Dear Speaker Won Pat:

Transmitted herewith is Bill. No 25 (EC) entitled "AN ACT TO AMEND §1000(a) OF CHAPTER 10 OF TITLE 1, GUAM CODE ANNOTATED, TO INCLUDE MARTIN LUTHER KING, JR. DAY AS A GUAM HOLIDAY AND TO ADD A NEW CHAPTER 23 TO TITLE 1, GUAM CODE ANNOTATED, TO CREATE THE REVEREND DR. MARTIN LUTHER KING, JR. HUMAN AND CIVIL RIGHTS COMMISSION" which I have vetoed.

Public Law 26-157 was enacted on December 15, 2002 as part of cost-reduction steps to conserve the government's limited financial resources by reducing the number of paid holidays of the government of Guam from 15 to 10. Martin Luther King, Jr. Day was one of the five holidays eliminated. Also eliminated were Presidents Day, Discovery Day, Good Friday, Columbus Day and Election Day.

1 G.C.A. §1000 was subsequently amended to restore the Governor's authority to declare additional holidays and the adoption of the federal government practice for holidays falling on a weekend.

While I admire and applaud the sacrifices and strides that Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. accomplished in the struggle for equality, Bill No. 25 was passed by the Guam Legislature with no additional appropriation to cover the increased cost this government would incur, and as such would begin to erode the purpose for the limited holiday measure. Several of the holidays that were eliminated from the government of Guam, Presidents Day, Discovery Day, Good Friday, Columbus Day and Election Day, carry significant value to our people, however, our financial realities preclude us from granting those holidays. This does not diminish the significance of these events nor does it prevent the government or its employees from acknowledging or celebrating their significance.

Rather than codifying the holiday, the law allows the Governor the flexibility to declare special holidays when it is determined that the government's finances could afford it. Unfortunately, the government's financial condition still warrants austere measures including limited holidays and therefore regretfully have had to veto Bill No. 25.

AN ACT TO AMEND §1000 (a) OF CHAPTER 10 OF TITLE 1, GUAM CODE ANNOTATED, TO INCLUDE MARTIN LUTHER KING, JR. DAY AS A GUAM HOLIDAY AND TO ADD A NEW CHAPTER 23 TO TITLE 1, GUAM CODE ANNOTATED, TO CREATE THE REVEREND DR. MARTIN LUTHER KING, JR. HUMAN AND CIVIL RIGHTS COMMISSION.

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF GUAM:

- 2 Section 1. §1000 (a) of Chapter 10 of Title 1, Guam Code Annotated, is

- 4 **"§1000. Holidays.** (a) The holidays of Guam are:
- 5 New Year's Day;

24	§2301. Creation and Membership. There is hereby created the Reverend, Dr.
25	Martin Luther King, Jr. Human and Civil Rights Commission, hereinafter referred to
26	as the 'Commission', which shall continue in effect until dissolved by I Liheslatura.

1 The Commission shall be formed and meet no later than forty-five (45) days after the 2 enactment of this Act. 3 Commission appointees must have lived in Guam for at least one (1) year and must be committed to promoting the ideas and vision of the Reverend, Dr. King, Jr., 4 5 as well as human and civil rights in Guam. Commission members shall be sworn in by I Maga'lahen Guåhan and their appointments shall not be subject to advice and 6 7 consent procedure of I Liheslaturan Guåhan. 8 The Commission shall be comprised of seventeen (17) members, fourteen (14) of whom shall be appointed by I Maga'lahi and three (3) who shall be appointed by 9 10 the Speaker of *I Liheslatura*. 11 (a) I Maga'lahi's appointees are: 12 The Executive Director; **(1)** 13 (2) Two (2) from the military community; 14 (3) One (1) from the business community; 15 **(4)** One (1) from the Guam Interfaith Committee: 16 (5) Three (3) representing education: one (1) each from private. 17 public, and military educational institutions; One (1) from the Consular Corps; 18 (6) 19 **(7)** One (1) member of the Mayor's Council of Guam 20 designated by the President of the Council, who may select 21 himself; 22 (8)One (1) member of the Guam Youth Congress designated by 23 the Speaker of the Youth Congress, who may select himself; 24 (9) One (1) member of the Civil Service Commission; 25 (10)One (1) from the Judiciary System; and

1	(11) One (1) member of the Guam Chamber of Commerce,
2	designated by the Chairman of the Chamber, who may select
3	himself.
4	(b) The Speaker's appointees are one (1) member of the minority and
5	two (2) members of the majority who shall be designated by the
6	Speaker who may appoint himself.
7	§2302. Term and Vacancy. Members of the Commission shall serve a
8	three (3)-year term. Members shall serve without compensation. The Executive
9	Director of the Reverend, Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Human and Civil Rights
10	Commission shall serve as the Commission's Chair and the Vice Chairperson and
11	other commissioned officers shall be elected from among its members. Any
12	vacancies occurring within any three (3)-year term shall be filled by nomination by
13	two-thirds $(2/3)$ vote of the remaining Commission members and approved by I
14	Maga'lahi.
15	§2303. Function. The Executive Director, as Chair of the Commission,
16	shall be responsible for the leadership, guidance, and directions, for the planning,
17	organizing, coordinating, and developing activities to achieve the mission and goals of
18	the Commission as contained in this Chapter. The Commission shall receive support
19	services from I Maga'lahi's Office consisting of office supplies, materials, equipment,
20	and duplicating services to carry out the duties and mission of the Commission.
21	Commission Members shall be responsible for:
22	(a) the roles, duties, and responsibilities of the officers and
23	committees;
24	(b) creating programs and activities that promote social justice, peace
25	and goodwill among people of different races and cultures through
26	debates, festivals that markets goods and services, performing arts,

1		arts and crafts, and displays of the Reverend Dr. Martin Luther
2		King, Jr.'s vision of 'Living the Dream';
3	(c)	securing grants, sponsorships, and donations for developing and
4		delivering educational programs, cultural activities and projects
5		that promote positive social change, cultural understanding, and
6		appreciation for ethnic differences;
7	(d)	Planning, developing and coordinating workshops, seminars,
8		and/or conferences that focus on 'Training the Trainers' on the
9		non-violent philosophy espoused by Dr. King, Jr.;
10	(e)	Building partnership with Guam's public, private, and military
11		school systems, Guam Community College, University of Guam,
12		Nieves Flores Memorial Library, Guam Educational
13		Telecommunications Corporation (KGTF), other media stations,
14		government instrumentalities, non-profit organizations, and human
15		and civil rights groups for promoting and marketing the
16		Commission's programs and activities; and
17	(f)	developing communication networks with local and global
18		communities to gain information, share ideas, and exchange
19		resources that foster a global vision for future leaders.

24	§2304.	General Powers. The Commission shall have, and may exercise,
25	the following gene	eral powers in carrying out the activities specified in this Chapter.

24		services, real, personal or mixed, tangible or intangible property - to aid
25		in developing and implementing of the activities, programs, and projects
26		as authorized by this Chapter and Commission.

(f) The Commission *shall* adopt rules and regulations for governing the operations of this Commission and *shall* take other actions as may be necessary *or* appropriate to carry out the powers and duties herein specified *or* hereafter granted to *or* imposed upon it.

§2305. Repository for Commission Documents. The Executive Director of the Human and Civil Rights Commission *shall* be responsible for transmitting video recordings and documents that represent programs, workshops, activities, and projects conducted by the Commission. The Nieves Flores Memorial Library *shall* be the official repository of all public records and materials pertaining to the Commission's programs.

§2306. Budget. In addition to assistance from *I Maga'lahi's* Office, the Commission *shall* exert efforts to secure grants, monetary donations, and sponsorships and in-kind services from the community at large, both locally and nationally.

- **§2307. Reporting.** The Commission *shall* submit the following reports to *I Maga'lahi* and the Speaker of *I Liheslaturan Guåhan*:
 - (a) Overall Financial Status Reports on all Committees;
- (b) Copies of all Commission and Committee minutes; and
- 18 (c) Annual Overall Evaluation & Performance Report.

§2308. Martin Luther King, Jr. Festival. The primary festival event will occur on the Monday of the Martin Luther King, Jr. holiday; however, additional events related to the holiday may be scheduled at any time during the holiday weekend and thereafter. The Commission will conduct a festival that highlights 'Living the Dream.' The Commission will seek the volunteer participation of government of Guam employees and the community at large to participate in the various stages of planning, developing, and implementing the festival activities as deemed necessary."
