Dear Legislative Secretary Brown:

Enclosed please find Bill No. 161 (COR) "AN ACT TO ADD CHAPTER 58 TO TITLE 5 OF THE GUAM CODE ANNOTATED, RELATIVE TO ESTABLISHING A MEANS FOR EDUCATION FACILITIES CONSTRUCTION" which was I have signed into law as Public Law No. 26-61.

This legislation allows the government of Guam to use an additional manner of financing the construction of new schools. The mechanism would be to allow government property to be leased to a contractor who would then obtain tax exempt bonds to finance the construction. After the construction, the finished school would be leased back to the government.

While there may be some deficiencies in the language of this legislation, especially concerning the terms "capital maintenance", "if a mechanism to do so [issue tax exempt bonds]", and other terms, the concept is worth exploring and may offer some alternatives in the future.

At this time, there are no current plans to build schools utilizing this type of method.



18 **Section 58101. Title.** This Act shall be known and shall be

19 cited as '*The Education Facilities Construction Initiative Act of 2001.*'

20 **Section 58102. Legislative Findings and Policy.** There is a

21 critical shortage of public school facilities on Guam. Many existing

22 facilities are antiquated and are *not* fit for the purpose of public

23 education. The Department of Education ('D.O.E.') is in need of *at least*

24 five (5) new public schools with all the related civil and structural

1 facilities and amenities customarily associated with a first rate public
2 education facility, and the University of Guam ('U.O.G.') and the Guam
3 Community College ('G.C.C.') are also in need of additional education
4 and related facilities.

5 The government of Guam lacks funding for the design and
6 construction of new public school facilities. The government of Guam is
7 also currently unable to seek financing, in its own name, through the
8 bond market. In an effort to overcome these financing hurdles, and to
9 provide for the educational needs of the students of Guam, *I Liheslaturan*
10 *Guåhan* desires to authorize the government of Guam to enter into
11 contracts for the financing, design, construction and long-term capital
12 maintenance of new public schools with private sector contractors who
13 can provide long-term financing obtained through tax-exempt bonds.

14 To facilitate the financing, design, construction and maintenance
15 of public school facilities envisioned by this Act, the government of
16 Guam will be authorized to lease for *up to* thirty (30) years government
17 of Guam property on which the public school facilities will be
18 constructed.

19 The lease of the government property will be to the contractor,
20 who will design and construct the public school facilities and provide
21 funding for the design and construction through the use of tax-exempt
22 bonds. Upon completion of the construction, the facilities and land will
23 be leased back to the government of Guam for a period *not to exceed* the
24 initial ground lease to the contractor over which time the government of
25 Guam will amortize, as lease payments to the contractor, the cost of the

1 financing, design, construction and related expenses of the public
2 school.

3 The contractor will also be responsible for the capital maintenance
4 and repair of each of the public school facilities constructed under this
5 Act, which costs shall be paid by the government of Guam as provided
6 for under this Act. At the expiration of the lease-back period, the
7 government of Guam real property and the public school facilities
8 constructed on the government of Guam real property will revert to the
9 government of Guam with no further obligations to the contractor.

10 **Section 58103. Definitions.** For purposes of this Chapter
11 and unless otherwise specified, the following words and phrases are
12 defined to mean:

13 (a) 'Act' means Chapter 58 of Title 5 of the Guam Code
14 Annotated, known as '*The Education Facilities Construction Initiative*
15 *Act of 2001.*'

16 (b) 'Contractor' shall mean the authorized entity which
17 shall be the signatory on the Contract and shall be fully
18 responsible for carrying out the design, construction, financing
19 and maintenance of the Education Facility. The Contractor may
20 cooperate with another entity or entities in any manner the
21 Contractor deems appropriate to provide for the financing, design
22 and construction of the public school facilities envisioned by this
23 Chapter.

1 (c) '*Contract*' shall mean the design, construction and
2 financing contract entered into by and between the Education
3 Agency and the Contractor following negotiations on the response
4 to the Request for Proposal.

5 (d) '*Education Agency*' shall mean the Guam Department
6 of Education, the University of Guam or the Guam Community
7 College.

8 (e) '*Education Facility*' shall mean any structure or
9 structures, together with all ancillary facilities, including parking
10 facilities, utilities and infrastructure associated with providing the
11 educational or related services required by an Education Agency.

12 (f) '*Lease*' shall mean a lease from an Education Agency to
13 the Contractor entered into at the time of the Contract for the
14 Property and commencing upon completion of the Education
15 Facility.

16 (g) '*Lease-Back*' shall mean the period of the term of the
17 lease between the Contractor and the Education Agency over
18 which period the costs of the design, construction, financing and
19 maintenance of an Education Facility is amortized according to the
20 terms agreed to between the government of Guam and the
21 Contractor. The period of the Lease and the Lease-Back shall be
22 identical.

23 (h) '*Property*' shall mean any property on which an
24 Education Facility is located.

1 **Section 58104. Authorization to Enter into Long-Term Leases.**

2 For the purpose of facilitating the financing of the design, construction
3 and maintenance of an Education Facility encompassed by this Act, the
4 government of Guam or an Education Agency, as the case may be, is
5 authorized to lease, *if required*, to the Contractor, *subject* to legislative
6 approval, sufficient government of Guam real property on which to
7 construct an Education Facility; *provided*, such property is in the
8 inventory of the Education Agency. The location of the Property may be
9 at the site of an existing Education Facility under the control of an
10 Education Agency, which may be demolished and rebuilt under the
11 provisions of this Act.

12 Any lease of property pursuant to this Act will be for a period
13 mutually agreed upon between the Education Agency and the
14 Contractor as may be reasonably necessary to amortize over the Lease-
15 Back, the costs associated with the financing, design, construction and
16 maintenance of the Education Facility, and in no event shall such period
17 be *less than* twenty (20) years, or *exceed* thirty (30) years.

18 Upon completion of the construction of the Education Facility, the
19 Contractor shall lease back to the Education Agency the Property for the
20 period of the Lease-Back period. Upon the expiration of the Lease and
21 the Lease-Back of the Property, and the fulfillment of the terms and
22 conditions of the Lease-Back by the Education Agency, the Property and
23 the Education Facility shall become the property of the Education
24 Agency, and the Contractor shall have no further right, title or interest
25 in the Property or the Education Facility.

1 **Section 58105. Procurement.** Upon identifying Property
2 adequate for the placement of an Education Facility, an Education
3 Agency shall solicit Requests for Proposals ('RFP'), through the
4 Department of Public Works, in compliance with the Guam
5 Procurement Law, for the financing, design and construction of the
6 Education Facility, together with maintenance of the Education Facility
7 over the term of the Lease-Back, according to the needs of the Education
8 Agency and consistent with this Chapter.

9 **Section 58106. Responsibilities of Contractor.** The Contract
10 shall require that the Contractor be responsible for all costs, expenses
11 and fees of any kind or nature, associated with the design, civil
12 improvements, infrastructure, construction, permits and financing
13 associated with the completion of an Education Facility.

14 The Contractor shall also be responsible for the capital
15 maintenance and upkeep of the schools during the period of the Lease-
16 Back term. The costs of the design, construction and financing for an
17 Education Facility shall be paid in *substantially* equal monthly
18 installments over the term of the Lease-Back period, which shall be
19 mutually determined by the Education Agency and the Contractor, but
20 which will *not* exceed thirty (30) years.

21 The capital maintenance, repair and upkeep costs shall be paid on
22 a periodic basis as incurred by the Contractor on terms to be agreed to
23 in the Contract for each Education Facility.

1 **Section 58107. Assignments.** To facilitate the purposes of
2 this Chapter and to provide security for the bondholders, the Contractor
3 may assign, without the need of the consent of the Education Agency,
4 the Contract, the Lease and the Lease-Back to any underwriter or other
5 appropriate party that has facilitated the issuance of the tax-exempt
6 bonds necessary to provide the financing for the Education Facility.

7 **Section 58108. Use of Tax-Exempt Bonds for Financing.** To
8 minimize the financing cost to the Education Agency, all financing
9 utilized by the Contractor to fund the design, construction and
10 maintenance of an Education Facility shall be through tax-exempt bonds
11 or other financial instruments, *if* a mechanism to do so is available. The
12 purpose for this requirement is to assure the Education Agency pays the
13 lowest possible interest rate so that the cost of financing the design,
14 construction and maintenance of an Education Facility to the Education
15 Agency, amortized through the Lease-Back payments from the
16 Education Agency to the Contractor, will be lower than regular
17 commercial rates.

18 **Section 58109. Utilities and Routine Maintenance and Repair.**
19 The Education Agency shall be responsible for the connection and
20 payment of all utilities, including without limitation, power, water,
21 sewer, telephone and cable, and all routine interior maintenance and
22 repair and exterior grounds-keeping and landscaping, and upkeep of
23 the Education Facility. Capital maintenance and repair shall be
24 performed by the Contractor as provided for in this Chapter.

Ike Santos, Chief Planner, Dept. of Education (Oral testimony)
Carl Taitano, Member, Task Force on Educational Facilities (Oral Testimony)
Ron Teehan, Administrative Director, Chamorro Land Trust Commission (Oral testimony)
Steve DeBiasi, President, Guam Contactor's Association (Oral testimony)
Rosie Tainatongo, Superintendent of Education (Written Testimony)
Edward Untalan, Administrator, Guam Economic Development Authority (Written testimony)
James A. Martinez, Executive Director, Guam Contractors' Association (Written testimony)

Dr. Roy T. Tsuda, Acting President of the University of Guam, testified before the Committee on Bill No. 161. He said the University is not opposed to the bill, but is unsure of whether it would take advantage of this type of partnership with contractors. He said that if it did, the University should be able to follow its usual procurement procedures, and not go through the Department of Public Works.

Alicia Pinaula, president of the Parent Teacher Organization of Mt. Santa Rosa Elementary School, testified before the Committee in favor of Bill No. 161. She said the bill will open the door for a new school to be opened in the Pagat area, and that the Department of Education is planning on closing Mt. Santa Rosa, leaving the Pagat children to be switched to another school that is already overcrowded. She said DOE has said the structure at Mt. Santa Rosa is still OK for a few years, and added that she thinks it doesn't make sense to close the school.

Juanita Blas, representing her daughter, a student at Mt. Santa Rosa Elementary School, testified before the Committee in favor of Bill No. 161. She said she's been attending land meeting trying to get schools built, and said she's concerned with DOE shutting down Mt. Santa Rosa Elementary School. She said it will split up a good staff at the school. Funding is always a problem, but children deserve more than that. She would also prefer having children tolerate the conditions for a year or a year and a half while a new school is being built rather than the stress of switching to another school.

Jesus Cruz, a parent of a student at Mt. Santa Rosa Elementary School, testified before the Committee in favor of Bill No. 161. He said he would like a picture and the exact location in Pagat for a new school.

Rose Nauta, a parent of a student at Mt. Santa Rosa Elementary School, testified before the Committee in favor of Bill No. 161. She said her children go from Price to Upi to Mt. Santa Rosa. She hopes the schools stay open until God knows when.

Juanita Cushing, a grandparent of a student at Mt. Santa Rosa Elementary School, testified before the Committee in favor of Bill No. 161. She said she's close to the bonding of the school, which will go away if the school is closed.

Lon Bottcher, a retired educator, testified before the Committee in favor of Bill No. 161. He said he now builds small homes, which are steel, quick to put up, the size of a classroom, and easier to air-condition. He suggested that these could be used to build classrooms.

Ike Santos, chief planner at the Department of Education, representing the director, Rosie Tainatongo, read from Tainatongo's written testimony in favor of Bill No. 161 with amendments. The suggested amendments include clearly defining the term "capital maintenance", using the term "agreement" instead of lease so that there would be more flexibility in the agreement, and authorizing the education agency to enter general agreements concerning the underlying land. In addition, Santos said that Mt. Santa Rosa will stay open until a new school is built.

Carl Taitano, a member of the Task Force on Educational Facilities, testified before the Committee on Bill No. 161. He said the Legislature should look at how to deal with capital maintenance and regular maintenance, and should define the responsibilities of each party. He said regarding leases, which transfer ownership rights, the property rights of GovGuam should remain intact. He also has recommendations for tax-exempt debt that he will submit later.

Ron Teehan, administrator of the Chamorro Land Trust Commission, testified before the Committee on Bill No. 161. He said that it's not necessary to transfer the ownership of property to DOE, because the Land Trust Commission can license the use of land to DOE. He also cautioned that identifying lots for school sites should not displace families that have been there for years, as happened at Machanao. He also said that consideration should be taken into account for identifying lots for schools that have infrastructure already in place, because this means that subdivisions for families will have to have infrastructure built elsewhere, which will be an additional cost.

Steve DeBiasi, president of the Guam Contractors Association, testified before the Committee on Bill No. 161. He said the bill has merit, and asked that the Legislature consider adding language to the bill requiring that jobs used for building schools should use 100% local labor.

III. FINDINGS AND RECOMMENDATION

The Committee on Rules, General Governmental Operations, Reorganization and Reform, and Federal, Foreign and General Affairs finds that Bill No. 161 would provide the Department of Education, the University of Guam, and the Guam Community College with an additional funding mechanism for building educational facilities, some of which are badly needed and overdue, as the parents of Mt. Santa Rosa Elementary School testified to.

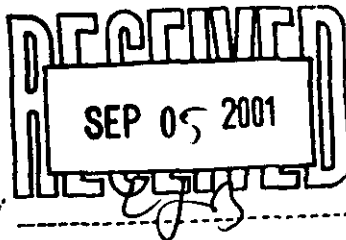

11 **Section 51101. Title.** This Act shall be known and shall be
12 cited as "*The Education Facilities Construction Initiative Act of 2001.*"

4 through tax exempt bonds.'

5 To facilitate the financing, design, construction and maintenance of
6 public school facilities envisioned by this Act, the government of Guam will be
7 authorized to lease for up to thirty (30) years government of Guam property on
8 which the public school facilities will be constructed.

9 The lease of the Government property will be to the contractor who will
10 design and construct the public school facilities and provide funding for the
11 design and construction through the use of tax-exempt bonds. Upon
12 completion of the construction, the facilities and land will be leased back to the
13 government of Guam for a period not to exceed the initial ground lease to the
14 contractor over which time the government of Guam will amortize, as lease
15 payments to the contractor, the cost of the financing, design, construction, and
16 related expenses of the public school.

17 The contractor will also be responsible for the capital maintenance and
18 repair of each of the public school facilities constructed under this Act, which
19 costs shall be paid by the government of Guam as provided for under this Act.
20 At the expiration of the lease-back period, the government of Guam real
21 property and the public school facilities constructed on the government of
22 Guam real property will revert to the government of Guam with no further

1 **Section 51103. Definitions.** For purposes of this Chapter and
2 unless otherwise specified, the following words and phrases are defined to
3 mean:

4 (a) "Act" means Chapter 51 of Title 5 of the Guam Code
5 Annotated, known as "*The Education Facilities Construction Initiative*
6 *Act of 2001.*"

7 (b) "Contractor" shall mean the authorized entity which shall be
8 the signatory on the Contract and shall be fully responsible for carrying
9 out the design, construction, financing and maintenance of the Education
10 Facility. The Contractor may cooperate with another entity or entities in
11 any manner the Contractor deems appropriate to provide for the
12 financing, design and construction of the public school facilities
13 envisioned by this Act.

14 (c) "Contract" shall mean the design, construction and
15 financing contract entered into by and between the Education Agency
16 and the Contractor following negotiations on the Response to the
17 Request for Proposal.

18 (d) "Education Agency" shall mean the Guam Department of

20 (e) "Education Facility" shall mean any structure or structures,

Enclosed please find Bill No. 212 (LS) "AN ACT TO ESTABLISH A TASK FORCE ON WORKPLACE VIOLENCE TO STUDY THE MOST EFFECTIVE MEANS TO PREVENT VIOLENCE IN THE WORKPLACE" which was I have signed into law as Public Law No. 26-62.

While there are many task forces created in the government, there is no task force specifically to concentrate on violence as it occurs in the workplace. This legislation fills that gap, and this task force may find that workplace violence has different characteristics than violence in other types of settings. Also, the increase of workplace violence throughout the United States in recent year, and an especially serious case of workplace violence that has occurred here on our island, has caused a great deal of concern for safety at work. Some concentration of effort will serve to eliminate the causes of this violence.

The task force set up under this legislation will determine the parameters of the occurrence of workplace violence on Guam, and will suggest a course of action that can be taken.



1 **BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF GUAM:**

2 **Section 1. Legislative Findings and Intent.** *I Liheslaturan Guåhan*
3 finds that Workplace Violence has emerged as an important safety and health
4 issue in today's workplace. It is important *not* to ignore nor condone this
5 reality. It is a known fact that there are threats of violence in the workplace.
6 Workplace violence is a pervasive and deadly phenomenon that could strike

1 anywhere at anytime. The first line of defense is to be well informed in order
2 to respond appropriately in the event of a threat or incident of violence.

3 It is therefore the intent of *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* to establish a Task Force
4 on Workplace Violence to address methods in the prevention and preparation
5 for deterrence of potential incidents of workplace violence, and what recourse
6 is available in the event that an employee is threatened with violence.

7 **Section 2. Establishment and Duties of the Task Force on Workplace**
8 **Violence.** There is hereby established the Task Force on Workplace Violence
9 (“Task Force”), which shall study the most effective means to prevent
10 workplace violence. The Task Force shall issue, *no later than* one hundred
11 twenty (120) days from its initial meeting, a written report to *I Maga’lahen*
12 *Guåhan* and to *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* which shall include, but *not* be limited to:

13 (a) review of the incidence of workplace violence, based upon
14 data obtained from health, labor and law enforcement agencies of the
15 government of Guam and the Federal Government;

16 (b) an analysis of the existing policies and regulations
17 governing prevention of workplace violence; *and*

18 (c) recommendations concerning laws, regulations or incentives
19 necessary for increased security in the workplaces, and protection of
20 employees, including any draft legislation the Task Force deems
21 appropriate.

22 **Section 3. Composition of Task Force on Workplace Violence.**

23 The Task Force shall be composed of ten (10) members as follows:

- 1 (a) the Director of the Department of Labor, or that person's
2 designee;
- 3 (b) the Attorney General of Guam, or that person's designee;
- 4 (c) the Chief of the Guam Police Department, or that person's
5 designee;
- 6 (d) three (3) representatives from the business community
7 appointed by *I Maga'lahaen Guåhan*;
- 8 (e) a representative from organized labor appointed by *I*
9 *Maga'lahaen Guåhan*;
- 10 (f) one (1) advocate from a non-profit family violence coalition
11 or organization appointed by the Speaker of *I Liheslaturan Guåhan*;
- 12 (g) one (1) member of the community-at-large appointed by the
13 Speaker of *I Liheslaturan Guåhan*; and
- 14 (h) a representative from the Superior Court of Guam.

15 The Director of the Department of Labor, or that person's designee, shall
16 serve as temporary chairperson, and shall convene the first meeting of the
17 Task Force. At its first meeting the Task Force shall elect from among its
18 members a chairperson and a vice-chairperson. The chairperson shall preside
19 at all meetings of the Task Force, shall act as the spokesperson of the Task
20 Force and perform such other duties as the Task Force shall direct.

21 **Section 4. Term and Vacancy of the Task Force on Workplace**
22 **Violence.** The Task Force shall be formed and meet *no later than* forty-five
23 (45) days *after* the enactment of this Act. The members of the Task Force shall
24 serve for the duration of the existence of the Task Force. Any vacancy shall be

1 filled in the same manner as the original appointment, but *only* for the balance
2 of the term. The Task Force members shall serve without compensation. The
3 Task Force shall terminate upon the acceptance of its report by *I Maga'laha*
4 *Guåhan* and the Speaker of *I Liheslaturan Guåhan*.

5 **Section 5. Support Services.** The Department of Labor, the Office
6 of the Attorney General and the Guam Police Department shall assist the Task



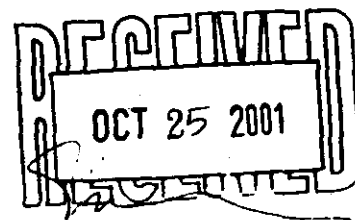



10 It is therefore, the intent of *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* to establish a Task
11 Force on Workplace Violence to address methods in the prevention and
12 preparation for deterrence of potential incidents of workplace violence and
13 what recourse is available in the event that an employee is threatened with
14 violence.

1 **Section 2. Establishment and Duties of the Task Force on Workplace**
2 **Violence.** There is established the Task Force on Workplace Violence
3 (“Task Force”), which shall study the most effective means to prevent
4 workplace violence. The Task Force shall issue, no later than one hundred
5 twenty (120) days from its initial meeting a written report to *I Maga’lahen*
6 *Guåhan*; and *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* which shall include, but not be limited
7 to:

- 8 (a) review of the incidence of workplace violence, based on data
9 obtained from health, labor and law enforcement agencies of the
10 government of Guam and the Federal government;
- 11 (b) an analysis of the existing policies and regulations governing
12 prevention of workplace violence; and
- 13 (c) recommendations concerning laws, regulations or incentives
14 necessary for increased security in the workplaces and
15 protection of employees, including any draft legislation the Task
16 Force deems appropriate.

17 **Section 3. Composition of Task Force on Workplace Violence.** The Task
18 Force shall be composed of seven (7) members as follows:

- 19 (a) the Director of Department of Labor or his designee;
- 20 (b) the Attorney General of Guam or his designee;
- 21 (c) the Chief of the Guam Police Department or his designee;

1 (d) a representative from the business community appointed by I
2 *Maga'lahaen Guåhan*;

3 (e) a representative from organized labor appointed by I
4 *Maga'lahaen Guåhan*;

5 (f) one (1) advocate from a non-profit family violence coalitions or
6 organizations appointed by Speaker of the *I Liheslaturan*
7 *Guåhan*; and

8 (g) one (1) member of the community at large appointed by the
9 Speaker of the *I Liheslaturan Guåhan*.

10 The Director of the Department of Labor or his designee shall serve as
11 temporary chairperson, and shall convene the first meeting of the Task
12 Force. At its first meeting the Task Force shall elect from among its
13 members a chairperson and a vice-chairperson. The chairperson shall
14 preside at all meetings of the Task Force, shall act as the spokesperson of
15 the Task Force and perform such other duties, as the Task Force shall
16 direct.

17 **Section 4. Term and Vacancy of the Task Force on Workplace Violence.**

18 The Task Force shall be formed and meet no later than forty-five (45) days
19 after the enactment of this Act. The members of the Task Force shall serve
20 for the duration of the existence of the Task Force. Any vacancy shall be
21 filled in the same manner as the original appointment, but only for the
22 balance of the term. The Task Force members shall serve without
