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Dear Speaker Unpingco:

Enclosed please find Substitute Bill No. 62 (COR), "AN ACT TO ADD CHAPTER 16 TO DIVISION 2 OF TITLE 7, AND TO REPEAL AND REENACT CHAPTER 13 OF TITLE 16, BOTH OF THE GUAM CODE ANNOTATED, RELATIVE TO PROVIDING CERTAIN PROTECTIONS TO VOLUNTEERS OF GOVERNMENTAL ENTITIES, NONPROFIT ORGANIZATIONS AND OTHER ENTITIES IN LAWSUITS", which I have signed into law today as **Public Law No. 25-38**.

With the South Pacific Games well underway, I can conceive of no more appropriate time for the enactment of this legislation. The spirit of volunteerism, which is the driving force of the 11th South Pacific Games, is in fact, a feature of this community throughout the year. From typhoon emergencies to Presidential visits, our island's people have always risen to the occasion. Establishing minimum liability protection is the least we can do for those who have offered of their own time and energies on behalf of the community.

I would though recommend to the Liheslaturan Guåhan that it revise the new Section 13102 provided in the bill. For the enforcement of certain traffic requirements punishable as misdemeanors, arresting authority is granted to all peace officers. This is unprecedented and may be impractical given that not all peace officers are trained in arrest procedures and the requirements of probable cause. Furthermore, Section 13102 limits the authority for arrest of Speaker/Bill62/P.L. 25-38 June 1999 Page -3-

violators to only four hours. Currently, there is no time limit on the enforcement of misdemeanors. In essence, the Liheslaturan Guåhan's attempt to strengthen enforcement in this area may have in fact undermined it. I therefore urge you and your colleagues to revisit this section to clarify legislative intent.

AN ACT TO ADD CHAPTER 16 TO DIVISION 2 OF TITLE 7, AND TO REPEAL AND REENACT CHAPTER 13 OF TITLE 16, BOTH OF THE GUAM CODE ANNOTATED, RELATIVE TO PROVIDING CERTAIN PROTECTIONS TO VOLUNTEERS OF GOVERNMENTAL ENTITIES, NONPROFIT ORGANIZATIONS AND OTHER ENTITIES IN LAWSUITS.

#### **BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF GUAM:**

Section 1. Legislative Findings. I Liheslaturan Guåhan finds that the 2 willingness of volunteers to offer their services is deterred by the potential for 3 liability actions against them. As a result, many nonprofit public and private 4 5 organizations and governmental entities, including voluntary associations, social service agencies, educational institutions and other civic programs, 6 including public and private partnerships, have been adversely affected by 7 8 the withdrawal of volunteers from boards of directors and service in other 9 capacities. The contributions of these programs to the community are thereby diminished, resulting in fewer and higher cost programs than would be 10 11 obtainable if volunteers were participating.

12 I Liheslaturan Guåhan further finds that although Federal and local funds 13 are expended on useful and cost-effective social service programs, many of 14 which are National in scope, these programs remain heavily dependent on 15 volunteer participation. These programs also represent some of the most 16 successful public-private partnerships. Specifically, the following reasons support the legislative intent to clarify and limit the liability risk assumed by 17 18 volunteers in connection with such participation:

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the scope of problems created by the legitimate fears of (a) volunteers about frivolous, arbitrary or capricious lawsuits; 20

21 the residents of Guam depend on, and both the Federal and (b) 22 local government expend funds on and provide tax exemptions and 23 other consideration to, numerous social programs that depend on the 24 services of volunteers; and

1 (c) it is in the interest of both the Federal and local government 2 to encourage the continued operation of volunteer service organizations 3 and contributions of volunteers due to the lack of capacity by the 4 Federal and local government to carry out all of the services provided 5 by such organizations and volunteers.

6 Section 2. Legislative Intent. It is the intent of *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* 7 to promote the interests of social service program beneficiaries and taxpayers, 8 and to sustain the availability of programs, nonprofit organizations, and 9 governmental entities that depend on volunteer contributions by reforming 10 the laws to provide certain protections from liability abuses related to 11 volunteers serving nonprofit organizations and governmental entities.

Section 3. Chapter 16 is hereby *added* to Division 2 of Title 7 of
the Guam Code Annotated to read as follows:

14 "CHAPTER 16. VOLUNTEER LIABILITY PROTECTION. 15 16 Section 16101. Short Title. This Act may be cited as 17 the 'Volunteer Protection Act of 1999.' 18 Section 16102. For purposes of this Act: Definitions. 19 'Economic loss' shall mean any pecuniary loss resulting (a) 20 from harm, including the loss of earnings or other benefits related 21 to employment, medical expense loss, replacement services loss, 22 loss due to death, burial costs, and loss of business or employment 23 opportunities, to the extent recovery for such loss is allowed 24 under applicable local law.

(b) *'Harm*' shall mean and include physical, nonphysical, economic and non-economic loss.

(c) 'Noneconomic loss' shall mean loss for physical and emotional pain, suffering, inconvenience, physical impairment, mental anguish, disfigurement, loss of enjoyment of life, loss of society and companionship; loss of consortium, other than loss of domestic service; hedonic damages; injury to reputation and all other nonpecuniary losses of any kind or nature.

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(d) 'Nonprofit organization' shall mean:

(1) any organization which is described in §501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, and exempt from tax under §501(a) of such Code; *or* 

(2) any *not-for-profit* organization which is organized and conducted, pursuant to the laws of Guam, for public benefit and operated primarily for charitable, civic, educational, religious, welfare or health purposes.

'Volunteer' shall mean an individual performing 17 (e) services for a nonprofit organization or a governmental entity, or 18 19 for any entity that has entered into an agreement with a nonprofit 20 organization or a government entity to perform public or community services for or on behalf of a nonprofit organization or 21 22 a government entity, who does not receive compensation other 23 than reimbursement or allowance for expenses actually incurred, 24 and as specifically provided by workers' compensation or other

law, and such term includes a volunteer serving as a director, officer, trustee or direct service volunteer.

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Section 16103. Liability Protection for Volunteers.

Unless otherwise provided by law, no volunteer of a nonprofit organization or governmental entity shall be liable for harm caused by an act or omission of the volunteer on behalf of the organization or entity if:

8 (a) the volunteer was acting within the scope of the 9 volunteer's responsibilities in the nonprofit organization or 10 governmental entity at the time of the act or omission;

11 (b) the appropriate or required volunteer was properly 12 licensed, certified or authorized by the appropriate authorities for 13 the activities or practice on Island, in which the harm occurred, 14 where the activities were, or practice was undertaken, within the 15 scope of the volunteer's responsibilities in the nonprofit 16 organization or governmental entity;

17 (c) the harm was *not* caused by willful or criminal
18 misconduct, gross negligence, reckless misconduct, or a conscious,
19 flagrant indifference to the rights or safety of the individual
20 harmed by the volunteer; *and*

(d) the harm was *not* caused by the volunteer operating a motor vehicle, vessel, aircraft or other vehicle for which the operator or the owner of the vehicle, craft or vessel is required to:

(1) possess an operator's license; or

(2) maintain insurance.

Limitation on Punitive Damages Based on the Section 16104. 1 As a general rule, punitive damages may 2 Actions of Volunteers. not be awarded against a volunteer in an action brought for harm based -3 on the action of a volunteer acting within the scope of the volunteer's 4 responsibilities to a nonprofit organization or governmental entity, 5 unless the claimant establishes by clear and convincing evidence that the 6 harm was caused by an action of such volunteer which constitutes 7 willful or criminal misconduct, or a conscious, flagrant indifference to 8 9 the rights or safety of the individual harmed.

10 Section 16105. Liability For Non-economic Loss: General 11 Rule. In any civil action against a volunteer based on an action of a 12 volunteer acting within the scope of the volunteer's responsibility to a 13 nonprofit organization or governmental entity, the liability of the 14 volunteer for non-economic loss shall be determined in accordance with 15 §16106 of this Chapter.

16 Section 16106. Liability For Non-economic Loss: Amount of 17 Liability. Each defendant, who is a volunteer, shall be liable only for 18 the amount of non-economic loss allocated to that defendant in direct 19 proportion to the percentage of responsibility of that defendant for the 20 harm to the claimant with respect to which the defendant is liable. The 21 court shall render a separate judgment against each defendant in an 22 amount determined pursuant to the preceding sentence.

For purposes of determining the amount of non-economic loss allocated to a defendant who is a volunteer under this Section, the trier

of fact shall determine the percentage of responsibility of that defendant
 for the claimant's harm.

3 Section 16107. Application. This Act applies to any claim 4 for harm caused by an act or omission of a volunteer where that claim is 5 filed on or after the effective date of this Act, but only if the harm that is 6 the subject of the claim or the conduct that caused such harm occurred 7 after such effective date."

8 Section 4. Chapter 13 of Title 16 of the Guam Code Annotated is 9 hereby *repealed and reenacted* to read as follows:

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#### "CHAPTER 13.

#### SCHOOL CROSSING GUARDS.

12 School Crossing Guards. (a) The Chief of Section 13101. 13 the Guam Police Department is hereby authorized to appoint and equip 14 volunteers and designated employees of the Department of Education, 15 and may provide training to such volunteers as school crossing guards 16 to direct traffic at school crossings, streets and highways in the vicinity 17 of schools and bus stops, by means of lawful orders, signs or 18 semaphores. Such persons shall wear a distinctive garb or insignia 19 indicating such appointment. 'School crossing guard' shall mean any 20 person eighteen (18) years of age and older acting with or without 21 compensation who is authorized by this Chapter to supervise, direct, 22 monitor, or otherwise assist school children at a street or intersection in 23 the vicinity of a school or bus stops.

(b) With the approval of the Chief of Police, a school crossing guard may be authorized, in addition to directing traffic at school crossings, to direct and regulate the flow of traffic in the event of a fire, explosion, hurricane, tornado or other emergency situation. Such volunteer shall *not* have the power of arrest provided to peace officers.

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6 (c) Provisions of Chapter 16 of Title 7 of the Guam Code 7 Annotated, which provide liability protection for volunteers shall apply 8 to any volunteer school crossing guard authorized under this Section *if* 9 all requirements set forth in §16103 of Title 7 of the Guam Code 10 Annotated are met.

(d) The Guam Police Department shall maintain a list ofauthorized school crossing guards.

**Section 13102. Enforcement.** (a) It shall be unlawful for any person driving or operating any vehicle to willfully fail or refuse:

(1) to comply with any lawful order or direction of any peace officer or any individual authorized under §13101, to direct, control or regulate traffic; *or* 

(2) to stop *not* less than fifty feet (50') from the nearest
side of a school pedestrian lane where any signal device, flagman
or other person is stationed, giving warning that children are
about to cross, or are crossing, the street and it is further declared
unlawful to proceed until such signal has stopped, raised or been
removed, or the flagman or person stationed at such pedestrian
lane has given a signal to go, or has left the locality.

A peace officer may arrest the driver of a motor vehicle if the 1 (b) peace officer has probable cause to believe that the driver has operated 2 the vehicle in violation of this Chapter within the past four (4) hours.

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In addition to any other citation for penalties or fines that 4 (c) 5 may be levied, every person violating this Section shall be issued a citation and shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction, 6 7 punished by a fine not less than Fifty Dollars (\$50.00), nor more than Two Hundred Dollars (\$200.00) for each violation." 8

9 Section 5. Effective Date. The provisions of this Act shall take effect 10 ninety (90) days after its enactment.

This Act applies to any claim for harm 11 Section 6. Application. 12 caused by an act or omission of a volunteer where that claim is filed on or after the effective date of this Act, but only if the harm that is the subject of the 13 14 claim or the conduct that caused such harm occurred on or after such effective 15 date.

#### Committee on Judiciary, Public Safety, Consumer Protection, and Human Resources Development Committee Report on Bill 62 Publicly Heard Friday, February 26, 1999

Bill 62: An act to add a new Chapter 16 to Title 7, Guam Code Annotated, relative to providing certain protections to volunteers, nonprofit organizations, and governmental entities in lawsuits based on the activities of volunteers.

#### III. SYNOPSIS

This act reforms existing law to allow more protection for volunteers serving nonprofit organizations and government entities so that the liability for any harm caused in the act of volunteering is not the burden of the individual.

#### IV. TESTIMONY

Senator Pangelinan, sponsor of the bill, provided an overview.

**Mr. Dave Lotz, Boonie Stomp Volunteer Guide,** provided testimony on behalf of himself in favor of the bill. He attested to the need for liability protection for volunteers, and suggested that worker's compensation be extended to volunteers through this bill as well.

**Mr. Bill Pavesic, of Boy Scouts of America,** provided testimony in favor of the bill, explaining that the Boy Scouts live and thrive on volunteerism, and this bill would have very positive effects on volunteerism for organizations like his.

**Mr. Sonny Shelton, Director of the Department of Parks and Recreation,** provided testimony in favor of the bill. He explained that the Parks and Recreation budget has been depending more and more on volunteers, and this protection would make volunteers and sponsors much more willing to serve the community. He asked that liability coverage be extended to corporate entities who are refraining from Adopt-a-Park and Adopt-a-Roadside programs due to the fact the Government cannot offer indemnity.

Judy Jackson, of G.O.R., provided testimony in favor of the bill, saying it is way overdue.

**Chairman Salas** suggested she provide the Committee with written testimony in the next ten days if she wishes. He said he will look into worker's compensation coverage costs. He's afraid adding volunteers will over extend an already strained fund.

#### V. COMMITTEE FINDINGS & RECOMMENDATION

The Committee finds that it is important to extend the protection provisions of Bill 62 to the volunteers of Guam. The author offered an amendment to the bill which would include School Crossing Guards under this Act's protection as long as they are trained and properly equipped by the Guam Police Department. The Committee agreed that this inclusion is appropriate. Further, the Committee agreed that Workers Compensation coverage is not be an issue in this Act. Therefore, the Committee recommends **TO DO PASS Bill 62**, as substituted.







For purposes of determining the amount of noneconomic loss allocated to a defendant who is a volunteer under this section, the trier of fact shall determine the percentage of responsibility of that defendant for the claimant's harm.

20§16107. Application. This Act applies to any claim for21harm caused by an act or omission of a volunteer where that claim is filed22on or after the effective date of this Act, but only if the harm that is the23subject of the claim or the conduct that caused such harm occurred after24such effective date."

Section 3. Effective Date. The provisions of this Act shall take effect 90
 days after its enactment.









## Hafa Adai, Mr. Chairman and Members:

Thank you for the opportunity to provide input on Bill No. 62, "An act to add a new Chapter 16 to Title 7, Guam Code annotated, relative to providing certain protections to volunteers, nonprofit organizations, and governmental entities in lawsuits based on the activities of volunteers."

This department is highly supportive of the proposed legislation as volunteers and non-profit organizations often provide public service via our department by assisting with park clean-ups, painting, donating additional facilities, and in many other varied ways. As such, passage of Bill No. 62 would provide some measure of liability protection for these civic-minded entities.

We would further request that the committee expand the intended scope of Bill No. 62 to address some pressing needs of this department and provide increased public benefit.

As you are aware, the department has long had an "Adopt-A-Park" program which encourages *corporate entities*, among other groups to "Adopt" park areas and provide much-needed, but unfunded maintenance efforts for these areas. On more than one occasion, the question of liability and indemnification has arisen and the department has lost sorely needed "adoptive" sponsorship as a result. In this regard, we would urge the committee to expand coverage to corporate entities and other businesses who would ordinarily assume these maintenance responsibilities as good neighbors were it not for the question of their inherent liability.



#### Letter to Senator John Salas; re: Bill No. 62, dated 2/26/99, page 2 of 2:

Another example of an area where expansion of the proposed legislation may be warranted is the department's "Boonie Stomp" program which conducts hikes to various points of interest for local residents and newcomers to our island. This program was established by Mr. Dave Lotz, a now retired employee of the department using only volunteer hike leaders. We would ask the committee to include worker's compensation benefits for these volunteers and others in similar capacities to further encourage such unselfish volunteerism.

Additionally, the department has been spearheading an effort to seek "adoptive parents" or sponsors to beautify, upgrade, and maintain roadside areas along major roadways and village streets as impetus for increased public awareness and participation in Island-wide beautification. By expanding Bill No. 62 to include liability protection and other benefits for these potential sponsors, our job will be made much easier.

As you can tell from our comments, we have high hopes for Bill No. 62 and believe that with necessary amendments by the committee, it will prove to be a vehicle which can further the efforts of our community for a bright and beautiful island.



Dear Chairperson Salas:

Thank you for providing Sanctuary, Incorporated with the opportunity to provide testimony on Bill 62. As a non-profit entity operating for the benefit of the public, we are in full support of the measure to provide certain protections to volunteers of organizations such as ours.

Sanctuary, Incorporated is the sole provider of services to runaway, homeless and troubled youth on island. Our organization has a 28 year history of being a moving force to directly counteract juvenile delinquency, familial disunity, child abuse and neglect. Since it's founding in 1971, our organization has been focused on youth advocacy and in providing a comprehensive continuum of services to youth in the community. Our services include among other things a 24 hour Teen Help Line, crisis intervention, supportive counseling, brief therapy, emergency shelter services, a transitional living program, drug/alcohol education and prevention programs, parenting classes, parenting programs and the Home Instruction Program for Preschool Youngsters (HIPPY).

Throughout our history we have relied heavily on the support from the community in providing volunteer services on our Board of Directors and within our programs. In its' inception, Sanctuary was managed solely by volunteers who wanted to contribute to our island. In recent years, we have noticed a decrease in the willingness of persons to volunteer. This has caused a tremendous burden on our resources, as we have to employ people for activities that would have normally been done by a volunteer. We believe that the decrease in volunteerism is in someway attributed to the personal liability on that individual for actions associated with helping the non-profit entity. Employees of these organizations are afforded protections under insurance policies and other such coverages for their conduct that causes losses not attributed to the gross negligence or willful misconduct of that individual. Volunteers are not afforded that same protection despite the fact that they are acting in the same capacity as would a paid employee.

Furthermore, non-profit entities are governed by a Board of Directors. These Directors do not receive any form of compensation for their time, commitment, or effort in supporting the organization. Yet, these individuals may also be held personally liable for the actions of the agency that they are volunteering for. This does a great disservice to the people of Guam as many of these organization that provide public service may not be fortunate enough to secure Board Members who can truly contribute to the positive evolution of these agencies and the solid provision of services designed to meet the needs of the community.
