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Substitute Bill by Committee on Judiciary

An Act to smeed the Penal Code of Guam by adding Title XIII thereto, providing for juries and trial by jury in feloxy cases within the jurisdiction of the District Court of Guam and to amend the Code of Civil Procedure of Guam by adding Chapter 8 to Title VIII of the Code of Civil Procedure providing for juries and trial by jury in civil cases within the jurisdiction of the District Court of Guam,

BE IT ENACTED BY THE PROPIE OF THE TERRITORY OF GUAR:

Section 1. Part II of the Penal Code of Guam is hereby amended by adding Title XIII thereto to read as follows:

PRITIE XIII

JURIES: TRIAL BY JURY

Section 1571. Trial by jury. Any person accused by information of a felony in the District Court of Guam shall be entitled to a trial by jury, and the Federal Rules of Criminal Procedure heretofore or hereafter promulgated shall be applicable thereto.

Section 1572. Qualifications. Any citizen of the United States who has attained the age of 21 years and who has resided anywhere within the territory of Guam for a period of six months, immediately prior to jury service, is competent to serve as a juror, unless:

- (1) He has been convicted in a state, territorial, or federal court of record of a crime punishable by imprisonment for more than one year and his civil rights have not been restored by pardon or samesty;
- (2) He is unable to read, write, speak and understand the English language;
- (5) He is incapable, by reason of mental or physical infirmities, to render efficient jury service;
- (4) He is incompetent to serve as a jurer by any law of the territory of Guam.

 Section 1575. Exemptions. The following persons shall be

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(1) Members in actual service in the armed forces of the United States;

- (2) Members of the Fire or Police Departments of the territory of Guam or employees of government contractors emgaged in providing internal security protection or fire protection by such contractors;
- (5) Public officers of the executive, legislative or judicial branches of the government of the United States or of the government of Suam who are actively engaged in the performance of official duties.

 Section 1574. Explusion or excuse from service.
- (a) The district judge, for good cause, may excuse or exclude from jury service any person called as a juror.
- (b) Any class or group of persons may, for the public interest, be excluded from the jury panel or excused from service as jurors by order of the district judge based on a finding that such jury service would entail undue hardship, extreme inconvenience or serious obstruction or delay in the fair and impartial administration of justice.
- (c) No citizen shall be excluded from service as a jurer on account of race or color.

Section 1575. Manner of drawing; jury commissioners and their compensation. The names of jurors shall be publicly drawn from a box containing the names of mot less than two hundred qualified persons at the time of each drawing.

The jury box shall, from time to time, be refilled by the elerk of the District Court, or his deputy, and a jury commissioner appointed by the court with the approval of the Judicial Council of Guam.

Such jury commissioner shall be a citizen of good standing.

He shall receive \$10 per day for each day necessarily employed in the performance of his duties.

The jury commissioner and the clark of the District Court, or his deputy, shall alternately place one name in the jury box until the box shall contain at least two hundred names or such larger number as the court determines.

Section 1576. Special jury: talesmen from bystanders.

(a) Whenever sufficient jurors are not available, the court may require the United States Marshal to summon a sufficient number of talesmen from the bystenders.

Section 1577. Summaning jurors. When a court orders a jury to be drawn, the elerk, or his deputy, shall issue summons for the required number of jurors and deliver them to the United States Marshal for service.

Each person drawn for jury service may be served personally or by registered mail addressed to such person at his usual residence or business address.

Such service shall be made by the marshal, who shall attach to his return the addressee's receipt for the registered summons, where service is made by mail.

Section 1576. Disqualification of marshal or deputy. Whenever the United States Marshal or his deputy is, in the opinion of the court, disqualified to summon jurors, the court may appoint some disinterested person who shall take an oath to perform such duty truly and impartially.

Section 1579. Frequency of service. A juror may be challenged on the ground that he has been summoned and served as a juror within one year prior to the challenge.

Section 1580. Fees. Jurors shall receive the following fees for actual attendance at the place of trial and for the time necessarily occupied in going to and from such place, at the beginning and end of such service or at any time during the same: \$7.00 per day, except that any juror required to attend more than thirty days in hearing one case

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may be paid, in the discretion and upon the certification of the district judge, a per diem fee not exceeding \$10.00 for each day in excess of thirty days which he is required to hear such case.

For the distance necessarily traveled to and from a juror's residence by the shortest practicable route in going to and returning from the place of service, at the beginning and at the end of the term of service, and for all additional mecessary daily transportation expense: Y costs per mile, except that if daily travel appears impracticable, subsistance of \$5.90 per day shall be allowed. Whenever in any case the jury is ordered to be kept together and not to separate, the cost of subsistence during such period shall be paid upon the order of the court in lieu of the foregoing subsistence allowance."

Section 2. Effective date: Title XIII of the Penal Code shall be applicable to all offenses amounting to a felony committed on or after October 1, 1955.

Section 3. Chapter 8 is hereby added to Title VIII of the Code of Civil Procedure of Guan to read:

"CHAPTER &

TRIAL BY JURY

Section 680.1. In sivil cases within the jurisdiction of the District Court of Guen, the parties shall be entitled to a trial by jury and the Federal Rules of Civil Procedure heretofare or hereafter promulgated shall be applicable thereto.

Section 680. 2. Qualifications. Any citizen of the United States who has attained the age of 21 years and was has resided anywhere within the territory of Guan for a period of six months, immediately prior to jury service, is competent to serve as a juror, unless:

- (1) He has been convicted in a state, territorial, or federal court of record of a crime pumishable by imprisonment for more than one year and his civil rights have not been restored by pardon or aumesty;
 - (2) He is smable to read, write, speak and

- (5) He is incapable, by reason of mental or physical infirmities, to render efficient jury service;
 - (4) He is incompetent to serve as a juror by any

Section 580.5. Exemptions. The following persons shall be

- (1) Members in actual service in the armed

- (a) The district judge, for good cause, may expuse or explude from jury service may person called
- (b) Any class or group of persons may, for the public interest, be excluded from the jury panel or expused from service as jurors by order of the district judge based on a finding that such jury service would entail undue hardship, extreme inconvenience or serious obstruction or delay in the fair and impartial adminis-
- (c) No citizen shall be empluded from mervice as a juror on account of race or color.

Section 580.5. Manner of drawing; jury commissioners and their compensation. The names of juror shall be publicly drawn from a box

containing the names of not less than two hundred qualified persons at the time of each drawing.

The jury box shall, from time to time, be refilled by the clerk of the District Court, or his deputy, and a jury commissioner appointed by the court with the approval of the Sudicial Council of Guam.

Such jury commissioner shall be a citizen of good stending.

He shall receive \$10 per day for each day necessarily employed in the performance of his duties.

The jury commissioner and the clark of the District Court, or his deputy, shall alternately place one name in the jury box until the box shall contain at least two hundred names or such larger number as the court determines.

Section 680.6. Special jury; talesmen from bystanders.

(a) Whenever sufficient jurors are not available, the court may require the United States Marshal to summon a sufficient number of talesmen from the bystanders.

Section 680.7. Summaning jurors. When the court orders a jury to be drawn, the elerk, or his deputy, shall issue summans for the required number of jurors and deliver them to the United States Marshal for service.

Each person drawn for jury service may be served personally or by registered mail addressed to such person at his usual residence or business address.

Such service shall be made by the marghal, who shall attach to his return the addressee's receipt for the registered summons, where service is made by mail.

Section 680.6. Disqualification of marshal or deputy. Whenever the United States Marshal or his deputy is, in the opinion of the court, disqualified to summon jurors, the court may appoint some disinterested person who shall take an oath to perform such duty truly and impartially.

Section 680.9. Prequency of service. A jurer may be challenged on the ground that he has been summoned and served as a jurer within

one year prior to the challenge.

Section 580.10. Challenges. In civil cases, each party shall be entitled to three peremptory challenges. Several defendants or several plaintiffs shall be considered as a single party for the purposes of making challenges. If there is more than one defendant the court may allow the defendants additional perceptory challenges and permit them to be emercised separately or jointly.

All challenges for cause or favor, whether to array or panel or to individual jurors, shall be determined by the court."

Section 680.11. Pees. Jurors shall receive the following fees
for actual attendance at the place of trial and for the time necessarily
escupied in going to and from such place, at the beginning and end of
such service or at any time during the same: \$7.00 per day, except that
any juror required to attend more than thirty days in hearing one case
may be paid, in the discretion and upon the certification of the district
judge, a per diem fee not exceeding \$10.00 for each day in excess of thirty
days which he is required to hear such case.

For the distance necessarily traveled to and from a juror's residence by the shortest practicable route in going to and returning from the place of service, at the beginning and at the end of the term of service, and for all additional necessary daily transportation expense:

7 cents per mile, except that if daily travel appears impracticable, subsistence of \$5.00 per day shall be allowed. Whenever in any case the jury is ordered to be kept together and not to separate, the cost of subsistence during such period shall be paid upon the order of the court in lieu of the foregoing subsistence allowance."

Section 4. Chapter 8 of Title VIII of the Code of Civil Procedure shall be applicable to all actions tried in the District Court of Guam after October 1, 1955.
