Committee on Rules, by request of the Governor in accordance with Section 6(b) of the Organic Act of Guam.

AN ACT TO ADD A NEW TITLE LV TO THE GOVERNMENT CODE OF GUAN RELATIVE TO UNFAIR TRADE PRACTICES AND CONSUMER PROTECTION.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE TERRITORY OF GUAM:

Section 1. A new Title LV is hereby added to the Government Code of Guam to read as follows:

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### TRADE PRACTICES AND CONSUMER PROTECTION

#### Chapter 1

#### General Enforcement

Section 53600. Definitions. As used in this Chapter:

- (a) 'Person' means natural persons, corporations, trusts, partnerships, incorporated or unincorporated associations, and any other legal entity.
- (b) 'Trade' and 'commerce' mean the advertising, offering for sale, or distribution of any services and any property, tangible and intangible, real, personal or mixed, and any other article, commodity, or thing of value wherever situate, and shall include any trade or commerce directly or indirectly affecting the people of Guam.
- (c) 'Documentary material' means the original or a copy of any book, record, report, memorandum, paper, communication, tabulation, map, chart, photograph, mechanical transcription, or other tangible document or recording, wherever situate.
- (i) 'Unfair methods of competition and unfair or deceptive acts or practices' means any one or more of the following:

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- (3) causing likelihood of confusion or of misunderstanding as to affiliation, connection, or association with, or certification by, another;
- (4) using deceptive representation or designation of geographic origin in connection with goods or services;
- (5) representing that goods or services have sponsorship, approval, characteristics, ingredients, uses, benefits, or quantities that ao not have or that a person has a sponsorship, approval, status, affiliation, or connection that he does not have:
- (6) representing that goods are original or new if they are deteriorated, altered, reconditioned, reclaimed, used, or secondhand;
- (7) representing that goods or services are of particular standard, quality, or grade, or that goods are of a particular style or model, if they are of another;
- (8) disparaging the goods, services, or business
   of another by false or misleading representation of fact;
- (9) advertising goods or services with intent not to sell them as advertised;
- (10) advertising goods or services with intent not to supply reasonably expectable public demand, unless the advertisement discloses a limitation of quantity;
- (11) making false or misleading statements of fact concerning the reasons for, existence of, or amounts of price reductions: or

(12) engaging in any other conduct which similarly creates a likelihood of confusion or of misunderstanding.

Section 53601. Unlawful Acts or Practices. Unfair methods of competition and unfair or deceptive acts or practices in the conduct or any trade or commerce are hereby declared unlawful.

Section 53602. Restraining Prohibited Acts. Whenever the Attorney General has reason to believe that any person is using or is about to use any method, act or practice declared by Section 53601 of this Chapter to be unlawful, and that proceedings would be in the public interest, he may bring an action in the name of the Government of Guam against such person to restrain by temporary or permanent injunction the use of such method, act or practice. The Island Court is sutherized to issue temporary or permanent injunctions to restrain and prevent violation of this Chapter and such injunctions shall be issued without bond.

Section 53603. Assurances of Voluntary Compliance. In the administration of this Chapter, the Attorney General may accept an assurance of voluntary compliance with respect to any method, act or practice deemed to be violative of the Chapter from any person who has engaged or was about to engage in such method, act or practice. Any such assurance shall be in writing and filed with and subject to the approval of the Island Court. Such assurance of voluntary compliance shall not be considered an admission of violation for any purpose. Matters thus closed may at any time be reopened by the Attorney General for further proceedings in the public interest, pursuant to Section 53602.

Section 53604. Civil Investigative Demand.

(a) Whenever the Attorney General believes that any person may be in possession, custody, or control of the original or a copy of any documentary material relevant to the subject matter of

an investigation of a possible violation of this Chapter, he may execute in writing and cause to be served upon such a person a civil investigative demand requiring such person to produce such documentary material and permit inspection and copying: Provided that this Section shall not be applicable to criminal prosecutions.

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- (b) Each such demand shall:
- (1) State the statute and section thereof, the alleged violation of which is under investigation, and the general subject matter of the investigation;
- (2) Describe the class or classes of documentary material to be produced thereunder with reasonable specificity so as fairly to indicate the material demanded;
- (3) Prescribe a return date within which the documentary material is to be produced; and
- (4) Identify the members of the Attorney General's staff to whom such documentary material is to be made available for inspection and copying.
- (c) No such demand shall:
- (1) Contain any requirement which would be unreasonable or improper if contained in a subpoena duces tecum issued by a court; or
- (2) Require the disclosure of any documentary material which would be privileged, or which for any other reason would not be required by a subpoens duces tecum issued by a court;
- (c) Service of any such demand may be made by:
- (1) Delivering a duly executed copy thereof to the person to be served or to a partner or to any officer or agent enthorized by appointment or by law to receive service of process on behalf of such person;

(2) Delivering a duly executed copy thereof to the principal place of business in Guam of the person to be served; or

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- (3) Mailing by registered or certified mail a duly executed copy thereof addressed to the person to be served at the principal place of business in Guam, or if said person has no place of business in Guam, to his principal office or place of business.
- (e) Documentary material demanded pursuant to the provisions of this Section shall be produced for inspection and copying during normal business hours at the principal office or place of business of the person served, or at such other times and places as may be agreed upon by the person served and the Attorney General.
- (f) No documentary material produced pursuant to a demand under this Section shall, unless otherwise ordered by a court for good cause shown, be produced for inspection or copying by, nor shall contents thereof be disclosed to, any person other than the authorized employee of the Attorney General, without the consent of the person who produced such material; provided that under such reasonable terms and conditions as the Attorney General shall prescribe, such documentary material shall be available for inspection and copying by the person who produced such material or any duly authorized representative of such person. The Attorney General or any attorney designated by him may use such documentary material or copies thereof as he determines necessary in the enforcement of this Chapter, including presentation before any court; provided that any such material which contains trade secrets shall not be presented except with the approval of the court in which the act is pending after adequate notice to the person furnishing such material.

(g) At any time before the return date specified in the demand, or within twenty (20) days after the demand has been served, whichever period is shorter, a petition to extend the return date for, or to modify or set aside the demand, stating good cause, may be filed in the Island Court.

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- (h) A person upon whom a demand is served pursuant to the provisions of this Section shall comply with the terms thereof, unless otherwise provided by order of sourt. Any person who, with intent to avoid, evade, or prevent compliance, in whole or in part, with any civil investigative demand under this Section, removes from any place, conceals, withholds, or destroys, mutilates, alters, or by any other means falsifies any documentary material in the possession, custody or control of any person subject of any such demand shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and shall be subject, upon conviction, to a fine not to exceed \$500 or to imprisonment for a term of not more than one (1) year, or both.
- (i) Whenever any person fails to comply with any civil investigative demand duly served upon him under this Section or whenever satisfactory copying or reproduction of any such material cannot be done and such person refuses to surrender such material, the Attorney General, through such officers or attorneys as he may designate, may file, in the Island Court, and serve upon such a person a petition for an order of such court for the enforcement of this Section. Whenever any petition is filed in the Island Court, under this Section, such court shall have jurisdiction to hear and determine the matter so presented, and to enter such order or orders as may be required to carry into effect the provisions of this Section. Any disobedience of any final order entered under this Section by any court, appellate or otherwise, shall be punished as a contempt thereof.

Section 53605. Civil Penalties. Any person who violates the terms of an injunction issued under Section 53602 shall forfeit and pay to the Government of Guam a civil penalty of not more than \$1,000 per violation.

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Section 53606. Forfeiture of Corporate Franchise. Upon petition by the Attorney General, the Island Court may, in its discretion, order the dissolution or suspension or forfeiture of franchise of any corporation which violates the terms of an injunction issued under Section 53602.
