, the people of Guam and most importantly the students who critically need a Library that would enhance their learning and professional careers.

Summary Statement for Book/Age/Discipline Analysis of the RFK Library Collection

This book collection analysis is meant to offer a more discipline specific portrait of the RFK Memorial Library's collection than has been available in the past. Although the University of Guam's Collection Development Policy incorporates the quantitative standards of the Association of College and Research Libraries (ACRL), the current funding levels affecting the University make the approximately 4.5 million dollar difference between what the ACRL formula says we should have and what is actually in the collection unrealistic. This analysis is not, however, meant to dismiss ACRL standards since the University is preparing students for professions that have been established and held up to standards on national and international levels.

The purpose of creating a portrait of the RFK collection in relation to each UOG degree program is to address long-standing book collection development problems more strategically. It is meant to enable us to make more concentrated contributions to the book collection in relation to discipline areas that need the most attention. The analysis confronts the most common complaint made of the collection - its age. One of the limitations of the ACRL formula, which is a part of the Collection Development Policy approved by the Board of Regents, is that it only offers quantitative standards for an entire library collection - not for individual disciplines such as biology, psychology, music, etc. Because of the vast number of books published in the United States every year, there is also no set number of books for each academic area that one could realistically strive to obtain and then consider a book collection to be "complete" - unless, of course, we were a major university library in the U.S. mainland. But even in major academic libraries there is an increased use of consortium arrangements to build collections cooperatively and to lend books throughout the consortium system rather than expecting individual libraries to stand on their own. The RFK Library continues to use its interlibrary loan program for students and faculty on a cost recovery basis although passing the cost of interlibrary loans on to patrons seriously restricts the extent to which these loans can supplement library holdings.

Library related excerpts from all available program reviews have also been included for each discipline page so that the comments of faculty members who are most qualified to assess holdings for individual disciplines can be incorporated into the portraits. Also included as a part of each discipline portrait is the number of registered majors found in the Institutional Researcher's Fall 97 Enrollment by Major Level, Collection, Level, Gender, and Class Load. These numbers are also translated into the total percentage of UOG enrollment that they represent. Although the number of students enrolled in each program may not remain the same from semester to semester, these figures do provide a general indication of the number of students enrolled in each discipline and the needs of the collection in relation to respective subjective areas.

At the end of this collection analysis is a graphic illustration of the age ranges of the RFK collection. At least 81% of the collection found in these discipline specific tables is composed of books published before 1986. 64% of the collection was published before 1971. (It should be noted that the final book total in this analysis falls somewhat short of the library's book total because the subject matter of those books could not be specifically connected to UOG discipline areas. The Learning Resource's annual reports offer information on the number of books in the entire library collection without using these subject categories.) Finally, this percentage illustration is followed by a summary of the ratio of books in the collection per student major. A discipline specific books/student ratio is also found on each discipline page.

It is hoped that by providing several kinds of information related to students, books, and

disciplines, this analysis will offer a more informed understanding of the RFK Library's book collection weaknesses as they are related to individual UOG programs and to the students enrolled in those programs.

A recent memorandum to the Dean of Learning Resources concerning the costs for acquiring periodicals on an annual basis in relation to major periodical indexes is also attached to this summary statement. (These costs need to be supplemented with annual calculations of journal price increases and rates of inflation.) When combined with this book/discipline analysis, a broader picture of the learning resources at the RFK Library comes into view.



From 1993 Agriculture Program Review: "The library has a collection of reference materials that are barely adequate for support of the curriculum, but are inadequate for research needs. The collection needs to add current references for many subject areas, as the holdings are somewhat dated. Important journals subscriptions have been allowed to expire and there are missing issues in some journal collections. The library needs improvement in the breadth of the journal collection in order to more effectively support the Agriculture program's teaching and research efforts.

"Occasionally instructors use the AV rooms and facilities in instructional activities. With the expected campus-wide increase in the use of multi-media activities, it will prove necessary for the library to increase the number and availability of these facilities and resource materials. CALS Library, located within the main RFK Library, has a collection of government documents and reports from other agricultural organizations and institutions. A monthly report of new acquisitions is sent to the college, and presently these documents are being catalogued in database OCEAN and will be consolidated together with the collection of the main library. This combining the cataloging of CALS documents and references with those of the main library will allow faculty and students to have easy access to documents."

CALS Programs - RFK Collection by Publishing Date







From National League for Nursing 1996 Self-Study Report: "There are 1,410 nursing titles classified as "RC" and 2,027 nursing related items classified as "R less RC." The Report notes that although the "basic library collection of nursing and other health science texts has been limited, "the RFK library staff consults with the CNHS faculty to ensure that the most pertinent materials are purchased." The 1991 Nursing Program Review considers journal, book and audio-visual holdings to be inadequate for the Nursing program. Journals have time gaps in them that make for a "patchwork effect that is not conducive to research." Nursing faculty assist RFK library staff in weeding outdated materials but advances in nursing "create a need for additional titles [including computer software for individual self-learning]...again, this is a matter of budget restraints....Although our library resources are limited, the students do benefit and make us of these resources on a regular basis." The Nursing Program Review refers to the use of "the Brandon and Hill articles entitled 'Selected List of Nursing Books and Journals' in the March/April 1988 issue of Nursing Outlook."

The Biology M.S. Program Review (1997) points out that the periodical "swap" proposed by the biological sciences faculty was intended to provide access to more core biology journals by canceling titles that were not seen as central to the program. The proposed journal cuts occurred in 1996 but they were not replaced by the requested titles. During the spring semester 1997, requested new subscriptions for the biology program were added to the library's periodicals collection. The review notes that the Dean "arranged for the new subscriptions to start fall 1997. If these subscriptions will be established, then the library resources of the program will be greatly improved." The report does not contain a discussion of the library's collection of biology related books or recommendations for specific purchases.



CAS Biology/Natural History/Pre-Medicine - RFK Collection by Publication Date







Many of these books must be weeded. Books for College libraries also recommends about 350 titles for a core chemistry collection, but we have only a small fraction of these titles. If we estimate we need 300 of these titles, an expenditure of about \$12,000 is needed to bring the collection up to minimum standards."

"Undergraduate Professional Education in Chemistry recomends a minimum of 20 referred journals, while Magazines for Libraries recommends 40. RFK library has only 13 journal titles in the "QD" schedule. If another 10 journals were added, at least an additional \$4000 a year would be required."

CAS Chemistry - RFK Collection by Publishing Date





Pre-Engineering - RFK Collection by Publishing Date





Mathematics Program Self Study Review (Dec. 1994) estimates that the RFK collection contains approximately 1500 volumes for the Mathematical Sciences. "In terms of the number of volumes available it would appear that the division has an adequate source of reference materials. However, upon closer examination of this collection it becomes evident that the materials may not be sufficient." The Review considers the past practice of faculty requests to many of these volumes being "more appropriate for faculty than for the students. A lack of usable materials for students preparing to be mathematics teachers at the elementary and secondary levels is evident. It is suggested that the Division of Mathematical Sciences prepare a list of books or reference materials they wish to see in the library collection." There is no comment on the adequacy of journal holdings.

CAS Mathematics - RFK Collection by Publishing Date





CAS Computer Science - RFK Collection by Publishing Date







except for Beowulf and Chaucer, The Elizabethan period is generally weak: for instances, there is little of Ben Johnson (either primary or secondary), not to say a host of others; The seventeenth century is inadequate in that there is no Bunyan criticism, very little Dryden criticism, and little criticism on the other Restoration writers like Congreve;

Both eighteenth-century poetry, prose, and drama are wanting in criticism. Poets like Thomas Cray, Oliver Goldsmith, James Thomson, and Robert Burns, novelists like Defoe, Richardson, Smollett, and Sterne, dramatists like Sheridan, and prose writers like Addison and Steele all need replenishing. The Romantic period is weak in Byron criticism. There is a big hole in the holdings on the Victorian authors. The following writers need further acquisition - Poets: Hopkins, Clough, Roussetti, Morris, Oscar Wilde. Novelists: The Bronte sisters, Thackeray, George Eliot, Meredith, Anthony Trollope, Samuel Butler, George Gissing, Stevenson, Oscar Wilde, Goerge Moore; Essayists: Thomas Carlyle, John Ruskin. In the modern and contemporary period, the list is too long for us to draw up here. Suffice it to say that this is the weaknest period in both primary and secondary sources. There is so little criticism on Bennett, Galsworthy, Kipling, and Auden, not to mention a host of others.

Books relating to American literature:

Primary works: 3249 Secondary works: 1266 Total: 4515

Strengths: The RFK library is well stocked both in primary and secondary sources as far as the major nineteenth-century and the 1920's American authors are concerned.....Weaknesses: The period stretching over the seventeenth and the eighteenth centuries is bleak in both primary and secondary sources. And so is the long period from the 1930's through the present. Major authors such as O'Neill, Steinbeck, Tennessee Williams, Arthur Miller, Edward Albee, Ralph Ellison, Joseph Heller, John Barth, and Alice Walker, and most other contemporary poets and novelists need replenishing (especially in criticism). It will be difficult to offer an upper-level /G course on the authors of this period. There is little on Black American literature and other minority literatures (both primary and secondary sources). There is little on women's literature. American drama is an exceptionally weak area so that it will be hard to offer an upper-level /G course on it.

Journals and reference works pertaining to British and American literature: Journals: 26 (far too few); Reference works: 60.

The up-to dateness of the secondary sources: It is safe to say that most of our critical commentaries--over 70% of the secondary sources relating to British literature, and that about half of the critical sources on American literature--came out in print in the 1960's. This is significant in that it warns us that we need serious updating to keep step with current literary criticism."



CAS Fine Arts/Arts - RFK Collection by Publishing Date





CAS Fine Arts/Music - RFK Collection by Publishing Date







CAS History - RFK Collection by Publishing Date







COE Secondary Education - RFK Collection by Publishing Date



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




COE Primary/Elementary Ed. - RFK Collection by Publishing Date





Although on the surface the number of books appears to be adequate to support the current program research demands, the reality is that many of these books are dated and limited in scope for any substantial research efforts."

Dates of Publication/Volumes



CB&PA Management - RFK Collection by Publishing Date



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



CB&PA International Business - RFK Collection by Publishing Date





CB&PA Accounting - RFK Collection by Publishing Date







From National League for Nursing 1996 Self-Study Report: "There are 1,410 nursing titles classified as "RC" and 2,027 nursing related items classified as "R less RC." The Report notes that although the "basic library collection of nursing and other health science texts has been limited, "the RFK library staff consults with the CNHS faculty to ensure that the most pertinent materials are purchased."

The 1991 Nursing Program Review considers journal, book and audio-visual holdings to be inadequate for the Nursing program. Journals have time gaps in them that make for a "patchwork effect that is not conducive to research." Nursing faculty assist RFK library staff in weeding outdated materials but advances in nursing "create a need for additional titles [including computer software for individual self-learning]...again, this is a matter of budget restraints....Although our library resources are limited, the students do benefit and make us of these resources on a regular basis." The Nursing Program Review refers to the use of "the Brandon and Hill articles entitled 'Selected List of Nursing Books and Journals' in the March/April 1988 issue of Nursing Outlook."

History of the Project:

In the 1980's, the Chamorro Genealogy Database project was started by the then MARC librarian, the late Albert Williams. Over the years, Mr. Williams compiled a wealth of data from individual families on island. Unfortunately, when Mr. Williams retired, this project went into hiatus until 1995. At that time, MARC acquired a laptop which was designated for use in the genealogy project. During summer 1995, one student intern, Maria Tajito, created a genealogy checksheet and a questionnaire designed to facilitate a discussion between a family elder and the interviewer. Because we realized that some of these elders may feel more comfortable talking in Chamorro, we decided that these sheets should be written in both languages: Chamorro and English. For this project, Ms. Tajito worked with members of the Chamorro Language Commission.

Why is this project important?:

Interest in this project has steadily increased since 1995. Lately, we have been receiving donations of print or electronic versions of family histories. We have people emailing us from offisland, particularly Chamorros residing in the U.S. Mainland, as well as those who are unable to visit MARC during our regular office hours. Recently, some Chamorro teachers at both the public and private schools have expressed an interest in using this project as a learning module for Chamorro family relationship and history.

To give your committee an idea of how many genealogy requests we routinely receive, we compiled these statistics:

- * During a 7 month period, approximately 45 Genealogy related inquiries were received to RFT MARC Guam and Micronesia Reference Collection email accounts (monthly that equates to 6 messages). These requests require that the staff sift through the printed sources to find the names mentioned in the queries.
- * Each month the Guam and Micronesia Reference Collection receives approximately 200-250 visitors (identified themselves as non UOG patrons). Of this monthly total, we estimate one fifth to one quarter of this total (50 individuals) used the genealogical resources in our collection.
- * In addition, at least two to four questions each week are received via phone or fax.

Problems with existing system:

Within the last eighteen months, the computer which Mr. Williams used has become unstable and very awkward for patrons to use. Specific problems include the hard drive crashes regularly, the screen freezes, and the computer shuts itself down or reboots itself during queries. Due to the age of the computer and the size of the hard drive, we have been advised to acquire a new computer to house the data. Because of the inconsistency of the computer, we shut the computer down, a decision that disappointed our genealogy patrons. Thus, this project has been sustained on two laptop computers which are rapidly running out of memory—last week, we discovered that one laptop has reached its maximum capacity in terms of memory allocation. We are just waiting for the other one to reach its capacity.

What the funds will be used for:

The funds will be used to purchase a master computer with necessary software which will house the Familian Chamorro Genealogy Database. The source of data will originate from 1920 U.S. Census, 1920 Church Records (which is informally referred to as the 1920 Spanish Census), vital statistics published in the Guam Newsletter and the Guam Recorder, and written records from the estate of Albert Williams. Donated family histories will be enterred in ONLY AFTER WRITTEN PERMISSION is granted by the compiler/author.

Estimated breakdown of funds:

Where:

Our vision is to have a computer database which is physically housed in the Guam and Micronesia Reference Room and to have the two existing laptops as roving workstations. Upon the establishment of a master computer, the two laptops will be used to compile data at community centers, as workstations in classrooms, or for mobile dispalys at the malls or shopping centers.

Benefits:

The tangible benefit created by this database would be efficient retrieval of genealogical records housed at the Guam and Micronesia Reference Collection for applicants for programs based on Chamorro ancestry such as the Chamorro Land Trust, for Family History projects, and for individuals who are looking for their family's roots.

The intangible benefit is the fostering of pride among the Chamorro people about their ancestry and their family roots. We see this result everytime someone finds a grandparent or great-grandparent. The elation on their faces is always a beautiful sight to behold.
