AN ACT TO *ADD* ARTICLES 3A AND 4A, AND TO *ADD* §§15303, 15407 AND 15707, ALL TO CHAPTER 15, DIVISION 3 OF TITLE 17 OF THE GUAM CODE ANNOTATED, RELATIVE TO CREATING NEW ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS AND BENEFITS FOR MERIT AWARDS AND PROFESSIONAL AND TECHNICAL AWARDS GRANTED FOR ACADEMIC YEARS 2000-2001 AND THEREAFTER, AND TO PLACE A SUNSET PROVISION ON DOCTORAL FELLOWSHIP SCHOLARSHIPS IN FAVOR OF PROFESSIONAL AND TECHNICAL

AWARDS AS A MEANS OF PURSUING HIGHER EDUCATION.

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1	BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF GUAM:
2	Section 1. Article 3A of Chapter 15, Division 3 of Title 17 of the Guam
3	Code Annotated is hereby added to read as follows:
4	"Article 3A.
5	Merit Awards to the University of Guam.
6	(For Academic Years 2000-2001 and Thereafter.)
7	Section 15A301. Students Entitled to Merit Awards.
8	Section 15A302. Benefits.
9	Section 15A303. Service Credit.
10	Section 15A304. Rules and Regulations.
11	Section 15A305. Applicability of this Article.
12	Section 15A301. Students Entitled to Merit Awards.
13	(a) There are established annual merit awards for high
14	school students in the graduating classes of a fully accredited, or
15	candidate for accreditation, as recognized by the Western
16	Association of Schools and Colleges ('WASC') public and private
17	high school on Guam now or hereafter established. The students
18	entitled to these awards shall be the students having the highest
19	scholastic standing in the graduating classes of each such public
20	and non-public high school on Guam, except for Department of
21	Defense Schools. The awards shall be determined as follows:

(1)One (1) for every fifty (50) graduates of a school's graduating class, rounded to the nearest fifty (50). If as a result of the equal scholastic standing of two (2) or more graduates, there is a tie for the awards granted pursuant to this Chapter, the University of Guam shall provide a mechanism to break the tie. Awardees are entitled to four (4) years of education at the University of Guam. However, if the awardee's major is unavailable at the University of Guam, the awardee may attend any accredited college or university in the United States, or one (1) recognized by the Council on Post Secondary Accreditation ('COPA'), where such declared major is available. The benefits are according to the amounts provided in §15A302 of this Article.

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15 (2)Of the students receiving awards in Subsection 16 (1), supra, who attend and graduate from the University of 17 Guam, the top two (2) awardees per graduating class shall 18 be entitled to an additional two (2) years of study for a 19 Master's Degree at the University of Guam after completion 20 of the bachelor's program awarded under the provisions of 21 Subsection (1). In the event that, as a result of graduating 22 class size, only one (1) student is entitled to an award under 23 Subsection (1), supra, then only one (1) student shall be 24 eligible for an award under this Subsection. The benefits are

according to the amounts provided in §15A302 of this 1 Article. 2 All awards shall be subject to the following limitations: 3 4 A recipient must be a: United States citizen, or a permanent 5 (i) resident alien, who has completed four (4) academic 6 7 years in public or private high school on Guam; and a resident of Guam for a continuous period 8 (ii) 9 of not less than five (5) years immediately preceding 10 June 15th of the year the award is to be awarded. 11 (b) If any student is ineligible for an award because of 12 failure to meet the requirements contained in Subsection (a) of this 13 Section; or *if* any eligible student chooses *not* to accept an award 14 when first offered such award, the award shall be granted to the 15 eligible student with the next highest scholastic rank, or in the case of tie, the student that was eliminated by the tie-breaker. If an 16 17 eligible student declines to accept an award when first offered, 18 such student cannot accept such an award after it has been granted to another student. 19 20 The recipient of a merit award must notify the Board within 21 thirty (30) days, that the award is accepted. If such recipient fails 22 to do so, the award is thereby forfeited and the same shall be offered to the next alternate. 23 24 Award recipients must agree that the recipient will (c)25 work on Guam for a period of one (1) year for each academic year

the award was received within six (6) months following the completion or termination of the course of studies for which the award was granted; provided, that *if* the recipient continues as a full-time student at a graduate or professional school, such recipient may defer work on Guam until such additional studies are completed.

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Awards granted on or subsequent to the effective date of this Section shall be cancelled if a recipient:

9 (1) fails to maintain a cumulative grade point 10 average of 2.5 or its equivalent, *except* a recipient may be 11 allowed one (1) academic term to regain this average 12 without cancellation of the award, *or*

(2) fails to meet the academic and/or other
requirements governing full-time students at the University
of Guam, *except* a recipient shall be allowed one (1) academic
term in which to regain full-time student status before
cancellation of such recipient's award.

18 Section 15A302. Benefits. Students entitled to merit awards
 19 pursuant to this Article shall receive the following benefits:

(a) Tuition to Attend School. Tuition and fees for each
academic year to be paid by the Student Financial Assistance Fund
for a period of *not more than* four (4) years in an undergraduate
program at the University of Guam. For awards granted under
§15A101(2) of this Article, students shall receive an additional two

(2) years of tuition and fees for a graduate degree upon successful completion of undergraduate studies and admission requirements for graduate school.

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Award recipients are entitled to a monthly 4 **(b)** Stipend. stipend to be disbursed in nine (9) monthly installments during 5 the academic year, as follows: (i) fifty-nine (59) or fewer semester 6 7 hours completed: Three Hundred Dollars (\$300.00) per month; (ii) sixty (60) and over semester hours to graduation: Five Hundred 8 9 Dollars (\$500.00) per month. For graduate students, Six Hundred 10 Dollars (\$600.00) per month to be disbursed in nine (9) monthly 11 installments during the academic year.

12 (c) Allowance for Textbooks. Each student receiving an 13 award under the Article shall be entitled to an additional Two-14 hundred Fifty Dollars (\$250.00) per semester for textbooks to be 15 disbursed *prior to* the first day that classes begin.

(d) Optional Inter-Session Allowed.

17 (1) Summer. Each student shall be entitled to 18 tuition, fees and textbooks for inter-session courses on a full-19 time basis. The maximum amount for textbooks is One 20 Hundred Dollars (\$100.00). Students attending inter-session 21 as provided herein shall be entitled to one (1) additional 22 month's stipend, as defined in §15A302(b) of this Article, for 23 each inter-session cycle attended in the summer only.

(2) Between Fall and Spring Semesters. Each student shall be entitled to tuition, fees and textbooks for inter-session courses on a full-time basis. The maximum amount for textbooks is One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00). Students attending inter-session between the Fall and Spring Semesters shall *not* be entitled to an additional stipend.

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7 (e) For those authorized to attend school off-Island as
8 provided for herein, the amount of assistance shall *not* exceed the
9 amount of assistance for a student attending school at the
10 University of Guam.

11 Section 15A303. Service Credit. The financial assistance granted 12 under this Article shall be repaid on a one-to-one basis for each year that 13 assistance was provided through employment on Guam or in the office 14 of Guam's Delegate to Congress. In the event that any portion of the 15 assistance is *not* repaid through service credit, the amount unpaid in 16 service credit shall become due and payable.

17 In calculating the amount due and payable for failure (a) 18 to repay through service credit, the amount due shall be the total 19 amount of assistance minus the number of years repaid through 20 service credit. For purposes of this Section, a year of service credit 21 is twelve (12) months. The Board of Regents may also extend 22 payment of cash repayment, via a promissory note, for a term not 23 to exceed ten (10) years at an annual percentage rate of not less than 24 ten percent (10%). No amounts shall be considered due and

payable during the time in which the awardee is repaying service 1 credit pursuant to the provisions herein. 2 The Board of Regents may grant deferrals of 3 (b)repayment through service for the following reasons: 4 pursuit of a graduate degree; or 5 (1)(2)6 a family or medical emergency. 7 (c)Any awardee granted an award pursuant to the provision of this Article must commence work on Guam within 8 six (6) months following the completion of studies, unless as 9 10 extended by the Board for extenuating circumstances; or will be in default as of the date classes ended. The permanent transfer to an 11 off-Island office or branch of a Guam employer shall not count 12 13 towards service credit and shall result in default on the date of 14 transfer and interest shall begin on such date of default. 15 Permanent transfers, for purposes of this Section, are those that 16 are longer than six (6) months. The Board shall establish such 17 policies prescribing the length and terms of repayment, the 18 interest rate to be charged, the collection of delinquent accounts or 19 in the event of default.

(d) If any temporary leave of absence is expected to last
longer than forty-five (45) days, the awardee shall inform the
University of Guam of the length of time expected to be off-Island,
the reason for such time off-Island and the address while offIsland. As long as the employee remains employed on Guam
while off-Island temporarily, the employee shall receive service

credit for such employment, during the time the employee is off Island for the purposes described herein.

3 Death or total disability of the student shall terminate (e) 4 Total disability for purposes of this any obligations herein. 5 Section is defined as any physiological or psychological condition 6 that will prevent the awardee from obtaining or maintaining any 7 form of gainful employment for a period of *not less than* three (3) 8 years. The Board may defer repayment for temporary disability. 9 Total disability requires the certification of two (2) physicians 10 licensed to practice on Guam. 11 The Section 15A304. Rules and Regulations. University of Guam shall develop appropriate rules and regulations for 12 13 the administration of this Article. 14 Section 15A305. Applicability of this Article. This Article 15 shall apply only to awards made during the Academic Year 2000 - 2001 and thereafter." 16 17 Section 2. Article 4A of Chapter 15, Division 3 of Title 17 of the Guam Code Annotated is hereby added to read as follows: 18 19 "Article 4A. 20 Professional and Technical Awards. 21 (For School Years 2000 - 2001 and Thereafter.) 22 Section 15A401. Students Entitled to Awards. 23 Section 15A402. Benefits. 24 Section 15A403. Repayment of Benefits and Service Credit.

- 1 Section 15A404. Forfeiture of Awards.
- 2 Section 15A405. Rules and Regulations.
- 3 Section 15A406. Applicability of this Article.

Section 15A401. Students Entitled to Awards. There 4 are 5 established professional and technical annual awards for graduate On or before December 1st of each year, the Board shall 6 studies. 7 conduct a public hearing to receive the opinion and recommendation of 8 the community, and the Guam Occupational Information Coordinating 9 Committee, or its equivalent, and may use findings of any other survey 10 or study to determine those areas in which additional professional and 11 technical skills are needed. From those hearings the Board shall 12 establish a list of occupational priorities for Guam prior to considering 13 applications for the awards. The number of awards and occupational 14 priorities to be recommended shall be submitted to I Liheslaturan Guåhan 15 no later than January 1st of each year.

- Funds appropriated to provide professional and technical awards, and which are *not* totally expended, may be used in succeeding years so as to increase the number of annual awards. The awards provided in this Article are subject to the following limitations:
- (a) the applicant must be a *bona fide* resident of Guam for
 a continuous period of *not less than* ten (10) years prior to
 application, and a United States citizen, or a permanent resident
 alien, and must have achieved an overall grade point average of
 3.00 in undergraduate studies *if* pursuing a master's degree, or

3.33 in a master's degree program *if* pursuing a doctoral degree, or an irrevocable letter of acceptance from a U.S. accredited professional school, as recognized by the Council on Post Secondary Accreditation ('COPA');

5 (b) the applicant must agree to the repayment terms as 6 specified in §§15A403 and 15A404;

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(c) the applicant must present to the Board prior to
granting of the award satisfactory proof that such applicant has
been accepted by a U.S. accredited college or university as
recognized by COPA, as a full-time student to pursue a program
of study in the field applied for; and

12 (d) the colleges or universities must be properly 13 accredited as recognized by COPA and must be approved by the 14 Board; provided, however, that no award shall be granted for 15 studies at an off-Island institution in a program that is available at 16 the University of Guam.

17 The Board shall select the recipients of the awards upon the basis 18 of scholastic ability, financial need and aptitude. The Board may also 19 use work or life-time experience and achievement criteria in place of the 20 aptitude criteria *if* because of such experience, it can be reasonably 21 determined that the applicant will succeed in a course of study funded 22 by an award herein.

In determining financial need the applicant must submit a Student
Aid Report ('SAR') which results from the completion of a Free

Application for Federal Student Aid ('FAFSA') as documentary
 evidence of need.

No benefits as specified in §15A402 shall be continued beyond the number of years normally required to complete studies in the specific academic degree program for which the award was granted, *except* under exceptional circumstances as determined by the Board.

7 Section 15A402. Benefits. Students entitled to awards pursuant
8 to this Article shall receive the following benefits:

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(a) payment of tuition and fees;

10 (b) an annual grant loan of *not more than* Ten Thousand 11 Dollars (\$10,000.00) per year to be used for room and board, books 12 and educational supplies, to be disbursed in accordance with 13 regulations adopted by the Board, such grant loans to be non-14 interest bearing, *except* as to unpaid delinquent amounts; *and*

15 (c) cost of airfare for economy airline tickets; one (1) ticket 16 to the school of attendance and one (1) ticket to return to Guam 17 upon completion of studies.

18Total for items (a) and (b) of this Section shall not exceed Twenty19Thousand Dollars (\$20,000.00) per year, unless the course of study is in20the area of medicine or dentistry. If the course of study is in medicine or21dentistry, the total for items (a) and (b) of this Section shall not exceed22Twenty-five Thousand Dollars (\$25,000.00) per year.

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Section 15A403. Repayment of Benefits and Service Credit.

1 The financial assistance granted under this Article shall be repaid on a 2 two-to-one (2:1) basis for each year that assistance was provided 3 through employment on Guam or in the office of Guam's Delegate to 4 Congress. In the event that any portion of the assistance is *not* repaid 5 through service credit, the amount unpaid in service credit shall become 6 due and payable.

7 (a) Every student granted an award pursuant to this 8 Article shall execute a promissory note agreeing to repay said loan 9 over a period to be determined by the Board, but not in excess of 10 ten (10) years from the contemplated date of the termination or the 11 completion of the course of studies for which the award was 12 approved. The amount of the note shall be left blank until the 13 completion of studies, in which the amount of the note will be the 14 total monetary amount of assistance provided by the award. Said 15 promissory note shall be non-interest bearing, except as to 16 amounts unpaid by service credit that are due and payable under 17 the note, which shall be subject to interest at the annual rate of ten 18 percent (10%). No amounts shall be considered due and payable 19 during the time in which the awardee is repaying service credit 20 pursuant to the provisions herein.

(b) Any student granted an award pursuant to this Article
shall receive service credit against amounts due under the
promissory note as follows:

(1) The amount of the note shall be the total amount of assistance provided. Service credit shall be applied in against the note in monthly installments.

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(2) The number of monthly installments to be paid shall be based on the number of months for which assistance was provided times two (2).

(3) In the event of default, the balance due in monetary terms shall be the amount of assistance provided less the amount repaid through service credit. The amount repaid through service credit shall be the total amount of assistance provided divided by the number of installments of service credit due as calculated in Item (2) of this Paragraph times the number of installments paid through service credit.

15 Any awardee granted an award pursuant to the (c) 16 provision of this Article must commence work on Guam within six (6) months following the completion of studies, unless as 17 extended by the Board for extenuating circumstances, or will be in 18 19 default as of the date classes ended. The permanent transfer to an 20 off-Island office or branch of a Guam employer shall not count 21 towards service credit and shall result in default on the date of 22 transfer and interest shall begin on such date of default. 23 Permanent transfers, for purposes of this Section, are those that 24 are longer than six (6) months. The Board shall establish such 25 policies prescribing the length and terms of repayment, the

interest rate to be charged, the collection of delinquent accounts or in the event of default.

(d) If any temporary leave of absence is expected to last longer than forty-five (45) days, the awardee shall inform the University of Guam of the length of time expected to be off-Island, the reason for such time off-Island and the address while off-Island. As long as the employee remains employed on Guam while off-Island temporarily, the employee shall receive service credit for such employment, during the time the employee is off-Island for the purposes described herein.

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Death or total disability of the student shall terminate 11 (e) 12 any obligations on the note. Total disability for purposes of this Section is defined as any physiological or psychological condition 13 14 that will prevent the student from obtaining or maintaining any 15 form of gainful employment for a period of *not less than* three (3) years. The Board may defer repayment for temporary disability. 16 17 Total disability requires the certification of two (2) physicians 18 licensed to practice in the United States.

(f) In the event a student forfeits an award as defined in
§15A404, no service credit shall be granted and repaid according
to the provisions herein for those years in which assistance was
provided and all awards plus interest shall be repaid according to
the provisions herein.

24The Board of Regents may grant deferrals of repayment through25service in cases where family or medical emergency arises.

Section 15A404. Forfeiture of Awards. Expulsion from a school 1 or institution attended, or suspension for a period of the same or greater 2 than one (1) academic semester, or its equivalent, in such school or 3 institution, or failure to complete the program for which the award was 4 granted, or failure to comply with the regulations of the Board, shall 5 result in a forfeiture of the award provided by this Article. For purposes 6 7 of this Article, a person shall be considered to have completed the course of studies upon the event or events of forfeiture as provided in 8 9 this Section.

10Section 15A405. Rules and Regulations. The Board of11Regents shall develop rules and regulations pursuant to the12Administrative Adjudication Law for the administration of the program13enacted by this Article. In addition to the administration of the14program, such Rules and Regulations shall include provisions for:

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- (1) conditions for continuance of an Award;
 - (2) construction of applicable promissory notes;
- (3) time frames for the completion of program studies; *and*

(4) provisions for the temporary suspension of completion
of a degree program or repayment of awards for cases beyond the
control of the scholarship recipient such as personal illness or
death or illness of a family member.

Section 15A406. Applicability of this Article. This Article
 shall apply only to awards made during the academic year 2000 - 2001
 and thereafter."

1	Section 3. Section 15303 is hereby added to Article 3 of Chapter 15,
2	Division 3 of Title 17 of the Guam Code Annotated to read as follows:
3	"Section 15303. Applicability of this Article. Awards
4	granted under the provisions of this Article apply to awards made
5	during and prior to the School Year 1999 - 2000. Awards granted
6	after School Year 1999 - 2000 shall be made pursuant to the
7	provisions of Article 3A of this Chapter."
8	Section 4. Section 15407 is hereby added to Article 4 of Chapter 15,
9	Division 3 of Title 17 of the Guam Code Annotated to read as follows:
10	"Section 15407. Applicability of this Article. Awards
11	granted under the provisions of this Article apply to awards made
12	during and prior to the School Year 1999 - 2000. Awards granted
13	after School Year 1999 - 2000 shall be made pursuant to the
14	provisions of Article 4A of this Chapter."
15	Section 5. Section 15707 is hereby added to Article 7 of Chapter 15,
16	Division 3 of Title 17 of the Guam Code Annotated to read as follows:
17	"Section 15707. Sunset Provision of Fellowships Under This
18	Article. No new Fellowships shall be awarded under the provisions
19	of this Article after the School Year 1999 - 2000. Doctoral scholarships
20	shall be awarded pursuant to the Professional and Technical Awards
21	provisions under Article 4A of this Chapter."

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AWARDS AS A MEANS OF PURSUING HIGHER EDUCATION.

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1	BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF GUAM:
2	Section 1. Article 3A of Chapter 15, Division 3 of Title 17 of the Guam
3	Code Annotated is hereby added to read as follows:
4	"Article 3A.
5	Merit Awards to the University of Guam.
6	(For Academic Years 2000-2001 and Thereafter.)
7	Section 15A301. Students Entitled to Merit Awards.
8	Section 15A302. Benefits.
9	Section 15A303. Service Credit.
10	Section 15A304. Rules and Regulations.
11	Section 15A305. Applicability of this Article.
12	Section 15A301. Students Entitled to Merit Awards.
13	(a) There are established annual merit awards for high
14	school students in the graduating classes of a fully accredited, or
15	candidate for accreditation, as recognized by the Western
16	Association of Schools and Colleges ('WASC') public and private
17	high school on Guam now or hereafter established. The students
18	entitled to these awards shall be the students having the highest
19	scholastic standing in the graduating classes of each such public
20	and non-public high school on Guam, except for Department of
21	Defense Schools. The awards shall be determined as follows:

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One (1) for every fifty (50) graduates of a (1)school's graduating class, rounded to the nearest fifty (50). If as a result of the equal scholastic standing of two (2) or 3 more graduates, there is a tie for the awards granted pursuant to this Chapter, the University of Guam shall provide a mechanism to break the tie. Awardees are entitled to four (4) years of education at the University of Guam. However, if the awardee's major is unavailable at the University of Guam, the awardee may attend any accredited college or university in the United States, or one (1) recognized by the Council on Post Secondary Accreditation ('COPA'), where such declared major is available. The benefits are according to the amounts provided in §15A302 14 of this Article.

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Of the students receiving awards in Subsection 15 (2)16 (1), supra, who attend and graduate from the University of Guam, the top two (2) awardees per graduating class shall 17 be entitled to an additional two (2) years of study for a 18 Master's Degree at the University of Guam after completion 19 20 of the bachelor's program awarded under the provisions of 21 Subsection (1). In the event that, as a result of graduating 22 class size, only one (1) student is entitled to an award under 23 Subsection (1), supra, then only one (1) student shall be 24 eligible for an award under this Subsection. The benefits are

according to the amounts provided in §15A302 of this 1 Article. 2 All awards shall be subject to the following limitations: 3 A recipient must be a: 4 United States citizen, or a permanent 5 (i) resident alien, who has completed four (4) academic 6 years in public or private high school on Guam; and 7 a resident of Guam for a continuous period 8 (ii) of not less than five (5) years immediately preceding 9 June 15th of the year the award is to be awarded. 10 If any student is ineligible for an award because of 11 (b) 12 failure to meet the requirements contained in Subsection (a) of this Section; or *if* any eligible student chooses *not* to accept an award 13 when first offered such award, the award shall be granted to the 14 eligible student with the next highest scholastic rank, or in the case 15 16 of tie, the student that was eliminated by the tie-breaker. If an 17 eligible student declines to accept an award when first offered, 18 such student cannot accept such an award after it has been 19 granted to another student. 20 The recipient of a merit award must notify the Board within 21 thirty (30) days, that the award is accepted. If such recipient fails 22 to do so, the award is thereby forfeited and the same shall be 23 offered to the next alternate. 24 Award recipients must agree that the recipient will (c)25 work on Guam for a period of one (1) year for each academic year 1 the award was received within six (6) months following the 2 completion or termination of the course of studies for which the 3 award was granted; provided, that *if* the recipient continues as a 4 full-time student at a graduate or professional school, such 5 recipient may defer work on Guam until such additional studies 6 are completed.

Awards granted on or subsequent to the effective date of
this Section shall be cancelled if a recipient:

9 (1) fails to maintain a cumulative grade point 10 average of 2.5 or its equivalent, *except* a recipient may be 11 allowed one (1) academic term to regain this average 12 without cancellation of the award, *or*

(2) fails to meet the academic and/or other
requirements governing full-time students at the University
of Guam, *except* a recipient shall be allowed one (1) academic
term in which to regain full-time student status before
cancellation of such recipient's award.

18 Section 15A302. Benefits. Students entitled to merit awards
 19 pursuant to this Article shall receive the following benefits:

(a) Tuition to Attend School. Tuition and fees for each
academic year to be paid by the Student Financial Assistance Fund
for a period of *not more than* four (4) years in an undergraduate
program at the University of Guam. For awards granted under
§15A101(2) of this Article, students shall receive an additional two

(2) years of tuition and fees for a graduate degree upon successful completion of undergraduate studies and admission requirements 3 for graduate school.

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Stipend. Award recipients are entitled to a monthly 4 **(b)** stipend to be disbursed in nine (9) monthly installments during 5 the academic year, as follows: (i) fifty-nine (59) or fewer semester 6 hours completed: Three Hundred Dollars (\$300.00) per month; (ii) 7 8 sixty (60) and over semester hours to graduation: Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) per month. For graduate students, Six Hundred 9 Dollars (\$600.00) per month to be disbursed in nine (9) monthly 10 11 installments during the academic year.

Allowance for Textbooks. Each student receiving an 12 (c) 13 award under the Article shall be entitled to an additional Two-14 hundred Fifty Dollars (\$250.00) per semester for textbooks to be disbursed prior to the first day that classes begin. 15

Optional Inter-Session Allowed. (d)

17 (1)Summer. Each student shall be entitled to 18 tuition, fees and textbooks for inter-session courses on a full-19 time basis. The maximum amount for textbooks is One 20 Hundred Dollars (\$100.00). Students attending inter-session 21 as provided herein shall be entitled to one (1) additional 22 month's stipend, as defined in §15A302(b) of this Article, for 23 each inter-session cycle attended in the summer only.

(2) Between Fall and Spring Semesters. Each student shall be entitled to tuition, fees and textbooks for inter-session courses on a full-time basis. The maximum amount for textbooks is One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00). Students attending inter-session between the Fall and Spring Semesters shall *not* be entitled to an additional stipend.

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7 (e) For those authorized to attend school off-Island as 8 provided for herein, the amount of assistance shall *not* exceed the 9 amount of assistance for a student attending school at the 10 University of Guam.

11 Section 15A303. Service Credit. The financial assistance granted 12 under this Article shall be repaid on a one-to-one basis for each year that 13 assistance was provided through employment on Guam or in the office 14 of Guam's Delegate to Congress. In the event that any portion of the 15 assistance is *not* repaid through service credit, the amount unpaid in 16 service credit shall become due and payable.

17 In calculating the amount due and payable for failure (a) 18 to repay through service credit, the amount due shall be the total 19 amount of assistance minus the number of years repaid through 20 service credit. For purposes of this Section, a year of service credit 21 is twelve (12) months. The Board of Regents may also extend 22 payment of cash repayment, via a promissory note, for a term not 23 to exceed ten (10) years at an annual percentage rate of not less than 24 ten percent (10%). No amounts shall be considered due and payable during the time in which the awardee is repaying service credit pursuant to the provisions herein.

(b) The Board of Regents may grant deferrals of repayment through service for the following reasons:

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(1) pursuit of a graduate degree; or

(2) a family or medical emergency.

Any awardee granted an award pursuant to the 7 (c) provision of this Article must commence work on Guam within 8 six (6) months following the completion of studies, unless as 9 extended by the Board for extenuating circumstances; or will be in 10 default as of the date classes ended. The permanent transfer to an 11 12 off-Island office or branch of a Guam employer shall not count towards service credit and shall result in default on the date of 13 transfer and interest shall begin on such date of default. 14 15 Permanent transfers, for purposes of this Section, are those that 16 are longer than six (6) months. The Board shall establish such 17 policies prescribing the length and terms of repayment, the interest rate to be charged, the collection of delinquent accounts or 18 19 in the event of default.

(d) If any temporary leave of absence is expected to last
longer than forty-five (45) days, the awardee shall inform the
University of Guam of the length of time expected to be off-Island,
the reason for such time off-Island and the address while offIsland. As long as the employee remains employed on Guam
while off-Island temporarily, the employee shall receive service

credit for such employment, during the time the employee is off Island for the purposes described herein.

3 Death or total disability of the student shall terminate (e) any obligations herein. Total disability for purposes of this 4 Section is defined as any physiological or psychological condition 5 that will prevent the awardee from obtaining or maintaining any 6 form of gainful employment for a period of not less than three (3) 7 years. The Board may defer repayment for temporary disability. 8 Total disability requires the certification of two (2) physicians 9 licensed to practice on Guam. 10 11 Section 15A304. Rules and Regulations. The 12 University of Guam shall develop appropriate rules and regulations for 13 the administration of this Article. 14 Section 15A305. Applicability of this Article. This Article 15 shall apply only to awards made during the Academic Year 2000 - 2001 16 and thereafter." 17 Section 2. Article 4A of Chapter 15, Division 3 of Title 17 of the Guam 18 Code Annotated is hereby *added* to read as follows: 19 "Article 4A. 20 Professional and Technical Awards. 21 (For School Years 2000 - 2001 and Thereafter.) 22 Section 15A401. Students Entitled to Awards. 23 Section 15A402. Benefits. 24 Section 15A403. Repayment of Benefits and Service Credit.

- 1 Section 15A404. Forfeiture of Awards.
- 2 Section 15A405. Rules and Regulations.

3 Section 15A406. Applicability of this Article.

Section 15A401. Students Entitled to Awards. There are 4 established professional and technical annual awards for graduate 5 studies. On or before December 1st of each year, the Board shall 6 conduct a public hearing to receive the opinion and recommendation of 7 the community, and the Guam Occupational Information Coordinating 8 Committee, or its equivalent, and may use findings of any other survey 9 or study to determine those areas in which additional professional and 10 11 From those hearings the Board shall technical skills are needed. 12 establish a list of occupational priorities for Guam prior to considering 13 applications for the awards. The number of awards and occupational 14 priorities to be recommended shall be submitted to I Liheslaturan Guåhan 15 no later than January 1st of each year.

Funds appropriated to provide professional and technical awards, and which are *not* totally expended, may be used in succeeding years so as to increase the number of annual awards. The awards provided in this Article are subject to the following limitations:

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(a) the applicant must be a *bona fide* resident of Guam for a continuous period of *not less than* ten (10) years prior to application, and a United States citizen, or a permanent resident alien, and must have achieved an overall grade point average of 3.00 in undergraduate studies *if* pursuing a master's degree, or 3.33 in a master's degree program *if* pursuing a doctoral degree, or
 an irrevocable letter of acceptance from a U.S. accredited
 professional school, as recognized by the Council on Post
 Secondary Accreditation ('COPA');

5 (b) the applicant must agree to the repayment terms as
6 specified in §§15A403 and 15A404;

(c) the applicant must present to the Board prior to
granting of the award satisfactory proof that such applicant has
been accepted by a U.S. accredited college or university as
recognized by COPA, as a full-time student to pursue a program
of study in the field applied for; and

12 (d) the colleges or universities must be properly 13 accredited as recognized by COPA and must be approved by the 14 Board; provided, however, that no award shall be granted for 15 studies at an off-Island institution in a program that is available at 16 the University of Guam.

17 The Board shall select the recipients of the awards upon the basis 18 of scholastic ability, financial need and aptitude. The Board may also 19 use work or life-time experience and achievement criteria in place of the 20 aptitude criteria *if* because of such experience, it can be reasonably 21 determined that the applicant will succeed in a course of study funded 22 by an award herein.

In determining financial need the applicant must submit a Student
Aid Report ('SAR') which results from the completion of a Free

Application for Federal Student Aid ('FAFSA') as documentary
 evidence of need.

No benefits as specified in §15A402 shall be continued beyond the number of years normally required to complete studies in the specific academic degree program for which the award was granted, *except* under exceptional circumstances as determined by the Board.

7 Section 15A402. Benefits. Students entitled to awards pursuant
8 to this Article shall receive the following benefits:

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(a) payment of tuition and fees;

10 (b) an annual grant loan of *not more than* Ten Thousand 11 Dollars (\$10,000.00) per year to be used for room and board, books 12 and educational supplies, to be disbursed in accordance with 13 regulations adopted by the Board, such grant loans to be non-14 interest bearing, *except* as to unpaid delinquent amounts; *and*

15 (c) cost of airfare for economy airline tickets; one (1) ticket
16 to the school of attendance and one (1) ticket to return to Guam
17 upon completion of studies.

18Total for items (a) and (b) of this Section shall *not* exceed Twenty19Thousand Dollars (\$20,000.00) per year, *unless* the course of study is in20the area of medicine or dentistry. *If* the course of study is in medicine or21dentistry, the total for items (a) and (b) of this Section shall *not* exceed22Twenty-five Thousand Dollars (\$25,000.00) per year.

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Section 15A403. Repayment of Benefits and Service Credit.

1 The financial assistance granted under this Article shall be repaid on a 2 two-to-one (2:1) basis for each year that assistance was provided 3 through employment on Guam or in the office of Guam's Delegate to 4 Congress. In the event that any portion of the assistance is *not* repaid 5 through service credit, the amount unpaid in service credit shall become 6 due and payable.

7 Every student granted an award pursuant to this (a) 8 Article shall execute a promissory note agreeing to repay said loan over a period to be determined by the Board, but not in excess of 9 10 ten (10) years from the contemplated date of the termination or the completion of the course of studies for which the award was 11 12 approved. The amount of the note shall be left blank until the 13 completion of studies, in which the amount of the note will be the 14 total monetary amount of assistance provided by the award. Said 15 promissory note shall be non-interest bearing, except as to 16 amounts unpaid by service credit that are due and payable under 17 the note, which shall be subject to interest at the annual rate of ten 18 percent (10%). No amounts shall be considered due and payable 19 during the time in which the awardee is repaying service credit 20 pursuant to the provisions herein.

(b) Any student granted an award pursuant to this Article
shall receive service credit against amounts due under the
promissory note as follows:

(1) The amount of the note shall be the total amount of assistance provided. Service credit shall be applied in against the note in monthly installments.

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(2) The number of monthly installments to be paid shall be based on the number of months for which assistance was provided times two (2).

(3) In the event of default, the balance due in monetary terms shall be the amount of assistance provided less the amount repaid through service credit. The amount repaid through service credit shall be the total amount of assistance provided divided by the number of installments of service credit due as calculated in Item (2) of this Paragraph times the number of installments paid through service credit.

Any awardee granted an award pursuant to the 15 (c) provision of this Article must commence work on Guam within 16 six (6) months following the completion of studies, unless as 17 18 extended by the Board for extenuating circumstances, or will be in 19 default as of the date classes ended. The permanent transfer to an 20 off-Island office or branch of a Guam employer shall not count 21 towards service credit and shall result in default on the date of 22 transfer and interest shall begin on such date of default. 23 Permanent transfers, for purposes of this Section, are those that 24 are longer than six (6) months. The Board shall establish such 25 policies prescribing the length and terms of repayment, the

interest rate to be charged, the collection of delinquent accounts or in the event of default.

If any temporary leave of absence is expected to last 3 ~ (d)longer than forty-five (45) days, the awardee shall inform the University of Guam of the length of time expected to be off-Island, the reason for such time off-Island and the address while off-Island. As long as the employee remains employed on Guam while off-Island temporarily, the employee shall receive service credit for such employment, during the time the employee is off-Island for the purposes described herein.

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Death or total disability of the student shall terminate 11 (e) any obligations on the note. Total disability for purposes of this 12 13 Section is defined as any physiological or psychological condition 14 that will prevent the student from obtaining or maintaining any 15 form of gainful employment for a period of not less than three (3) 16 years. The Board may defer repayment for temporary disability. 17 Total disability requires the certification of two (2) physicians 18 licensed to practice in the United States.

19 (f) In the event a student forfeits an award as defined in 20 §15A404, no service credit shall be granted and repaid according 21 to the provisions herein for those years in which assistance was 22 provided and all awards plus interest shall be repaid according to 23 the provisions herein.

24 The Board of Regents may grant deferrals of repayment through 25 service in cases where family or medical emergency arises.

1 Section 15A404. Forfeiture of Awards. Expulsion from a school or institution attended, or suspension for a period of the same or greater 2 3 ~ than one (1) academic semester, or its equivalent, in such school or institution, or failure to complete the program for which the award was 4 granted, or failure to comply with the regulations of the Board, shall 5 result in a forfeiture of the award provided by this Article. For purposes 6 7 of this Article, a person shall be considered to have completed the course of studies upon the event or events of forfeiture as provided in 8 9 this Section.

10Section 15A405. Rules and Regulations. The Board of11Regents shall develop rules and regulations pursuant to the12Administrative Adjudication Law for the administration of the program13enacted by this Article. In addition to the administration of the14program, such Rules and Regulations shall include provisions for:

- (1) conditions for continuance of an Award;
 (2) construction of applicable promissory notes;
 (3) time frames for the completion of program studies; and
 (4) provisions for the temporary suspension of completion
 of a degree program or repayment of awards for cases beyond the
 control of the scholarship recipient such as personal illness or
- 20 control of the scholarship recipient such as personal illness or
 21 death or illness of a family member.
 22 Section 15A406. Applicability of this Article. This Article
- shall apply only to awards made during the academic year 2000 2001and thereafter."

GUAM CODE** 15 ANNOTATED **RELATIVE** TO **CREATING** NEW ELIGIBILITY REOUIREMENTS AND BENEFITS FOR MERIT AWARDS PROFESSIONAL/ TECHNICAL AWARDS AWARDED FOR ACADEMIC YEARS 2000-2001 AND THEREAFTER AND TO ADD A NEW §15707 TO PLACE A SUNSET PROVISION ON DOCTORAL FELLOWSHIP **SCHOLARSHIPS** IN FAVOR OF **PROFESSIONAL/TECHNICAL AWARDS AS A MEANS OF PURSUING HIGHER EDUCATION.**

I. OVERVIEW

The Committee Education held a public hearing on Monday, August 9, 1999 at 8:45 a.m. at I Liheslaturan Public Hearing Room. Public Notice of the hearing was announced in the August 4th and 8th 1999 issues of the Pacific Daily News.

II. Testimony

Mrs. Marie R. Nelson, Member UOG Board of Regents & Chairperson of the Scholarship Committee. Mrs. Nelson testified in favor of the Bill and thanked the sponsor of the bill for incorporating many of the recommendations of UOG's Financial Aid Committee.

Dr. Jose T. Nededog, President of the University of Guam, was present and testified in favor of the bill. Dr. Nededog added that the reforms in the Merit Award Program and the elimination of the Doctoral fellowship would result in a reduction of costly awards and allow more residents to be helped. Dr. Nededog added that off-island merit awards cost considerably more than on-island programs and that recipients are only required to work on Guam for one year. He also noted that the Doctoral Fellowship cost \$40,000 per year per applicant up to five years.

Dr. Richard Wyttenbach-Santos, Dean of Student Affairs, UOG. Dr. Wyttenbach-Santos affirmed Dr. Nededog's testimony in favor of the Bill. He mentioned that although the off-island Merit Award Program had approximately 50 fewer applicants than the on-island program, the cost was about \$200k more. He also noted that present policy only allowed for students to go off-island for programs not offered at UOG and that this policy has often resulted in students selecting a program not based on career goals but rather as a means to attend school elsewhere. Dr. Wyttenbach-Santos also noted that students have in the past, worked to require those eligible to attend school off-island to complete at least two years on Guam. Dr. Wyttenbach-Santos also asked the Committee to consider recommendations of their legal counsel that had been given to committee staff with regards to form and technical corrections.

Mrs. Sally Mc Donald, Acting Financial Aide Officer, UOG, did not testify on the Bill but appeared to provide informational support to Regent Nelson and Drs. Nededog and Wyttenbach-Santos.

III. Findings and Recommendation

The Committee on Education finds that Bill No. 265 (LS) will provide needed reform and much needed financial aid support for programs offered at UOG. The Bill reforms the merit award program by (1) replacing off-island awards with graduate school benefits at UOG, (2) provides uniformity in award granting among schools regardless of size, (3) reduces monthly stipends in exchange for funding inter-session studies and textbooks and (4) requires service credit payback for all applicants. With regards to the Professional Technical Award Program (Protech), the Bill sets limits of annual assistance at \$20,000 for all majors except for medicine and dentistry which are set at \$25,000 and

strengthens service credit requirements. The Bill also places a sunset provision on new awards under the Doctoral Fellowship program since residents desiring seeking assistance in obtaining a Doctoral degree may do so under the Protech Program.

It is the recommendation of the Committee on Education that Substitute Bill No. 265 (LS) be reported out with the recommendation **TO DO PASS**.

The students entitled to these awards shall be the students having the highest scholastic standing in the graduating classes of each such public 9 10 and non-public high school in Guam except for Department of Defense Schools. 11 The awards shall be determined as follows:

- (1) One (1) for every fifty (50) graduates of a school's graduating class,
 rounded to the nearest fifty (50). If as a result of the equal scholastic
 standing of two (2) or more graduates, there is a tie for the awards
 granted pursuant to this Chapter, the University of Guam shall provide a
 mechanism to break the tie. Awardees are entitled to four years of
 education at the University of Guam. The benefits are according to the
 amounts provided in §15A302 of this Article.
- (2) Of the students receiving awards in Subsection (1)*supra*, the top two (2)
 awardees per graduating class shall be entitled to an additional two years
 of study for a Master's Degree at the University of Guam after
 completion of the bachelor's program awarded under the provisions of
 Subsection (1). In the event that, as a result of graduating class size, only
 one (1) student is entitled to an award under Subsection (1) supra, then
 only one (1) student shall be eligible for an award under this subsection.

- The benefits are according to the amounts provided in §15A302 of this

- (d)Awards granted on or subsequent to the effective date of this section shall becancelled if a recipient:

(1)fails to maintain a cumulative grade point average of 2.5 or its equivalent,
 except a recipient may be allowed one academic term to regain this average
 without cancellation of the award, or

§15A302. Benefits. Students entitled to merit awards pursuant to this Article
shall receive the following benefits:

(a) Tuition to attend school: Tuition and fees for each academic year to be paid
by the Student Financial Assistance Fund for a period of not more than four (4)

granted under §15A101(2) of this Article, students shall receive an additional
two (2) years of tuition and fees for a graduate degree upon successful

month to be disbursed in nine (9) monthly installments during the academic
year.

(c) Allowance for Textbooks. Each student receiving an award under the Article
 shall be entitled to an additional Two-hundred Fifty Dollars (\$250.00) per
 semester for textbooks to be disbursed prior to the first day that classes begin.

(d) Optional Inter-session allowed. (1) Summer: Each student shall be entitled to
tuition, fees and textbooks for inter-session courses on a full-time basis. The
maximum amount for textbooks is One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00). Students
attending inter-session as provided herein shall be entitled to one (1) additional
month's stipend, as defined in \$15A302(b) of this Article for each inter-session
cycle attended in the summer only.

7 (2) Between Fall and Spring Semesters: Each student shall be entitled to 8 tuition, fees and textbooks for inter-session courses on a full-time basis. The 9 maximum amount for textbooks is One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00). Students 10 attending inter-session between the Fall and Spring Semesters shall not be entitled 11 to an additional stipend.

13 §15A303. Service Credit. The financial assistance granted under this article 14 shall be repaid on a one-to-one basis for each year that assistance was provided 15 through employment on Guam or in the office of Guam's Delegate to Congress. In 16 the event that any portion of the assistance is not repaid through service credit, the 17 amount unpaid in service credit shall become due and payable.

(a) In calculating the amount due and payable for failure to repay through 18 19 service credit, the amount due shall be the total amount of assistance minus the 20 number of years repaid through service credit. For purposes of this Section, a year 21 of service credit is twelve (12) months. The Board of Regents may also extend 22 payment of cash repayment, via a promissory note, for a term not to exceed ten 23 (10) years at an annual percentage rate of not less than ten percent (10%). No 24 amounts shall be considered due and payable during the time in which theawardee 25 is repaying service credit pursuant to the provisions herein.

26 (b) The Board of Regents may grant deferrals of repayment through service

(c) Any awardee granted an award pursuant to the provision of this Article 3 must commence work on Guam within Six (6) months following the completion of 4 studies, unless as extended by the Board for extenuating circumstances; or will be 5 in default as of the date classes ended. The permanent transfer to an off-island 6 7 office or branch of a Guam employer shall not count towards service credit and shall result in default on the date of transfer and interest shall begin on such date of 8 default. Permanent transfers, for purposes of this section, are those that are longer 9 than Six (6) months. The Board shall establish such policies prescribing the length 10 and terms of repayment, the interest rate to be charged, the collection of delinquent 11 12 accounts or in the event of default.

(d) If any temporary leave of absence is expected to last longer than fortyfive (45) days, the awardee shall inform the University of Guam of the length of time expected to be off-island, the reason for such time off-island and the address while off-island. As long as the employee remains employed on Guam while offisland temporarily, the employee shall receive service credit for such employment, during the time the employee is off island for the purposes described herein.

(e) Death or total disability of the student shall terminate any obligations
herein. Total disability for purposes of this Section is defined as any physiological
or psychological condition that will prevent the awardee from obtaining or
maintaining any form of gainful employment for a period of not less than Three (3)
years. The Board may defer repayment for temporary disability. Total disability
requires the certification of two (2) physicians licensed to practice on Guam.

The amount repaid through service credit shall be the total amount of assistance provided divided by the number of installments of service credit due as calculated in Item (2) of this paragraph times the number of installments paid through service credit.

(c) Any awardee granted an award pursuant to the provision of this Article 1 must commence work on Guam within Six (6) months following the completion of 2 studies, unless as extended by the Board for extenuating circumstances; or will be 3 in default as of the date classes ended. The permanent transfer to an off-island 4 office or branch of a Guam employer shall not count towards service credit and 5 shall result in default on the date of transfer and interest shall begin on such date of 6 default. Permanent transfers, for purposes of this section, are those that are longer 7 than Six (6) months. §15A404. Forfeiture of Awards. Expulsion from a school or institution attended, or suspension for a period of the same or greater than one academic semester or its equivalent in such school or institution, or failure to complete the program for which the award was granted, or failure to comply with the regulations of the Board shall result in a forfeiture of the award provided by this Article. For purposes of this Article a person shall be considered to have completed his course of studies upon the event or events of forfeiture as provided in this Section.

§15A405. Rules and Regulations. The Board of Regents shall develop 11 12 rules and regulations pursuant to the Administrative Adjudication Law for the administration of the program enacted by this Article. 13 In addition to the 14 administration of the program, such Rules and Regulations shall include provisions for (1) conditions for continuance of an Award, (2) construction of applicable 15 16 promissory notes, (3) time frames for the completion of program studies and (4) 17 provisions for the temporary suspension of completion of a degree program or 18 repayment of awards for cases beyond the control of the scholarship recipient such 19 as personal illness or death or illness of a family member.

§15A301. Students Entitled to Merit Awards. There are established 4 annual merit awards for high school students in the graduating classes of a fully 5 accredited, or candidate for accreditation as recognized by the Western 6 Association of Schools and Colleges (WASC) public and private high school on 7 Guam now or hereafter established. The students entitled to these awards shall be 8 the students having the highest scholastic standing in the graduating classes of 9 10 each such public and non-public high school in Guam except for Department of 11 Defense Schools. The awards shall be determined as follows:

- (1) One (1) for every fifty (50) graduates of a school's graduating class,
 rounded to the nearest fifty (50). If as a result of the equal scholastic
 standing of two (2) or more graduates, there is a tie for the awards
 granted pursuant to this Chapter, the University of Guam shall provide a
 mechanism to break the tie. Awardees are entitled to four years of
 education at the University of Guam. The benefits are according to the
 amounts provided in §15A302 of this Article.
- (2) Of the students receiving awards in Subsection (1) supra, the top two
 (2) awardees per graduating class shall be entitled to an additional two
 years of study for a Master's Degree at the University of Guam after
 completion of the bachelor's program awarded under the provisions of
 Subsection (1). In the event that, as a result of graduating class size,
 only one (1) student is entitled to an award under Subsection (1) supra,
 then only one (1) student shall be eligible for an award under this

- subsection. The benefits are according to the amounts provided in
 §15A302 of this Article.
- 3 (3) All awards shall be subject to the following limitations:

4 (a) A recipient must be a:

- 5 (1) a United States citizen or a permanent resident alien who has completed
 6 four (4) academic years in public or private high school on Guam; and
- 7 (2) a resident of Guam for a continuous period of not less than five (5) years
 8 immediately preceding June 15th of the year the award is to be awarded.

9 (b) If any student is ineligible for an award because of failure to meet the 10 requirements contained in subsection (a) of this section; or if any eligible student 11 chooses not to accept an award when first offered such award, the award shall be 12 granted to the eligible student with the next highest scholastic rank or in the case 13 of tie, the student that was eliminated by the tie-breaker. If an eligible student 14 declines to accept an award when first offered, such student cannot accept such an 15 award after it has been granted to another student.

16 The recipient of a merit award must notify the Board within thirty (30) days, 17 that the award is accepted. If such recipient fails to do so, the award is thereby 18 forfeited and the same shall be offered to the next alternate.

(c) Award recipients must agree that he/she will work on Guam for a period of one
(1) year for each academic year the award was received immediately following the
completion or termination of the course of studies for which the award was
granted, provided that if the recipient continues as a full-time student at a graduate
or professional school such recipient may defer work on Guam until such
additional studies are completed.

25 (d)Awards granted on or subsequent to the effective date of this section shall be
26 cancelled if a recipient:

(1) fails to maintain a cumulative grade point average of 2.5 or its equivalent,
 except a recipient may be allowed one academic term to regain this average
 without cancellation of the award, or

4 (2) fails to meet the academic and/or other requirements governing full-time
5 students at the University of Guam, or

6 (3) Is no longer a full-time student, except a recipient shall be allowed one
7 academic term in which to regain full-time student status before cancellation of
8 such recipient's award, or

9 §15A302. Benefits. Students entitled to merit awards pursuant to this
10 Article shall receive the following benefits:

(a) Tuition to attend school: Tuition and fees for each academic year to be paid
by the Student Financial Assistance Fund for a period of not more than four (4)
years in an undergraduate program at the University of Guam. For awards
granted under §15A101(2) of this Article, students shall receive an additional
two (2) years of tuition and fees for a graduate degree upon successful
completion of undergraduate studies and admission requirements for graduate

(b) Stipend. Award recipients are entitled to a monthly stipend to be disbursed in
nine (9) monthly installments during the academic year, as follows: Fifty-nine
(59) or fewer semester hours completed: Three Hundred Dollars (\$300) per
month; Sixty (60) and over semester hours to graduation: Five Hundred Dollars
(\$500) per month. For graduate students, Six Hundred Dollars (\$600) per
month to be disbursed in nine (9) monthly installments during the academic
year.

(c) Allowance for Textbooks. Each student receiving an award under the Article
 shall be entitled to an additional Two-hundred Fifty Dollars (\$250.00) per
 semester for textbooks to be disbursed prior to the first day that classes begin.

4 (d) Optional Inter-session allowed. (1) Summer: Each student shall be entitled
5 to tuition, fees and textbooks for inter-session courses on a full-time basis. The
6 maximum amount for textbooks is One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00). Students
7 attending inter-session as provided herein shall be entitled to one (1) additional
8 month's stipend, as defined in §15A302(b) of this Article for each inter-session
9 cycle attended in the summer only.

(2) Between Fall and Spring Semesters: Each student shall be entitled to
 tuition, fees and textbooks for inter-session courses on a full-time basis. The
 maximum amount for textbooks is One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00). Students
 attending inter-session between the Fall and Spring Semesters shall not be entitled
 to an additional stipend.

16 §15A303. Service Credit. The financial assistance granted under this 17 article shall be repaid on a one-to-one basis for each year that assistance was 18 provided through employment on Guam or in the office of Guam's Delegate to 19 Congress. In the event that any portion of the assistance is not repaid through 20 service credit, the amount unpaid in service credit shall become due and payable.

In calculating the amount due and payable for failure to repay through service credit, the amount due shall be the total amount of assistance minus the number of years repaid through service credit. For purposes of this Section, a year of service credit is twelve (12) months. The Board of Regents may also extend payment of cash repayment, via a promissory note, for a term not to exceed ten (10) years at an annual percentage rate of not less than ten percent (10%).

The Board of Regents may grant deferrals of repayment through service for 1 the following reasons: (1) pursuit of a graduate degree, or (2) a family or medical 2 3 emergency.

Death or total disability of the student shall terminate any obligations 4 Total disability for purposes of this Section is defined as any 5 herein. 6 physiological or psychological condition that will prevent the awardee from obtaining or maintaining any form of gainful employment for a period of not less 7 than Three (3) years. The Board may defer repayment for temporary disability. 8 Total disability requires the certification of two (2) physicians licensed to practice 9 10 on Guam.

11 §15A304. Rules and Regulations. The University of Guam shall develop 12 appropriate rules and regulations for the administration of this Article.

13 §15A305. Applicability of this Article. This article shall apply only to 14 awards made during the academic year 2000-2001 and thereafter.

§15A401. Students Entitled to Awards. There are established professional 4 and technical annual awards for graduate studies. On or before December 1st of 5 each year, the Board shall conduct a public hearing to receive the opinion and 6 recommendation of various professional groups or associations and the Guam 7 Occupational Information Coordinating Committee or its equivalent, to determine 8 those areas in which additional professional and technical skills are needed. From 9 10 those hearings, the Board shall establish a list of occupational priorities for Guam prior to considering applications for the awards. The number of awards and 11 occupational priorities to be recommended shall be submitted to the Legislature no 12 13 later than January 1st of each year.

Funds appropriated to provide professional and technical awards and which are not totally expended may be used in succeeding years so as to increase the number of annual awards. The awards provided in this Article are subject to the following limitations:

(a) The applicant must be a bona fide resident of Guam for a continuous period of
not less than ten (10) years prior to application and a United States citizen or a
permanent resident alien and must have achieved an overall grade point
average of 3.00 in undergraduate studies if pursuing a master's degree or 3.33
in a master's degree program if pursuing a doctoral degree, or an irrevocable
letter of acceptance from a U.S. accredited professional school, as recognized
by the Council on Post Secondary Accreditation (COPA).

(b) The applicant must agree to the repayment terms as specified in §15A403 and
§15A404.

(c) The applicant must present to the Board prior to granting of the award
 satisfactory proof that such applicant has been accepted by a U.S. accredited
 college or university as recognized by the Council on Postsecondary
 Accreditation, as a full-time student to pursue a program of study in the field
 applied for.

6 (d) The colleges or universities must be properly accredited as recognized by the
7 Council on Postsecondary Accreditation and must be approved by the Board;
8 provided, however, that no award shall be granted for studies at an off-island
9 institution in a program that is available at the University of Guam.

(e) The Board shall select the recipients of the awards upon the basis of scholastic
ability, financial need, aptitude and/ or work or life-time experience or
achievement.

(f) In determining financial need, the applicant must submit a Student Aid Report
(SAR) which results from the completion of a Free Application for Federal
Student Aid (FAFSA) as documentary evidence of need.

(g)No benefits as specified in §15A402 shall be continued beyond the number of
 years normally required to complete studies in the specific academic degree
 program for which the award was granted except under exceptional
 circumstances as determined by the Board.

§15A402. Benefits. Students entitled to awards pursuant to this Article shall
receive the following benefits:

22 (a) Payment of tuition and fees;

(b) An annual grant loan of not more than Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000) per
year to be used for room and board, books and educational supplies, to be
disbursed in accordance with regulations adopted by the Board, such grant
loans to be non-interest bearing except as to unpaid delinquent amounts.

(c) Cost of airfare for economy airline tickets; one (1) ticket to the school of
 attendance and one (1) ticket to return to Guam upon completion of studies.

3 (d) Total for items (a) and (b) of this Section shall not exceed Twenty Thousand
4 Dollars (\$20,000) per year unless the course of study is in the area of medicine
5 or dentistry. If the course of study is in medicine or dentistry, the total for
6 items (a) and (b) of this Section shall not exceed Twenty-five Thousand
7 Dollars (\$25,000) per year.

§15A403. Repayment of Benefits. The financial assistance granted under this article shall be repaid on a two-to-one (2:1) basis for each year that assistance was provided through employment on Guam or in the office of Guam's Delegate to Congress. In the event that any portion of the assistance is not repaid through service credit, the amount unpaid in service credit shall become due and payable.

13 (a) Every student granted an award pursuant to this Article shall execute a 14 promissory note agreeing to repay said loan over a period to be determined by the 15 Board, but not in excess of ten (10) years from the contemplated date of the 16 termination or the completion of the course of studies for which the award was 17 approved. The amount of the note shall be left blank until the completion of 18 studies in which the amount of the note will be the total monetary amount of 19 assistance provided by the award. Said promissory note shall be non-interest 20 bearing, except as to amounts unpaid by service credit that are due and payable 21 under the note which shall be subject to interest at the rate of ten percent (10%).

(b) Any student granted an award pursuant to this Article shall receive service credit against amounts due under the promissory note as follows:

24 (1)The amount of the note shall be the total amount of assistance provided.
25 Service credit shall be applied in against the note in monthly installments.

(2) The number of monthly installments to be paid shall be based on the

1 number of months for which assistance was provided times two (2).

(3)In the event of default, the balance due in monetary terms shall be the
amount of assistance provided less the amount repaid through service credit. The
amount repaid through service credit shall be the total amount of assistance
provided divided by the number of installments of service credit due as calculated
in Item (2) of this paragraph times the number of installments paid through service
credit.

8 (c) Any awardee granted an award pursuant to the provision of this Article 9 must commence work on Guam within Six (6) months following the completion 10 of studies, unless as extended by the Board for extenuating circumstances; or will be in default as of the date classes ended. The permanent transfer to an off-island 11 12 office or branch of a Guam employer shall not count towards service credit and 13 shall result in default on the date of transfer and interest shall begin on such date 14 of default. Permanent transfers, for purposes of this section, are those that are 15 longer than Six (6) months. The Board shall establish such policies prescribing the 16 length and terms of repayment, the interest rate to be charged, the collection of - 17 delinguent accounts or in the event of default.

(d) If any temporary leave of absence is expected to last longer than fortyfive (45) days, the awardee shall inform the University of Guam of the length of
time expected to be off-island, the reason for such time off-island and the address
while off-island. As long as the employee remains employed while off-island
temporarily, the employee shall receive service credit for such employment,
during the time the employee is off island for the purposes described herein.

(e) Death or total disability of the student shall terminate any obligations on
the note. Total disability for purposes of this Section is defined as any
physiological or psychological condition that will prevent the student from

obtaining or maintaining any form of gainful employment for a period of not less
 than Three (3) years. The Board may defer repayment for temporary disability.
 Total disability requires the certification of two (2) physicians licensed to practice
 on Guam.

5 (f) In the event a student forfeits prior to completion of degree/program 6 requirements, no service credit shall be granted for those years in which assistance 7 was provided and all awards plus interest shall be repaid according to the 8 provisions herein.

9 The Board of Regents may grant deferrals of repayment through service in 10 cases where family or medical emergency arises.

11 §15A404. Forfeiture of Awards. Expulsion from a school or institution 12 attended, or suspension for a period of the same or greater than one academic 13 semester or its equivalent in such school or institution, or failure to complete the 14 program for which the award was granted, or failure to comply with the 15 regulations of the Board shall result in a forfeiture of the award provided by this 16 Article. For purposes of this Article a person shall be considered to have 17 completed his course of studies upon the event or events of forfeiture as provided 18 in this Section.

19 §15A405. Rules and Regulations. The Board of Regents shall develop 20 rules and regulations pursuant to the Administrative Adjudication Law for the 21 administration of the program enacted by this Article. In addition to the 22 administration of the program, such Rules and Regulations shall include 23 provisions for (1) conditions for continuance of an Award, (2) construction of 24 applicable promissory notes, (3) time frames for the completion of program 25 studies and (4) provisions for the temporary suspension of completion of a degree

program or repayment of awards for cases beyond the control of the scholarship
 recipient such as personal illness or death or illness of a family member.

§15A406. Applicability of this Article. This article shall apply only to

Pursuant to Chapter 9 of Title 2, Guam Code Annotated, I respectfully request that your office issue Fiscal Notes for the attached bills:

Bill No. 65 (COR) -An Act to end social promotion in Guam's schools.

Bill No. 66 (COR) -An Act to increase school accountability by requiring audits and report cards of each school on Guam, to be known as the "School Accountability Act of 1999".

Bill No. 153 (COR) - An Act to add a new §7109 to Chapter 7 of Title 17, Guam Code Annotated relative to authorizing the Department of Education to contract with a bonafide nonprofit corporation pursuant to §501(C)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954, as amended, for the operation of the Fine Arts Facility at the Southern High School.

Bill No. 198 (COR) - An Act to repeal and reenact Sections 3104, 3107 and 3108 of Title 17, Guam Code Annotated relative to the reapportionment and composition of the Territorial School Board; to properly represent the entire island of Guam; to set board member terms; and to set a prompt election date to expeditiously install an elected Islandwide Public School Board of Education for the island of Guam.

Bill No. 256 (COR) - An Act to add a chapter 5B to Title 17, Guam Code Annotated Relative to act to providing financial incentives for National Board Certification of Teachers.

Bill No. 264 (LS) -An Act to amend Article 2 of Chapter 15 of Title 17, Guam Code Annotated Relative to increasing the amounts authorized for student loans, allowing the use of student loan proceeds for Distance Learning and Extending student loans to students attending the Guam Community College.

Bill No. 265 (LS) An Act to add new articles 3A and 4A and new §\$15303 and 15407 to Chapter 15 of Title 17, Guam Code Annotated Relative to creating new eligibility requirements and benefits for merit awards Professional/ Technical Awards for Academic Years 2000-2001 and thereafter and to add a new \$15707 to place a sunset provision on Doctoral Fellowship Scholarships in favor of Professional/Technical Awards Awards as a means of pursuing higher education.

Bill No. 268 (COR) -An Act to authorize and appropriate funds to the Guam System for Assistive Technology Program (GSAT) for the purpose of coordinating training for the transportation service providers relevant to assistive lifting techniques.

2	Section 1. Article 3A of Chapter 15 of Title 17, Guam Code Annotated is

§15A301. Students Entitled to Merit Awards. There are established 4 annual merit awards for high school students in the graduating classes of a fully 5 accredited, or candidate for accreditation as recognized by the Western 6 Association of Schools and Colleges (WASC) public and private high school on 7 Guam now or hereafter established. The students entitled to these awards shall be 8 the students having the highest scholastic standing in the graduating classes of 9 10 each such public and non-public high school in Guam except for Department of 11 Defense Schools. The awards shall be determined as follows:

- (1) One (1) for every fifty (50) graduates of a school's graduating class,
 rounded to the nearest fifty (50). If as a result of the equal scholastic
 standing of two (2) or more graduates, there is a tie for the awards
 granted pursuant to this Chapter, the University of Guam shall provide a
 mechanism to break the tie. Awardees are entitled to four years of
 education at the University of Guam. The benefits are according to the
 amounts provided in §15A302 of this Article.
- (2) Of the students receiving awards in Subsection (1) *supra*, the top two
 (2) awardees per graduating class shall be entitled to an additional two
 years of study for a Master's Degree at the University of Guam after
 completion of the bachelor's program awarded under the provisions of
 Subsection (1). In the event that, as a result of graduating class size,
 only one (1) student is entitled to an award under Subsection (1) supra,
 then only one (1) student shall be eligible for an award under this

- subsection. The benefits are according to the amounts provided in
 §15A302 of this Article.
- 3 (3) All awards shall be subject to the following limitations:
- 4 (a) A recipient must be a:
- 5 (1) a United States citizen or a permanent resident alien who has completed
 6 four (4) academic years in public or private high school on Guam; and
- 7 (2) a resident of Guam for a continuous period of not less than five (5) years
 8 immediately preceding June 15th of the year the award is to be awarded.
- 9 (b) If any student is ineligible for an award because of failure to meet the 10 requirements contained in subsection (a) of this section; or if any eligible student 11 chooses not to accept an award when first offered such award, the award shall be 12 granted to the eligible student with the next highest scholastic rank or in the case 13 of tie, the student that was eliminated by the tie-breaker. If an eligible student 14 declines to accept an award when first offered, such student cannot accept such an 15 award after it has been granted to another student.
- 16 The recipient of a merit award must notify the Board within thirty (30) days, 17 that the award is accepted. If such recipient fails to do so, the award is thereby 18 forfeited and the same shall be offered to the next alternate.
- (c) Award recipients must agree that he/she will work on Guam for a period of one
 (1) year for each academic year the award was received immediately following the
 completion or termination of the course of studies for which the award was
 granted, provided that if the recipient continues as a full-time student at a graduate
 or professional school such recipient may defer work on Guam until such
 additional studies are completed.
- (d)Awards granted on or subsequent to the effective date of this section shall be
 cancelled if a recipient:

(1)fails to maintain a cumulative grade point average of 2.5 or its equivalent,
 except a recipient may be allowed one academic term to regain this average
 without cancellation of the award, or

4 (2) fails to meet the academic and/or other requirements governing full-time
5 students at the University of Guam, or

6 (3)Is no longer a full-time student, except a recipient shall be allowed one
7 academic term in which to regain full-time student status before cancellation of
8 such recipient's award, or

9 §15A302. Benefits. Students entitled to merit awards pursuant to this
10 Article shall receive the following benefits:

(a) Tuition to attend school: Tuition and fees for each academic year to be paid
by the Student Financial Assistance Fund for a period of not more than four (4)
years in an undergraduate program at the University of Guam. For awards
granted under §15A101(2) of this Article, students shall receive an additional
two (2) years of tuition and fees for a graduate degree upon successful
completion of undergraduate studies and admission requirements for graduate
school.

(b) Stipend. Award recipients are entitled to a monthly stipend to be disbursed in
nine (9) monthly installments during the academic year, as follows: Fifty-nine
(59) or fewer semester hours completed: Three Hundred Dollars (\$300) per
month; Sixty (60) and over semester hours to graduation: Five Hundred Dollars
(\$500) per month. For graduate students, Six Hundred Dollars (\$600) per
month to be disbursed in nine (9) monthly installments during the academic
year.

(c) Allowance for Textbooks. Each student receiving an award under the Article
 shall be entitled to an additional Two-hundred Fifty Dollars (\$250.00) per
 semester for textbooks to be disbursed prior to the first day that classes begin.

(d) Optional Inter-session allowed. (1) Summer: Each student shall be entitled
to tuition, fees and textbooks for inter-session courses on a full-time basis. The
maximum amount for textbooks is One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00). Students
attending inter-session as provided herein shall be entitled to one (1) additional
month's stipend, as defined in §15A302(b) of this Article for each inter-session
cycle attended in the summer only.

(2) Between Fall and Spring Semesters: Each student shall be entitled to
 tuition, fees and textbooks for inter-session courses on a full-time basis. The
 maximum amount for textbooks is One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00). Students
 attending inter-session between the Fall and Spring Semesters shall not be entitled
 to an additional stipend.

16 §15A303. Service Credit. The financial assistance granted under this 17 article shall be repaid on a one-to-one basis for each year that assistance was 18 provided through employment on Guam or in the office of Guam's Delegate to 19 Congress. In the event that any portion of the assistance is not repaid through 20 service credit, the amount unpaid in service credit shall become due and payable.

In calculating the amount due and payable for failure to repay through service credit, the amount due shall be the total amount of assistance minus the number of years repaid through service credit. For purposes of this Section, a year of service credit is twelve (12) months. The Board of Regents may also extend payment of cash repayment, via a promissory note, for a term not to exceed ten (10) years at an annual percentage rate of not less than ten percent (10%).

1 The Board of Regents may grant deferrals of repayment through service for 2 the following reasons: (1) pursuit of a graduate degree, or (2) a family or medical 3 emergency.

4 Death or total disability of the student shall terminate any obligations 5 herein. Total disability for purposes of this Section is defined as any 6 physiological or psychological condition that will prevent the awardee from 7 obtaining or maintaining any form of gainful employment for a period of not less 8 than Three (3) years. The Board may defer repayment for temporary disability. 9 Total disability requires the certification of two (2) physicians licensed to practice 10 on Guam.

\$15A304. Rules and Regulations. The University of Guam shall develop
appropriate rules and regulations for the administration of this Article.

§15A401. Students Entitled to Awards. There are established professional 4 and technical annual awards for graduate studies. On or before December 1st of 5 each year, the Board shall conduct a public hearing to receive the opinion and 6 recommendation of various professional groups or associations and the Guam 7 8 Occupational Information Coordinating Committee or its equivalent, to determine those areas in which additional professional and technical skills are needed. From 9 10 those hearings, the Board shall establish a list of occupational priorities for Guam prior to considering applications for the awards. The number of awards and 11 12 occupational priorities to be recommended shall be submitted to the Legislature no 13 later than January 1st of each year.

Funds appropriated to provide professional and technical awards and which are not totally expended may be used in succeeding years so as to increase the number of annual awards. The awards provided in this Article are subject to the following limitations:

(a) The applicant must be a bona fide resident of Guam for a continuous period of
not less than ten (10) years prior to application and a United States citizen or a
permanent resident alien and must have achieved an overall grade point
average of 3.00 in undergraduate studies if pursuing a master's degree or 3.33
in a master's degree program if pursuing a doctoral degree, or an irrevocable
letter of acceptance from a U.S. accredited professional school, as recognized
by the Council on Post Secondary Accreditation (COPA).

(b) The applicant must agree to the repayment terms as specified in §15A403 and
§15A404.

(c) The applicant must present to the Board prior to granting of the award
satisfactory proof that such applicant has been accepted by a U.S. accredited
college or university as recognized by the Council on Postsecondary
Accreditation, as a full-time student to pursue a program of study in the field
applied for.

- 6 (d)The colleges or universities must be properly accredited as recognized by the
 7 Council on Postsecondary Accreditation and must be approved by the Board;
 8 provided, however, that no award shall be granted for studies at an off-island
 9 institution in a program that is available at the University of Guam.
- 10 (e) The Board shall select the recipients of the awards upon the basis of scholastic
 11 ability, financial need, aptitude and/ or work or life-time experience or
 12 achievement.
- (f) In determining financial need, the applicant must submit a Student Aid Report
 (SAR) which results from the completion of a Free Application for Federal
 Student Aid (FAFSA) as documentary evidence of need.
- (g) No benefits as specified in §15A402 shall be continued beyond the number of
 years normally required to complete studies in the specific academic degree
 program for which the award was granted except under exceptional
 circumstances as determined by the Board.

§15A402. Benefits. Students entitled to awards pursuant to this Article shall
receive the following benefits:

22 (a) Payment of tuition and fees;

(b) An annual grant loan of not more than Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000) per
year to be used for room and board, books and educational supplies, to be
disbursed in accordance with regulations adopted by the Board, such grant
loans to be non-interest bearing except as to unpaid delinquent amounts.

(c) Cost of airfare for economy airline tickets; one (1) ticket to the school of
 attendance and one (1) ticket to return to Guam upon completion of studies.

(d) Total for items (a) and (b) of this Section shall not exceed Twenty Thousand
Dollars (\$20,000) per year unless the course of study is in the area of medicine
or dentistry. If the course of study is in medicine or dentistry, the total for
items (a) and (b) of this Section shall not exceed Twenty-five Thousand
Dollars (\$25,000) per year.

§15A403. Repayment of Benefits. The financial assistance granted under this article shall be repaid on a two-to-one (2:1) basis for each year that assistance was provided through employment on Guam or in the office of Guam's Delegate to Congress. In the event that any portion of the assistance is not repaid through service credit, the amount unpaid in service credit shall become due and payable.

13 (a) Every student granted an award pursuant to this Article shall execute a 14 promissory note agreeing to repay said loan over a period to be determined by the 15 Board, but not in excess of ten (10) years from the contemplated date of the 16 termination or the completion of the course of studies for which the award was 17 approved. The amount of the note shall be left blank until the completion of 18 studies in which the amount of the note will be the total monetary amount of assistance provided by the award. Said promissory note shall be non-interest 19 20 bearing, except as to amounts unpaid by service credit that are due and payable 21 under the note which shall be subject to interest at the rate of ten percent (10%).

(b) Any student granted an award pursuant to this Article shall receive
service credit against amounts due under the promissory note as follows:

24 (1)The amount of the note shall be the total amount of assistance provided.
25 Service credit shall be applied in against the note in monthly installments.

26 (2) The number of monthly installments to be paid shall be based on the

1 number of months for which assistance was provided times two (2).

(3)In the event of default, the balance due in monetary terms shall be the
amount of assistance provided less the amount repaid through service credit. The
amount repaid through service credit shall be the total amount of assistance
provided divided by the number of installments of service credit due as calculated
in Item (2) of this paragraph times the number of installments paid through service

8 (c) Any awardee granted an award pursuant to the provision of this Article 9 must commence work on Guam within Six (6) months following the completion 10 of studies, unless as extended by the Board for extenuating circumstances; or will 11 be in default as of the date classes ended. The permanent transfer to an off-island 12 office or branch of a Guam employer shall not count towards service credit and 13 shall result in default on the date of transfer and interest shall begin on such date 14 of default. Permanent transfers, for purposes of this section, are those that are 15 longer than Six (6) months. The Board shall establish such policies prescribing the 16 length and terms of repayment, the interest rate to be charged, the collection of 17 delinguent accounts or in the event of default.

(d) If any temporary leave of absence is expected to last longer than fortyfive (45) days, the awardee shall inform the University of Guam of the length of
time expected to be off-island, the reason for such time off-island and the address
while off-island. As long as the employee remains employed while off-island
temporarily, the employee shall receive service credit for such employment,
during the time the employee is off island for the purposes described herein.

(e) Death or total disability of the student shall terminate any obligations on
the note. Total disability for purposes of this Section is defined as any
physiological or psychological condition that will prevent the student from

obtaining or maintaining any form of gainful employment for a period of not less
 than Three (3) years. The Board may defer repayment for temporary disability.
 Total disability requires the certification of two (2) physicians licensed to practice
 on Guam.

5 (f) In the event a student forfeits prior to completion of degree/program 6 requirements, no service credit shall be granted for those years in which assistance 7 was provided and all awards plus interest shall be repaid according to the 8 provisions herein.

9 The Board of Regents may grant deferrals of repayment through service in 10 cases where family or medical emergency arises.

11 §15A404. Forfeiture of Awards. Expulsion from a school or institution 12 attended, or suspension for a period of the same or greater than one academic 13 semester or its equivalent in such school or institution, or failure to complete the 14 program for which the award was granted, or failure to comply with the 15 regulations of the Board shall result in a forfeiture of the award provided by this 16 Article. For purposes of this Article a person shall be considered to have completed his course of studies upon the event or events of forfeiture as provided 17 18 in this Section.

19 §15A405. Rules and Regulations. The Board of Regents shall develop 20 rules and regulations pursuant to the Administrative Adjudication Law for the 21 administration of the program enacted by this Article. In addition to the 22 administration of the program, such Rules and Regulations shall include 23 provisions for (1) conditions for continuance of an Award, (2) construction of 24 applicable promissory notes, (3) time frames for the completion of program 25 studies and (4) provisions for the temporary suspension of completion of a degree program or repayment of awards for cases beyond the control of the scholarship
 recipient such as personal illness or death or illness of a family member.

3 §15A406. Applicability of this Article. This article shall apply only to
4 awards made during the academic year 2000- 2001 and thereafter.
