AN ACT TO CALL A SPECIAL ELECTION FOR THE PURPOSE OF ASCERTAINING THE VIEWS OF THE VOTERS OF GUAM UPON DISTRICT REPRESENTATION WITHIN THE GUAM LEGISLATURE.

WHEREAS, the Congress of the United States recently amended the Organic Act of Guam to provide that elections to the Guam Legislature could be at large, could be by districts, or could be partly at large or partly by districts, but provided that in the event districts were utilized, the composition of such districts would have to be based on the latest Federal population census of the territory; and

WHEREAS, this Federal population census makes no distinction between voters and non-residents who just happen to be physically on the island at the time the census was taken, and thus the largest election districts under the census are Yigo and Santa Rita because of the military bases within each of these districts, although for purposes of local elections neither Yigo or Santa Rita are anywhere close to having the largest number of local voters, and thus if the Federal census be followed, it appears that the results might well be so distorted as to destroy the very purpose of the "one man one vote" doctrine since a vote in Yigo would count more than a vote in Tamuning; and

WHEREAS, this emendment to the Organic Act further provided that the Legislature should act promptly on the three alternatives provided and that whatever action was taken could not be changed until the next Federal census; and

WHEREAS, since the Legislature is not at all certain how the interests of the people can best be protected in local elections, but does know that the present system of all candidates running at large has at least the virtue of making everyone's vote count exactly the same; now therefore

BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE TERRITORY OF GUAM:

Section 1. There shall be held in Guam a Special Election for the purpose of submitting to the voters of Guam two special questions, as hereinafter set out, to determine the will and desire of the people of Guam thereon. Said Special Election shall be held on the Tuesday next after the first Monday of November, 1968, concurrently with the holding of the 1968 General Election, and the Governor shall issue a proclamation calling said Special Election for such date and for such purpose, in accordance with the Election Laws of Guam and the provisions of this Act.

Section 2. At said Special Election, each qualified elector shall be given a special ballot, to be prepared and furnished by the Election Commission, which shall be in substantially the following form:

## SPECIAL QUESTIONS

QUESTION NO. 1

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(The voter should indicate his preference by placing a cross (X) mark in the square opposite the method of election he prefers.)

How shall candidates for election to the Guam Legislature be elected?

Run at large

Run from districts

Some run from districts and some run at large QUESTION NO. 2

(To'vote for the proposal, place a cross (X) mark in the square opposite the word "YES"; and to vote against the proposal, place a cross (X) mark in the square opposite the word "NO".)

If candidates for election to the Guam Legislature are to run from election districts, should the population of such election districts be based upon the Federal population census? Yes

Section 3. The Special Election established in this Act shall be conducted in all respects in the same manner as provided by law for other elections, so far as such provisions may be applicable, except that such special ballots shall be kept in separate boxes and canvassed separately. The results of such canvass shall be certified to the Election Commission

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in similar manner as other election results, and by it duly certified to the Governor.

Section 4. This Act is an urgency measure.

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
