#### I. OVERVIEW

#### A. Purpose and Essential Elements

The purpose of Bill 230 "An act relative to making registration with the selective service an eligibility requirement for obtaining a motor vehicle driver's license," is to ensure that any future involuntary recruitment of military personnel would be fair and equitable. Bill 230 would help raise awareness of federal mandates and help to ensure young men of Guam eligibility for federal benefits.

#### SECTION BY SECTION

SECTION 1. Legislative Findings and Intent. Implies that awareness or compliance of the Selective Service registration in order to comply with federal statute requirements is not at an optimal level. In order to raise compliance with federal requirements, adding as an additional qualification, that males between 18 and 25 years of age must register or be registered with the Selective Service in order to apply for issuance, renewal, or duplicate of a motor vehicle driver's license. This also enables 'the young men of Guam' eligibility for federal benefits and not to suffer penalties associated with noncompliance.

SECTION 2. Adds new §3101.1 to Article 1, Chapter 3 of Title 16 of the GCA:

Add mandatory registration with the Selected Service (the draft registry) to eligibility for drivers' license for male population.

Current law requires application containing: (1) the applicant's full name, age, sex and both mailing and residence addresses; (2) the height, weight and color of eyes of the applicant; (3) the kind of license applied for; (4) whether the applicant has been licensed previously as an operator or chauffeur, and if so, when and in what jurisdiction and whether or not any such license has been suspended or revoked, and if so, the date of and reason for such suspension or revocation; (5) whether the applicant previously has been refused an operator's or chauffeur's license in Guam, and if so, the date and the reason for such refusal; (6) whether the applicant has previously operated a motor vehicle, and if so, for what length of time; (7) whether the applicant has the normal use of both hands and feet; (8) whether the applicant has ever been afflicted with heart condition, epilepsy, paralysis, insanity or other disability or disease affecting his ability to exercise reasonable and ordinary control in operating a motor vehicle upon a highway; (9) whether the applicant understands traffic signs and signals; (10) one (1) parent or guardian of an applicant under the age of eighteen (18) shall attest to his relationship with the minor, certify the correctness of information furnished on the application form; give his consent to the issuance of a license to the applicant and shall sign the application; (11) the applicant and licensing official shall sign all approved applications and date the application at the time signatures are made; and (12) a valid Certificate of Completion of a drivers education course by the applicant, if the applicant is applying for a license for the first time or if the applicant is under eighteen (18) years of age, and any other information necessary to determine whether the applicant is entitled to a license under this Title.

> Requires applicant provide consent and authorization to DMV to register with Selected Service.

**SECTION 3.** Effective Date. 120 days following enactment of Bill 230 into law. Also mandates public awareness program regarding new mandatory regulation – and use existing budget to fund the program.

**SECTION 4.** Standard Severability Clause.

#### **B. Public Hearing Conducted**

The Committee on Economic Development, Retirement, Investments, Public Works and Regulatory Functions conducted a public hearing on 9:00 a.m. Wednesday, January 14, 2004 in the Legislative Public Hearing Room, I Liheslaturan Guahan, in Hagatna. Public notice was provided on January 6, 2004 and January 12,2004.

Committee Chairwoman Toni Sanford called the public hearing to order at 11:02 a.m. in the Legislative Public Hearing Room. Committee members present were: Senators Carmen Fernandez, Tina Muna Barnes, Larry Kasperbauer and Speaker Ben C. Pangelinan. Non-Committee member present was Senator Robert Klitzkie.

Individuals who appeared before the Committee and provided testimony were: Mr. Howard Hemsing (native), Ms. Diane Castro (native), Mr. James F. Wang (Veteran), Mr. Edward Cenzon (member SSS Appeals Board), Mr. Lorenzo Aflague (Selective Service System State Director, Guam), Mr. Gregory Perez (Selective Service System Reserve Forces Officer, Guam), Mr. Tony Santos (Selective Service System Reserve Forces Officer, Guam), Mr. Art Ilagan (Revenue and Taxation), and Mr. Frank Blaz (Assistant to the Director of Rev. and Tax).

#### II. SUMMARY OF TESTIMONY

Chairwoman Sanford allowed Senator Tina Muna-Barnes the opportunity to explain the general intent of Bill 230.

Senator Muna-Barnes explained that the intent of Bill 230 was to assist in the Military Selective Service here on Guam by providing an accessible vehicle requiring males between the ages 18-25 years old, to sign up with the U.S. Selective Service in order to receive or renew their driver's licenses.

Howard Hemsing, (identified himself on sign-up sheet as Maga Aniti), a native of Guam, appeared before the Committee and provided oral testimony opposing Bill 230. Mr. Helmsley argued that we, the Chamorros, are not U.S. citizens because we are not allowed to vote for the President.

Fanai Castro, identifying herself as a native of Guam, appeared before the Committee and provided oral testimony opposing Bill 230. Ms. Castro thanked the Committee for being allowed to provide oral testimony. Ms. Castro challenged the political and legal ties to the U.S. federal government. She stated that it is offensive, to her that her brothers will have to serve a repeated offense of having to serve a country that does not recognize their U.S. citizenship. Further, she questions, if the war is at home or abroad when we want to put our sons and brothers involuntarily into a war, or service, of a country that does not fully recognize our citizenship. Ms. Castro also, as examples, disputes why should we do anything for a country that does not care for our ancestral remains at Ylig Bay.

James Wang, a Vietnam combat veteran, appeared before the Committee and presented written and oral testimony in favor of Bill 230. Mr. Wang thanked the distinguished members of the committee. He stated that he served his country voluntarily and his only son is currently attending the U.S. Military Academy at West Point and will join the Army to complete his military service obligation. Mr. Wang further states that he and his son have dedicated themselves to serve in the U.S. Army as responsible and loyal citizens. Furthermore, Mr. Wang stated that Bill 230 has a defining intent that enhances a federal requirement to provide a mechanism to have ready additional military manpower for future recruitment and to comply with related federal mandate. Mr. Wang asks-for the committee's support and endorsement of the 27<sup>th</sup> Guam Legislature for unanimous passage of Bill 230.

Ed Cenzon, a member of the Selective Service Appeals Board, appeared before the Committee and provided oral testimony in favor of Bill 230. Mr. Cenzon stated that he supports Bill 230 for three main reasons. He states that Bill 230 will promote compliance with federal regulations concerning registration with the Selective Service Board benefiting our young people because failing to register will mean that they will not be eligible for federal grants and other benefits that they would normally be eligible for. His second reason is that it will provide equitable distribution if the Selective Service is activated. Mr. Cenzon points out that only 60% are registering and the remaining 40% are able to get away from the draft. Finally, Mr. Cenzon stated that he believes that 30 states in the continental U.S. are now implementing the driver's registration to be tied in with the Selective Service. Mr. Cenzon urged the Committee to look at Bill 230 in a favorable manner and vote on its approval. He thanked the Committee for the opportunity to present his testimony.

Gregory D. Perez, the Reserve Forces Officer for the Selective Service System, Guam, appeared before the Committee and provided written and oral testimony in support of Bill 230. Mr. Perez stated that an effective method of improving registration is the Driver's License Legislation. He stated that the Selective Service System is responsible for providing manpower in an equitable manner for the U.S. Armed Forces in the event of a national emergency. Mr. Perez points out that the Selective Service System coordinates with other government agencies such as the U.S. Postal System, federal and state education agencies, state job employment agencies and with volunteers in order to pass the information to males to register with the Selective Service System after their 18<sup>th</sup> birthday. He also points out that there are now 35 states and territories of the U.S. have enacted the Driver's License Legislation and are reporting positive results of up to 11% increase in compliance in 2002. Mr. Perez then, urged by Mr. Lorenzo Aflague, read briefs on the benefits of this proposal (see attachments).

The briefs read by Mr. Perez (labeled as Benefits of This Proposal in the Committee Package) provide benefits of the proposed bill, some background supporting implementation of the bill, provisions of Bill 230, and the Driver's License Application Statement if the bill is implemented.

Frank Blaz, Assistant to the Director of the Department of Revenue and Taxation, appeared before the Committee to present testimony written by Art Ilagan, Director of Revenue and Taxation. The testimony provided did not identify whether Art Ilagan was in favor or in opposition of Bill 230. The testimony presented pointed out areas of concern and stated a possible solution to respond to a concern for the Department of Revenue and Taxation. The areas of concern are the related costs of implementing Bill 230, actions of the Department of Revenue and Taxation if the applicant refuses to register, and issues specific to reporting requirements.

The cost that the Department of Revenue and Tax are associated with is the purchasing of the new software required, installation and training of personnel in the use of the software, programming and maintenance, applications to be reformatted, extended, and produced, and for the updating of handbooks to include new information.

Art Ilagan stated in his written testimony that he urges strong consideration from the Committee to raise certain fees in order to offset the costs. The testimony states that current fees for a Guam Driver's License is the lowest in the U.S., its territories and possessions. Mr. Ilagan's written testimony cites the \$12.00 fee the C.N.M.I. charges as an example. His written testimony also suggests charging different fees for a new license and for a renewal, duplicate, and/or temporary license. The fees suggested are \$25.00 and \$10.00 respectively.

Larry Aflague, State Director for the Selective Service System in Guam, appeared before the Committee and provided written and oral testimony in favor of Bill 230. Mr. Aflague stated that Bill 230 is an opportunity to support an important Federal program that is a key element to the National Security strategy. Furthermore, he stated National Defense is a partnership between the Federal Government and all states and territories, and is every U.S. citizen's responsibility. Mr. Aflague also stated that the Selective Service System is in the National Defense Readiness and the Fairness and Equity Business, and that this legislation adds to the preparation of the uncertainty of war and the capability of conducting a draft in reflection of that uncertainty. Mr. Aflague argued that the degree to which a draft can be fair and equitable in wartime is directly related to today's registration compliance. Mr. Aflague also stated that registration compliance ensures the eligibility of Guam's young men for Federally backed student loans and grants, jobs with the U.S. Government, vocational job training, and citizenship by those immigrants seeking citizenship. He pointed out that the present registration rate for 18 year olds on Guam is 59.46% and that the Selective Service System is not able to educate those who drop out from high school. Mr. Aflague adds that enactment of Bill 230 will raise the registration compliance statistics by making the registration process easier for the men on Guam. (Attached documents with written testimony include testimonials from the States of Colorado, Delaware, Oklahoma, Illinois, and Utah that pertain to the current situations dealing with each state's perspective of having their male citizens between 18 and 25 years of age be registered with the Selective Service in order to apply for issuance, renewal, or duplicate of a motor vehicle driver's license.)

Chairman Sanford thanked the panel for their presentation of testimonies and opened the floor for questions.

Senator Klitzke asked if, before 1973, you could be drafted even if you had not registered for the draft? He also asked if, by failing to register, you do not immunize yourself from being drafted? Senator Klitzke questioned if an individual that failed to register that they would be subjecting themselves to five years in prison? He continued to point out that Bill 230 provides a, very easy, means for people to register for the draft and that registering for the draft is more of a census type of operation. Senator Klitzke then went on to say that the bill has a function protecting entitlement of federal grants, keeping you out of federal prison and does not immunize you from being drafted. He also stated that, every male up until the age of 45 is eligible for service to his country if we are in time of war, regardless of whether he is registered or not. The senator then stated that the next focus should be on the ease of administration. He stated that most people go through the driver's license application process when they are 16.

Larry Aflague affirmed Senator Klitzke's comments and added that before 1973 an individual must still be registered in order to be drafted unless the law caught them. This bill does have some benefits. Bill 230 enhances our ability to provide this nation and insurance policy in the event that we are needed. There are three tiers of defense that are presently available; the active duty forces, the National Guard and the reserves, and the Selective Service. Regardless of whether you have served your country. If you are out on a standby status, you are subject to recall. Responding to the question from Senator Klitzke, regarding the age of registering for a license, 16 year-olds will be registered, in a sense, but will not be subjected to the draft and will be placed on a special pool. Upon reaching the age of 18, they will automatically be moved over to the 18 year-old groups.

Senator Klitzke asked about citizens from the Freely Associated States of Micronesia in regard to registration into the Selective Service. Mr. Aflague responded that they are subject to registration. If they can qualify for all those benefits, he is sure. The citizens from the Freely Associated States of Micronesia have an opportunity to rebut that later on. The Selective Service is just taking inventory on what they have available. Senator Klitzke then asked Mr. Aflague if the Selective Service has spoken with the Department of Revenue and Taxation on issues regarding implementation. Mr. Aflague replied that there is very little interruption, if any on the current procedures that they have. The Selective Service would have to look at the issues regarding training on a separate note. He is sure that the Selective Service will come up and is able to fund that at a minimum cost.

**Senator Klitzke**, now addressing Frank Blaz and asked Mr. Blaz, if you were Mr. Ilagan, would the Selective Service be responsible for the payment of the software and train the personnel so that it comes to annul extra cost type of operation for the Department of Revenue and Taxation, you wouldn't object to it, would you?

Mr. Blaz responded by saying that they wouldn't. It's just that the department would like to be able to work with something a little more concrete. He further pointed out that

they do not know the cost of the software and if they are able to cover it completely, and be able to provide people to train the personnel handling the system. If those issues were made clear, then it wouldn't be a problem for Mr. Ilagan.

Senator Klitzke stated that perhaps the language in the bill would create a condition precedent that the bill would become effective upon the necessary for the funding for the software and the training. Then that would make it pretty powerful. Mr. Blaz confirmed that it would.

Senator Kasperbauer, addressing Mr. Blaz, stated that this bill reminds him of past bills that were introduced in previous Legislatures. This bill limits itself only to a driver's license, whereas other bills in the past focused on financial aid, local financial aid for attending a college, and employment. In terms of the previous question by our colleague from Yigo; well I guess it's not germaine why you didn't include those this time. I won't follow that up. With 120 days, perhaps this will be for Mr. Blaz, is that reasonable or is that too close, in terms of the acquisition of the software and the training and the necessary adjustment of forms?

Mr. Blaz responded that that seems to be appropriate time. If it were something we were given early in that period, then yes that's a long enough transition time. Turning to the Selective Service, Senator Kasperbauer commented and asked that this is assurance that the funding will be available. Is there any, perhaps Larry or Greg or Mr. Wang, evidence in states where they have implemented this of an increase in the number of non registered driver's? In other words, are people, simply, not getting a driver's license to avoid having to go through this? We have a lot of people without a license now, who are driving. Would we anticipate that kind of thing to happen here?

Mr. Aflague commented that information was not provided to us. The only thing that I can say is, with the enactment of this legislation in the 32 states that are implementing the law, there has not been any problem identified. As far as those people escaping the system of not registering and driving, we have no statistics on that. I'm sorry. What we can do if you are interested, I'm going to inquire to find out if there is any information on that and we will provide it to you.

Senator Kasperbauer went on to ask why is our rate so low, so much below the national average? We basically, boast about the high spirit of supporting the national efforts and we talk about the proportion of our young men and women who join the service. And yet, we have such a low average. It seems very inconsistent. Does it mean that you folks aren't doing your job? Do we have high drop out rates so they are not getting it through counselors at the schools? It seems very unusual that we'd be so far below the national average on this.

Mr. Greg Perez, in response, stated that the Selective Service is trying to find if there is a single answer to that. What appears to be the case is that, initially, people will tell us that the awareness isn't out there. Although, the Selective Service approach organizations, we approach the schools, we've met with principals. We have actually

gone into senior classes. Especially, towards years end graduation where they are all gathered in one spot. The other factor could be what you mentioned; the high drop out rate. Or, just some 18 year-olds who just refuse to comply with the federal mandate. Again, in keeping with the Selective Service philosophy and preference, that compliance is what they prefer over prosecution. We are trying to continue the effort. We see this as one additional effort, in addition to visiting the schools, talking to the young men 17 and 18 year-olds, all the way to age 25, trying to convince them that because it is a law it's also the right thing to do. It's also a civic responsibility of every citizen to come to the national defense, if called. We need to be ready to stand to respond to that call. To answer the question is that, there are a lot of kids out there that may not be aware. Apparently, those who have dropped out of school we haven't had a chance to talk to them. At the same time, whenever there is a call to arms and you had pointed out, Guam is known to produce the best military members. The best soldiers and sailors and airmen and marines in the U.S. armed forces. So, we know that when the call does come, we respond and we respond positively. We're hoping that this legislation will be one of the contributors to increased registration.

Senator Kasperbauer questioned the status of the C.N.M.I., the benefits a person would forgo, and if the Selective Service has any communication with U.O.G. and G.C.C.? Mr. Aflague responded said the C.N.M.I is implementing the legislation on this issue now. The benefits a person would forgo are; Federal employment, employment with the Postal Services, federal funds for grants and aids in education, immigration. The University is aware of this requirement. They are filtering the system. They are asking for proof of registration before they are process for any federal aids and grants. Also, the Joint Training and Partnership Act, when they go in there to apply for a job, they will be requested to show proof. If they don't have any and they are required to registered, they will be registered on the spot through the Internet.

**Senator Brown** commented that Bill 230 presents issues that, in relation to religion, can be debated until the end of time. A large issue to be dealt with is the issue of National Security. In the end, we can still choose our citizenship. That is a freedom we also have. We can choose to be citizens elsewhere, if that is more in line with our philosophy.

Chairwoman Sanford questioned that if Bill 230 becomes law, whose enforcement issue is it? Furthermore, is it first a local issue for enforcement? Do we put the shoes of the federal government responsibilities on the local environment here? Mr. Aflague responded that what we are trying to do here is to enact a law that upon applying for a driver's license or renewal that they will consent to registration. Immediately after that, it will be on the federal side.

#### III. COMMITTEE FINDINGS

The Committee finds 36 states have passed similar legislation making Selected Service registration a requirement for state motor vehicle licensing. The percentage of registered persons in the Selective Service System has increased by as much as 8% in some of the states that implemented this type of legislation. These state laws also require males be registered with the Selective Service System before receiving state student financial assistance or be eligible for state government jobs. While the Committee finds these state laws help facilitate a federal mandate, the Government of Guam's currently has insufficient local funds to fully implement and administer such dual registration and finds it appropriate to make the requirement voluntary.

The Committee further finds several other suggestions provided by those testifying were appropriate and would improve the legislation and therefore has made the following changes:

• In Section 2 of the Bill: Substituted the word 'shall' with the words 'may register'; substituted the words 'to qualify' with 'when applying,' and substituted the phrase 'shall be required to' with 'with 'may voluntarily'; and deleted the words 'has already registered with the Selective Service System, or that he' to read:

Section 2. Section 3101.1 is hereby added to Article 1, Chapter 3 of

Title 16 of the Guam Code Annotated to read as follows:

"Section 3101.1. License: Selective Service."

- (a) Male applicants, between the ages of 18-25 years may register with the United States Selective Service System in compliance with Title 50 U.S.C. App. 451, et. seq., as amended, when applying for a motor vehicle driver's license pursuant to §3101 of this Title.
- (b) Every qualified male applicant identified in this section may voluntarily authorize the Motor Vehicles Administrator to:
  - (1) Collect the necessary personal information required for registering the applicant with the United States Selective Service System and electronically transmit the necessary personal information; and
  - (2) Transmit said information to the Selective Service System pursuant to provisions in this section for purposes of registering the applicant with the United States Selective Service System.

The applicant's submission of the application shall serve as an indication that the applicant is authorizing the Division of Motor Vehicles to forward the necessary information for such registration.

• Added new sections 4 and 5 and renumbered accordingly to provide for voluntary Selective Service registration and that such registration costs by borne by the U.S. Selective Service.

Section 4. Costs associated with the Selected Service Registration Process shall be borne by the U.S. Selective Service System.

Section 5. Registering with the Selected Service when applying for a Guam motor vehicle driver's license shall be voluntary. Refusal by the applicant to register with the Selected Service shall not be a basis for denial of a Guam motor vehicle driver's license.

• Reworded the Title of the Bill to allow voluntary Selective Service registration when applying for a Guam motor vehicle driver's license to read:

AN ACT RELATIVE TO MAKING PROVIDING FOR VOLUNTARY REGISTRATION WITH THE U.S. SELECTIVE SERVICE AN ELIGIBLITY REQUIREMENT FOR WHEN OBTAINING A MOTOR VEHICLE DRIVER'S LICENSE.

#### IV. COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATIONS

The Committee on Economic Development, Retirement, Investments, Public Works, and Regulatory Functions recommends that Substituted BILL 230 "AN ACT RELATIVE TO PROVIDING FOR VOLUNTARY REGISTRATION WITH THE U.S. SELECTIVE SERVICE WHEN OBTAINING A MOTOR VEHICLE DRIVER'S LICENSE" as substituted by the Committee be hereby reported out with the recommendation "TO DO PASS".







The Committee has scheduled a public hearing 9am Wednesday, January 14th on Bill No. 230 (attached) and will be delivering an invitation to Attorney General Lenny Rapadas seeking his comments and input on the Bill.

The proposed language in Bill No. 230 makes registering with federal Selective Service an eligibility requirement for obtaining a Guam driver's license. Because registering is a federal mandate, the committee would like to clarify exactly how this law is administered, enforced etc to better determine whether the Dept of Revenue and Taxation can afford to assume this additional task, and properly interact with the respective agencies involved in implementing this federal statute. Dear Senator Sanford and Members of the Committee:

To assist in the compliance of the Military Selective Service Act, the Department of Revenue and Taxation has currently been providing a biannual report to the Selective Service National Headquarters in Chicago for the last ten years. This Bill will require purchasing new software and its related costs to install and train personnel in the use of the software. This results in additional programming and maintenance. For this, the Department will need additional funding for the Systems and Programming Division.

During Fiscal year 2003, the Driver's License Branch processed just over 39,000 applications with the current format of the current application utilizing the entire space on an 81/2 x 11 sheet of paper. With the passing of Bill 230, the application would need to be reformatted and extended resulting in a higher cost to produce. Additional costs would also be incurred for updating the handbooks to include this information.

With the Graduated License Law that was implemented in June 2003, the Branch has succeeded in operating within its budget to provide the additional processing and is ready to issue the 2<sup>nd</sup> stage Intermediate License next week. This Bill will add another challenge for the Department to meet with its already tightened budget due to the additional programming involved. Another point is that the Graduated License Law also allowed for the surrender of a valid U.S. Driver's License for Guam Driver's Licenses without the requirement of a written test. Due to this, the fee of \$15 that was charged by the University of Guam to provide the test is lost revenue for the university.

Two other areas of concern regarding Bill 230 are:

- 1) One is that if the eligible applicant refuses to register, would the Driver's License Branch deny him a license or simply forward his refusal to the National Headquarters. Clarification on this matter would be needed.
- 2) The second concern is the reporting requirement. The Bill does not specify how often during the year the reports are needed.

I would like to take this opportunity to ask the committee to strongly consider one way to offset the increased costs, which would be to raise the fees. The fee of five dollars (\$5.00) for a driver's license is what the Guam Vehicle Code has established since the 1970s. Five dollars for a three-year license is the lowest fee in the U.S. including its territories and possessions. The Commonwealth of the Northern Marianas Islands (CNMI) for example charges twelve dollars (\$12.00) and its license resembles the old laminated version of Guam's license that the Department stopped issuing in 1994.

No one will argue that the cost to provide a license has increased over the past thirty years. Just based on the 39,000 applications processed and a budget of \$476,000, a license on average costs over twelve dollars (\$12.00) to provide. Even at twelve dollars, the fee would still be amongst the lowest fees in the U.S.

The issuing of a license requires additional processing than a renewal or duplicate. Therefore, it is requested that your committee consider different fees for the different services and licenses. For example, a twenty five dollar fee (\$25.00) for a new full license and a ten dollar fee (\$10.00) for an Intermediate License and the same or reduced fees for renewals and duplicates. Attached is an extract of the Motor Vehicle Division's Fiscal Year Report pertaining specifically to the number of licenses issued and processed and a summary of written and road examinations administered. The Division is currently working on improving the reporting of its Fiscal Year production, which will provide for more detailed information regarding the costs to provide its services.

I thank you again for this opportunity to provide this statement.

### Testimony of James F. Wang before The Legislative Committee on Economic Development, Retirement, Investments, Public Works and Regulatory Functions 27th Guam Legislature Chaired by Sen. Toni Sanford

January 14, 2004

Good morning, Madam Chair, and distinguished members of the committee.

I appear before you to submit my written testimony in support of Bill 230-"An act relative to making registration with the Selective Service an eligibility requirement for obtaining a motor vehicle driver's license".

I am a Vietnam combat veteran, was assigned to the 1st Cavalry Division, in the Republic of Vietnam, as an infantryman/squad leader in May 1968 to May 1969. I am a recipient of the Combat Infantryman's Badge, Air Medal, Vietnam Service Medal, Overseas Service Medal, National Defense Medal and two (2) Bronze Star Medals. I also served military assignments in California, Washington State, Maryland, Washington, D.C., and Alaska. I served our great nation and Guam honorably and have the utmost respect for the men and women in the United States armed forces.

My only son, Matthew James, is a 2<sup>nd</sup> year cadet "yearling" (Class of 2006) at the United States Military Academy at West Point. I am extremely proud that he will soon join the ranks of dedicated soldiers, as an Army officer to complete his military service obligation. We have dedicated ourselves to serve in the United States Army as responsible and loyal citizens.

In 1967, after graduating from JFK high school, I answered a calling from the local Selective Service Board to enlist in the United States Army.

I enlisted willingly and knew that I will most likely do a tour of duty in Vietnam. I served in Vietnam without protest, it was a very traumatic experience for me and for the thousands of young soldiers just out of high school.

There is a long established military tradition of the United States of America's involvement to resolve world conflicts, where our men and women in the military, are placed in harm's way to make the ultimate sacrifices to maintain world peace and order.

When military duty calls, I believe, able men between 18 and 25 years of age, having met all requirements of the Selective Service System should enlist in the United States armed forces. Bill 230 has defining intent that enhances a federal requirement, to provide a mechanism to have ready additional military manpower for future recruitment and to comply with related federal mandate.

I extend my gratitude to the authors of Bill 230, for a responsible and sensible legislation. I humbly ask for the committee's support and endorsement of the 27<sup>th</sup> Guam Legislature for unanimous passage.

Presently, I am a member of the local Selective Service System board.

Thank you kindly for your attention and favorable action.


Remarks by Mr. Lorenzo C. Aflague State Director, Guern

Thank you Senator Toni Sanford, Chairwoman on Economic Development, Retirement, Investment, Public Works Regulatory Functions, and Senators who are present. I am Lorenzo Aflague, State Director for the Selective Service System in Guam. I am also a Veteran of the United States Army (Korean Conflict). I am here to provide testimony in support of Bill 230(LS). With this bill, you have an opportunity to give urgently needed support to an important Federal program that is a key element of National Security Strategy. National Defense is a partnership between the Federal Government and all States and Territories, and is every citizen's responsibility.

Federal law requires that men must register with Selective Service at age 18. They can register late, but once they reach age 26, they can no longer register. Registration preserves the vital link between our all-volunteer force and society at large. It shows the world that we aim to remain strong, and that we expect our youth to be responsible, as the generations before them have It also demonstrates to the men and women in our all volunteer military that the general population stands behind them, ready to serve if a crisis makes a draft necessary. Some of you may have sons, 18 through 25 years old. I hope you share my sentiment that, if a draft is necessary, we want the young men in our lives to be subject to the most fair, most equitable one in our Nation's history.

Presently, the registration rate for 18 year olds in Guam is 59.46 percent. This means that many young men are not registering when they turn 18 as the law requires. This will hinder the fairness of any future Guam draft. Presently, you have a Selective Service System Registrar in 90% of the high schools in Guam. However, we are not reaching all of those young men who drop out of school. Those who need the benefits the most will be forever denied them. One thing is certain, enactment of Bill 230 (LS) will cure this problem. As we have discovered in many other states. Driver's License laws in support of SSS registration make the registration process easier for all men in Guam. It will also skyrocket the compliance statistics to nearly 100 percent.

On behalf of the men and women of the Selective Service System here in Guam and throughout America, and our Acting Director, Mr. Lewis Brodsky, I thank each of you for giving this bill your consideration.

### **BILL 230**

### (Brief)

Legislation Requiring Individuals to be in Compliance with the Registration Provisions of the United States Military Selective Service Act (MSSA) in order to receive a Driver's License in Guam.

### PROVISIONS OF THE PROPOSED LEGISLATION:

- Would authorize the Division of Motor Vehicle, Department of Revenue & Taxation, Guam to submit driver's license records to the United States Selective Service System, and would automatically register those required to do so to be in compliance with the MSSA.
- Through the "informed consent" statement, would advise applicants for a driver's license in Guam, that their application will be used to register them if required by federal law.

/

- Failure to register, upon prosecution and conviction, carries criminal penalties of a maximum \$250,000 fine and/or maximum 5 year federal prison sentence.
- Failure to register also prohibits the individual from all federal funding toward education, including student grants and loans, and all federal employment opportunities.
- Failure to register may directly impact immigrant's opportunities to obtain citizenship.
- There is no known organized or intentional resistance to the registration requirement in Guam. Guamanians have historically complied willingly with this requirement.
- Thirty Two states/territories, including the Northern Marianas have enacted this type of legislation.
- Registration compliance rates for states that have passed Drivers
   License Legislation are approaching 100% in almost every State.
- There are no recorded problems in ANY of the states with this legislation. No state officials have reported issues associated with compliance. (See attached testimonials from Colorado, Delaware, Oklahoma, Illinois, and Utah.)

# States With Driver's License Legislation Report Increased Selective Service Compliance

WASHINGTON, DCStates that have joined the
national movement to
require young men to register with Selective Service
before they can renew their
driver's licenses have seen
dramatic positive results
from their efforts, with
mereases in registration rates
as high as 11 percent.

Results of the fourth annual state-by-state registration compliance report released today by the Selective Service System show that most of the 32 states. two U.S. territories, and the District of Columbia, that have driver's license legislation showed dramatic increases in compliance rates. California which has not egacted the driver's license legislation, reported an 88 percent compliance rate - a 7 percent increase since last year.

The state-by-state report of state registration compliance rates are based on the percentage of draft eligible! men who were born in 1983 and had registered by December 31, 2002.

Nationally, registration compliance in 2002 increased to a record 89 percent for men reaching age 19 during the year, ao by two points from 2000's high of 87 percent. Virtually all young men living in the United States are required by Federal law to register with Selective Service when they turn 18. While failure to register is a crime punishable by a fine of up to \$250,000 and/or up to five years imprisonment, the government rarely prosecutes men in peacetime who fail to register. However, many Federal opportunities including eligibility for student loans, job training, Federal employment, and citizenslop for male immigrants - are denied to young men who fail to register. Young men who are required to register and do not do so by the

time they turn 26 are perma-

nently barred from these opportunities.

In addition, cities and counties over the years have taken their own steps to ensure registration. Chicago and New York City, for instance, require young men to be registered if they want municipal jobs with the city, such as police officers or fire fighters.

Over the past few years, a movement among states to link driver's license registration and Selective Service registration has been growing.

Selective Service has the challenge of reaching more than 5,000 young men in America who turn 18 every day with a message that they're not always interested in hearing. "It's especially gratifying to see state government take this issue so seriously," said Lew Brodsky, acting director of the Selective Service System. "By tying registration directly to something that is a too-

of-mind association for pretty much every young man in America - the ability to get a driver's license - states are sending the clear message that they support registration and expect young men to take their responsibilities seriously."

In most states with such legislation, Selective Service works with the Department of Public Safety or Motor Vehicles to include a consent statement on all applications or renewals for driver's permits, licenses, and identification cards. The statement informs the applicant that by submitting the applicant he is consenting to being registered with Selective Service if he is required to do so.

In 2002, states and territoties who had begun transmitting registration data made significant gains in their compliance rates. They include Hawaii, posting 11 percent; Georgia (10 percent), Colorado and Illinois (8 percent), Alabama and Arkansas (6 percent), and Ohio and Florida (4 percent).

Utah passed legislation that gave the Driver License Division authority to transmit files electronically to the Selective Service System. The law went into effect in May 2001, and our programs were modified to keep track of all males ages 16 to 26 that appeared in our offices for a license or a identification card that was issued after the effective date. Our license/ID card applications were changed to explain to males in that age range that by making application with our office they were registering with the Selective Service System.

We provide a file weekly to Selective Service and have experienced no problems implementing this legislation or providing the data to them. The data elements that we provide are the following:

- (a) Name
- (b) Address (mailing address if there is one, if not the residential address).
- (c) Social security number
- (d) Date of birth.
- (e) License and or ID Card/Issue Date

We had minor problems with the first files that we transmitted, but it was our problem. We have test records in our production environment that we inadvertently sent in our first couple of transmissions. The problem was corrected, and things have been running smoothly since that time.

In response to legislative mandate the State of Colorado entered into an exchange of data with the Selective Service System. This necessitated the following:

- Digimarc (Polaroid) modified the Declaration Sheet to include Selective Service registration information and charged about \$1300 for their effort, which the Selective Service System paid.
- Development of data extract to include all male Selective Service applicants between and including the ages of 18 and 26; took one programmer analyst approximately 30 hours.
- Development and testing of FTP, File Transfer Protocol, took about 10 hours.

The Selective Service System personnel were extremely flexible in the method of information delivery (tapes, diskettes, CD's, or electronic) we chose to use. They wanted the information on a weekly basis. Our analysis determined that FTP provided the most efficient means of transferring data. We have been transferring data, via FTP, since September without any difficulty.

Perspective Pertaining to the Driver's License and Selective Service System's
Registration Initiative

The purpose of this memorandum is to help provide information to other State's DMVs or DPS who are considering legislation supporting the Driver's License and Selective Service System's Registration initiative.

On June 1, 2000, the State of Oklahoma became the second state to pass legislation requiring young men between the ages of 18 to 26 to show proof of being registered with the Selective Service System before being issued a permit, driver's license or state identification card.

Initially, there were concerns as to the impact upon our customer service response time, training of our personnel and what financial impact may result from this new piece of legislation. Since this law has been implemented, none of the above concerns have been realized. In other words, there have been no adverse impacts to our Department of Public Safety operations.

In Oklahoma, driver licenses are issued by Motor License Agents, who are private business operators, functioning as agents of the state. We may have as many as 280 agents, some of which will have several employees who issue driver licenses. All of the agents and their employees had to be trained to check for registration compliance and in how to explain that requirement to the applicants.

From the beginning, the Selective Service System's Regional Headquarters provided materials and support to help ensure a smooth transition with our field offices. In conjunction with the Regional Headquarters we developed computer



programming which allowed us to match the SSS registration data base to our driver's license data base and to flag the files of those license holders who were in compliance with SSS registration requirements. By doing this we were able to prompt our Motor License Agents to ask for proof of compliance from only those whom we had not verified by computer. We then enabled our agents to flag the applicant's file, after verifying compliance so that we would never have to ask for By utilizing technical applications, we have been successful in proof again. implementing the Selective Service System's Registration initiative with minimal impact on the applicants or the issuing agents. The time required to ask the question, check proof of registration, and flag the file, for the most part, less than a minute per applicant. Most applicants understand the requirements for registration and for those who do not, a very simple statement we provided the agents resolves the issue without dispute or confrontation. All training for the agents was by email and, for a few, a telephone conversation was required. With few exceptions, the system was in place and running very smooth in less than a month. At the present time, in our DPS Headquarters location, we average two (2) to three (3) questions a day regarding registration confirmation.

In closing, from the Department's view, this initiative has been a very easy program to implement and the results for helping the young men of Oklahoma comply with Federal law has been phenomenal. I understand the registration rate for Oklahoma has increased from 91.35% to 99.00%.

All of us in Illinois are excited about the positive impact of SB 290. Not only are we protecting the benefits of young men across the state, we are increasing registration compliance levels which will help ensure fairness and equity for any future draft.
