

Bill No. 2

Introduced by F. T. Ramirez,
by request

An Act making appropriations for certain
necessary capital improvements.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE TERRITORY OF GUAM:

Section 1. There is hereby appropriated out of moneys in the
Treasury of Guam, not otherwise appropriated, the following sums of
money for the purposes and projects as herein set forth, during the
fiscal year ending June 30, 1955.

(a) To continue construction of the permanent
hospital development and to provide funds in connection
with all phases of the construction of the facilities,
the sum of one million, two hundred and fifty thousand
dollars (\$1,250,000).

(b) For the Public Utility Agency to plan, con-
struct, equip, install and improve the water supply
facilities, the sum of one hundred thirty-four thousand
dollars (\$134,000).

(c) To purchase construction equipment for the
use of the Public Utility Agency, the sum of fifty
thousand dollars (\$50,000).

Section 2. Appropriations made herein carrying out the purposes
and projects authorized by this Act shall be available for expenses
incident thereto, including administration, overhead, planning and
supervision, and any and all other expenses incident thereto, and shall
continue in full force and effect and shall be available until expended
for such purposes and projects.

Section 3. This Act is an urgency measure and shall take effect
upon its approval by the Governor.
