Enclosed please find Substitute Bill No. 609 (COR), "AN ACT TO ESTABLISH INCENTIVES TO ENCOURAGE THE VOLUNTARY EARLY RETIREMENT OF GOVERNMENT OF GUAM EMPLOYEES IN CONNECTION WITH A GENERAL REORGANIZATION EFFORT IN THE GOVERNMENT OF GUAM", which I have vetoed.

The following are the reasons for this veto:

1. Violation of federal laws concerning retirement. The legal counsel for the Retirement Fund, Carlsmith Ball, states that this legislation violates a number of federal laws relative to the operations of retirement funds. Federal laws state that employees suffer discrimination in employment on the basis of age if they do not receive sufficient information concerning the ramifications of their choices in such plans as contained in this legislation.

The legal opinion states that this legislation does not provide adequate information necessary for employees to make a "voluntary" choice. Some of the factors which determine if an employee has made a "voluntary" choice are the adequacy of information, whether the choice was free from fraud, false promises, threats, misrepresentations, or other misconduct, whether the employee had an opportunity to say "no", and whether the employee had sufficient

time to consult lawyers, accountants, or family members in their decision. There are no provisions in this legislation which guarantee these conditions.

- 2. Possible liability of the government under federal Civil Rights laws. This legislation may expose the government to liability because the statute may be found by a court to "entice" employees to retire early by offering enhanced benefits, but instead, this legislation may in fact result in reduced benefit levels for some employees because of their relatively young age.
- 3. Provisions of the legislation are so unclear that it cannot be administered without order of a federal court. The legal counsel has determined that the eligibility and processing requirements under this legislation are so unclear that it is recommended that, should this legislation become law, that the Government of Guam Retirement Fund forebear from enforcing it until receiving instructions from a federal court. Questions concerning compliance with Age Discrimination in Employment Act (ADEA), benefit calculations, and refund of contribution issues cannot be applied as written.
- 4. Early retirement plans are presumed by courts to be discriminatory because of age. Under a recent Supreme Court case, employees who participate in an early retirement plan and who later sue the government for discrimination due to age and win, do not have to pay back any of the benefits already received.
- 5. Government of Guam Retirement Fund has determined that this plan is extremely costly to the fund. This legislation will cost the Retirement Fund a one-time cost of, at the high end, \$50,126,000 to fund employer contributions for service credits. It will also impose an additional estimated \$75,726,000 to the government's unfunded liability to the Retirement Fund. The government will have to increase its contribution rate to fund the increased liability.
- 6. Mandating that employees who chose early retirement will not return to any form of government service, including contractual, for 3 years is not realistic. Many of the employees who may chose this plan cannot realistically be spared in the government. Many are professionals in areas where there are no

ready replacements, thereby forcing amendments to the legislation to allow these employees to return to government service prior to the 3 years.

The history of prior legislative attempts to encourage early retirement have failed because of the intense pressure on the legislative body to make legislative exceptions to this prohibition on future employment. One must also remember that employees who are encouraged to "retire" are not, in fact, even senior citizens, and in many cases, but are quite young. These young "retirees" will continue to attempt to re-enter the workplace.

- 7. Provisions in legislation which this are unrelated to retirement are unrealistic and unmanageable. legislation requires i Liheslatura to meet and pass bills as "permission" to hire any employee to fill any vacancy which may occur, including vacancies within the schools. This is just not a realistic way to run any organization, let alone a government which is now suffering from declining revenues, or a school which has teachers who may resign. This procedure will simply usurp all Executive management decisions and the elimination of public hearings for such legislation simply removes the public from consideration. If a public hearing is unnecessary for this type of legislation, for what type of legislation will i Liheslatura next determine that a public hearing is unnecessary?
- 8. Legislative determination of spending of federal funds violates federal law. This legislation states that no vacancy funded by federal funds can be filled without the permission of i Liheslatura, by statute. This management by i Liheslatura of federal funds violates long standing prior court decisions on the management of federal grants. See Wong vs. Camina. District Court of Guam.
- 9. This legislation directs the Executive Branch to reduce "appropriations". The legislation states that the total operational budget of the government for Fiscal Year 1999 shall not exceed \$486,800,000 from the General Fund. Interestingly, the legislation seems to have no cap or ceiling imposed on total appropriations which include those many appropriations made for miscellaneous items.

The legislation states: "Should the appropriations for the Executive Branch Operations not conform to this limit, the appropriations shall be reduced by the Director of the Bureau of Budget and Management (BBMR) with the concurrence of i Maga'lahi. This provision is perplexing since the Executive Branch does not make, reduce, or have power over appropriations, except in narrow situation where legislation is approved or vetoed. This legislation try to transfer the legislative appears authority appropriations to the Executive Branch.

In light of the considerable liability which may occur to the government, and the fact that this legislation will probably cost the government more than will be realized in savings, this legislation cannot be enacted.

- **Section 1. Legislative Findings and Intent.** The purpose of this Act is 3 to:
 - (1) reduce current and future payroll costs of the government of Guam without imposing forced reductions in current staffing;
 - (2) maintain or increase the current level of employee productivity with the same *or* lesser compensation costs; *and*
 - (3) increase opportunities for lower and middle-level employees to move upward by filling the vacancies created by senior employees who retire.

I Liheslaturan Guahan further finds that a successful early retirement program must be accompanied by a long-term freeze or limitation on future hiring in order to offset the immediate increased costs of funding the incentives provided in the program lower than those of rehired retirees.

After the hearing, the Committee received written testimonies regarding Bill 609 from numerous individuals. Please see attached documents.

A clear majority of those individuals appearing before the Committee presented oral testimony in favor of the bill. Several individuals pointed out that Bill 609 is more equitable than previous early-retirement measures. Bill 609 allows *all* individuals who are a part of the Defined Benefit Plan the option to apply and receive the retirement credit. The Guam Federation of Teachers, represented by Mr. John Burch endorsed the measure and emphasized that the membership supports the measure and appreciates that it does not discriminate against people with college degrees.

Individuals appearing before the Committee also stated that the option to purchase the credit would in fact result in many government of Guam employees retiring; thereby reducing the size of the govGuam's workforce. Most individuals testifying before the Committee expressed their desire to see the measure signed into law. They indicated that they would readily act on such an opportunity to apply and receive up to five (5) years of retirement credit.

In addition, many recognized that although the intent is to reduce govGuam's operating costs through the reduction of personnel by freezing the funding of those positions vacated after the adoption of this bill, it does provide a clause to ensure certain essential positions are excepted from the hiring freeze. Many persons testifying in favor of the measure offered support of the author's inclusion of teachers, nurses and law enforcement personnel to the list of those positions that shall not be affected by the freeze.

A common theme throughout the testimonies offered to the Committee, was the critical nature of implementing cost-saving measures throughout the government of Guam in these severe economic times. Many stated that as the revenues of the government of Guam continue in a steep decline, it is urgent and essential that govGuam implement measures that would save the government in the immediate, as well as in the long term.


Of the individuals presenting oral testimony not in favor of the measure, some voiced concerns over the possibility that too many govGuam employees would take advantage of the opportunity to purchase the retirement credit and retire. Thus, resulting in a reduced number of contributors to the Retirement Fund. In addition, there were individuals appearing before the Committee who were concerned with the possibility of employees purchasing the credit, retiring and then returning to the government of Guam through special contracts. These individuals testified that such "double-dipping" would defeat the measure's intent to streamline the operational costs of the government of Guam. Another common concern of those individuals testifying against the measure was the measure did not include the exemption of critical positions such as social workers and other positions within the Department of Public Health and Social Services Division of Senior Citizens.

III. FINDINGS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

The Committee on Rules, Government Reform and Federal Affairs finds that the purpose of Bill No. 609 is to reduce the operating costs of the government of Guam on an annual basis through attrition. Due to the economic uncertainty that our island faces and the very real decline in govGuam revenues, it is necessary that the government of Guam adopt measures to reduce the cost of operating itself, without compromising its purpose to provide services to the people of Guam. The personnel costs of the government of Guam continue to grow, despite the stagnation and even decline of government revenues. If the government refuses to quickly adapt measures to streamline, it stands to jeopardize the critical services it renders to the taxpayers. The Committee finds that Bill 609 provides an incentive for those qualified employees of the government of Guam to purchase up to five (5) years of retirement credit. The bill further mandates the automatic repeal of the appropriated funding and FTE for any govGuam position that becomes vacant after the effective date of this bill. It is this section of the measure that addresses the government's need to reduce its operational costs. The Committee further finds that there are certain positions in the government of Guam that should be exempted from the hiring freeze and that the bill contains provisions to exempt these jobs (i.e. law enforcement personnel, teachers, nurses, doctors, etc.). Moreover, the bill also allows the Governor of Guam to appeal to I Liheslaturan Guahan, should he deem any other position critical enough to be exempted from the hiring freeze.

Accordingly, the Committee on Rules, Government Reform and Federal Affairs, to which Bill No. 609 was referred does hereby submit its findings and recommendations to I Mina' Bente Kuåttro Na Liheslaturan Guahan TO DO PASS BILL NO. 609 as substituted "An act to establish incentive programs for early retirement for govGuam employees as part of a general reorganization effort in the government of Guam."



AN ACT TO **ESTABLISH INCENTIVE** PROGRAMS FOR EARLY RETIREMENT FOR GOVGUAM EMPLOYEES AS PART GENERAL REORGANIZATION EFFORT IN THE GOVERNMENT OF GUAM

BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF GUAM:

Section 1. Intent. It is intended that through this act, a mechanism be established that will allow employees of the government of Guam who are 2 members of the Retirement Fund the possibility of early retirement at fullbenefits should they meet certain qualifications. This will not only provide 4 employees with a desired benefit, but will also reduce the operating costs of the 5 government of Guam on an annual basis over the course of time. This outcome 6 is not only desirable, but necessary in an atmosphere of declining revenues and an uncertain economic picture in Asia. As revenues remain stagnant or decline 8 over the next few fiscal years, the infrastructure and operational requirements for the government continue to grow. Our people require more and more in the 10 way of service, especially in view of service deficiencies in the past. Personnel 11 12 costs today constitute such a large portion of our operational costs, and hiring continues unabated, raising the frightening spectre of the government being 13 unable to make payroll in the next few years unless all other operational 14 requirements and services are curtailed or drastic measures are taken. This bill 15 is an attempt to forestall that undesirable outcome by providing an incentive for 16 early retirement and placing controls on hiring, thus using attrition to reduce 17 operational costs in a way that provides hardship to no one. By acting sensibly 18 now, we can prevent suffering for our employees and our people down the 19 road. This act intends to provide a benefit to our hard-working employees and 20 save money in the General Fund, at the same time. 21 22

Dear Senator Forbes,

First of all, I would like to commend you on your efforts in streamlining our government to make it more effective and efficient. I am currently a Government of Guam employee, and have been employed with the government for over three years now. I agree with your actions to reform the Government of Guam. I especially agreed with the reduction of the number of senators from 21 to 15, of which you pushed during the last election. More effort should be made in reducing government expenditures rather than increasing expenditures.

You recently introduced Bill 609, An Act to Establish Incentive Programs for Early Retirement for GovGuam Employees as Part of a General Organization Effort in the Government of Guam". This bill, should it become law, will give current GovGuam workers the opportunity to apply for and receive up to five (5) year of retirement credit. Another bill that was recently introduced which would amend the current retirement plan was Bill 537, introduced by Senator Felix Camacho. Bill 537, "An Act to Provide Members of the Defined Contribution Retirement System With Pre-retirement Ancillary Benefits of Survivor Death Insurance and Disability Insurance. The bill introduced by Senator Camacho, made the Defined Contribution Retirement System more equitable, by providing ancillary benefits in the form of disability benefits for members and survivor death benefits.

I agree with the intent of both bills, Bill 609 and Bill 537, however, I have several concerns regarding the current GovGuam Retirement System. The current system seems to benefit only career employees, employees who actually work for the government for 25 years or more and receive their pension. It does not benefit GovGuam employees who do not anticipate in staying with government throughout their careers. For example, I am currently on the old plan, the Defined Benefit Plan. I currently contribute 9.5% of my base salary, of which my contributions earn a mere 5% in annual interest through the Retirement Fund. Based on the current law, I am forced to contribute 9.5% of my base salary on an after-tax basis. The only time I can touch the money I have contributed to the Retirement Fund, is when I resign or quit from the government. The only time I benefit from the Defined Benefit Plan is if I reach retirement. Should I resign or quirt prior to retirement, I only get the my contributions, plus interest. It's just like putting my money in the bank, however, the only difference is that I don't have access to these funds. My concern is that the money I have contributed to the Retirement Fund is on an after-tax basis, however, I am restricted in having access to money that is rightfully mine. It's like saving 9.5% of base salary at a local bank, and the bank saying that I have to resign from my job in order to get access to my funds.

Over the past three years, I've seen several employees from my department and various government agencies resign from their positions just to get the money they've contributed to the Retirement Fund, and then be reinstated a few weeks later. Like I previously stated, these employees receive only their contributions to the Fund, plus interest. Why do employees have to go through the trouble of resigning from their position just to get funds that are rightfully theirs?? By resigning from their positions, they are putting themselves and their families in financial risk.

I feel that a provision should be added to Bill 609 to give an incentive to employees to switch from the Defined Benefit Plan to the Defined Contribution Plan. The Defined Benefit Plan places a large financial burden on the Government budget. For example, for each government employee under the Defined Benefit Plan, the government budgets 18.6% of their base salary for the government retirement contribution. In comparison, the government only contributes up to 5% of an employee's base salary in the Defined Contribution Plan. The less employees under the Defined Benefit Plan, the less the government has to budget and contribute to the Retirement Fund on their behalf. Employees currently have the opportunity to switch to the Defined Contribution Plan, however, they still cannot pull out funds previously contributed to the old plan. Employees who switch to the Defined Contribution Plan should be able to pull out their funds that were previously in the Defined Benefit Plan because the contributions are after-tax dollars, compared to pre-tax dollars that are going into the new plan.

In conclusion, if you are sincerely looking a reducing the financial impact personnel is having on the GovGuam fiscal year budget and the Retirement Fund, legislation should be introduced to provide incentives to employees to switch to the new plan. Let the employees be responsible for their own futures, and not dependent on a retirement system that may not be dependable when these employees retire. Also, this legislation should amend the current retirement law to allow employees who do not expect to retire with GovGuam, to be able to have access to funds contributed to the Retirement Fund on an after-tax basis. Employees should not have to go through the formality of resigning just to get funds that are rightfully theirs.

Testimony on Bill 609

AC ACT TO ESTABLISH INCENTIVE PROGRAM FOR EARLY RETIREMENT FOR GOVGUAM EMPLOYEES AS PART OF A GENERAL REORGANIZATION EFFORT IN THE GOVERNMENT OF GUAM

Although I appreciate the intent of the bill, several concerns come to mind relative to Section 6 on the "Temporary Hiring Freeze." As a senior citizen, the Chairman of the Guam Council on Senior Citizens and a consumer of these services, the Manamko of our island rely on the one and only division, the Division of Senior Citizens, under the Department of Public Health and Social Services to administer Title III Aging Programs. The Division is our local State Office on Aging and, it, through this office contracts formal support services to maintain the integrity and dignity of my fellow Manamko. At this point in time, however, their current state of human resources is limited and are in need of additional manpower. On March 5, 1998, the division administrator, Mr. Arthur U. San Agustin, MHR presented to Director Rodriguez and Deputy Director Manibusan the need for additional personnel to insure services to my fellow Manamko are provided in the best and most efficient possible way. On April 16, 1998, I and fellow Council Members met with Director Rodriguez to advocate for Mr. San Agustin's request for additional personnel. For many, this may not be a time to make such a request; however, Mr. San Agustin has gone for two years, too long, without the much needed manpower.

The Division of Senior Citizens is in the midst of expanding, improving and realigning it's programs all in the effort of providing a comprehensive and coordinated service delivery system for our manamko. Their goal by the next millennium is to double client participation, especially to those seniors without adequate family support. Currently, approximately 6000 seniors utilize the 12 senior programs listed below:

Adult Day Care (2 contracts)
Congregate Meals (2 contracts)
Home-delivered meals (11 seniors)
Immunization
Legal Assistance
Transportation

Case Management
Emergency Receiving Home (2)
Homemaker Services
In-Home Services
Senior Center Operations (16 sites)
Manamko Yan Manhoben (Intergenerational)

The Contracts Management Program Development Unit under the Division of Senior Citizens manages 11 of these programs, ten (10) of which are senior specific programs and one (1) program for both senior citizens and adults with disabilities. It is not enough to simply count programs administered by this division as eleven programs when they are programs, that for the most part, are provided throughout the island, at either 16 senior center sites, and at hundreds of homes receiving home-delivered meals for their frail

parent(s), as well as homemaker or in-home services and case management services. Hundreds of seniors are also being transported to and from centers to doctor's appointments, shopping, and so forth.

All the aforementioned programs are provided throughout the island and are not limited to a specific area; thus, the scope of responsibility placed on the Division of Senior Citizens is quite a tall order to insure contractual compliance in areas of service. Additionally, two Adult Day Care programs are being administered by this division. The expansion of this program occurred this current fiscal year and was in response to a waiting list when only one Day Care facility was operational. It is anticipated that a third site may be in the horizon to be situated in the southern-most region of our island. Currently, this program has the capacity to provide services to seventy (70) frail Manamko. Finally, the Division is undertaking additional projects such as the Homebound Immunization Program which started this month and is conducting literature review and consulting with the dental profession on the establishment of a pilot Homebound Dental Program.

This is only one segment of this Division that serves my fellow Manamko. A second segment of this Division is the Community Support Services Unit. Tomorrow, April 18, 1998 and on Sunday, April 19, 1998, the Division and fellow Council Members will be passing out program information flyers in an effort to enlighten our community of senior programs. The goal of this Division is to disseminate approximately 15,000 brochures by the end of this fiscal year. With such an aggressive agenda to inform our community of programs that could help alleviate stress in the caregiving of seniors and which would attribute to the delay in pre-mature institutionalization and possibly abuse, this Division could not be placed in jeopardy of losing positions, even if for an interim period. Beyond all this, my fellow Manamko need to know what services are out in the community that could assist them maintain their independence to the greatest extent possible. By the end of this fiscal year, this Division will have available to our community a Directory of Resources specific to seniors. This directory will be a quick reference guide of programs and services to seniors and will be updated periodically. By doing periodic updates, the Directory's usefulness is maintained. This segment of the Division manages all referrals received and conducts follow-up on the referrals to insure services are provided in the manner contracted for. As part of the Division activity/function, this segment conducts monthly outreach through presentations at various public and private entities throughout the island. This Unit also coordinates the activities of the Manamko Yan Manhoben Program.

The third and final segment of this Division is the provision to protect my fellow Manamko and adults with disabilities through the Adult Protective Services Unit. As part of this Unit's function, a twenty-four hour emergency shelter operation is maintained through contract. This contract includes the provision of a twenty-four hour emergency hotline to respond to calls for help from the two very distinct and vulnerable populations. The number of referrals at this point appears to have gone up approximately 15% as of the second quarter of this fiscal year in comparison to the number received during the first two quarters of last fiscal year.

Additionally, the provision to provide protective services is mandated by local legislation to respond within seven (7) calendar days not working days. This provision alone puts an urgency to respond to all calls received. For physical and sexual allegations received, this Unit responds on the same day.

Currently, only an FTE of 4 staff, are responsible to respond to all cases of suspected abuse on island. At this time, however, only 3 social workers cater to the island's population. However, even if the vacant positions under this Unit are filled, they would still fall short to being fully equipped with the manpower needed to support this islands dilemma. This shortage of manpower is being addressed by the current Administrator.

As a Division, they are also responsible for the coordination and implementation of our annual Senior Citizens Month celebration. All who have coordinated any similar type of celebration would not need to further inquire as to the amount of manpower needed to put such a celebration together. Year after year, this Division has come through for myself and my fellow Manamko by coordinating activities that would occur throughout the month. Furthermore, the Division chairs two major events during this month, the Annual Governor's Conference on Aging and Senior Health and Fitness Day.

I hope I have painted the picture that this Division and all its personnel must be exempted from the temporary hiring freeze and should be included as Item L under Section 6.

On behalf of the Guam Council on Senior Citizens, the Department of Public Health and Social Services' Division of Senior Citizens, the Aging Network of Guam, and my fellow manamko, we thank you for the privilege of sharing our concerns and ask your consideration to exempt the Division of Senior Citizens from the temporary hiring freeze.

Thank you for the opportunity to comment on Bill No. 609, "An Act to Establish Incentive Programs for Early Retirement for GOVGUAM Employees as Part of a General Reorganization Effort in the Government of Guam."

As you may already know, several attempts have been made by members of previous and current Legislatures over the past decade which were aimed at, among other things--reducing the over inflated personnel costs in government through a variety of creative legislation; righting a wrong" with respect to the terms and conditions under which the previous granting of education credits toward retirement were implemented; and, enticing long term government employees in the upper pay scale to retire, with the assumption that new employees entering the system will more than likely enter in the lower "steps" within the pay range.

None-the-less, we continue to be plagued with controversies over the "soundness" and adverse effects of similar legislative proposals which, some claim, do not adequately make provisions to protect the integrity of the Retirement Fund, and/or ultimately realize any reduction in overall government expenditures. Bill No 609, on the other hand, and for all intents and purposes, provides a realistic approach towards resolving the inevitable on Guam--" reduce operational costs and government spending in one of the most obvious means available now, or suffer the consequences of government inaction and lack of foresight in the long run."

Although Bill 609 provides Government of Guam employees who are members of the Retirement Fund the possibility of early retirement, while providing a cost savings in the General Fund over a period of time through attrition, the Bill appears to have other possible "side benefits" including:

a) A "reasonable compromise" regarding the controversial issue of educational credits for retirement purposes, subsequent to PL 19-19 and PL 20-4. Because the proposed incentive program for early retirement limits eligibility to current GOVGUAM employees under the Defined Benefit Plan, the earlier arguments against prior legislation that aims to reinstate "college credits for retirement purposes" render themselves inapplicable under this proposal. b) Is more "palatable" for all classes of long term government employees under the Defined Benefit Plan, in

that the nature of Bill 609 is non-discriminatory--the Bill recognizes the worthiness of GOVGUAM workers across all service categories and provides an equitable benefit for all its eligible members, rather than limiting service credit purchase benefits to a selected class of "elite" employees, i.e. former civil service employees and military service members, college degree holders, etc., under prior legislation. c) GOVGUAM may begin realizing a reduction in personnel and costs related thereto, immediately upon enactment of the Bill into law. And, d) Gradually opening opportunities for some privatization of certain government services which may be subcontracted, as positions are eliminated in non-critical and non-essential job categories.

I would like to bring to the Committee's attention, however, a couple of concerns relating to the concept of "having worked for a living" through government service. In as much as some government employees have benefited earlier on some form of credit purchase for retirement purposes (in some cases as much as 8 years), I am uncomfortable with the idea of having GOVGUAM employees "buying their way through the retirement system" with but a few years of actual government service.

In the interest of further protecting the credibility and integrity of the Retirement Fund and government work ethics, and as a precaution to the probability of an "instant brain drain of government workers in specialized fields," by providing prior beneficiaries of service credit purchases an option to buy an additional 5 years of service credits, the Committee may wish to consider setting some limitations pertaining to the aggregate sum of service credit purchases allowable from all prior provisions by law and under this Act. A stipulation may include something to the effect that, "Any person who has purchased and received service credits for retirement purposes under any other provisions and entitlements of the Retirement Fund, as provided by law or regulation, may be eligible to participate under this Act, provided, however, that the combined total of all purchases of service credits toward retirement SHALL NOT EXCEED FIVE (5) YEARS, inclusive of any other prior service credit purchases for retirement purposes."

Except for the one concern pertaining to cumulative service credit purchases, I wholeheartedly support the intent and purpose of Bill 609. Your efforts in exploring avenues for the reduction of operational costs in GOVGUAM, as a way of realizing immediate and long term savings to the government (ultimately the tax payers), while concurrently providing a reasonable early retirement opportunity for GOVGUAM employees without the threat of causing hardship to anyone, are admirable and commendable.

Hafa Adai. Due to my teaching responsibilities at UOG, I am unable to attend your scheduled 11:00 a.m. public hearing scheduled for April 17, 1998. I would appreciate inclusion of my written testimony related to Bill 609. I applaud your efforts to develop legislative policy related to the reorganization of the Government of Guam. While it is evident that the Government of Guam's revenues are on the decline, efforts by Legislative policy makers to streamline public services via a temporary hiring freeze must be carefully considered.

Bill 609, section 6 has serious implications that if passed into law will affect the delivery of social welfare services to Guam's residents. With the increase of drug abuse and family violence in Guam, placing a freeze on Government of Guam social work positions is critical at this time.

Bill 609's list of exceptions to the Temporary Hiring Freeze does not include social workers employed by various Government of Guam agencies (i.e., Child Protective Services, Mental Health, Department of Youth Affairs). Most social workers in the Government of Guam function as case workers, case managers, supervisors, and educators. These functions are important in the problems.

It is my opinion that a temporary hiring freeze of Government of Guam social work positions will result in heavier client caseloads and overburdened social work employees. This in turn will result in individuals, couples, and families unable to receive social welfare services in an appropriate and timely manner. Therefore, I recommend that the exceptions listed under Bill 609 Section 6 include social work positions within the Government of Guam.

Dear Senator Forbes:

Thank you for allowing me to comment on Bill 609. I believe that the bill is appropriate in this time of economic uncertainty and that the intent to save costs over the long term for the government of Guam, and ultimately, the people, by having employees retire at an earlier financial stage, will be met if this bill is passed.

However, I would hope that you would consider three changes to the proposed bill. The first is that Section 6 of the proposed bill stated that instead of the government agency losing that particular position and its funding, that bill reduce the budget for that agency by the same amount. This gives the agency the flexibility to determine whether the position is critical and to reallocate the funds to meet their needs. That is to say, that if the agency needs a administrator, that it should be able to fill that position instead of two other positions that are not deemed critical at that time.

The second point that I hope you will consider is to lengthen the period of time that the government and individual must pay for these credits. I believe that the period of time should be for a four (4) year repayment schedule for both, rather than the current proposal of three (3) years for an employee (Section 2 and 3), and two (2) years for the government (Section 5). This would allow both parties an opportunity to pay for these credits in a reasonable fashion.

The final change or clarification that I hope that the committee considers is to state clearly in section 2(B) that if an employee signs for a promissory note, that <u>no</u> interest is charged. Or if there is interest that the Retirement Fund is to charge, the interest rate should be computed based upon the remaining amount of the principal each year, rather than a straight simple interest

rate. This would help alleviate the cost that the employee would be forced to pay.

Thank you for the opportunity to comment on this bill. I strongly urge the committee to propose its passage into law.

TESTIMONY ON BILL 609

Hafa Adai and good morning Senator Mark Forbes, and distinguished members of this committee. My name is John Quinata, Director of the Customs and Quarantine Agency. I appear before you today to offer testimony on Bill 609...a piece of legislation, which in essence, seeks to streamline Gov-Guam's workforce, by establishing an incentive program for early retirement for Gov-Guam employees.

As a member of this community, I realize that in light of the ailing Asian economy, our local economy is not up to par with recent years and that signifies a decline in much needed revenues for our island. I understand that measures must be taken to control spending within our government...but, as the Director of a law enforcement agency...I question at what expense.

Although I agree with the intention behind Bill 609...I do not agree with a portion of the Bill, specifically, Section 6, with regard to a temporary hiring freeze. Although Customs Inspectors of the agency is exempted from this freeze, it is with certain restrictions. As the bill stands, only Customs Inspectors will not be affected. However, this leaves us at a disadvantage with our upper management level employees, who are sworn officers as well. Most of these officers qualify for the retirement incentive plan, and if they take advantage, we would feel a loss in operations...right down to our supervisory levels. Although that may sound insignificant to many, the fact remains, most of our officers in supervisory positions are needed, on an "on-site" basis with our inspectors. Without them, our front-line officers would lack proper leadership in preventing the importation of illegal drugs and contraband into our community. And in light of our growing "ice" problem, the consequences could prove drastic.

Therefore, Senator Forbes and distinguished committee members, I ask that your remove the restrictions, and allow for <u>all</u> sworn officers of the Customs and Quarantine Agency to be exempt from this hiring freeze. Doing so would allow our agency to better fulfill our mission of protecting our island, our people and our resources. Thank you for allowing me this time to speak on behalf of officers in my agency. If you have any questions, I will be more than willing to answer them at this time.

PUBLIC HEARING ON BILL NO. 609 APRIL 17TH, 1998

Buenas Dias, Senator Forbes and members of this committee! Thank you for this opportunity to provide input concerning Bill No. 609. I wish to speak specifically to one section of this bill, Section 6, which provides that "the appropriated funding and FTE for any position in the government of Guam, funded by the General Fund or any fund appropriated . . ." by this body, "which becomes vacant . . . shall be considered automatically repealed." The bill then lists various positions which are exceptions to this provision. I am here to recommend that social workers, social service administrators, and related social work positions be exempted from this freeze.

My name is Vivian Dames and I am an associate professor, founder and current Coordinator of the Bachelor of Social Work Degree Program (BSW) at the University of Guam. The University of Guam has been offering this professional degree since 1980. Since then we have graduated one hundred students, a majority of whom have remained in Guam or returned to other islands in the region and are employed as social workers or in a related position in various fields of practice in the public and private sectors.

Social workers and social service supervisors and administrators should be added to this list because they are essential government workers. In addition, social workers in particular fields should be included in several categories already listed in the bill. For example:

- (A) Nurses, school health counselors, medical and psychiatric social workers.
- (B) Teachers, school counselors and school social workers.
- (E) Guards and correctional social workers at the Department of Corrections

In our public welfare system, in health and mental health settings, in our new school districts, in correctional settings, and in our newly established Department of Integrated Services for Individuals with Disabilities (DISID), as just a few examples, social workers are an essential members of the team. Without professional social workers at both the direct services and supervisory levels, persons on public assistance are unable to gain the skills and organize the resources needed to obtain and maintain employment as required under our new welfare reform initiative; investigations of child abuse and family violence are not conducted within the time period required by law placing children and women at risk; individuals with mental illnesses are not provided the out-patient treatment and case management services needed to prevent acts of violence and institutionalization; the discharge of patients from the hospital are delayed; young people are not provided the activities and help they need to be able to complete their education; recidivism rates at both the Department of Youth Affairs and the Department of Corrections are likely to increase; and the increasingly complex maze of services and policies affecting persons with disabilities will remain difficult, if not impossible, for some to negotiate. The number of social services vacancies in some agencies is already critical. Further reductions simply forces this government to remain in a crisis mode in our response to escalating social problems rather than being able to take a more prevention, social development or --- to rework an important post-Paka buzzword --- "social" mitigation approach. This inevitably

We come here today to testify against Bill 609 "An Act to Establish Incentive Programs for Early Retirement for GovGuam Employees as part of a General Reorganization Effort in the Government of Guam".

Servicio Para I ManAmko(SPIMA) is a project of the GovGuam Association of Retired Persons (GGARP) which was founded in 1969 as a private, community based organization. GGARP oversees our projects which provide services to thousands of elderly each day through services at the senior citizen centers and through the provision of transportation.

Bill 609 as it is written now, does not consider exempting a variety of government of Guam positions critical to aging programs that would not be replaceable should the incumbents opt to retire. Many of our elderly are recipients in many government programs such as medical social services, dental care, welfare, food stamps, and general assistance. Some of our aged are victims of abuse which require social workers at Adult Protective Services (APS) to investigate immediately. In addition, the coordination and management of services to the elderly as provided for by law, rests with the Division of Senior Citizens of the Department of Public Health and Social Their expertise and thorough understanding of both federal and Services. local mandates is critical in the quality leadership needed. DSC cannot afford to loose anymore staff nor can any of the other divisions within that department. We already understand that there are many vacancies there that need to be filled.

The newly formed **Department of Integrated Services for Individuals** with **Disabilities** (**DISID**) supposedly has only 50% of their positions filled. Would the remaining vital positions be lost if this bill be passed? Many of the positions are social work positions for support services and positions that require the evaluation and monitoring of the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA).

Many of our senior citizens are victims of depression and some with substance abuse and other mental health issues. We are already dismayed because there are few with the expertise in geriatric mental health. But as the **Department of Mental Health and Substance Abuse** has been building on this expertise and in work with families, some 50 positions which are now vacant, may be lost in addition to the masters degreed positions within their department.

What would happen if the most seasoned of government employees decide to retire now and their positions not be replaced? We suggest to you Mr. Chairperson, that the void would be tremendous, and the exodus of such expertise would be fatal to social services programs for the man'amko, for persons with disabilities, and our community in general.

We are now just understanding the challenges of the new millennium. Mr. Chairperson, a child born today is predicted to live until age 90 if a boy, and age 96 if a girl. Can you believe this? They expect those persons born in the 1940's and 50's to live until at least age 85 years. Experts in the field of aging say that the most productive years are now projected to be from 60-70 years old. Our population is not increasing, it is aging!

Mr. Chairperson, we are ill prepared at this point to deal with the influx of elderly and persons with disabilities in our communities, in social services, and in the work force. We, as a caring community, as policy makers and implementors, must plan well for those retiring, those getting older, and those who have disabilities.

The early retirement incentive would do little to help us in this challenge. We suspect hat many that would be qualified are not even 50 years old, and would be in the retirement system for 35-40 years. In addition, how would they remain productive and active so as to prolong their lives and maintain good mental and physical health? How can their skills be utilized to meet the personnel needs in other categories of work in the private sector such as in tourism, and private health and social services? What retooling or retraining will be provided for the estimated thousand who may take advantage of this early retirement?

Testimony on Bill 609

Senator Mark Forbes and other members of the Government Affairs Committee of the Twenty-fourth Legislature:

This is my written testimony of that which I presented orally Friday, April 17, 1998.

Senator Forbes and other members of your committee, I laud you in your efforts toward reducing government expenditure especially in light of Guam's ailing economy.

Before I address the contents of Bill 609, I would like to point out that Bill 609 addresses two different issues. While the two issues are related, I strongly feel that each issue should be separately addressed.

I do not favor early retirement for the following reasons:

- 1. The attractiveness of early retirement will result in many employees retiring therefore increasing the number of retirees who will be receiving pensions, while simultaneously reducing the number of contributors towards the retirement fund. The reduced number of contributors towards the retirement fund as a result of the new system, the public law that adopted the 401K, will be further compounded.
- 2. Early retirement will entice many employees whose children are still dependent. With the high cost of living, many families will have difficulty maintaining the life style they are used to with less than 50% or any percentage less than 100%. Unquestionably some of these young retirees may be able to find employment in the private sector, but with an ailing economy, the number will be less than more. Will not this result in families suffering or having to resort to social welfare, food stamps, free school lunch, and perhaps stealing and robing? How much hope is there for advanced education for children in these families?

There will be some of these early retirees who will be able to return to Government of Guam under special contracts therefore coming out ahead, but does not this defeat the desire to reduce government spending?

3. Early retirement will drain the Government of Guam of many employees in their prime. For many employees with fifteen to twenty years of service, the Government of Guam has invested on many of them tremendous amount of monies for training both locally and abroad. The less expensive inexperienced employee cannot altogether substitute employees with years of experience and intensive on-the-job training even with the vitality of youth.

I support strong control on employment towards reducing government expenditure; however, I do not favor the "fast track" procedure as proposed in Sub-Section 81113.3, Section 5 of Bill 609. Instead, I recommend the following:

- 1. That the legislature scrutinize the annual budget request and approve only those FTEs that are substantially justified.
- 2. That no approved FTE be filled by a position of different title when it becomes vacant.
- 3. That no approved FTE be filled in an acting capacity or by temporary employment. Exception to this will be for limited term employment for emergency certified teachers for the classroom only if professional-certified teacher applicants are not available.
- 4. That no approved FTE be filled by any kind of contractual appointment including "double dipping". That a retiree who desires to return to any Government of Guam service must temporarily relinquish all Government of Guam benefits including pension.
- 5. That any violation of items #1 through #4 above will result in the immediate deletion of the FTE.

Other suggestions towards reducing government expenditure are as follows:

- I. Introduce a bill for a five-year or even a three-year moratorium for <u>new</u> textbook adoptions except for science, history, and political science textbooks.
- 2. Introduce a bill to delete the "Miscellaneous" item in the annual budget. This section encourages misspending. Provide for "emergency" and special need requests as they arise.
- 3. Review the Executive Branch towards reducing the number of departments and agencies. Consolidation will reduce the number of department heads.
- 4. Go slow in introducing bills that require additional and astronomical expenditures. Identify specific funding sources for bills that require funding for their implementation.

Dear Senator Forbes:

This is a formal testimony regarding Bill 609 "An Act to Establish Incentive Programs for Early Retirement for GovGuam Employees as part of a General Reorganization Effort in the Government of Guam" of which you sponsored recently.

The GovGuam Association of Retired Persons (GGARP) is a 29 year old, private, not for profit organization comprised of Government of Guam retirees. We manage several senior citizen programs including the 16 senior centers and transportation services to our man'amko island wide.

We come here to day to plead you **reconsider going forward with this bill**. The idea of developing cost saving activities for the government and to even reorganize to streamline on personnel is admirable. However, the manner in which you wish to accomplish this appears to be counterproductive.

There are approximately 8,000 government of Guam employees today. Of that number, we can expect that about 1/3 would be eligible for early retirement if this bill passes. It is therefore conceivable that 2,500 employees may opt to leave public service. These individuals have perhaps the most educational and experiential background in the work force. These are individuals who have had tax payer dollars invested in their training and in their long term contributions to the government. When they leave, what level of expertise will be left, especially if their positions will not be filled?

Mr. Chairperson, the Administration on Aging of the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, is predicting that the **average baby boomers will live to be 85 years** old. That means those persons who would probably consider this early retirement are more than likely in the 45-55 year old category. These individuals could theoretically be **receiving retirement benefits for another 35-40 years**, and twice as long as the time they contributed to the fund and were active. Can we really afford this?

We suggest that the idea of early retirement be revisited and if it continues to appear to be a feasible option, that a **comprehensive territory wide plan** be developed that will consider how these retirees can be encouraged to continue to contribute to our community and how the government will reconcile the tremendous loss of the early retiree's expertise. If you should have additional information, please let us know.

I am opposed to Bill No. 609, which attempts to reduce the numbers of government employees by granting additional retirement credits. I believe the measure would further weaken the Retirement Fund, which has a huge unfunded liability. The last actuarial study completed on the Retirement Fund showed that about one-third of anticipated benefits will not be paid out because of the shortfall in funds. A current study is being done now by the Retirement Fund, and will be completed by Deloitte & Touche in the next few months, I have been told. While investments of assets of the Retirement Fund may have done well as the entire stock market has done, there should be caution in liberalizing benefits to be paid out.

As I believe you are aware, our office has been required by public law to be notified when agencies of the government fall behind in their required contributions to the Retirement Fund. The Guam Memorial Hospital is now behind over \$17 million in payments. Thus we have lost investment opportunities of a substantial amount.

Furthermore, I believe there is a mistaken assumption in Bill No. 609 that retirees will not be rehired under special contracts as consultants, as happened the last time that an early retirement program was offerred. Also, an unknown number of employees retired for a period of time, and then were rehired. The present Governor may be willing to reduce the number of employees, but what about his successors?

The mechanism of attempting to control the vacancies by Legislative concurrence is probably not consitutional. In INS v. Chada, the U.S. Supreme Court held that one house vetoes of executive regulations violated the Constitution. Another case Anderson v. Lamm limited control of a State Legislature to specify numbers of employees that the Executive branch could hire.

The practical effect of making an early retirement possible on the current operations of government should not be ignored. Just a couple of years ago, the Legislature enticed hundreds of employees to retire by incorporating an end to certain COLA benefits to employees who retired by a certain date. From an auditing perspective, we discovered that many supervisors and program managers retired, who took with them much of the institutional memory that is so important in responding to audit issues raised. I feel the Government of Guam will lose more of its experienced personnel if retirement incentives are offerred again.

If the Legislature is determined to pursue this course of action, let me suggest some possible amendments to consider. First, I would suggest that no more than two years should be given, rather than five years of service credit. I believe many employees would leave if two years was possible. Two years of credit does not weaken the Retirement Fund as much as five years of credit. At 2.5% per year of service five years of credit would amount to 12.5% of additional annuity as opposed to 5% if two years was the maximum.

Second, I would incorporate a prohibition of a retiree from being permitted to retain the credit if he or she should ever return to government service. I would suggest that the Retirement Fund would simply refund the amount paid in by the employee, but that the additional years of credit would be subtracted from total service for any future annuity computation.

In other Pacific Islands, governments have reduced the work hours of current employees to entice employees to retire. In Pohnpei State, Federated States of Micronesia. employees have been placed on 10% fewer hours. In American Samoa, employees have been placed on 20% fewer hours. These drastic actions have both cut payroll costs as well as made the government a less attractive place to work.

I would like to suggest that additional public hearings be held. Because your legislation would impact the annuities of thousands of retirees, I would ask that their input be sought by holding hearings at community centers and by actively asking their comments.

Certainly the Retirement Fund Board's advice should be considered. I would like to know, for example, what year the Retirement Fund is expected to be depleted. The U.S. government has estimated very recently that the Social Security Fund will be bankrupt in the year 2032. I would like the Legislature mandate studies that show the impact of our unfunded liability and how the Retirement Fund can deal with the Fund's depletion. Should annuities be cut now for all annuitants or should we simply let the depletion of the Fund occur naturally while maintaining the present levels of disbursement.

In conclusion, this bill has serious impact on the Retirement Fund and much more study needs to be done before it is passed.

The Camp Watkins Road expansion project will mean delays for commuters, heavy equipment traffic for residents and dusty walkways for pedestrians.

But businessman David Lai is willing to endure about a year of construction outside his popular restaurant because he knows an expanded road will mean better busi-

ness later on.
"When they're done, it will make my business more exposed," the general manager of the new Shirley's Coffee Shop said yesterday. "And foot traffic will be better than what I have now

The Department of Public Works and Black Construction Corp. signed a contract and broke ground yesterday to begin expanding Camp Watkins Road, officially named Gov. Carlos Camacho Road, in Tamuning.

Officials hope the \$7 million project will be completed within a r, said Tony Quinata, director of Public Works.

The two-lane road will be spread out to five lanes with sidewalks, as outlined in Gov. Carl Gutierrez's Vision 2001 plan for infrastructure upgrades. The road project calls for new and improved streetlights and eventually landscaping, Quinata

Lai of Shirley's Coffee Shop said he's been assured by Public Works officials that two lanes will remain open while the road undergoes construction.

"Even if it does get busy with the construction, I think my customers will go out of their way to get good food," Lai said. "I have a lot of loyal customers who won't let the construction get in their way.

Bill 609 aims to trim GovGuam's work force

The ponderous, lumbering animal known as the government of Guam needs to shed some weight, according to some officials and govemment employees.

It's not a new concept, but some senators and government employees said yesterday that a bill to slowly trim the number of government employees has the right intention.

Bill 609, if passed, would impose a government hiring freeze and offer early retirement to some GovGuam employees. The freeze would affect 4,300 positions paid by the General Fund and 4,200 Department of Education jobs, according to the Department of Administration.

Sen. Mark Forbes, the bill's author, said a new law is needed be-

cause with an ailing economy, the government will take in less and less money.

"With the decrease in business activity, you're going to have a decline in revenues," said Forbes, R-Sinajana. "It's like night following

To deal with falling revenues, the government can either raise taxes or

trim costs, and Forbes said his bill aims to cut the government's largest expense - personnel salaries.

Any employee under the government's old retirement plan, the defined benefits plan, can buy up to five years of employment toward retirement. So an employee with 20 years of government service can pay five years worth of employee contributions and retire under a more lucrative 25-year retirement

Felix Dungca Jr., a government employee, said the early retirement plan should be popular among his fellow employees.

"No doubt about it." Dungca said. "I'm pretry sure there's a lot of employees who will jump at this opportunity. I don't see why they

Dungca said his parents took ad-

vantage of a similar early retirement plan the last time one was offered more than 20 years ago. Although he said he would change the bill to say that an employee who buys into the plan must retire, he agrees with

the bill's intent.
"The government, I think, is doing the right thing in saying we can't continue to meet our expenses if our revenues decrease," Dungca said.

Jim Friedenbach, a University of Guam professor, agreed.

"Everybody knows the Gov-Guam payroll is really top heavy," Friedenbach said. "It's hurting us now but three or four years down the line that's going to cause some major problems."

Sen. Felix Camacho, R-Tarruning, said the bill's effect on the retirement fund needs to be

looked at, but said GovGuam should follow the federal government's and private sector's lead.

"GovGuarn is the only entity that is continuously growing and spending like there's no end," Carnacho

To stop hiring, the bill says any position that becomes vacant is automatically eliminated, except for certain key jobs such as teachers, nurses, doctors, policemen and firefighters.

If an agency's director feels the position needs to be filled, the bill would allow the governor to send a request to the Legislature, which could approve the position without a public hearing.



Refinancing bonds may save \$700K a year, GPA chief says

The Guam Power Authority should refinance about \$260 million in bonds to take advantage of lower interest rates, the general manager yesterday.

The utility took out 30-уеаг bonds in 1992 and 1994 to pay for capital improvement projects. said GPA

General Manager Rick Unpingco. The interest rate for the bonds has been more than 6 percent, but a recent study by Goldman, Sachs and Co. indicates the utility could refinance the loans at an interest rate of about 5 percent.

'This is a shot in the arm for GPA as far as cash flow is con-cerned." Unpingco said.

Refinancing the bonds could save the utility about \$700,000 to \$950,000 a year, or about \$25 million for the remaining lifetime of the bonds, Unpingco said.

The move also could benefit residents next year when the utility plans to raise rates to pay for a new Piti power plant being built by the Houston-based company

"Now is the time to do this. we want to take advantage of the tes," Unpingco said.
The GPA board is asking the

Legislature to authorize the refinancing, he said.

Unpingco said the move would not mean savings for residents, but a better bond rating for the authority.

"It's a plus for the whole territory, for the General Fund as a whole," Unpingco said. Utility officials hope to have the legisla-tion approved by July I, he

The eyes have it

One of the pictures in this year's cat calendar has three white cats. One has two blue-colored eyes; one has a left blue eye and right yellow eye; the third has a left yellow eye and a right blue eye. Very strange — though no doubt some geneticist could explain it easily enough.

In bridge, the good players keep their eyes open, regardless of their color. They look at each card as it is played. They also keep their ears open, listening closely to the bidding

In this deal, how do you plan the play in four hearts after West leads the spade king?

Your three-heart advance after partner's takeout double shows some 9-11

Start by checking losers. With one in spades and one in hearts, you must avoid losing two diamond tricks.

In particular when an opponent has bid, once the dummy appears, check the points. Here, there are 16 in the dummy and you have 10. That leaves only 14 for the opponents, yet West opened the bidding. So, he must have the diamond ace. Just hope that it is a singleton or doubleton. If West has ace-third of diamonds, you have no chance against best defe

After winning with the spade ac play a trump. Let's assume West girl with his ace, cashes the spade a and exits with his final trump. (If West ducks the heart ace, or if you think he started with the singleton ace, you might go for an endplay: Cash two or three of dummy's clubs, then lead a trump to West's ace, hoping he has only spades and diamonds left.) Now you play a diamond to dummy's queen, then duck a diamond on the way back. West's ace dropping onto the table is a sight for watchful eyes!











