Currently, the law allows the Department of Education to only use the date of commencement to determine the cut-off date of the minimum age students are allowed to enter kindergarten.

AN ACT TO ADD §6103.3 TO ARTICLE 1, CHAPTER 6, DIVISION 2 OF TITLE 17 OF THE GUAM CODE ANNOTATED RELATIVE TO GRANTING THE INTERIM GOVERNING BOARD AND DISTRICT BOARDS THE FLEXIBILITY TO USE THE LAST DAY OF THE MONTH THAT CLASSES BEGIN IN DETERMINING THE MINIMUM AGE STUDENTS SHALL ATTEND

CLASSES IN CASES WHERE THE STARTING DATE IS ADVANCED TO ACCOMMODATE SPECIAL EVENTS OR PROGRAMS.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF GUAM:

Section 1. Legislative Findings and Intent. I Liheslaturan Guahan finds that circumstances may arise which would affect the setting of the starting date of classes in any given school year. Such was the case in the Department of Education's decision to modify its school calendar to accommodate the 1999 South Pacific Games. This makes it difficult for parents of kindergarten-age children to determine whether their children are required to enroll in school and plan accordingly.

It is the intent of *I Liheslaturan Guahan* to provide the Interim Governing Board presently, and the District Boards in the future, with the flexibility to use last day of the month classes begin as starting date of classes in determining the minimum enrollment age of students in any cases where the school calendar is advanced to an earlier than expected starting date for classes.

Section 2. Section 6103.3 is hereby *added* to Article 1, Chapter 6, Division 2 of Title 17 of the Guam Code Annotated to read as follows:

"Section 6103.3. Option to Use Last Day of the Month as the Starting Date to Determine Minimum Enrollment Age for Children.

Notwithstanding the provisions of §6103 of this Chapter regarding the beginning date of classes for each school, the Interim Governing Board and the District Boards may use the last day of the month in which classes begin for determining the minimum age a child shall attend school in cases where the beginning date of classes in the school

calendar is advanced to an earlier starting date to accommodate special events or programs. After the school year 1998-1999, at least three (3) months notice shall be given of any changes to advance the beginning date of classes in the school calendar, to include which date will be used in determining the minimum enrollment age that children shall attend classes."

Committee Report

on

Bill No. 681 (COR): AN ACT RELATIVE TO EXTENDING THE DATE FOR THE INITIAL **ENROLLMENT** OF SCHOOL CHILDREN GUAM'S PUBLIC SCHOOLS FOR SCHOOL YEAR 1998-1999. IN CONSIDERATION OF THE **ADJUSTED** SCHEDULE **FOR** THE COMMENCEMENT OF CLASSES DUE TO THE UPCOMING SOUTH PACIFIC GAMES.

I. OVERVIEW

The Committee on Education held a public hearing on Monday, July 20, 1998 at 9:00 a.m. at the Legislative Public Hearing Room. Public Notice of the hearing was announced in the July 13 issue of the Pacific Daily News.

II. Testimony

Mr. Roland L.G. Taimanglo, Director of Education. Mr. Taimanglo testified against the Bill. He stated that making exceptions and changes two weeks prior to the start of school would cause undue hardship on the system since the number of kindergarten classrooms and teachers have already been determined. He also recommends that the intent of the Public Law 24-26 be protected by not granting any exceptions.

Ms. Claudia R.U.B. Guerrero, Ms. Guerrero testified in favor of the Bill. She noted that her child was excluded from testing for the upcoming school year as the cut of date for testing is December 7th and her child will turn 5 on December 9th. She explained that she brought up her concern to the Board at one of their meetings and was ignored. She also told the Committee that she was informed that by DOE officials that they were aware of the need to move up the starting date of classes as of November of 1997, long after P.L 24-26 was passed in May of 1997.

Mr. Robert D. Santos, Mr. Santos testified in favor of the Bill. He informed the Committee that his child turns 5 after August 4th but before August 27th. He explained that his child now would have to be tested to be admitted into class where as if the starting date for class was not accelerated, he would not. He suggested that the original starting date that he had planned for be used with regard to minimum age requirements regardless of when classes start. Mr. Santos also noted that several other people that he know were also affected by the change in the starting date of classes.

Ms. Hilary Toves, Ms. Toves testified in favor of the Bill. She informed the Committee that while her daughter was taking the test at M.U. Lujan Elementary, she was informed by the school principal the he would not accept her daughter whether she passes or fails the test. She said that she

would put her child in private school for a semester since they would accept her. She further stated that the principal informed her that he would admit her child if she attended private school for a semester. She also informed the Committee that her child scored very low on the test and asked to have her child re-tested since she enrolled her child in a learning center and expects that she should now be able to pass the test. Mr. Taimanglo, at the request of the Chairperson interjected that there is an appeals process regarding the testing. Ms. Toves informed the Committee that she was unaware of the appeals process until today.

Ms. Trini Torres, Ms. Torres testified in favor of the Bill.

Mr. Joe Nangauta. Mr. Nangauta testified that he supported the position of the Director of Education and the Board regarding the Bill.

Ms Rosemarie P. Ruiz, Ms. Ruiz testified in favor of the Bill. She stated that her daughter is affected by the acceleration of the starting date of classes since she will turn five on August 11th. She urged the Committee to pass the Bill.

Ms. Jessica Torres, Ms. Torres testified in favor of the Bill. She testified that her child's 5th birthday is August 19th and should be attending M.U. Lujan which starts on August 24th. She was informed however that M.U. Lujan was using the August 4th date that the rest of the schools were using thus excluding her child. She informed the Committee that she felt this was unfair and a violation of the law.

Mr. Mark "Paps" Martinez, Member, Interim Governing Board, Mr. Martinez testified in favor of the Bill. He noted that he had not intended to testify nor was he representing the Board's position. He also noted that the Board did not support the Bill and therefore did not submit written testimony affirming his support for the Bill because written testimony may be construed as the Board's official position.

Mr. Jay Andre, Mr. Andre testified in favor of the Bill. He informed the Committee that his child was affected by the moving of the start up date and was required to take a test to be admitted. He also explained that he thought the test was unfair and should be evaluated. He noted that his son failed the test because it asked specific questions that he as a father did not teach him. He also noted that he took his son in for a psychological evaluation and was

informed that his son can function as a five year old child for school attendance purposes.

III. Findings and Recommendation

The Committee on Education finds that considerable discontent exists among parents who were affected by the Interim Governing Board's decision to accelerate the starting date of classes from August 27, 1998 to August 4, 1998 to accommodate the South Pacific Games. Because of this change, students who turn five (5) years of age between August 5th to August 27th must now pass an exam to be admitted to classes, and students who turn five (5) after December 7 are no longer eligible to take an exam for early admission.

The Committee further finds however, that DOE knew as early as November of 1997 that school facilities may be needed for the Games and the affect schedule changes may have on student enrollment eligibility and should have sought a legislative remedy to prevent the exclusion of any students. Recognizing that education officials have adopted plans for the school year, the Committee recommends that the Bill No. 681 provide a means for education officials to use originally set starting dates during school years in which the school calendar needs to be accelerated. The Committee also recognizes that it is not appropriate for the Legislature to provide relief for every situation in which the school calendar may change but to allow for flexibility in consideration of parents who have made future plans around the expectation that their child will be attending school during an upcoming school year.

So the education officials can be given the flexibility to accept students who may otherwise be excluded because of changes in the school calendar, it is the recommendation of the Committee on Education that Bill No. 681 (COR) As Substituted by the Committee on Education be reported out with the recommendation **TO DO PASS**

Dear Senator Kasperbauer,

Thank you for giving us the opportunity to testify on Bill No. §81: An Act Relative to Extending The Date For the Initial Enrollment of School Children in Guam's Public Schools for School Year 1998-1999, in Consideration of the Adjusted Schedule for the Commencement of Classes Due To The Upcoming 1999 South Pacific Games.

The Department of Education is not in favor of Bill 681 for the following reasons.

- Since the passage of PL 24-26, the Department of Education has organized its Kindergarten Program to welcome those children born by the first day of school with the opportunity for families to have their children assessed for early entrance if born within 125 days of the opening day of school. Families are also provided the opportunity to go through an appeals process if their early entrance children do not meet the required scores to enter kindergarten "early."
- 2. As was predicted, the number of needed teachers for kindergarten has decreased relative to the number of kindergarten students born by the first day of school. In past years, the cut-off day for kindergarten was December 31 eliminating four months of children has resulted in a lower number of kindergarten classrooms, teachers, and instructional resources needed. As a result of PL 24-26, the number of teachers reassigned from the kindergarten class to other grade levels is 50.
- These reassigned teachers have already begun to prepare for their newly assigned grade levels. To reassign them now a short two weeks before school opens not to mention the identification of classroom assignments, as well as the procurement of instructional materials to support the kindergarten program will place even more stress on the schools. Again, as soon as PL 24-26 was enacted, this organization planned and restructured its operations to ensure that this law was implemented as efficiently and as effectively as possible.
- 4. The Department of Education understands that the intent of PL 24-26 was to keep the



chronologically younger children out of school. It was the belief of this legislature that younger children are not ready for school and should wait another year before entering the public school system. Regardless of the opening date of school, younger children will always be kept out of school according to the language of the law. To make an exception to this law, whether or not the Department of Education is supporting the South Pacific Games, contradicts the intent of the law.

5. To reinforce the point made in number 4, you should know that the Joint Calendar Committee has recently forwarded its recommendation to begin next school year on August 4. If Bill 681 is passed this year, will another exception be made for next year? Again, if the intent of the legislation is to keep the chronologically younger children out of school, be assured that PL 24-26 succeeds in doing this.
