AN ACT TO APPROPRIATE THE NECESSARY FUNDS TO MEET THE EMERGENCY RECOVERY NEEDS OF GUAM RESULTING FROM TYPHOONS CHATA'AN AND HALONG.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF GUAM:

Section 1. Legislative Findings and Intent. Typhoon Chata'an struck Guam on July 5, 2002 and left the Island in need of *extensive* recovery in areas concerning the delivery of water and power; the clearing of roadways; reconstruction of infrastructure, such as bridges; and feeding and sheltering homeless individuals and families. While the typhoon strength of Chata'an was *not* as severe as some of Guam's former typhoons, Typhoon Chata'an's winds dwelled over Guam for numerous hours, breaking down many trees and causing considerable damage. The recovery effort from Typhoon Chata'an must be as quick and as responsive as the recovery efforts from other typhoons experienced in the past.

Guam must put the necessary resources together in order to put our Island back in order. Our People are severely inconvenienced in the lack of water, power and debris everywhere. To maximize our response, and to give further confidence to the business community and the tourism industry that Guam will shortly be the beautiful Island destination that it is, appropriate authorization to recover from this typhoon is needed and provided for herein.

Section 2. Expenditure Authority. Beginning July 3, 2002 and for forty-five (45) days from the enactment of this Act, I Maga'lahen Guåhan may spend up to Five Million Dollars (\$5,000,000) of the unexpended proceeds of the new money bonds under Article 10, Chapter 22 of Title 5 of the Guam Code Annotated, currently slated for Phase II of the Tumon Redevelopment Project, up to Eight Million Dollars (\$8,000,000) from the unreserved fund balance of the Territorial Highway Bond, up to One Million Eight Hundred

- 1 Thousand Dollars (\$1,800,000) from the unreserved fund balance of the
- 2 Educational Bond Fund, and notwithstanding any other provision of law a
- 3 sum not to exceed in aggregate One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000) from Special
- 4 Funds of the Executive Branch of the government of Guam, for Typhoon
- 5 Chata'an and Typhoon Halong recovery efforts.

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To the greatest extent possible, typhoon-related expenditures shall be those pre-approved by Federal Emergency Management Agency ("FEMA") for reimbursement to the government of Guam, for the purpose of providing and restoring damaged government services and infrastructure to the People of Guam resulting from Typhoon Chata'an or Typhoon Halong which serve to benefit and promote public health, safety, sanitation and welfare, including, but not limited to, restoration of roads and highways; restoration of power; restoration of water; restoration of telephone; repair of schools to pretyphoon conditions, both private and public, with priority of spending to public schools; repair of facilities belonging to non-profit organizations to pretyphoon conditions; repair of public buildings; restoration of public parks; restoration of sports facilities; interim public housing; repairing damage to government property; overtime compensation for existing personnel needed to perform emergency and restorative services; and classified supervisory personnel overtime, including, but not limited to, police, fire, public health and hospital, and for other services consistent with the intent of this Act.

Section 3. Reporting Requirements.

(a) All records of expenditures, grants and reimbursements from the Federal government, relative to the recovery efforts resulting

from Typhoon Chata'an and Typhoon Halong, shall be open to the Public Auditor for auditing.

(b) Reimbursement of Territorial Highway Bond, Educational Bond and Phase II of the Tumon Redevelopment Project funds expended under this Act from Federal sources, including FEMA, and other sources, including insurance policies, shall be returned to the source from which the funds originated.

There is hereby created a special fund identified as the "Typhoons Chata'an and Halong Special Reimbursement Fund" ("Special Fund"). Reimbursement of any Executive Branch Special Funds expended under this Act from Federal sources, including FEMA, and other sources, including insurance policies, shall be placed into the Special Fund. I Liheslaturan Guåhan shall review and appropriate the money to the fund source from which the money originated.

The Director of the Department of Administration shall maintain detailed accounting records pertaining to the expenditures authorized under this Act, with the exception of the Department of Education ("DOE") and all autonomous agencies, which shall maintain their own records. Within fourteen (14) days from the receipt of the initial reimbursement from FEMA, and fourteen (14) days after each subsequent reimbursement from FEMA, the Director of the Department of Administration, DOE and the autonomous agencies each shall submit a detailed written report of such expenditures and reimbursements authorized under this Act to the Speaker of *I Liheslaturan Guåhan*.

- 1 (c) Within fourteen (14) days of passage of this Act and every
 2 fourteen (14) days thereafter, I Maga'lahen Guåhan shall submit a
 3 detailed written expenditure report to I Liheslaturan Guåhan and to the
 4 Public Auditor.
- Section 4. Autonomous Agency Reimbursement. Any money disbursed for the typhoon recovery effort expenses to the autonomous agencies shall be reimbursed by the autonomous agencies to the source from which the funds originated.
- 9 **Section 5. Contractual Limitation.** Contracts entered into pursuant to this Act shall *not* exceed a term of sixty (60) days.
- Section 6. Severability. *If* any provision of this Law or its application to any person or circumstance is found to be invalid or contrary to law, such invalidity shall *not* affect other provisions or applications of this Law which can be given effect without the invalid provisions or application, and to this end the provisions of this Law are severable.

To maximize our response, and to give further confidence to the business community and the tourism industry that Guam will shortly be the beautiful island destination that it is, the same authorization to recover from this typhoon is needed that was made to recover from Typhoon Paka. Therefore, the same language as was passed by the Legislature for recovery from Typhoon Paka is set out in the Subsections below.
