Dear Legislative Secretary Brown:

Enclosed please find Substitute Bill No. 233 (COR), "AN ACT TO REPEAL AND REENACT §46.80 OF CHAPTER 46 OF TITLE 9 OF THE GUAM CODE ANNOTATED, RELATIVE TO DEFINING IDENTITY THEFT AND PROVIDING PROTECTION THEREFOR", which I have signed into law today as **Public Law No. 25-101**.

This legislation broadens the current law which forbids impersonation to injure or defraud, by making it illegal to impersonate or assume a false identity to obtain money, goods, services and otherwise use the identity of another person to injure, steal, or defraud others.

This legislation updates our current criminal statutes due to the more "modern" crimes we see now where individuals use another persons identifying information, such as the variety of information now kept in computers for drivers licenses, passports, social security, credit cards and other data bases.


This new legislation imposes penalties of second degree felony if a value of at least \$5,000 is obtained by the person using a false identity. In addition, the person found guilty of this crime must pay back the victim for the financial loss caused by the illegal use of identifying information. Court records shall also include information that the individual whose identity







15 **Section 2.** This Act shall be known and cited as "*The Identity Protection*
16 *Act of 2000.*"

17 **Section 3.** Section 46.80 of Chapter 46 of Title 9 of the Guam Code
18 Annotated is hereby *repealed and reenacted* to read as follows:

19 **"Section 46.80. Impersonation; Identity Theft; Defined &**
20 **Punished.** (a) A person commits an offense when that person:
21 (1) impersonates another or assumes a false identity
22 and does an act in such assumed character or false identity
23 to obtain a benefit for oneself or another, or to injure or
24 defraud another;

1 (2) pretends to be a representative of some person or
2 organization and does an act in such pretended capacity
3 with intent to obtain a benefit for oneself or for another, or to
4 injure or defraud another;

5 (3) impersonates another, assumes a false identity or
6 makes a false or misleading statement regarding the identity
7 of any person, in an oral or written application for services,
8 for the purpose of obtaining services;

9 (4) possesses or obtains any personal identifying
10 information pertaining to another person, without the
11 authorization of that person, and uses or attempts to use that
12 information, or assists another person in using the
13 information, for any unlawful purpose, including to:

14 (i) fraudulently obtain, or attempt to obtain,
15 money, credit, goods, services, anything of value, or
16 medical information in the name of another person;

17 (ii) injure or defraud, or attempt to injure or
18 defraud, another person;

19 (iii) avoid, or attempt to avoid, the payment of
20 debt or other legal obligation; *or*

21 (iv) avoid, or attempt to avoid, prosecution for
22 a crime in the name of the other person without the
23 consent of that person.

24 (b) As used in this Section, '*personal identifying information*'
25 means the name, address, telephone number, driver's license or

1 driver's license number, social security card or social security
2 number, passport or passport number, official government of
3 Guam or other state identification card or number, mother's
4 maiden name, demand deposit account number, savings account
5 number, credit card or credit card number, or a debit card or debit
6 card number, or any name or number that may be used, alone or
7 in conjunction with any other information, to assume the identity
8 of a person. The list in this Subsection is *not* exhaustive.

9 (c) An offense under this Section is a felony of the second
10 degree *if* the benefit obtained, or the injury or fraud perpetrated
11 on another, or the payment sought to be avoided, *if any*, is at least
12 Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00); otherwise, it is a felony of the
13 third degree.

14 (d) A person found guilty of violating any provisions of
15 this Section shall, in addition to any other punishment, be ordered
16 to make restitution for financial loss sustained by a victim as a
17 result of such violation. Financial loss may include any costs
18 incurred by such victim in correcting the credit history of such
19 victim, or any costs incurred in connection with any civil or
20 administrative proceeding to satisfy any debt or other obligation
21 of such victim, including lost wages and attorney's fees.

22 (e) In any case in which a person obtains personal
23 identifying information of another person without the
24 authorization of that person, and uses that information to commit

2 person whose identity was falsely used to commit the crime did
3 *not* commit the crime."

**AN ACT TO REPEAL AND REENACT §46.80 OF
TITLE 9, GUAM CODE ANNOTATED, RELATIVE
TO DEFINING IDENTITY THEFT AND
PROVIDING PROTECTION THEREFOR.**

1 **BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF GUAM:**

2 **Section 1. Legislative Statement.** *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* finds that there
3 are specific provisions in the law prohibiting and penalizing the theft or
4 misuse of the property of others. There, however, exists inadequate
5 protection of individual's identity, particularly in light of the rapid advances
6 in technology and the ever-growing utilization and importance of personal
7 identifying numbers and information to make electronic commercial
8 transactions over the telephone, computer via internet, etc.

9 It is the intent of *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* to protect the residents of Guam
10 by explicitly prohibiting a person from using or attempting to use any
11 personal identifying information of another, such as a person's name, address,
12 telephone number, social security number, driver's license number or bank or
13 other account numbers, to obtain anything of value without the authorization
14 or consent of the other person and by representing that he or she is the other
15 person or is acting with the authorization or consent of the other person, and
16 providing for severe penalties to those who fail to abide this provision.

1 Section 2. This Act shall be known and cited as "The Identity
2 Protection Act of 1999."

3 Section 3. §46.80 of Title 9, Guam Code Annotated, is repealed and
4 reenacted to read:

5 "§46.80. Impersonation; Identity Theft; Defined & Punished.

6 (a) A person commits an offense when he or she:

7 (1) Impersonates another or assumes a false identity and
8 does an act in such assumed character or false identity to obtain a
9 benefit for himself or another or to injure or defraud another;

10 (2) Pretends to be a representative of some person or
11 organization and does an act in such pretended capacity with
12 intent to obtain a benefit for himself or herself or for another, or to
13 injure or defraud another;

14 (3) Impersonates, another, assumes a false identity or
15 makes a false or misleading statement regarding the identity of
16 any person, in an oral or written application for services, for the
17 purpose of obtaining services;

18 (4) Obtains any personal identifying information
19 pertaining to another person, without the authorization of that
20 person, and uses or attempts to use that information, or assists
21 another person in using the information, for any unlawful
22 purpose, including to:

23 (i) Fraudulently obtain, or attempt to obtain,
24 money, credit, goods, services, anything of value, or medical
25 information in the name of another person;

1 (ii) Injure or defraud, or attempt to injure or
2 defraud, another person;

3 (iii) Avoid, or attempt to avoid, the payment of debt
4 or other legal obligation; or

5 (iv) Avoid, or attempt to avoid, prosecution for a
6 crime in the name of the other person without the consent of
7 that person.

8 (b) As used in this Section, *personal identifying information* means
9 the name, address, telephone number, driver's license or driver's license
10 number, social security card or social security number, passport or
11 passport number, official government of Guam or other state
12 identification card or number, mother's maiden name, demand deposit
13 account number, savings account number, credit card or number, or a
14 debit card or number, or any name or number that may be used, alone
15 or in conjunction with any other information, to assume the identity of a
16 person. The list in this subsection is not exhaustive.

17 (c) An offense under this Section is a felony of the second
18 degree, if the benefit obtained, or the injury or fraud perpetrated on
19 another, or the payment sought to be avoided, if any, is at least \$5,000;
20 otherwise, it is a felony of the third degree.

21 (d) A person found guilty of violating any provisions of this
22 Section shall, in addition to any other punishment, be ordered to make
23 restitution for financial loss sustained by a victim as a result of such
24 violation. Financial loss may include any costs incurred by such victim

1 in correcting the credit history of such victim or any costs incurred in
2 connection with any civil or administrative proceeding to satisfy any
3 debt or other obligation of such victim, including lost wages and
4 attorney's fees.

5 (e) In any case in which a person obtains personal identifying
6 information of another person without the authorization of that person,
7 and uses that information to commit a crime in addition to a violation of
8 subsection (a), and is convicted of that crime, the court records shall
9 reflect that the person whose identity was falsely used to commit the
10 crime did not commit the crime."



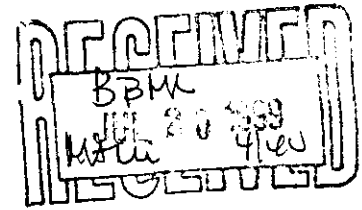

1 **BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF GUAM:**

2 **Section 1. Legislative Statement.** *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* finds that there
3 are specific provisions in the law prohibiting and penalizing the theft or
4 misuse of the property of others. There, however, exists inadequate
5 protection of individual's identity, particularly in light of the rapid advances
6 in technology and the ever-growing utilization and importance of personal
7 identifying numbers and information to make electronic commercial
8 transactions over the telephone, computer via internet, etc.

9 It is the intent of *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* to protect the residents of Guam
10 by explicitly prohibiting a person from using or attempting to use any
11 personal identifying information of another, such as a person's name, address,
12 telephone number, social security number, driver's license number or bank or
13 other account numbers, to obtain anything of value without the authorization
