1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF GUAM:

- 2 Section 1. Legislative Findings and Intent. Section 7(b) of Public Law
- 3 Number 21-14 authorized a land exchange between Mr. Gregorio A. and Mrs.

Maria T. Garrido the ("Garridos") and the government of Guam. The original property offered to the "Garridos" was not acceptable because of its proximity to the antenna fields in Barrigada. The "Garridos" felt that it was a health hazard. When the parties were not able to find other government owned property in Barrigada, they looked at other properties in the government inventory. They were shown a piece of property in Merizo only to find out that it is reserved for a future school site. They eventually went north and were shown two (2) pieces of property.

After the parties agreed to the choice of property, Lot Number 10120-R16, they proceeded to finalize the transaction. The Office of the Attorney General then issued an opinion stating that the property to be exchanged has to be in Barrigada and it has to be value for value, as stated in the law. The "Garridos" did *not* want a large piece of property that they will have to subdivide and sell in order to construct a new house for their residence. The Government likewise did *not* want to do a land exchange on this basis also. Although the government property offered for the exchange is reserved for that purpose, *I Maga'lahen Guåhan* had stated on a previously vetoed bill dealing with another land exchange that Lot No. 10102-R16 "is occupied by numerous permittees of the Arendo Program and squatters. This is *not* advantageous to the potential recipient, since relocation of existing residents will be difficult and time consuming."

The government property has yet to be surveyed. *I Mina' Bente Singko Na Liheslaturan Guåhan* finds that the Director of the Department of Land Management and Mr. Gregorio A. and Mrs. Maria T. Garrido have

- Section 2. Section 7(b) of Public Law Number 21-14 is hereby *amended* to read as follows:
- "(b) I Maga'lahen Guåhan is authorized to exchange government 6 7 real property designated as Block No. 4, Lot No. 6, Tract 170, West 8 Acres, Municipality of Dededo, Guam, containing an area of 957.68 9 square meters, as shown on Department of Land Management Drawing Number D4-701225, recorded under Document Number 496524, 10 11 Municipality of Dededo, Guam with Lot Number 1090-2-3 Barrigada, 12 Guam, containing an area of approximately one thousand one hundred 13 fifty-five ± (1,155±) square meters, belonging to Mr. Gregorio A. and Mrs. Maria T. Garrido ("Owners") on a value-for-value basis. If the two 14 15 (2) parcels are not of equal value, then the difference in value shall be paid in cash by the party receiving the more valuable parcel." 16
- 17 Section 3. Appraisals. Notwithstanding any other provision 18 of law, the appraisal dated April 21, 1998 by Robert & Robert and the 19 appraisal dated July 10, 1998 by Victor's Appraisal Service on the property 20 owned by the "Garridos'" are deemed to be in compliance with the appraisal 21 requirements.
- Section 4. Appropriations. (a) There is appropriated from the General Fund the sum of Two Thousand Dollars (\$2,000.00) to the

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- Section 2. Section 7(b) of Public Law Number 21-14 is hereby *amended* to read as follows:

Garrido ("Owners") on a value-for-value basis. If the two 15 (2) parcels are *not* of equal value, then the difference in value shall be 16 paid in cash by the party receiving the more valuable parcel."
 - Section 3. Appraisals. Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the appraisal dated April 21, 1998 by Robert & Robert and the appraisal dated July 10, 1998 by Victor's Appraisal Service on the property owned by the "Garridos" are deemed to be in compliance with the appraisal requirements.
- Section 4. Appropriations. (a) There is appropriated from the General Fund the sum of Two Thousand Dollars (\$2,000.00) to the

Department of Land Management to cover the cost for the appraisal of the government land identified in §2 of this Act.

- (b) Should the value of the "Garridos" property be greater than the government property, then there is appropriated such sums as may be necessary from the General Fund to the Department of Land Management to cover the difference in value between the property owned by the "Garrido's" and the property owned by the government as identified in §2 of this Act.
- (c) Notwithstanding any other provision of law, there is hereby authorized and appropriated the sum of Seventeen Thousand Dollars (\$17,000.00) from the General Fund to Mr. Gregorio Garrido to reimburse him for the loss of personal property due to his family's relocation from their Barrigada property.
- Section 5. The provisions of Chapter 75 of Title 21 of the Guam Code

 Annotated, *Chamorro Land Trust Act*, shall *not* apply to this land exchange.

### PUBLIC HEARING December 7, 1999

#### **Committee Report**

The hearing for the Committee on Land, Agriculture, Military Affairs and the Arts was called to order at 9:00 am, by the Chairman, Senator Marcel G. Camacho.

BILL NO. 350(LS): AN ACT TO AMEND PUBLIC LAW 21-14, SECTION 7 (b) RELATIVE TO LAND EXCHANGE.

Senators present: Marcel G. Camacho, Ben C. Pangelinan

Summary of Testimony:

Sen. Camacho: This bill attempts to address another long standing issue where prior legislation allowed for a land exchange to compensate a land owner whose property had been affected by some government work. In the initial legislation a proposal was made to exchange property in the Barrigada with government property in the Barrigada area. Attempts were made to secure a lot in order to accomplish the exchange but it was difficult to find a suitable parcel in the same village. So, what Bill 350 attempts to do is amend the initial legislation to allow for an exchange of property owned by the government outside the Barrigada area.

Mr. Garrido: My dad is in the Philippines right now getting medical treatment so I would like to read written testimony on his behalf. (See attached)

As you can see sir, my father does sound a little bitter and frustrated, but I ask wouldn't you feel that way if the same think was done to you after 21 years? He doesn't mention that our house was fine for 10 years from 1968 to 1978 until the government approved the ponding basin next to our house. I am sure there was a direct correlation between that. So for my dad to say he could have sued the government, yes, he could have, but he left it in the hands of people we trust. My deepest regret is that my mom wasn't able to see this come to closure and see the house, so its tough. I don't know who is opposing us, who doesn't want us to be able to have our place but please, my dad is an old man now, he just wants it done, plain and simple. He is asking for an amendment to the bill that we can stay in our current residence in Agat until something does happen and our new home does get built. He is afraid if the bill does pass that someone is going to say O.K. you have your land, get out! So he's hoping that can be done.

Sen. Camacho: That amendment will be made to the bill.

Mr. Teehan: The houses in Agat are technically the property of the CLTC and I will insure you are able to remain in the home if this bill goes through.

Sen. Camacho: I know my staff has been trying to work with DLM on this matter, Mr. Aguon would you like to make a comment?

Mr. Aguon: I would like to commend Mr. Garrido for his very articulate presentation of the family's situation. I believe we met in my office some time in early 1998, I think subsequent to that meeting Mr. Chairman we did request the CLTC to provide of alternative lots to offer to the Garrido's. At that time I also expressed there maybe a problem on the valuation because it is obvious that the value of the Garrido property would exceed the value of the government property in this case. I think the bill should be written in such a way as to allow for some monetary compensation because if we were to give only a land for land exchange it would not be fair to the Garrido's. This is so it does not become a burden on the agency that is to implement this bill, and if it is DLM we want to make sure the language of the Bill does not become a problem with us. We can go with the lot selected in Dededo, but since we already have the appraisal of their property in Barrigada, we also have an appraisal of a part of the 70 acres in Dededo and we could provide a figure to be incorporated into the bill so that once passed the implementation becomes fluid.

Sen. Camacho: So, you are suggesting that the cost of the physical structure be born by the government.

Mr. Aguon: My understanding is that they are looking for a lot for residential purposes. Our subdivision in Dededo is a 1/2-acre lot, but they will be satisfied with a smaller residential lot as long as there is an appropriation made to compensate them for their home.

Sen. Pangelinan: So the difference in value for the properties should be a separate appropriation.

Mr. Aguon: Absolutely, it should be contained in the bill so that when it comes to us we can expedite it quickly. If you are going to the Government Claims Fund that is a very lengthy process and is also subject to decision by the AG office.

Sen. Camacho: Avelino, thank you for your testimony, I am embarrassed frankly at how long it has taken for us to resolve this matter. I don't want to make any promises as in the past but you know you have my commitment and that my staff has been working with your father and DLM to try to resolve this as expeditiously as possible. I will take the testimony your father has submitted and appeal to the legislative body to try and quickly resolve this. The way the testimony was presented it is concise, clear and passionate and I do feel for what the family has been put through and I want to apologize for the government action rather inaction. Thank you very much for your testimony.

#### COMMITTEE FINDINGS AND RECOMMENDATIONS:

The Committee finds that it has been more than nine (9) years since Public Law 21-14 was enacted and to date the land exchange for the "Garrido's" has yet to be completed. P. L. 21-14:7 authorized two (2) land exchanges, private lot numbers 1090-2-3 and 1090-2-1 are to be exchanged with government land. Public Law 21-92:2 amended the method of exchange from value for value to area for area exchange between lot number 1090-2-3 totaling 1,107 square meters of Barrigada land and an equal size of Barrigada Heights land. Among the numerous problems that the "Garrido's" have encountered are the appropriation of funds for the appraisals and the lead agency to handle the request.

The Committee also finds that the "Garrido's" have endured numerous hardships caused by the inaction of the Government in resolving the problems that it imposed on its citizens. Among the hardship is the loss of most of their household goods to burglars in 1991. This action was reported to the Police, which investigated but was unable to solve the crime. When the "Garrido's" submitted their claim to their insurance company, it was denied because they considered the house abandoned.

The "Garrido's" to this date continue to make mortgage payments to Guam Housing Corp. for the Barrigada property. They are not complaining because the Government is not charging them rent. They have, however, lost out in any potential equity a new home would have accorded them had the land exchange been done on a timely basis.

The Committee recommends compensating the "Garrido's for the loss of their household goods. The Committee also recommends appropriating for the cost of appraisals required to complete the transaction and such sums, should they be needed, to comply with Section 2 of the Bill.

The case of Mr. Gregorio A. Garrido has been a long outstanding matter despite the solution contained in Public Law 21-14. As you probably know, his case has to do with the flooding of his property in Barrigada. Over the years, the government's efforts to resolve it has been stifled largely because of disagreement on land values and lack of selection of government land for exchange. And second is the passage of the Chamorro Land Trust Act which transferred essentially all unreserved public land to them.

Your predecessor, Senadot John C. Salas was working with us on this and we were able to identify several government residential lots for the exchange. These lots were offered to Mr. Garrido who after awhile selected the below described lot:

Block No. 4, Lot No. 6, Tract 170, West Acres, Municipality of Dededo, containing an area of 957.68 square meters, as shown on Land Management Drawing No. D4-70T225, recorded under Document No. 496524.

It is not certain what the status of this parcel is. That is, is it under the Chamorro Land Trust Commission or Land Management? To resolve this, authorizing legislation should address it concisely in order that Land Management can execute it without interference from them. On the

#### TESTIMONY OF MR. GREGORIO A. GARRIDO

Dear Senator Marcel Camacho -

November 25, 1999

Good morning. First of all, let me apologize that I am not able to be personally present at this public hearing, as the Guam Legislature - once again - takes up the issue of my very long standing issue. My name is Gregorio Garrido, from Agat. I have asked my son, Avelino, to read this testimony to you on my behalf. I had to leave for the Philippines on Thursday, November 25, 1999, to go to St. Luke Hospital. I have a heart and diabetes problem, and my doctor has ordered that I go off-island for treatment of my sickness. I am scheduled to return to Guam December 14. If I can return earlier than the 14th, I will try to make it back for the hearing. If it were not for my medical problem, I would have been here at this hearing.

Senator Camacho, and members of the Committee on Land, I didn't think that I would have to come before you again. The last time I was here, I was told by the previous chairman of the Committee on Land, Senator John Salas something that made me feel good. He said to me "Mr. Garrido, I promise you that this will be your last trip to the Legislature for your problem."—or words something like that. I believe Senator Salas then, and I was so happy that my problem is finally going to be resolved. Let me say, Senator Camacho, that this may actually be the very last time that I will give testimony on behalf of the issue which you have brought up for discussion again. If my land problem is not resolved during this time around, I will simply ask my God to forgive each and every person who could have done something to resolve my problem, but did not.

Senator, I was a middle-age man of 44 when this problem first started out, way back in 1978. The young man who is reading my testimony, my son, was only 10 years old when our problem began. Today, he is 31 years old. I just turned 65 years old this past November 26, and I don't think God will give me too much more days for me to come back for another round of public hearing. So this may be my last appearance before you, and if my problem is not resolved now, I will leave it in the hands of God. Not only am I getting old and sickly; I could be dead by then.

My problem, Senator, started in 1978 when the Government of Guam condemned my home and property in Leyang, Barrigada, because they told me it was like a ponding basin. Whenever it rains, it always floods. We were moved out of my own home and property, and we were promised that we would be compensated for that condemnation. The Government relocated me and my

family from one place to another for 10 years before we finally got settled down at the old Teachers' Housing in Agat. At that time our children were very small. Today, all except one is married, and I have become a grandfather at least 9 times. My wife, Maria Toves, familian Bobe from Merizo has since passed away 6 years ago. I have since remarried to Jean Enriquez.

Senator Camacho, I am sure that you have done your research regarding my problem, and you know everything that had been done (or not done) for me over the years, especially since you were a staff of Senator Salas when he was Chairman of the land committee. I know that I had met you there, along with other staff members.

I am sure you know the history of my problem, but just for the record, let me say that one of the very first senator who ever did anything about my problem was Senator Carl Gutierrez. He is now our governor.

It was Senator Gutierrez who had his bill passed into Public Law 21-14 which allowed the government to exchange my land in Barrigada for government land elsewhere, on a value-for-value exchange. Whatever my property was worth, I would be given land equal in value.

Every two years when a new Legislature begins, I bring my case up to the senators, over and over again. I remember various senators who tried to help me, including Senator Ted Nelson, Senator Frank Santos, Senator Eddie Reyes, and Senator John Salas. Senator Salas got as far as having my property and home in Leyang appraised by Land Management, in preparation to giving me land at Dededo. Lastly, of course, you, Senator Camacho, have introduced Bill 350 to address my problem.

Senator Camacho, and senators, I am again coming to you to please help me. I am an old man now, and I would like to have something to own which I can give to my children before I die. Many of the people who were on the list to be compensated by PL 21-14 have been compensated. I am among the very few who have not been compensated. I know you senators do not discriminate people based on their race, but you know, sometimes I feel that maybe if I am not a Filipino, maybe I would have been compensated long time ago.

Senator, there is nothing more I can do which I have not already done. I have cooperated with every senator and government official who has handled my case, including the many times that Public Works has delayed in solving my problem.

When Mr. Gil Shinohara was the Suruhanu many years ago and I brought my case to him, he told him that I should sue the government because it is doing an act of injustice to me. When he became Director of Public Works, I thought I had someone to fight for my cause. Unfortunately, even he as Director did not accomplish the work of having me compensated. When Mr. Tony Quinata became Acting Director of Public Works, I was assured by Senator Salas that Mr. Quinata will surely get my problem fixed. Mr. Quinata is gone from Public Works, and we have another Director, but my problem remains.

Senator Camacho, I don't what else to say. I have been a victim of government red tape for the past 21 years. I wonder how much longer this is going to go on. I often wonder if I will be alive to see it resolved. I certainly hope so. Please give an old man his last request. Please give me justice. Please give me the just compensation for the harm which our government has done to me by throwing me and my family out of our property, and making us live like hobos, going from place to place until we are settled down to a place that is not our choosing.

Before I close, Senator, I want to state for the record that I am attaching, as part of my testimony of today, the affadavit that I made on September 8, 1997 when I was asked by the good staff of Senator Salas to make a notarized statement to describe my problem. Please make the attachment a part of my official testimony.

I thank you for anything you and your colleagues can do. And if this ends up in more red tape, then Senator, may the Good Lord have mercy on you all, because justice has not been done to me for the past 21 years. Maybe justice exists only in the next life. I hope not. I am hoping that I am wrong, and that this Legislature, the 25th Guam Legislature, will be the one that will finally solve my problems. I thank you, and each of the senators, who will look very kindly on this matter.

#### AFFIDAVIT OF MR. GREGORIO A. GARRIDO

This Affidavit is given to describe the saga that I and my family had undergone with the Government of Guam regarding our being removed from our residence in Barrigada, and the government's failure to date to rectify the problem despite continuous pleadings on our part to resolve the matter.

Sometime in 1978 my family and I were forced to vacate our residence in Barrigada because, according to the Department of Public Works, our residence is in a flood hazard area. Over the years since we vacated our home, we were "tossed around from place to place" until we were finally settled down in 1989 at a rental unit of the Department of Administration's old Teachers Staff Housing in Agat, where we are currently staying.

Since we left our Barrigada home, we have left no stone unturned in trying to prevail upon the government to rectify our eviction from our home through a land exchange deal. We had approached governors, directors and senators to help us in our plight. A final solution appeared to have resulted when then Senator Carl T.C. Gutierrez introduced Bill 298 which eventually became PL 21-14, authorizing the governor to exchange our Barrigada Lot. 1090-2-1 for government land. That was in April 1991. Nothing ever came about from that law.

Sometime in 1992 or 1993, I approached the Office of the Suruhanu to seek advice on how to get redress from the government. I was advised by then Suruhanu, Gil Shinohara, that I had every right to sue the government and that perhaps I should. I did not, and continued to seek a solution to my problem through discussions with the government.

On September 1996, then DLM Director J.A. "Tony" Martinez wrote to advise me that a solution to my problem was in sight. I was finally to be given Lot. No. 10120-R16 in Dededo in exchange for my flooded lot in Barrigada. I met with Mr. Gil Shinohara again who had since become DPW Director, and two of his staff people, Mr. Jesse Garcia and Mr. Tony Quinata. Mr. Shinohara gave instructions to these two staffers to "do whatever it takes to give Mr. Garrido his property in time for Christmas as his Christmas present". That was in November 1996. Nothing came about from that conference.

In January of 1997, I met once again with Mr. Shinohara, Mr. Tony Quinata and Mr. Jesse Garcia. Mr. Shinohara again asked Mr. Quinata why my problem isn't yet resolved. Mr. Quinata said that there is in fact money to do the appraisal and that it is only a matter of paper work to have it released. I was assured by Mr. Quinata and Mr. Garcia that they will get to the bottom of my problem and resolve it within a week or two. Mr. Shinohara again instructed his two staffers to resolve my problem right away. Nothing came out of this second conference.

It was then that I approached Senator John C. Salas in February 1997 and explained my plight to him. He assured me he would take my problem seriously, and would get back to me as soon as he is assured of a solution. After giving the senator several months to work things out, I visited him again in July 1997, and was assured by him

that he will definitely have an answer to my problem since he had been assured by the Acting Director of DPW, Mr. Tony Quinata, that my problem will be definitely resolved in a week.

To date, nothing has happened. I cannot help but wonder what, if any, my government is going to do to right the wrong it has done to me after these past 19 years, or whether it intends to do anything at all.



#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF GUAM:

Section 1. Legislative Findings and Intent. Public Law 21-14, Section 7 2 3 (b) authorized a land exchange between Gregorio A. and Maria T. Garrido ("The Garrido's") and the Government of Guam. The original property offered to "The 4 5 Garrido's" was not acceptable because of its proximity to the antenna fields in 6 Barrigada. "The Garrido's" felt that it is a health hazard. When the parties were 7 not able to find other government owned property in Barrigada, they looked at other 8 properties in the government inventory. They were shown a piece of property in 9 Merizo only to find out that it is reserved for a future school site. They eventually 10 went north and were shown two pieces of property. After the parties agreed to the 11 choice of property, Lot No. 10120-R16, they proceeded to finalize the transaction. 12 The Office of the Attorney General then issued an opinion stating that the property to be exchanged has to be in Barrigada and it has to be value for value, as stated in 13
